Another major change in the SENTINEL will be the start of publication on a twice monthly basis beginning in January. It is hoped that more frequent editions of the newspaper can keep the students better informed on campus activities.

The new MONTAGE staff has also set a major goal for the coming year--an earlier deadline so that the college yearbook can reach the students sooner than ever before. The staff has been enlarged so that more emphasis can be placed on the individual student. In an effort to insure this emphasis, the MONTAGE staff will be taking pictures of all students on both freshman and sophomore registration days. This procedure will enable the staff to obtain almost 100 per cent participation in student photographs this year.

The yearbook staff will be headed by David Acuff, editor; Ginger Jackson, assistant editor; and Sheila Payne, business manager. Dr. Jere Roberson will be the faculty advisor.

Beginning this fall quarter, a third publication will be for med at Kennesaw Junior College. It is hoped that students will respond enthusiastically to the formation of a literary magazine which will be designed to reflect the creative ability of the students at this college. Under the direction of Jim Cahill, editor, the literary magazine will also attempt to inspire the students to express themselves through literature and art. Faculty advisors for this publication will be Miss Mary E. Rogato, Instructor of English, and M. Thomson Salter, III, Assistant Professor of Art.

KJC Will Host Area Schools' College Night

One of the primary functions of Kennesaw Junior College as an institution of higher learning is to encourage high school students from the surrounding community to continue on to college level education. At the same time, it is hoped that many of these students will choose our college for that pursuit of ed-

This method of encouragement is attained in many ways, one of which is the participation of KJC in the various college night programs in this area. Accordingly, on October 3, 1968, Mr. Ronald R. Ingle, Director of Admissions and Student Aid, will head up a program in which numerous high school students from the surrounding community will be invited to attend a college night program here at Kennesaw Junior

Previously, college night programs have been conducted at a centrally located high school to which the major colleges and universities in Georgia and other states would send representatives. However, the system has been reversed this year in hopes that holding the program on a college campus will help expose the students to a college atmosphere and increase their desire to continue their ed-

Seventy-five colleges and universities will send representatives to our campus to participate in this program. Besides the schools from Georgia, other institutions represented will be the Universities of Florida, Tennessee, and Alabama; Dartmouth and Yale; the major military academies; and the larger universities and colleges throughout the nation, including Auburn, Presbyterian College, Stetson, Florida Southern and Agnes Scott.

Some of the high schools which will participate in this program will be from Cobb, Bartow, and Paulding counties. Other high schools will include Milton, Cass, Cartersville, Roswell, Dallas, St. Joseph, and Hiram.

What is student involvement and how can it work at KJC?

Over the past year, much has been said about the question of student power and the right of the student to help direct the administrative policies in colleges and universities. Now a new college year is beginning and faculty and administrators are again having to set the standards by which they will respond to student

Although Kennesaw Junior College is only a two-year institution, many of the problems which face the senior colleges regarding student participation in administrative affairs also effect our campus. To deal with these problems, the Office of Student Affairs recently sponsored a weekend Leadership Conference in Bryson City, North Carolina. There, in an informal at-mosphere, students and administrators frankly discussed the question of student involvement and how it could benefit -or destroy- our

In an attempt to actually define student involvement, discussion centered around three major aspects of it--responsibility, awareness, and communication.

When a student enters college, his primary objective should be the attainment of a wellrounded education. To do this, he should accept the personal responsibility to do the very best he can to make the highest possible grades. If he does accept this responsibility, he then achieves one of the first basic requirements for student involvement. He establishes his right to become involved because he has become a responsible student.

As a student attempts to obtain a more wellrounded education, he becomes involved in more aspects of learning. He realizes that academics alone cannot always provide him with the type of education he is seeking and he, therefore, becomes aware of his duty to take interest in

some of the extra-curricular activities which his college offers. He begins to become associated with other students and with faculty and administrators. He becomes an accepted part of an effective educational system based on communication between all the people involved.

How can we at Kennesaw Junior College make use of these aspects -- responsibility, awareness, and communication? How can we convert three words into active student involvement?

The time is right. Freshman orientation and student registration are signs of the beginning of a new college year. With the new year come new leaders in campus activities. Each of these activities is eager for new members who are willing to become involved and make it a success.

All entering freshman should take stock of what benefits lie before them if they become involved in campus activities. Through membership comes friendship and a greater knowledge of the world in which we live. Action now to join these activities means an excellent foundation on which to build a rewarding and enjoyable academic career which combines academic and social a wareness.

All returning students should also focus upon the situation. Now is the time to change the side of your campus life that has been lacking. After all, transfer to senior colleges is in the near future and you should be prepared for the host of activities which they will offer you.

Kennesaw Junior College is for the students. Without them it cannot hope to exist. Without the spirit to survive, it cannot maintain its fight for life. As students, we owe it to ourselves to act now to become involved and accept the responsibility, become aware, and enter into full communication with our fellow students, our faculty, and our administrators.

Controller gives answer to students' question

(Editor's Note: The following letter is in response to the editorial written in the August 15 edition of the SENTINEL.)

Dear Editor:

It is true that the tennis courts presently under construction will not have lights for playing at night.

When the bid for the original proposed tennis court facility was opened, it was apparent that several desirable features had to be eliminated in order to stay within the limits of the budget.

After considerable discussion, the number of courts was believed to be more directly beneficial to the students in terms of instructional quality and use than the lights. Daylight savings time during the spring and summer months when tennis is August 27, 1968 very popular, permits playing until approximately 9:00 P.M. without the need for lighting facil-

ities. Utilization after this hour retraction in your next edition of would in all probability be at a minimum.

However, underground electrical provisions have been provided so that lights may be easily added at a later date as funds become available.

The facility when completed will be one of the finest installations of its kind in the metropolitan area. It is sincerely hoped the courts will be looked on with pride, greatly used, and treated with respect and care.



Kennesaw Junior College

Welcome to Kennesaw Junior College, one of the most outstanding two-year institutions in the Southeast.

As a beginning freshman in college, it is a certainty that many questions have been arising regarding campus policies, college purposes, school rules and regulations, student activities, etc. Because one of the primary functions of the SENTINEL is to provide the student with an array of the best possible information available, it is taking the opportunity to discuss the following which may help you in achieving a more valuable and well-rounded college education and to help acquaint you with Kennesaw Junior College:

History

Kennesaw Junior College was approved by the Board of Regents of the University System of Georgia on October 9, 1963. This action was taken under criteria for the establishment of new junior colleges in Georgia adopted by the Board of Regents in 1958.

Cobb County was designated as the site of the College which was officially named in August, 1965. The first president, Horace W. Sturgis, assumed duties on July 1 of that year.

The enrollment for the first academic year, 1966-67, total-ed 1,014 in the Fall Quarter, 864 in the Winter Quarter and 787 in the Spring Quarter. It increased 32 percent by the beginning of the second year.

When the school opened in September, 1966, the physical plant was not complete and classes were held in temporary locations in Marietta. The College was moved to the permanent site in January, 1967, and the campus was landscaped and streets and parking lots were paved that year.

Eight members of the teaching faculty and an administrative staff member were added during the second year.

The instructional program includes a Division of Humanities, a Division of Natural Science and Mathematics, a Division of Social Science, and a Department of Physical Education.

Purpose of the College

Kennesaw Junior College, a unit of the University System of Georgia, was established to provide programs of post-secondary school education to the community within commuting distance of the college. The offerings of the college are limited to the resources available to the college, and to the policies of the Board of

Regents of the University System which require that the college shall not duplicate programs of study provided at a reasonable cost to the individual by other institutions in the community.

The purpose of Kennesaw Junior College is, therefore, to provide opportunities to serve the educational and cultural needs of the community in which the college is located through the following channels:

Programs of post-secondary school education designed to prepare students for transfer to universities and senior colleges where they may successfully pursue programs of study leading to a baccalaureate degree;

Programs of post-secondary school education of a terminal nature which are not offered by other educational institutions in the community, and for which the resources of the college are reasonably adequate;

Developmental courses designed for students who need to strengthen their academic backgrounds and evaluate their educational and vocational goals through individualized programs of study; and

Programs of adult education and community services for individuals in the community who may wish to participate in programs of continuing education.

The Campus

Kennesaw's campus, located on 152-acre tract of land eight miles north of Marietta, features modern architecture.

It is flanked on the west by the Pinetree Estates and Country Club and on the north and east by rambling, wooded hillsides. The south view overlooks Kennesaw Mountain, a battle site of the War Between the States. Though it lies in this peaceful setting, the College is 20 miles from Atlanta, the largest city in the Southeast.

Index of Buildings

ADMINISTRATION BUILDING, located at the west side of the campus, contains the offices of the president, the dean, student affairs, admissions, registrar, controller, public information and continuing education.

STUDENT SERVICES BUILD-ING, situated between the administration and science buildings and facing north on the quadrangle, houses the college book store, snack bar, cafeteria, kitchen, student dining room, private dining room, printing shop, faculty lounge, and offices of the Student Government Association and student publications.

SCIENCE BUILDING, located at the southeast corner of the quadrangle, contains classrooms and laboratories for biology, chemistry, physics, nursing and mathematics, and faculty offices.

LIBRARY, located at the center of the east side of the quadrangle. contains a collection of 20,000 volumes, periodicals and aids for academic purposes. It also provides comfortable furniture in study rooms and study carrels, a student lounge, seminar room and offices for the staff.

SOCIAL SCIENCE BUILDING. located on the northeast corner of the quadrangle, contains classrooms and offices for the Division of Social Science and a learning laboratory.

HUMANITIES BUILDING, situated on the north side of the quadrangle, houses the classrooms and offices for the Division of Humanities and a learning laboratory.

GYMNASIUM, located at the east side of the campus across the parking lot from the quadrangle, is used for physical education courses, intramural contests and other college sponsored activities. It has a seating capacity of 2300, and contains a swimming pool, weight lifting room and faculty offices.





KJC provides financial aid for students

Kennesaw Junior College is prepared to assist qualified students with scholarships, loans, or student employment.

Eligibility for financial aid is based on financial need, academic potential, and participation in school and community activities.

Students seeking financial assistance are required to submit a copy of the Kennesaw Junior College Application for Financial Aid and a copy of the Parent's Confidential Statement of the College Scholarship Service. These forms are available from the high school counselor or from the Director of Student Aid at Kennesaw Junior College.

Scholarships and Grants

The following system of scholarships and grants is also made available to students at Kennesaw Junior College:

REGENTS SCHOLARSHIPS --The Board of Regents of the University System of Georgia makes scholarship awards to superior students who need financial aid in order to attend college. These awards are limited to Georgia residents. Applicants should apply directly to the Director of Student Aid at Kennesaw Junior College.

EDUCATIONAL OPPORTUN-ITY GRANTS -- Kennesaw Junior College participates in the Educational Opportunity Grants Program which was established by the Higher Education Act of 1965. This program is designed to provide Educational Opportunity Grants to students of exceptional financial need, who, for lack of financial means would be unable to enter or remain in college without such assistance. Applicants should apply to the Director of Student Aid at Kennesaw Junior College.

STATE SCHOLARSHIP COM-MISSION -- The Commission provides scholarships to qualified students in certain professional or technical fields. For more information, contact the State Scholarship Commission, Hartford Building, 100 Edgewood Avenue, N. E., Atlanta, Georgia 30303 or the Director of Student Aid at Kennesaw Junior College.

OTHER SCHOLARSHIPS --Several civic clubs and organizations in the area served by Kennesaw Junior College have in the past made awards on a yearly basis. It is felt that this practice will continue and that such awards will be available to students.

Office of Student Affairs guides students' college careers

To: Students of Kennesaw Junior College From: Dean of Student Affairs Office Subject: Student Counseling and Guidance Services

Undoubtedly you will discover that the counseling and guidance services at the college level are somewhat different from those you were familiar with in high school. Where most of the high school counselor's time is spent in college placement, college counselors devote more of their time and talents helping students

(1) personal adjustment to college life;

(2) study habits and attitudes; and

(3) vocational and educational A variety of ability, achievement,

and interest tests are available for diagnostic purposes whenever you feel a need for these services.

We hope students will consider seeing a counselor whenever these signs appear: inability to concentrate on studies; drowziness upon reading a text book; habitual "cutting" of classes; chronic bridge playing or tele-

vision viewing, etc. Faculty members and other college officials are encouraged to suggest that a student confer with his counselor when they observe the above kinds of behavior.

There are certain points about counseling and the relationship that evolves between the counselor and the student. Some of the more important are:

(1) All information discussed between counselor and counselee is confidential. Such infor mation will only be made public with the permission of the counselee or in the event that nondisclosure would result in injury to the student or society.

(2) Students will not be disiplined by their counselors. Disipline cases will be referred to the Discipline Committee by Dean of Student Affairs. Students may be referred to their counselor by the Discipline Committee, Academic Dean, or other college officials for counseling. The purpose of these referrals will be to help the students, not discipline them.

(3) In rare instances a counselor may find that he cannot establish a satisfactory relationship with a student; in such instances, the counselor will refer the student to a counselor with whom he can relate comfortably.

Kennesaw Junior College provides an adequate variety of student activities, clubs, and organizations for the benefit of its student body. Any student may join these organizations as long as he meets the individual standards of membership set by each of the groups themselves. The following list of clubs and other campus activities is a sample of the type of extra-curricular activities in which the student can take interest at Kennesaw Junior College:

The STUDENT ACTIVITIES COMMITTEE is the organization which aids in the entire student activity program. "Math for Elementary School Parents," a study of new math with emphasis on topics and approaches of elementary mathematics, Kennesaw Junior Col-



Advance registration is required for the courses. Additional information may be obtained by telephoning the continuing education office at the college, 422-8770, extension 234.



who puts the ball through the hole and one point is given if the ball hits the backboard.


Flicker ball, which combines some of the rules of football and basketball, will be taught by Coach Norman, Instructor of Physical Education at Kennesaw Junior College.
