



## Soviet Diplomats Come to KC

The Chautauqua Committee, having had a successful 1982-83 year which featured Ralph Nader, Dick Gregory and Maya Angelou, is kicking off its 1983-84 year in its usual grand style on October 12, 1983.

Arkady N. Shevchenko, the highest ranking Soviet diplomat ever to defect, and Alexander Ginzburg, a human rights advocate who also defected from the Soviet Union, will both be a part of the Fall Quarter program. Both of these men bring with them a wealth of information concerning the Soviet Union and the International Arena.

In 1978 Shevchenko "broke with the Soviet Union and

resigned his position at the United Nations and took residence in the United States." As Soviet Ambassador to the United Nations, Mr. Shevchenko became internationally known and respected for his knowledge and his hard work. Mr. Shevchenko's peers in the United Nations voted him to the position of Under Secretary General of that body, a position he held until his defection.

Prior to his appointment at the U.N. Mr. Shevchenko served in many high-ranking positions in the Soviet Union. To name a few, he was the personal advisor

to Soviet Foreign Minister Gromyko and also held the highest diplomatic rank in the Soviet Union, that is, Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary of the U.S.S.R. In addition to the above, Mr. Shevchenko "worked for Nikita S. Krushchev and Leonid S. Brezhnev."

Ambassador Shevchenko has authored several books and articles on a wide array of topics concerning international relations and world politics. Certainly he will be worth seeing and hearing.

As aforementioned, Alexander Ginzburg will also be on the program. Mr. Ginzburg is

best known for his daring human rights activities with the Soviet Union. It is no surprise that his activities caused him repeatedly to be imprisoned in labor camps. "On April 27, 1979, Mr. Ginzburg was released from a Soviet labor camp and exchanged...for the three convicted spies."

Mr. Ginzburg was the administrator of the Russian Social Fund, a charitable organization founded by him and exiled author Alexander Slzhenitsyn. The purpose of this fund was to aid Soviet prisoners and their families. After much harassment from the K.G.B.

and many years in prison, Mr. Ginzburg and his family came to the United States to start a new life. The Ginzburg family now live in Paris, France.

After both men finish their presentation, a panel discussion will follow to broaden the discussion topics. This event is one that should not be missed! Please note that the program will be on October 12, 1983 from 9:00 to 12:00 in the Kennesaw Gymnasium. ## Questions and Answers

1) When should I have my student I.D. made and validated?

**ON REGISTRATION DAY!** Most importantly, you must have your **validated** I.D. to checkout books at the library and to cash checks in the bookstore, among other things. This card must be validated each quarter when you register.

2) Who can I talk to about personal as well as school related problems?

The Counseling and Testing Center offers educational, vocational and personal counseling services to all Kennesaw College students. These services are provided by professional counselors in a confidential atmosphere at no extra cost to the students.

3) What should I do if I lock my keys in my car or have a dead battery?

Campus security personnel will help you get into your car and/or start it.

4) Where is the Office of Campus Security located?

The entrance to the Campus Security Office is on the first floor of the Old Library, across from the Science building.

5) Where should I pay for parking violations and what happens if I don't pay them?

All parking violations should be paid at the cashier's window, in the administration building. If your fine is not paid your grades will not be sent to you, you cannot obtain transcripts and if

you are a graduating senior, you will not receive your diploma.

5) Where can I get help in finding a job?

Students seeking full-time or part-time employment may register with Career Advisement and Placement Services (second floor of the Student Center) and review job listings posted daily. Seniors are urged to register with CAPS as soon as possible after beginning their senior year.

7) Where do I need to go if I need to drop (withdraw from) a class?

Students who need to withdraw from a class should complete an official withdrawal form. This form may be obtained from the Registrar's Office (Administration Annex).

8) Can I get financial help in attending Kennesaw?

**YES!** Information on scholarships, grants and loans available to students can be obtained from the Financial Aid Office in the Administration Annex.

10) How much does it cost to play Pool in the Student Center?

There is no charge for the use of the Pool tables and equipment. Indoor Recreation equipment (Backgammon, Chess, Checkers, Darts and Pool) can be checked out with a valid student I.D. from the Student Information Booth, which is located at the top of the stairs in the Student Center.

11) How can I get in touch with someone who is in the Student Center?

Call the Student Information Booth (429-2975) and have them paged.

12) Is there a "Lost and Found" office on campus?

While there is no official Lost and Found office on campus, there are several places you should check if you lose something on campus. If the article was lost in a classroom building, the appropriate school office. If it was lost somewhere else on campus, check with Campus security, the Student Information Booth and the Office of Student Activities.

13) What is the admission for the Friday movies on campus?

Like most activities sponsored by the Student Union, there is no charge for Kennesaw College Students and their guest.

# Kolka Takes Position at KC

One of the newest additions to the staff at Kennesaw is the Vice President of Academic Affairs, Dr. James B. Kolka. The job itself is new to this school but not to Dr. Kolka.

Dr. Kolka comes to Kennesaw from Drake University where he served in the same capacity as he does here for three years. While at Drake, a private college, he worked with faculty and students in developing academic programs and beginning long range planning.

Prior to his position at Drake, Dr. Kolka worked in Wisconsin's university system, a job that required him to travel to many college campuses within the state. While still with the system he served as senior budget planner for two years and then as senior academic planner for four years where his responsibilities included allocating money for programs and evaluating and experimenting with new programs.

Dr. Kolka's position as Vice President of Academic Affairs could best be described as a kind of "dean of deans." With the reorganization of the college it became necessary for departments to be more clearly defined with specific department heads named. In turn, those departments were grouped in a logical manner and put under a dean. Dr. Kolka's job is to work with the deans and the registrar among others. In other words he deals with the whole academic process.


Dr. Kolka cites many possibilities for Kennesaw. In comparison to Drake where enrollment was shrinking, Kennesaw is part of a growing community which means that the college has the ability to grow as fast as the resources expand. According to Dr. Kolka, "The fun part of it is that you can plan new programs. You can think about developing new interdisciplinary programs, developing an international thrust."

On a more personal level, Dr. Kolka and his wife Sandra are new residents of the East Cobb Community. They've just purchased a new home where they hope to pursue one of their hobbies-cooking. The new house is also close enough to downtown Atlanta so that she can pursue either her PhD. in educational administration or further her studies in clinical psychology at one of the universities there.

On the whole, Dr. Kolka seems eager to work and live in this area. The frigid winters of

the north have made him appreciative of the milder ones here in the south. Plus the variety of landscapes-mountains, beaches and flatlands-to be found in Georgia also have proven to be an irresistible lure.

As for right now Dr. Kolka is looking forward to working with students here. He is also looking forward to working with students with comparable backgrounds to those when he was with the University of Wisconsin. In his own words, "It should be fun."







## Be A Volunteer



# ASF Comes to Cobb

Shakespeare in Alabama? It is rather difficult to believe that the Bard would even try to succeed in the Deep South, but Martin L. Platt, the founder and artistic director of The Alabama Shakespeare Festival, believed that the Southerners could appreciate Shakespeare, and he has proved it, too. Since 1972, over 30,000 theatregoers have flocked to Anniston, Alabama, during the summer to see just what kind of Shakespeare comes out the South.

If you ever read the **Atlanta Journal and Constitution**, you may have noticed that much ado is made over the Alabama Shakespeare Festival. The ASF, which attracts people from forty states and fifteen foreign countries, has earned a reputation of being the best professional classical repertory theatre company in the Southeast.

If you are not yet convinced that quality theatre can come out of Alabama, you need not drive to Anniston to see for yourself. The ASF is bringing their touring company to the Cobb County Civic Center on Friday, October 7, and Saturday, October 8, in a production of Shakespeare's **THE COMEDY OF ERRORS**.

A fast-paced tale of coincidence and confusion, **THE COMEDY OF ERRORS** deals with mistaken identity compounded by not one, but two sets of identical twins. The plot revolves around a merchant,

Egeon, his wife Emilia, their twin sons (**Both** named Antipholus) and their sons' servants (**both** named Dromio). Separated in a shipwreck, Egeon returns to Syracuse with one son and one servant, believing his wife and the other

two children drowned at sea. But the two remaining boys refuse to give up hope, and when grown set out in search of

their brothers and mother. When they fail to return, Egeon resolves to find them. Five years of searching has brought him to the city of Ephesus, which-unknown to him-is also

the home of his missing son and servant. Coincidentally, his wandering son and servant arrive in Ephesus that same day. Though father and sons are not aware of each other's presence, the two Antipholuses

and the two Dromios are repeatedly mistaken for each other by the townspeople and even by each other. Chaos reigns before the day is out, and only a master playwright like Shakespeare can lead us through this hilarious maze and back out again.

John-Frederick Jones, Guest Director at the 1983 Alabama Shakespeare Festival and Director of the ASF Conservatory Training Program, staged **THE COMEDY OF ERRORS**. He considers it "a

good-natured, rough and tumble play in which we are greeted with Shakespeare's earliest and

perhaps least tested attitudes toward life. In **THE COMEDY OF ERRORS**, these attitudes are fused into a shining reaffirmation of the human spirit."

This madcap Shakespearean farce is being sponsored by the Joseph T. Walker School in Marietta. The ASF tour is made

possible in part by grants from SONAT, Inc., and the Blount Foundation, and is supported by the Alabama State Council on the Arts and Humanities, the Southern Arts Federation, and

the National Endowment for the Arts. In Marietta, it is made possible in part by grants from the Georgia Council for the Arts, The Southern Arts Federation and the National Endowment for the Arts.

In support of this program, the Cultural Affairs Committee of the Student Union will offer discount tickets to all Kennesaw College students with a valid I.D. Regularly \$6.00, the tickets will be available for only \$3.00 in the Information Booth, located in the Student Center, for Friday night's performance at 8:00 p.m., and Saturday night's




