

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EQUAL RIGHTS AMENDMENT

When I first became aware that Georgia was one of the states rejecting the ERA, I wasn't too concerned about it. After all the first equal opportunity court case, based on sexual discrimination, was begun in Georgia. The woman won, after some appeals, and her story was told very proudly on the three hour documentary special that was shown January 9. The program was geared towards the changing roles of women and men (titled "Of Women and Men" it is a likely emmy winner) in American society. Through my own ignorance, I expected that, since 1975 has been declared International Women's Year and Georgians had gathered from a wide variety of organizations to urge our state's ratification, the Georgia Media (capitalized because of its inherent power) would finally write a worthwhile article for the public to react to. Certainly Georgians reacted to last year's legislators who ran on about how they didn't want to see their wives drafted. Just as they generally react each time the Media seems to constantly attach the word lesbian to anything related to women's liberation. No, unfortunately the public's fears and weaknesses are manipulated to various editor's opinions. And the "apple pie" Phyllis Schlafly looks so all American, as she goes on about women's "place" to legislatures and church groups. This anti-ERA (yes, a female version of dear old J.B. Stoner) activist even sends a mysteriously financed newsletter to organizations and political powerheads. It is interesting to note that most pro-ERA material, especially that through N.O.W., is financed by individual supporters. But, alas and alack, the Media came through in its tradition of minimal coverage, with little undertones and inuendos, as usual.

I suppose the biggest gripe against the ERA is the myth that its passage

will make women draft material. The fact is that Congress ALREADY has the power to draft women, if so inclined. When this fact was pointed out to me, I became a definite supporter of the ERA. But, the truth is, I personally feel that it isn't any "nicer" to blow up a young man than a young woman. I am against war and I'd evade the draft, (maybe a few policies would finally change when half the country was either in jail or exiled?) but that is another issue. War has been defined as Hell...wonder if that too has been reserved for men only? The fact remains that currently the military is voluntary and men or women who elect to join should be treated according to their abilities. If a woman wants to be a combat soldier, then it is her sacrifice and/or choice. The idea that a male dominated Congress will suddenly begin to draft women, when the ERA is passed, is about as far fetched as the idea that public toilets will presto! convert to unisex. And even so, one pro-ERA Oklahoma man (another unratified state), Frosty Troy writes:

"Any man who notices the fine nuances raising a daughter has got to be for it. I'm less concerned about my daughter being drafted or operating a jack hammer or using a coeducational john than being a second class citizen all her life..Why should my daughter be treated differently under the law than my son?"

The Equal Rights Amendment was first brought to Congress over fifty years ago. It was supported by Eisenhower, Kennedy, Johnson, Nixon, and now by Ford. In 1972 Congress passed the amendment but five more states must ratify the amendment for it to become 27th.

The Amendment states:

Section 1. Equality of rights under the law shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any State on account of sex.

Just A Bunch of Crazy Ladies?

Section 2. The Congress shall have the power to enforce, by appropriate legislation, the provisions of this article.

Section 3. This amendment shall take effect two years after the date of ratification.

Contrary to some of the popular conceptions, the ERA is not for women only. For example, sexual assault on males would be redefined so that the criminal offender would be subject to the same laws as the rapist. This

would obviously be beneficial in cases of child molestation on male children. And on a more common basis, the ERA is justified by a representative of the Illinois men for the ERA. Jordan Miller writes, "Under the current laws, men as widowers are entitled to less money in social security benefits than their female counterparts. A man's financial situation can be as difficult as a woman's when he is the sole supporter of a family

and no longer able to work to his full capacity. With regard to child custody in divorce cases, there have been many instances in which the husband desired and rightfully deserved to be entrusted with the care of the child, but was denied custody. Both parents ought to have this option; it should not be assumed that the mother is by nature a better parent. Furthermore, protective labor laws should be

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Who Are "Us," Anyway?

Around The Sentinel office we speak of ourselves as a newspaper. Our worst critics accuse us of lacking hard-core news and therefore failing to fulfill the definition of a newspaper.

We agree. We are top-heavy with features. We lean toward a baroque artsy-ness (please! no hate mail from the art department!) and tend to look at things with more than a touch of humor. There's not very much we take seriously -- especially not ourselves.

In defense of our attitude, let us remind our readers to look again at KJC. There's not a great deal happening in the way of pure news. We are, after all, a small, rural community college, and we are infected with all the advantages and disadvantages of such a school. The news is just about all good -- and any newspaper reader knows that news is, by accepted modern-day usage, bad. If it isn't war or imminent war, murder, rape, economic collapse, or major earthquake, then it isn't

news. Mrs. Jones is interesting only if her house burns down and she's raped in the grocery store. Who cares to read "Mrs. Jones had a lovely day yesterday: she got a bargain in chicken fryers, decided to return to school to learn truck-driving, and the dentist pronounced her kid cavity-free"?

That's the kind of school we have. Our problems, our hassles are damn small compared to those of the world's. We complain about the one or two instructors whose calling seems to be making students lives miserable -- but we counter by spreading the word and avoid the monster next quarter. And we can congratulate ourselves for being lucky enough to have the vast majority of the faculty not only competent in their fields but also concerned about the individual student.

In the years past the traditional feud was between The Sentinel and the SGA. The charge was always apathy when you peeled away the particu-

lars. We could renew this tradition in 1975, but what for? The SGA could possibly do more, but so could we and so could everybody. A commuter college's greatest problem is apathy: we have no dorms and thus the campus is not "home" to any of the student body. Furthermore, KJC's records show that more than one half of the students work, many of these holding down full-time jobs, and a working student just does not have the time to spend in extracurriculars. Add to that figure the large number of married women with families to care for, and the number of students left is about the number of students active in some capacity on campus.

Frankly, I think things look pretty good, considering. I think the SGA is doing a great job, especially with the 4 Year KJC Campaign. And despite our detractors, I think The Sentinel is not doing so bad, either. We've gone from an 8 page paper of a year ago to a paper that runs a minimum of 16 pages in length. We publish regularly, come hell or high water, every two weeks. We've increased our circulation to over 200 colleges all over the U.S. We have also distributed bundles of The Sentinel to several businesses all over



San Franciscan rock flourished, then slowly declined, leaving the musical world as a melting pot from which new and meaningful talent emerged. From this vat one Joni Mitchell emerged bringing with her songs and feeling for the Woodstock generation.

For as Linda Rhonstadt says, "Joni is the first woman to match any man on his own terms as a song writer, guitar player or as an incredibly magnetic human being." This is what keeps Joni Mitchell as Rock'n'Roll's leading lady.



FARADE

To remove fat from soup (and from yourself), dip an ice cube wrapped in piece of clean cloth into soup. Fat congeals quickly a cold surface.

Food-saver. When food cooked in water has been oversalted, boil a few pieces of raw potato in the pot for several minutes. Most of the excess salt will be absorbed by the potatoes.

Rice trick. Keep rice grains snowy-white and separate, instead of lumpy, by adding a teaspoonful of lemon juice to the water.


Don't throw away beet tops. They are delicious and are rich in vitamins and minerals, especially iron.

To test the age of an

egg, place in deep pan of cold water. If it lies on its side, it is fresh. If it stands at an angle, it is probably 3 or 4 days old. If the egg stands on end upright, it is over 10 days old. If it floats to the top, toss it out!!

"Eggs-cellent" eggs. The least understood and most important rule in egg cookery is—low temperature. The science behind the rule is that the protein in the egg is easily toughened by too-high temperature. This accounts for eggs of unappetizing texture that give away the third-rate cook!

To store tennis racquets for the winter, cover them first with a coating of petroleum jelly. Prevents strings from snapping when not in use.




Creative Drama Workshops

[KJC-PIO] Exploring new avenues for creativity and personal enrichment will be one of the goals of Creative Drama Workshops beginning at two Cobb County locations this month.

The non-credit courses will be offered by Kennesaw Junior College at J.J. Daniell Community School on Monday evenings starting Jan. 13 and at McEachern Community School beginning January 20.

The J.J. Daniell course is open to the public but the McEachern class is open to drama students only.

Leader of the eight-weeks workshops will be Anthony Shibona—Atlan-

ta actor, teacher and director—whose drama experience includes many appearances at the New York Shakespeare Festival, the National Shakespeare Company and Academy theater of Atlanta. He has studied with Herbert Berghof, Uta Hagen, Milton Katselas and Frank Wittow.

Application of specific dramatic techniques—verbal and non-verbal, emotional and physical—will be utilized in the workshops to encourage expansion of self-awareness, Shibona said.

"The theater is the great, living laboratory of human behavior," the dramatist pointed out.

The workshops will include training in basic theater skills including verbal and non-verbal expression, relaxation and concentration, sensory and emotional recall, incorporating images, scene and character analysis and development of improvisational skills.

Shibona, who has served as Artist-in-Residence for Atlanta Public Schools holds the B.A. degree from Oberlin College and studied at the Herbert Berghof Drama School in New York.

Record Enrollment

Winter quarter enrollment at Kennesaw Junior College is 2,219—largest winter quarter yet—and still counting, according to unofficial figures released today by Thomas H. Rogers, Jr., registrar and director of admissions. Late registration continued through Wednesday evening (Jan. 8).

The number reflects a 15 percent increase over winter quarter 1974 and almost equals fall quarter's 2,241, a phenomenon college officials say has never occurred before in KJC's nine-year history. (Registration for winter quarter 1974 was 1,927).

"It's very unusual for any quarter's enrollment to equal or exceed the fall quarter figure," pointed out James W. Woods, director of dat processing.

Both Rogers and Woods said they feel the current economy is one of the major factors influencing the unusual increase. The

KJC officials indicated that rising unemployment and increased veteran's benefits apparently have encouraged many individuals to return to school.

William C. Watson, KJC's coordinator of veteran's affairs, said an unofficial count shows winter quarter veterans' registration (including dependents) is 385, an increase of 10 percent over the fall quarter figure of 347. He added that a larger percentage of veterans apparently is taking full-time academic loads.


"The realities of the current employment picture may be influencing many people to re-assess their job potential," Rogers observed. Such evaluation probably has led numbers of individuals to decide to further their education or re-train for other fields, he added.

Rogers also cited a "larger base of former stu-

dents" as another factor in the winter growth. "As the college becomes older, we have more former students to draw from, and apparently many of them are returning to the campus," he said.

Program expansion, growth of facilities and better accessibility to the campus also influence enrollment, according to Woods. He pointed out that KJC this quarter is offering three credit courses off-campus: two in Cartersville and one in Smyrna. KJC's new James V. Carmichael Student Center will open soon, and the completion of another segment of Interstate 75 in November has brought the highway to within three miles of the campus.

"It may be impossible to isolate all the factors involved in the growth this winter," Woods said, "but we are certainly pleased with the enrollment figure."







KJC-P10: If you and your spouse are arguing more and enjoying it less, then a short course at East Cobb Community School may offer a new kind of help.



Communal Bathing

If there is to be a fad to replace "streaking" as the national campus pastime for 1975, it just might be communal bathing. Already, group baths are becoming an integral part of after-class life for some students at the University of California at Berkeley.

Following a hard day of classes, student neighbors here not take to big back-yard tubs to sip wine, exchange tales of the day's woes, read

poetry, and soak their troubles away.

"I'm sure there's going to be a big hot-baths phenomenon pretty soon," says Clive Scullion, a self-described leader of what's becoming known as the "community tub" movement. But, says Scullion, group bathing is a far healthier form of tension-release than simply running across campus nude.

"Whatever your troubles may be -- if school is getting you down or your old lady is giving you a hard time -- popping into

a hot bath with your friends will make you feel better," he says.

Scullion, a major in conservation and natural resources at the University of California, became a "hot bath fanatic" after trying a dip in a friend's backyard tub. He decided immediately that he wanted a tub of his own. But, after some research, he discovered that he could not afford one. Most commercial models, built of redwood for Japanese hot bath enthusiasts, cost at least \$1,600.

Then, a few months back, Scullion stumbled onto a proverbial gold mine -- 13 huge industrial containers made of concrete and wasting away in a vacant lot. He purchased the unwanted tubs from the land's owner and went to work.

By smoothing and painting the concrete and drilling holes for water pipes, Scullion built his first tub which is capable of seating up to eight people comfortably. Now, he's in the process of turning out additional tubs for other Berkeleyites at a total cost of only \$250.

Scullion is also planning to "make forms" from his original containers so that he can continue to produce inexpensive tubs after his original supply is sold-out.

Although Scullion isn't sure just how many, quite a few outdoor tubs are springing up in the Berkeley area these days. And they are put to use even when the weather is at its winter ugliest, as most have small gas heaters to maintain a water temperature slightly beneath scalding.

For many of the participants, communal bathing has become a vital part of their social schedule. Ogden Williams of *The Daily Californian*, student newspaper at the University of California at Berkeley, recently interviewed a group of communal bathers.

"Your body just sort of melts away," reports one bather who believes that group baths "release harm-

ful toxins" from the body.

Another participant, Jennifer Bayless, adds, "It's not really sexual. It's a mental and physical bond experience, a social Activity. I've taken baths alone and with other people, and I definitely prefer bathing with others."

Scullion himself adds that the community-tub is a great way to get to know your neighbors. "I've had some of the best conversations sitting in the bath naked with my neighbors," he says. "It's a totally honest, totally relaxed experience...People just start to say exactly what they feel."

Even Women Ph.D.s Earn Less

(EARTH NEWS) — It may come as no surprise, but a new study comparing women and men who hold doctoral degrees has found that even the best-educated women in our society still earn less money than their male counterparts.


The study, sponsored by the Graduate Records Examination Board, found that male Ph.D.'s receive an average salary of \$18,700 five years after earning their degrees, while women earn an

average of only \$16,400. In addition a greater percentage of male doctorates are hired by business (where salaries are generally higher) while most women are hired by educational institutions (where salaries are generally lower.)

The study concludes that, despite recent moves toward affirmative action, women today are still "less likely to receive the rewards which their male colleagues enjoy."


Hawks


order to give graduating students professional experience in a touring company.

VOLUNTARY PROBATION

KJC-PIO— Kennesaw Junior College and the Marietta-Cobb YWCA will offer a 10-hour non-credit course for voluntary probation officers at two Marietta locations starting January 20.

Sessions will be held on Mondays and Wednesdays through February 3, and participants may choose morning hours, 9:30 to 11:30, or evenings, 7:30-9:30 p.m. Morning classes will be held in the Gold Room of the Marietta-Cobb YWCA and evening sessions will meet in the fourth floor Superior Court Room of the Cobb County Judicial Building, near the square in Marietta.

Open to the public without charge, the course is designed to provide basic training for volunteers who wish to help either juvenile or adult offenders. Instructors will be Dr. George Beggs, chairman of the KJC

Social Science Division, and Ron TeBeest, assistant professor of political science, who already have trained 140 area volunteers through similar classes.

Participants will learn what is expected of them as volunteers and will study basic psychology, behavior patterns of major personality types and basic concepts of communicating with offenders. Students also will have an opportunity to discuss with a probation officer, a volunteer probation officer and a person on probation the nature of probation programs.

On completing the course, participants will receive certificates and will be sworn in as volunteer probation officers.




