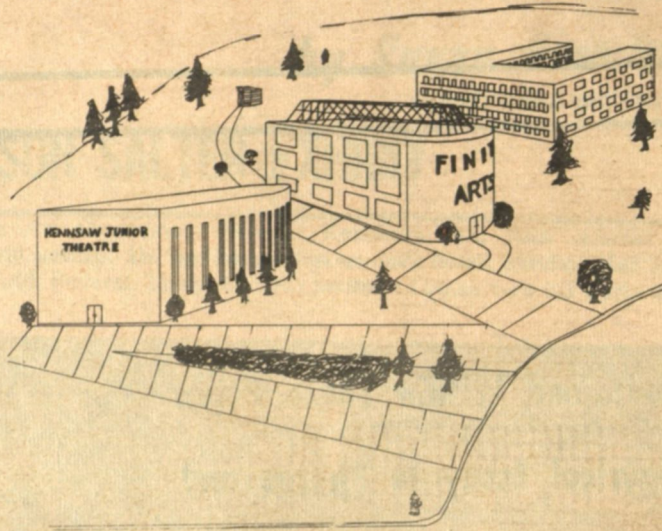

Hill on Donne

Dr. Hill recently presented the second lecture in the humanities series of three scheduled for this year. Dr. Hill spoke on the poetry and philosophies of John Donne, emphasizing those ideas that closely correspond with today's thinking.

By using a set of cones used in astrology, Dr. Hill determined early in his lecture that we were well in the third of twelve astrological phases: the age of Aquarius. Dr. Hill went on to define the standards of the Aquarian age, paralleling them with the ideas of John Donne.

"The Damp" and "The Sunne Rising", two of Donne's poems were investigated in an attempt to prove their contemporary value.

WALRAVEN IS LEAVING

Dr. Wesley C. Walraven, who has served as Chairman of the Division of Natural Science and Mathematics at Kennesaw Junior College since the facility opened four and a half years ago, has recently resigned to accept another position in the University System.

Although Dr. Walraven officially assumed his duties as Dean of Rome's Floyd Junior College in March, he will continue his association with Kennesaw Junior College on a part-time basis through Spring Quarter. Floyd Junior College will open Fall Quarter in its temporary facilities.

Dr. Walraven, a native of Dalton, Georgia, was a graduate of Valley Point High School. He received his Bachelor of Science in Science Education from the University of Chattanooga, and obtained his Master of Science Education from the University of Georgia. Dr. Walraven also completed his requirements for a Ph.D. in Botany at the University of Georgia.

Before coming to Kennesaw Junior College, Dr. Walraven had taught at Valley Point High School in Whitfield County. He had also served as an Instructor of Botany at the University of Georgia.



Patillo to Speak

H. G. Patillo, the past chairman of the Board of Regents of the University System of Georgia, will deliver the commencement address at Kennesaw Junior College on June 12 at 8 p.m. in the college gymnasium. Dr. Horace W. Sturgis, the president of K.J.C. will award diplomas to approximately one hundred sophomores. This will be the largest number of students to graduate at any commencement in the four year history of K.J.C.

Patillo, a director of the First National Bank of Atlanta, is a partner in a Decatur construction company. He is a trustee of Agnes Scott College and is also a member of the Board of Trustees of the Fulton-DeKalb Hospital Authority.

Patillo is a director of both the Atlanta Chamber of Commerce and the Georgia State Chamber of Commerce. He is an Elder in Decatur Presbyterian Church and is on the Board of Visitors of Emory University. Patillo holds a Bachelor of Science degree in architecture from Georgia Tech.

The K.J.C. commencement speaker has also served as president of the DeKalb Chamber of Commerce and the Decatur Rotary Club.

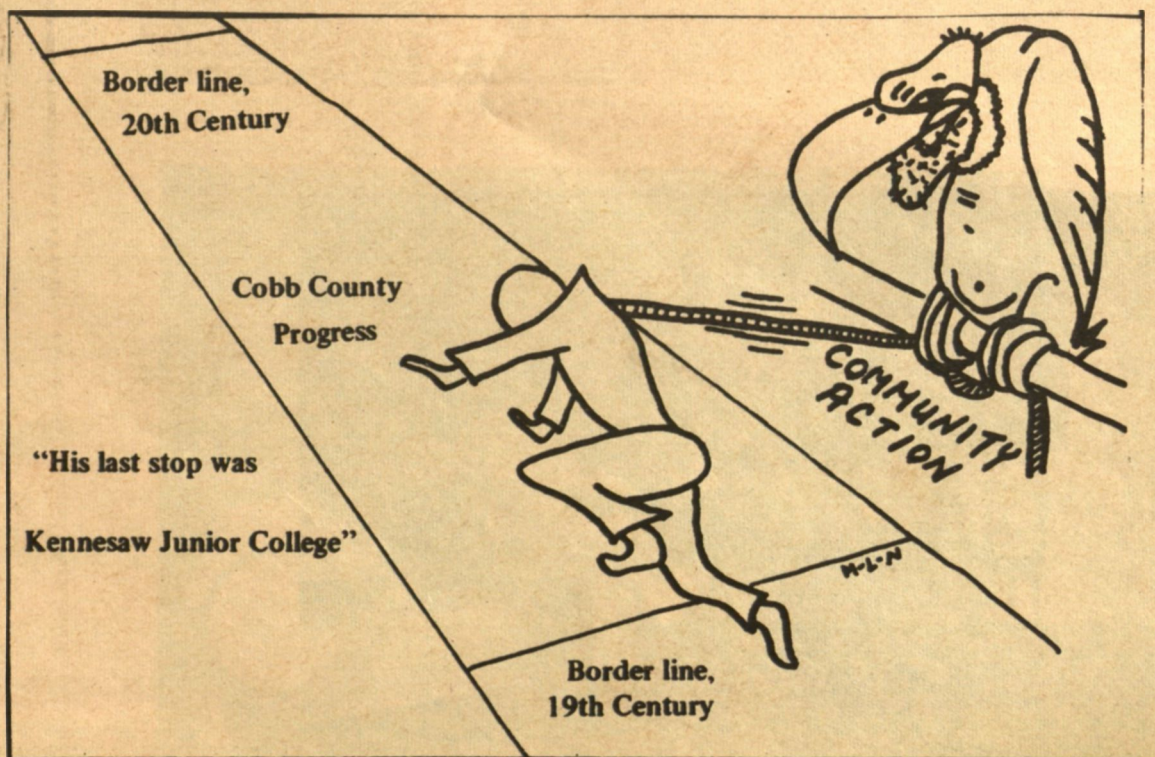
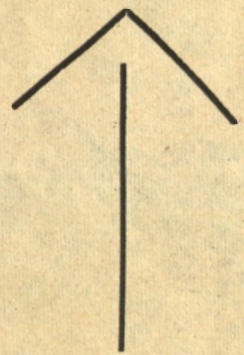
SGA Pres. Resigns

Hedda Gabler:

The Socc and Buskin Players of Kennesaw Junior College presented Henrik Ibsen's tragedy **Hedda Gabler** in the gymnasium on May 15 and 16. The production, directed by Charlotte Stephenson, was very effective. Ibsen's intent in the play seems to have been to get into sharp contrast the conflicts of the individual and society. Hedda Gabler is a character who encompasses a wide range of thoughts and emotions. Essentially a character whose responses are romantic, she finds herself in a situation that requires more compromise than she is willing to make. Having been involved in some obscure way with Eilert Lovborg, Hedda enters the play just married to Jorgen Tesman. She finds herself unable either to accept Lovborg in a new role or to release him from his old role. Having become unable to accept Lovborg as lover, she is also unable to accept Tesman as husband. The conflict of the play is in Hedda's mind; this conflict is of greater importance than the fact that Hedda induces Lovborg to commit suicide with a dueling pistol, and greater even than the fact that Hedda commits suicide with the matching pistol.

Hedda's mental conflict really is the substance of the play, but the conflict is apparent only as Hedda is able to elicit reactions from the other characters. Judith Larsen drew out a remarkable

characterization of Hedda. One of her favorite devices (and one which was very effective) was that of looking out over the audience while developing a full range of facial expressions which were hidden from the other characters on stage. The device served to isolate Hedda both from the audience and from the other characters in the play.

The supporting roles were quite well done. Steven DeArmoun as jorgen Tesman was particularly effective. His mannerisms of stooping slightly and of pronouncing Hedda as "Hettuh" were consistent and credible. David Stahl as Eilert Lovborg developed his role quite well by alternating reserved reticence and boyish impetuosity. Both these characterizations served, by contrast, to throw Hedda into greater isolation.

Charlotte Stephenson, in addition to directing the production, acted the part of Mrs. Julianna Tesman. Her stooping posture and slight limp were consistent and convincing.

The staging was beautifully done. The antique chairs and furnishings gave just the right combination of warmth and rigidity that the production demanded. All in all, the production of **Hedda Gabler** was quite effective, and was a worthwhile experience for those who saw it.

History of Symposium

The first Symposium, held in 1966, was sponsored by the Committee on Medicine and Religion, established by the Cobb County Medical Society. When the Committee was formed in 1965, officials decided one of its primary functions would be to sponsor an annual symposium including the disciplines of medicine, religion and law.

In 1967, Dr. Alan Watts of San Francisco spoke on "Eastern and Western Views of Man." Attendance for this year was 1,000.

By 1968, the Committee on Medicine and Religion had been expanded and re-named the Committee on Medicine, Religion and Law.

That year—1968—the symposium topic was "Human Sexuality," and an impressive roster of speakers included Dr. Mary S. Calderone, executive director of Sex Education and Information Council of the U.S. (SEICUS); Dr. Harold I. Lief of Philadelphia, president of the American Academy of Psychoanalysis; Dr. Seward Hiltner, professor of theology and personality, Princeton Theological Seminary, New Jersey; Dr. Ralph Slovenko, professor of law and behavioral sciences, University of Kansas School of Law. Attendance was over 1,000.

Symposium '69, "The Progress of Man Toward the Year 2000," brought to the campus of Kennesaw Junior College Max Lerner, author, teacher and lecturer; William Pollard, nuclear physicist; David M. Hume, organ transplant specialist; Griffin B. Bell, noted moralist; Joseph Fletcher, ethics lecturer; and Robert P. Nenko, psychiatrist.

According to Dr. Noah Meadows, chairman of the Committee on Medicine, Religion and Law in 1969, the purpose of the symposia is to "broaden the understanding of its audience and stimulate thought about the subject matter which will aid the participant in providing his fellowmen with the means to a fuller appreciation and involvement in the process of living."

The Committee is composed of members of the Cobb Medical Society, the Kennestone Chaplain's Association and the Cobb Judicial Circuit Bar Association.

REVIEWS:

THE DEVIL'S DECIPLE

"The Devil's Disciple," which is the last production of the Alliance Theater Company for this season, opened at the Memorial Arts Center Friday, May 3. The play will run through May 23.

The play was written by Bernard Shaw in 1947 and is a melodrama about the American Revolution. Shaw has managed an excellent mixture of wit and comedy in his play, but this mixture does not always appear in the Alliance production. 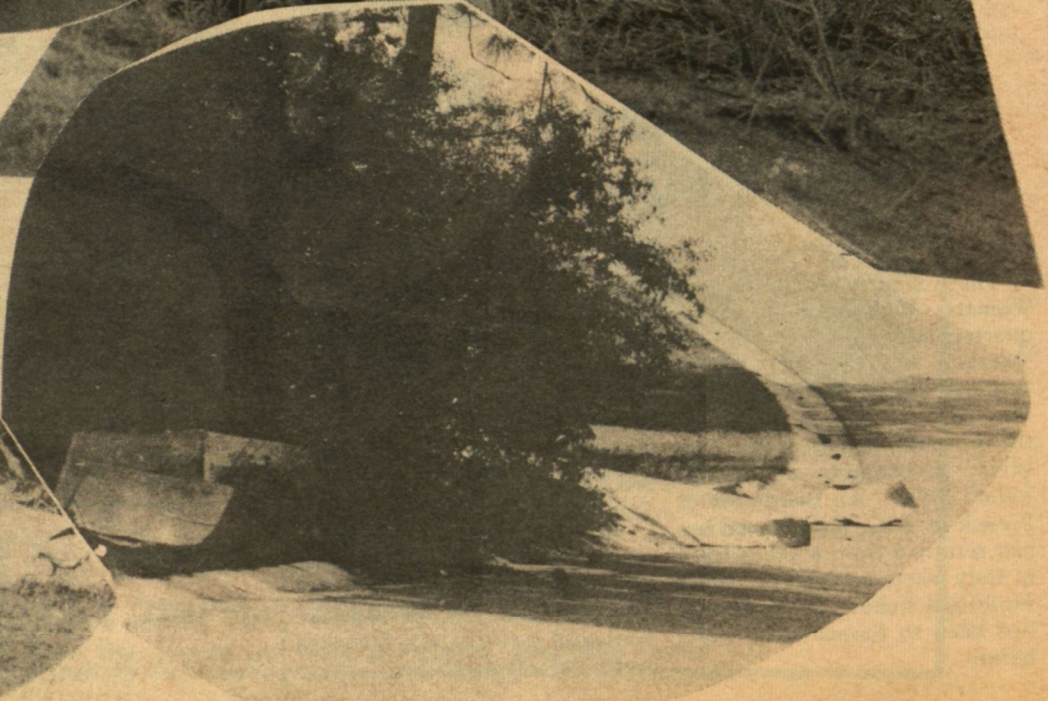
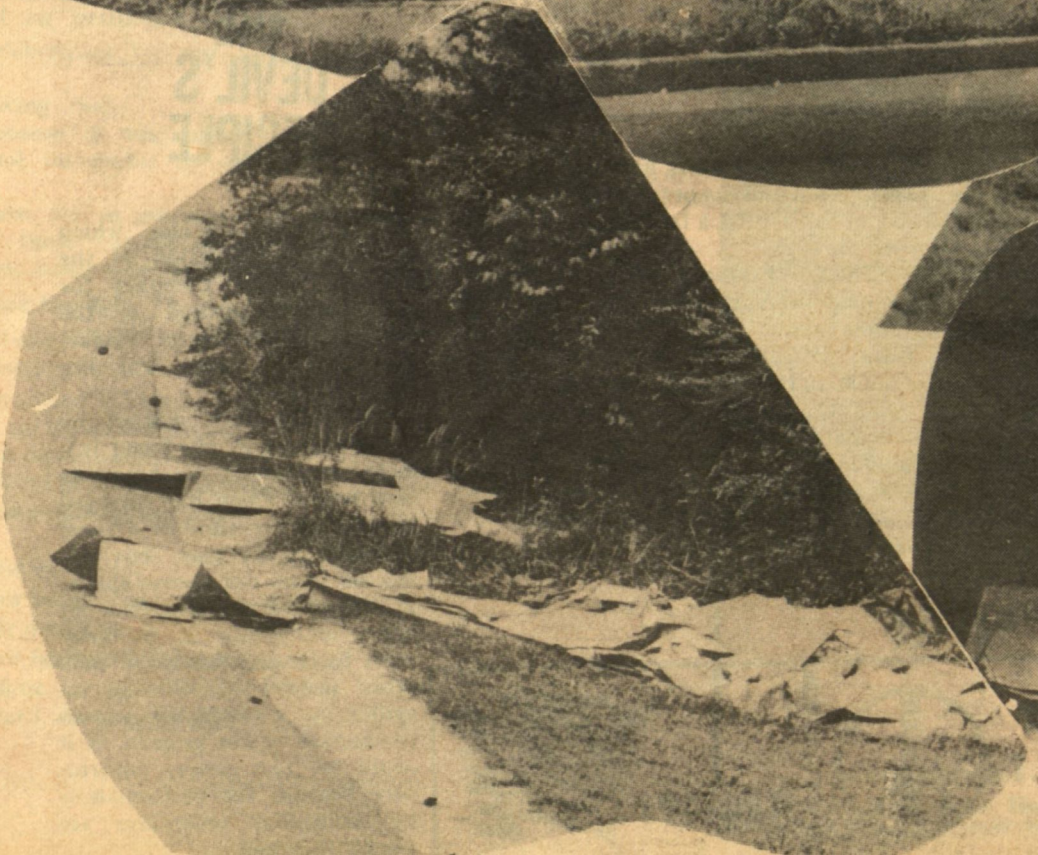
"See Georgia First", proclaims the local government. . . So we did, and these are some of the more scenic sights around our beautiful (?) state.
