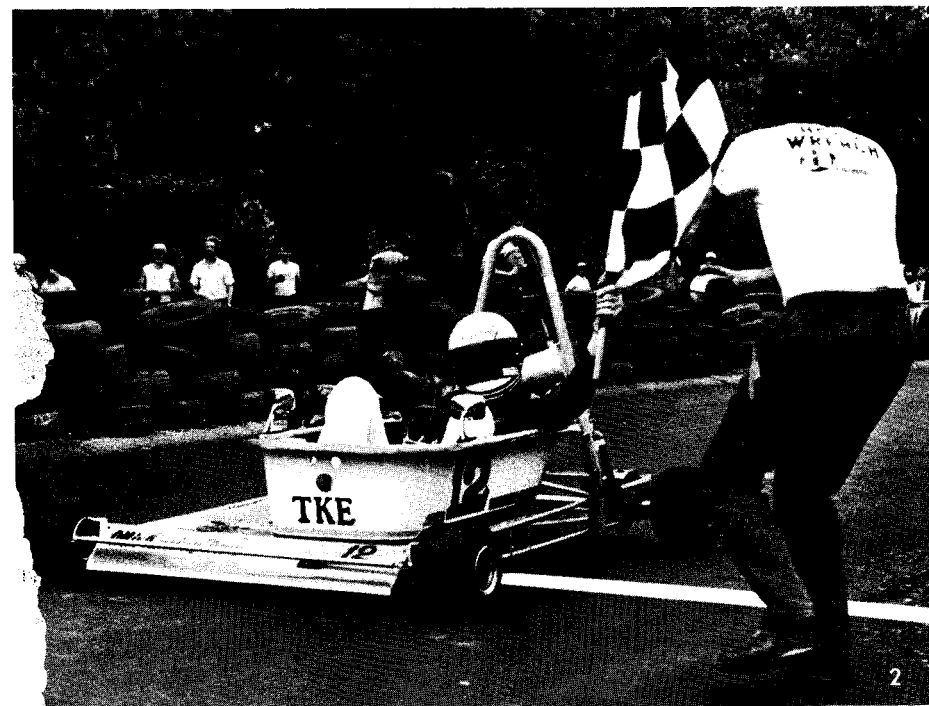

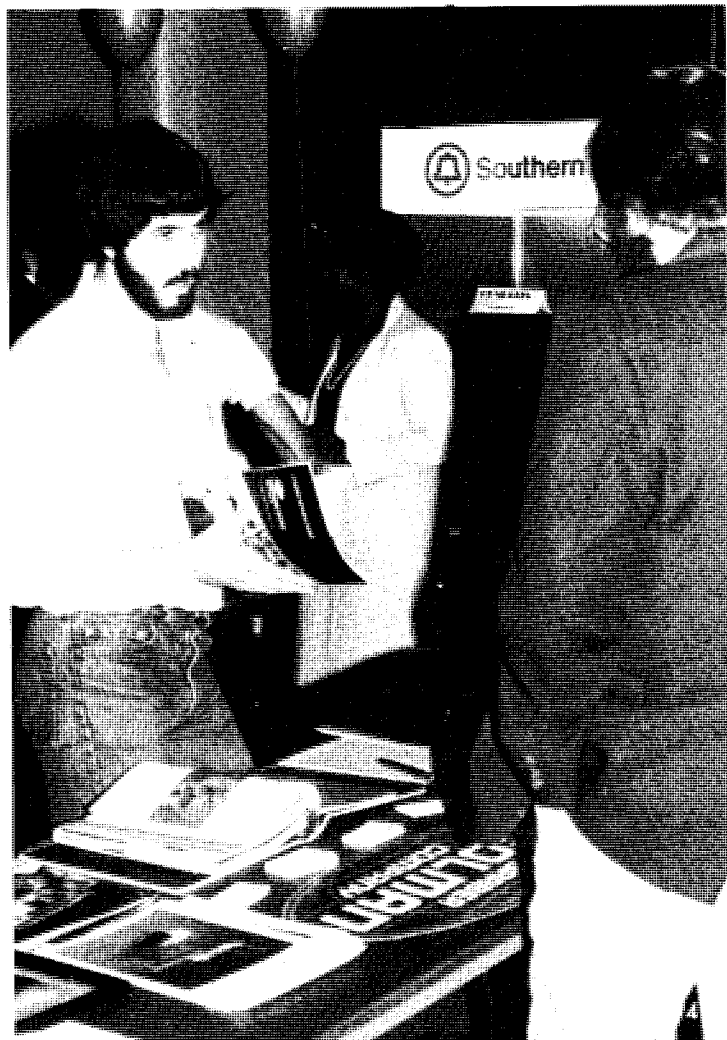

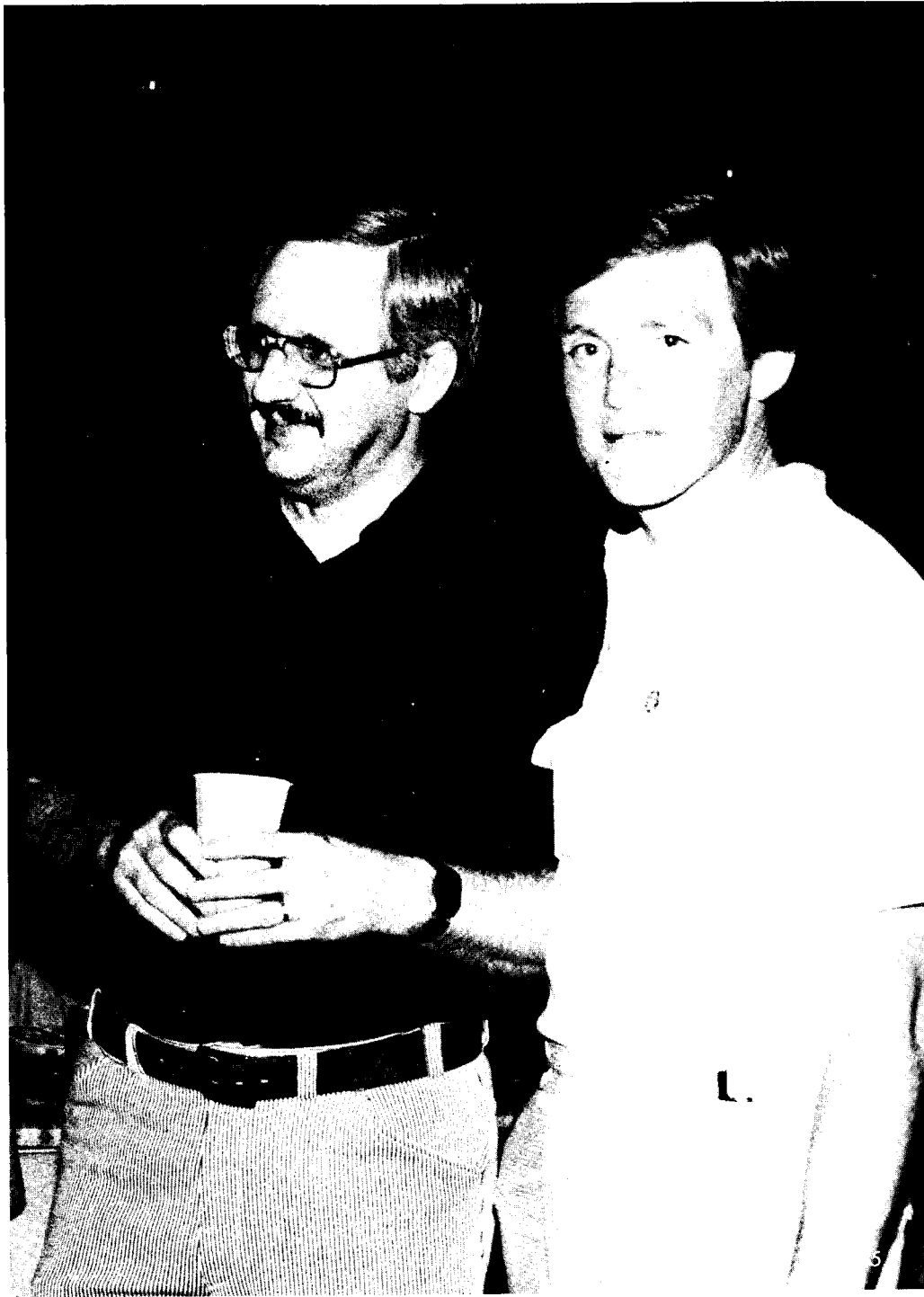

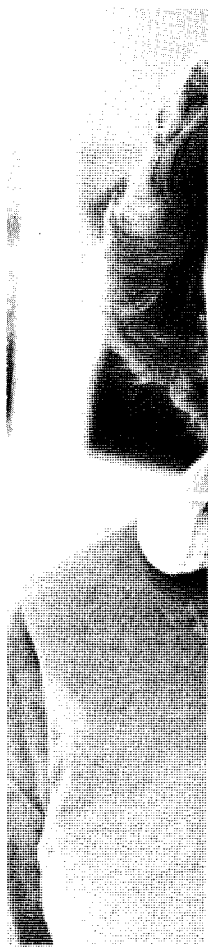

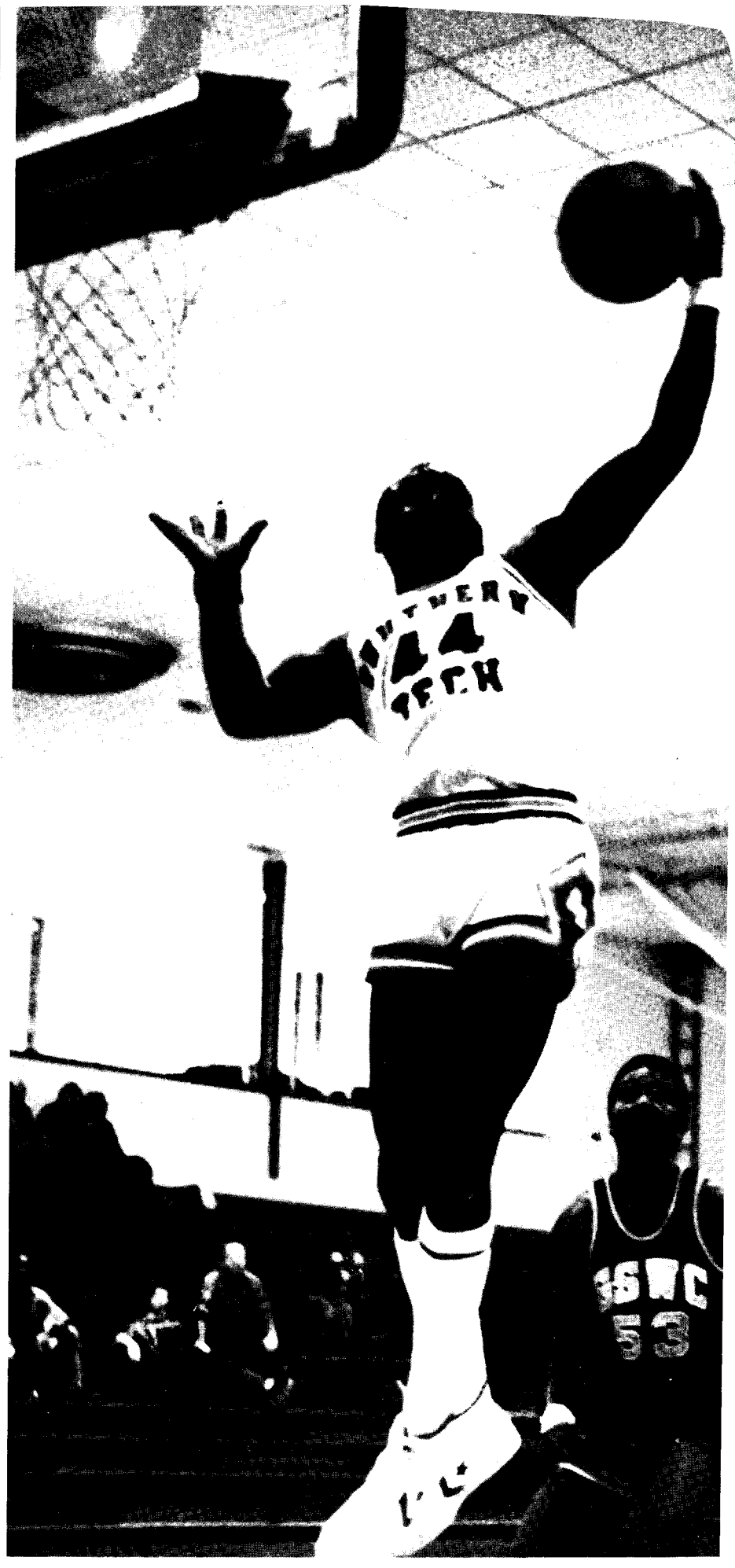
Leading in steals for the season were Baxter Thomas with 55, Ricky Hudson with 52, Charlie Glass with 46 and Richard Stallworth with 45.

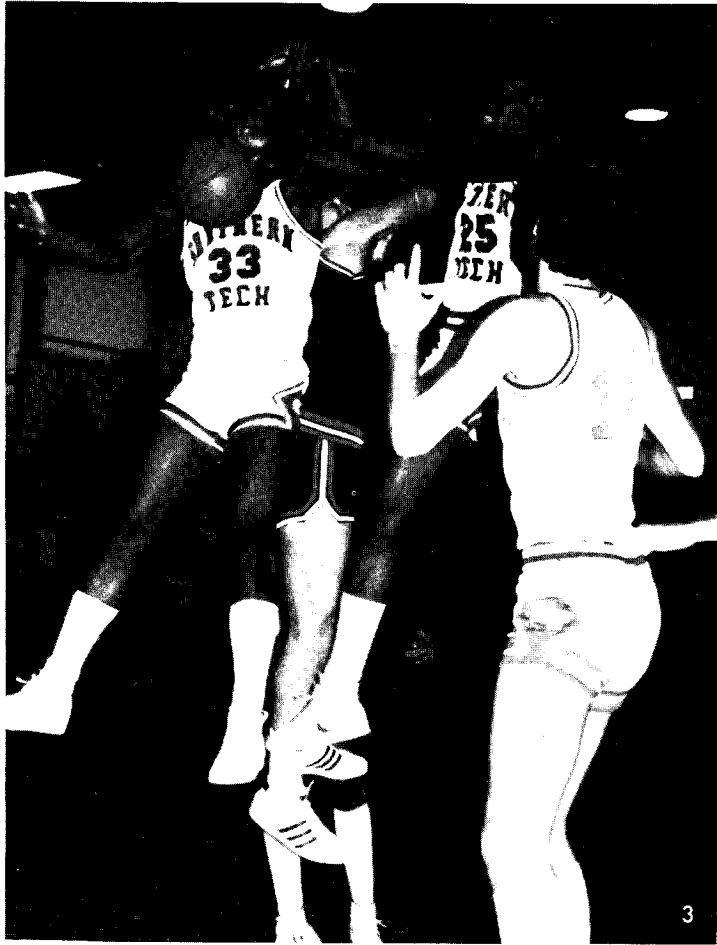
In total points scored per game, the Hornets averaged 73.5; opponents averaged 63.8.



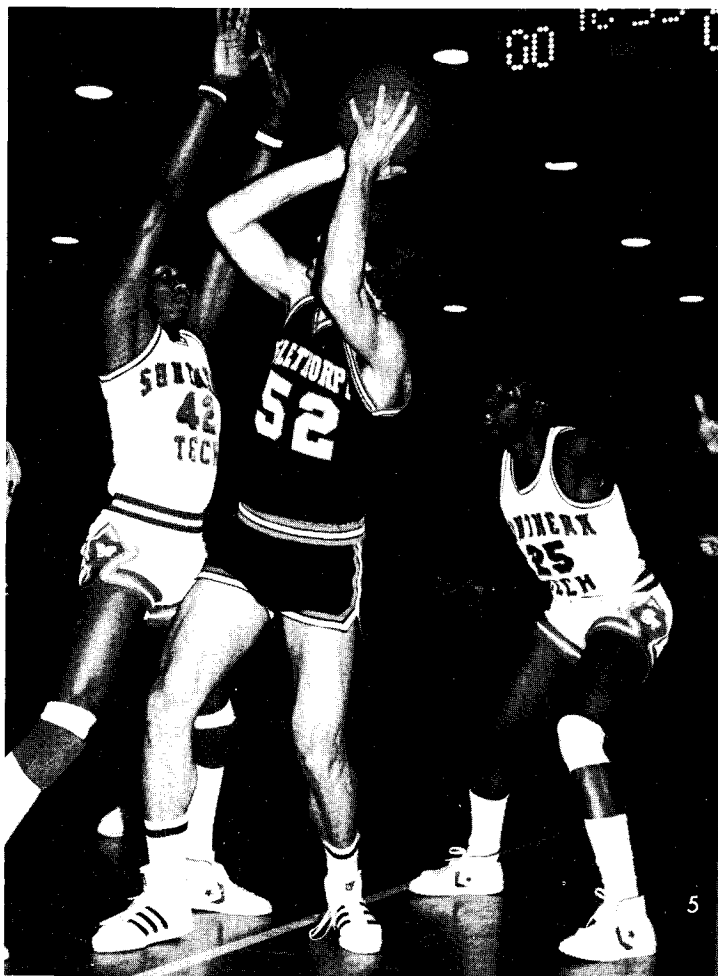

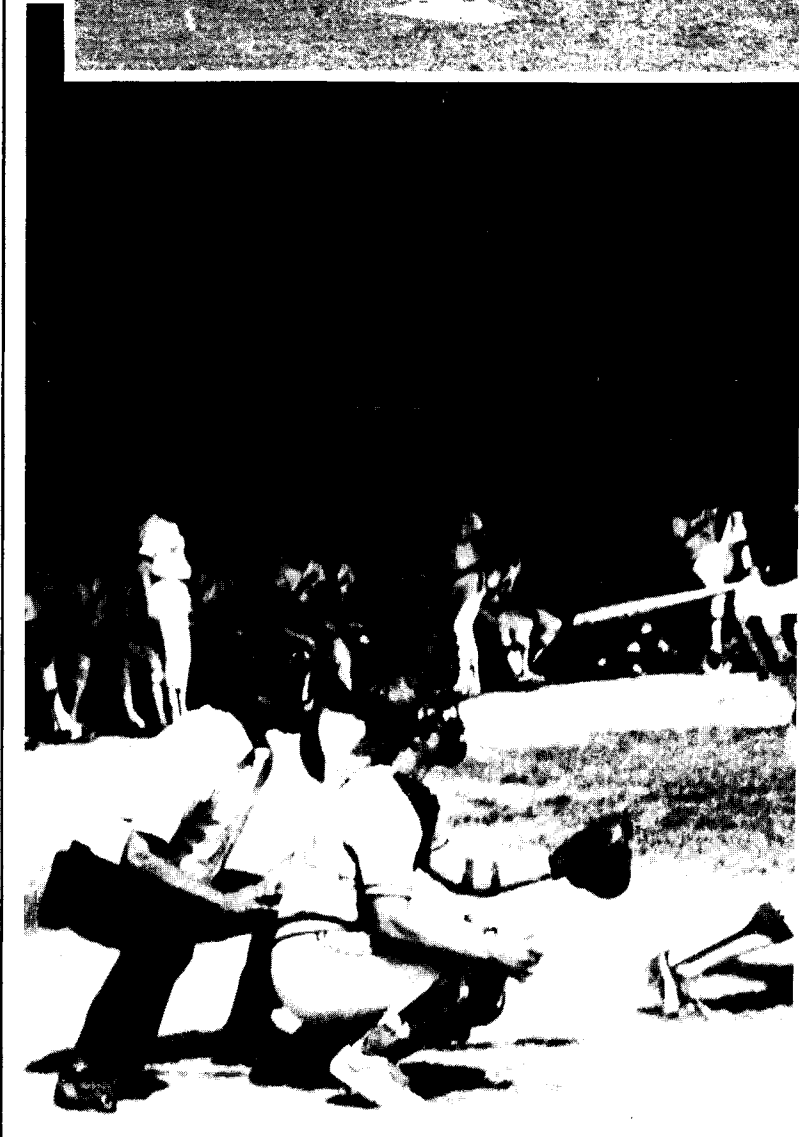
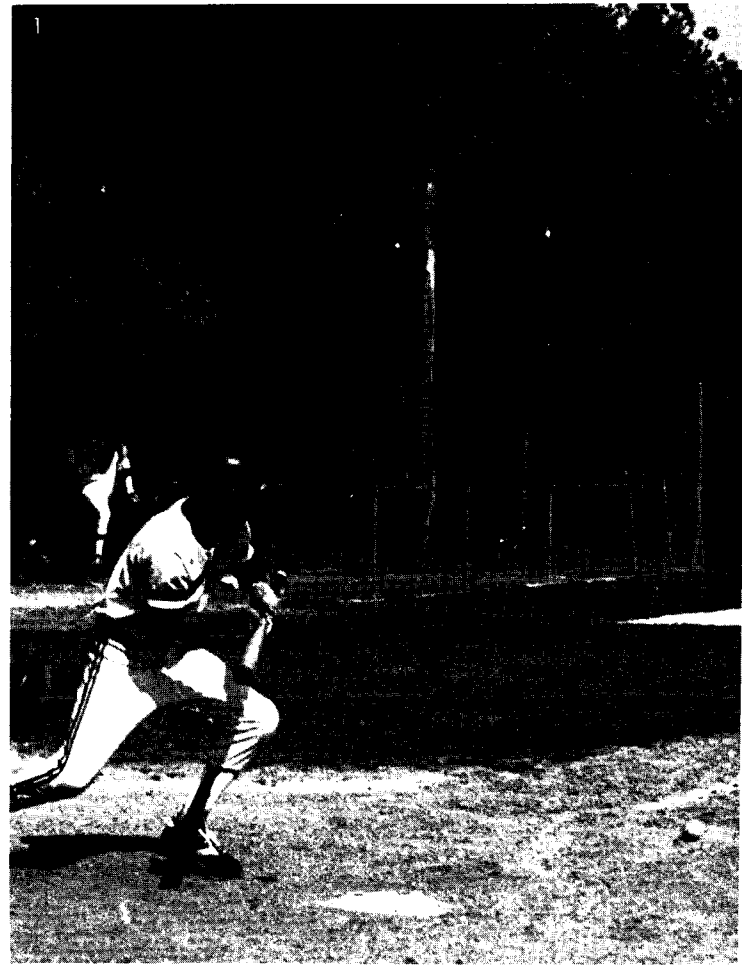


Discipline and sweat paid off for the 1981 basketball team with a 4th trip to K.C. - topping Valdosta State's record for three straight district titles from 1967-1969.


looking back
