W ith this first issue of The Technician The Technical Institute begins one of its most important student activities of the 1948-49 school year and makes its debut into the college journalistic field. The Technician will continue to be five columns wide 16 1/2 inches deep, and four pages long. It will appear nine times throughout the year as nearly as possible on the fifteenth of each

Fall Term to Bring 300 on September 27

nder the leadership of Director L. V. Johnson and Assistant Director John D. Sewell The Technical Institute will begin its fall quarter's work with the registration of students on Monday, September 27. Over 300 men and women are expected to enroll.

The Technical Institute is the new two-year coeducational technical boarding college established at Chamblee, Georgia on March 24, 1948 as unit of the Engineering Extension Division of Georgia Tech to train technicians for industry. To provide for the increase in enrollment and give the students the work which their courses require Mr. Johnson states that five basic shops will be ready for use by September 27. Workmen have been on the job all summer installing machinery and other equipment essential to the complete efficient operation of machine woodwork, welding, and sheet-metal shops. The advanced shops Mr. Johnson reports will be ready by January. Drawing and science labs have proven not only adequate but superior.

r. L.V. Johnson received his B.S. Degree in Engineering Physics in 1929 and his M.S. Degree in Physics in 1930 at the Ohio State University. After leaving Ohio State University Mr. Johnson became Assistant Professor in Physics at the Georgia Institute of Technology In 1940. Mr. Johnson was made Coordinator of the Civil Aeronautical Training Service for the Georgia Institute of Technology and acted in this capacity until 1942. The Georgia Institute of Technology granted Mr. Johnson leave of absence in 1943 in order that he might assist in the establishment of the Army University at Bierritz, France. While at the Army University in France Mr. Johnson was Professor of Electrical Engineering. In 1947 Mr. Johnson returned to the Georgia Institute of Technology as Associate Professor in the Aeronautical Department. Mr.

ommencement exercises for the forty-eight September graduates of the Southern Technical Institute and also for the seven June graduates will be held at 11:00 o'clock on the morning of September 6 at the Atlanta Naval Air Station Theater.

The commencement address will be delivered by Mr. Kirk Sutlive, of Savannah, President of the Associated Industries of Georgia. As we all know, the Association is one of the most interested sponsors of the Southern Technical Institute, and the selection of its distinguished president to deliver the Commencement address is quite fitting and proper.

Director Lawrence V. Johnson will act as master of ceremonies, and, with his unusual ability, will undoubtedly make the first commencement of Southern Tech on that will be long remembered.

Degree from Mercer University in 1930, Mr. Sewell did graduate work at Emory University and graduate work in administration and supervision of Vocational Education at the University of Florida. Mr. Sewell's studies at Law School were interrupted by his entrance into the Navy.

Mr. Sewell served in Balboa at the Naval Ammunition Depot for 18 months and was Operations Officer and Head of Instruction Afloat for 20 months at Ft. Schuyler. His last duty was as Instructor Training Officer with the Bureau of Naval Personnel. After being placed on active duty in November, 1945, Mr. Sewell became Supervisor of Distributive Education for the Atlanta and Fulton County Schools.

In addition to his duties as Assistant Director of The Technical Institute, Mr. Sewell is Brigade Training Officer for the Navy's Organized Reserve in this section.

Winter Quarter Opens January 2; 400 Anticipated

fter a Christmas holiday period, lasting from December 18 through January 1, students and instructors of Southern Technical Institute will return on Monday, January 2, to perform the first job of the winter quarter—registration.

In spite of the fact that millions of people throughout the nation will, on January 2, be listening to bowl games and observing New Year's Day in other ways, registration will go on. The Board of Regents has set the rule that all units under its supervision will register students on January 2; therefore STI must conform.

400 Expected

Four hundred students are expected to enroll. ALthough 36 will be lost through graduation, STI officials anticipate a sufficient number of new students to keep the enrollment at the 400 figure.

Since no resignations from the faculty are expected, the teaching staff will remain the same, with one exception. Another instructor in Civil Technology will be added to assist Mr. Holladay in this department.

Five Students Attain 4.0 Average As 53 Acquire Honor Roll Rating

From spring quarter averages compiled for the honor roll, it is apparent that many students at Southern Tech are determined to graduate with honors in the future. A total of five students— three of whom scheduled a heavy, 21-hour study load—attained a 4.0 (all "A's") average, while the majority of the others were honor roll repeaters with exceptionally high averages. Those five students leading the honor roll list with the perfect grade of 4.0 are Robert R, Berry, Russell H. Chiselbrook, Luther H. Cooper, Charles C. Russell, and Howell T. Stenger. Placing second with a grade of 3.90, Gas FUel student John L, Mosny repeated the position he acquired on the winter quarter honor roll. Viil Technology student Frank H. Blair ran a close third with a quarterly average 3.84.

Representing all eight departments at SOuthern Tech, a total of 53 students acquired the point averages necessary for honor roll qualifications. Several other students attained the required average but did not carry the minimum 15 credit hours.

Georgia Colleges Lose Students; STI Shows Gain

Curtailment of the GI training program, the birth rate during the depression of the 1930's, and the changeover of many high school systems from 11 grades to 12 grades have combined to lower enrollment in the state's University System this fall.

The Board of Regents recently reported total enrollment this year to be 20, 513 as compared with 23,533 in 1950. The expiration of GI training accounted for 2,000 of the loss. THis year there at 4, 654 GI students enrolled compared to 6,276 last year. College officials said the remaining decrease was due to high school grade extensions and the low birth rate 17-19 years ago. The Regents said, however, that they were pleased the decline was no larger.

Southern Technical Institute, with 435 students, was one of the few schools among the 18 in the University System that showed an increase over the fall enrollment of a year ago.

Tau Alpha Pi National Honor Society Chartered, Organized at Southern Tech

LOCAL CHAPTER IS NUCLEUS OF NEW NATIONAL GROUP

The Tau Alpha Pi National Honor Society, a national scholastic fraternity for technical institute students only, was chartered on the SOuthern Technical Institute Campus on January 15.

On January 29 the local Tau Alpha Pi, which had been Southern Tech's Honor Society since the fall of 1948, was deactivated and simultaneously became the first affiliate chapter of the National Honor Society—the Alpha Alpha Chapter.

The National Society is the outgrowth of considerable interest shown by members of the loca Tau Alpha Pi in affiliating with a national scholastic society for Technical Institute students. Since no such national organization having the high standards of the local TAP existed, members of the STI Society, under the leadership of Faculty Advisor J. J. Defore, determined to establish a national organization.

Constitution Drawn

A national constitution, which was written and then approved by a convention of interested persons, was established. These acts brought into existence the National Society. The constitution naturally made provisions for certificates, emblems, symbols, officers and details of their election, a national magazine, the Tau Alpha Pi Journal, and other essentials of running an efficient national society.

On February 6 the second affiliate group joined the national organization and became the Beta Alpha Chapter. It is the Academy of Aeronautics, La Guardia Field, New York.

National officers of the Tau Alpha Society are Mr. J. J. Defore, executive secretary; Mr. R. L. Wilkinson, executive councilor; and Mr. Anthony Behr, Academy of Aeronautics, executive councilor.

Some Facts and Figures Revealed As School Observes Its Ninth Birthday

Southern Technical Institute began actual operation—teaching students, that is—on Monday morning, March 24, 1948, though much preliminary work was essential before the doors could be opened to students.

One hundred and sixteen students took the chance and enrolled for work. Since that quarter 3281 have enrolled and taken work lasting in time from one day to graduation, sometimes a matter of 12 quarters. STI's largest enrollment was the 735 in the fall of 1956.

Of these 3281, 1280 men and women have received degrees in the eight fields taught. This means that only 39 percent of all who have studied at Southern Tech graduated. It must be added that the 1280 includes many students who remained to obtained two degrees.

Director L. V. Johnson Review Southern Tech's Past and Future

On January 2, 1948 a vanguard of five of the Southern Tech faculty and staff opened offices in Building 24 and began the job of building a college. They faced the job of converting open barracks into classrooms, laboratories, and offices, hiring a qualified faculty, designing courses, buying equipment, and selecting textbooks, all for a college program practically unknown in the entire South.

The first quarter opened on March 24, 1948, with an enrollment of 116 students, 106 veterans and 10 non-veterans, enrolled in seven different courses. OUr faculty and staff then totaled twelve. This quarter's enrollment of 826 students in eleven curricula, with a faculty and staff of 63, is a measure of our success to date, but it is only a beginning.

Today, ten years and 1512 graduates later, the technical-institute program is beginning to be understood and the technician is becoming a valuable and respected member of the industrial team. I am proud to say that the work of Souther Tech and the fine work of its graduates have contributed much to this better understanding of the technical-institute program and the training and responsibilities of the technician.



THE TECHNICIAN has received information that the progress on the new buildings has not been as rapid as was hoped for, but it has been ateady. At the present time all of the buildings are "above ground" in their construction, all foundation work having been completed. In fact, work is being done on the second floor of three of the buildings, and on the roof of the two one-story buildings.

The completed campus will consist of eight buildings: a one-story Administration Building; four twostory buildings—consisting of classroom, student services and laboratory, electrical, and drawing buildings; and a cluster of three onestory shop and laboratory buildings.

The architect estimates that the project is better than twenty per cent complete, and we still hope for completion on achedule in June 1960

One of my fondest memories is the fact that I did make an A in all four of his classes.


His example has been one that I treasure and I have tried to apply to my entire career.


STI Students Design Marietta Fountain




LETTER TO SPSU

Southern Tech & Kennesaw Launch Joint Fundraiser

Southern Tech and Kennesaw College are celebrating anniversaries. As Southern Tech reaches its 40th and Kennesaw its 25th year, the schools have united, not only to celebrate the past, but to look towards the future. Together they have initiated a fundraising effort with hopes of reaching \$4 million goal.

Dr. Stephen Chesire, President of Southern Tech, and Dr. Betty Siegel, President of Kennesaw, have worked closely with Earl Smith, Chairman of the drive, and other Steering Committee members to elicit donation pledges from members of the community (corporate and individual) even before official kickoff of the campaign. By the time of drive kick off (January 21, 1988), the halfway point of \$2 million in pledged donations had been

reached. Much of this commitment has come from the development community with John Williams (Post Properties) extending a three to one challenge.

For every three dollars pledged by developers, he will put up one dollar up to \$250,000. Tim O'Neil of O'Neil Development has pledged \$100,000 and facilities for the campaign office. Other contributors include Cotton States Insurance (\$25,000), Wiliby and Sewell (\$30,000), Melinda and Gordon Morton (\$25,000) and Wilton Looney of Genuine Parts (\$25,000).

Mr. Smith stated that "Barnett Bank, which will be locating its state headquarters in Cobb County, has established a leadership role for the banking community by pledging \$200,000. We hope, as a result, to obtain \$750,000 to \$1 million in pledges from the banking community." Individuals, small businesses, and large corporations will be asked to help achieve the remainder of the goal.



When I started at Southern Tech in the fall of 1962, we were merely another item in the Georgia Tech Extension Division. When I graduated with my AS (MET) at the end of the Summer quarter in 1965, we had finally broken the 1000 student threshold. The Northeast corner of the classroom building was occupied by the University of Georgia Extension. It later evolved into Kennesaw State University.

When I got out of the Navy in 1972, Southern Tech had become a 4 year institution, and I continued to my BET. The student population had increased to over 3000 and included good looking coeds. As the school approached the 80's, we felt the pinch of being a sizable percentage of the Georgia Tech undergrad population and still were just an item in the Extension Division budget. Several professors and alumni went to the Board of Regents and asked to be made into an independent college. The regents agreed and we became one of the (at the time) 33 colleges and universities.

Well, now we will see how we do as part of another university. Hopefully, President Dan Papp, who presided over Southern Tech for a short interim, will see to it that it is left to continue as a premier technical college as part of a larger university.





Name Changes, but Song Remains the Same

The Faculty met on Thursday, May 30 to vote on the proposed name change for Southern Tech. The Board of Regents had requested input from faculty by the following by the following day, Friday, May 31, so that it could its final decision.

The Board of Regents has recommended Atlanta Polytechnic State University. Georgia Polytechnic University (1st choice), and Marietta Polytechnic State University. Students also expressed general dislike for the Regents recommendation.

Alumni polled liked Southern Polytechnic State University, Southern Polytechnic University (1st choice), Southern Tech University, and Southern Technology University. Their main concern was to maintain "Southern" in our name.

Communicorp Consultants suggested Atlanta Polytechnic University, and noted that including "State" was also viable.


Faculty and Staff had mixed feelings about several possible names. They voted as follows: Southern Polytechnic State University (49) Atlanta State University (The Polytechnic University of GA) (33) Atlanta State University (22)

On the same three names, the dean's

department heads voted 15, 17, and 4 respectively.

The SGA by a unanimous vote, preferred Southern Polytechnic State University. At this time, it is unclear when final decision will be made or when the change will take effect. The Board of Regents will meet on June 11 and 12 to discuss these issues. They can either act then or table their discussion for thirty days.

A possible "grandfather" clause may be included so that current students may choose which name will appear their diploma.


Dr. Lisa Rossbacher is the New President


The Sting Stolen




Where's the fire?


Why? Nothing will change simply because we are a divided student body that only complains. We never join together and speak up about anything. Why should we expect anything to change?





The plan to consolidate Kennesaw State University and Southern Polytechnic State University is announced.




The commencement speech was wrapped around how avocados are the essential ingredient to make guacamole and how it holds everything together. "The most important part".
