## "Soup Line" Registration Requires Reformation

With the last edition, the *Sentinel* distributed 200 questionnaires on Pre-Registration. Twenty-nine of these questionnaires were completed and returned. This article is based on the answers received from those twenty-nine people.

One of the first questions asked was, "Did you like pre-registering before you knew your grades?" Most people didn't mind signing up for courses before final grades were issued. In fact, only 14% had to change their schedules because of low grades. Half of the people thought the benefits they received from pre-registering were worth standing in line twice and half believed the pre-registration system needed some sort of reformation.

Perhaps the most informative

section of the questionnaire was the section in which people gave their suggestions for changing the system. Outstanding in everyone's mind was some method for doing away with the long lines in the cold. Time cards were endorsed by many; others advocated a longer time period for picking up time cards. Another suggestion was for a separate line for students who needed to drop or add classes. Still another prevalent idea was that more student assistants were needed. (Student assisting is a strictly volunteer job. If you would like to help; go see Mr. Rogers in the Administration Building). Finally, many people seemed to blame much of the confusion and the long lines on the drug survey which was taken.

## Another Monday Passes

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### Fall Concert

Last quarter the concerts given at KJC were absolutely unbelievable. There was the concert that almost was — meaning Rare Earth. And if you weren't satisfied with almost attending a Rare Earth concert there was the unforgettable Buddy Miles show — too bad Buddy didn't come for it. And if you demanded still more entertainment you were given the once in a lifetime opportunity of seeing the Amboy Dukes — live and in person!

This could be an example of the dissatisfaction felt among KJC students about the entertainment offered to them. There seems to be an obvious reason for the many problems with entertainment in the past — the undemocratic method used to choose the entertainment. The usual method has been for a group of students to get together, known as the entertainment committee, and make a list of what groups they think are available and affordable, and then decide, according to their personal tastes, what group to get for a concert.

This group did make an effort to improve this method by conducting an opinion poll so that they would have a better idea of what type of music the students wanted. This opinion poll joined the overcrowded morgue of unsuccessful polls conducted at Kenesaw, and its failure was once again attributed to the ever-present apathy found lurking among the card tables in the Student Center.

January 12th a hurried opinion poll was conducted among a cross-section of about 200 students in order to help the entertainment committee choose a concert group. All the students at Kenesaw weren't polled because a concert group has to be decided on quickly so that they would be available for this quarter. Ten groups were given on this list and Bloodrock was voted as the number one choice, Goosecreek second, and Fanny third. Later the committee found out that Bloodrock was not available for a weekend concert so Goosecreek will be recommended to the SGA for the winter concert.

Hopefully a larger, better-distributed poll will be given later on about the entertainment for Spring quarter. Possibly as more polls are given, more students will take the time to respond to them. But even in the January 12th poll, where only 200 students were polled, a better, more democratic method for choosing our entertainment was offered and the participation in, and results of these polls should improve with time.

### Pre-Registration

In case you didn't happen to notice, winter quarter registration was utter chaos. Cold weather coupled with long lines and an unnecessary drug survey caused many tempers to flare while much of the confusion was due to the new Pre-Registration procedure which the Administration officials were attempting to implement.

Pre-Registration is a fantastic idea and is necessary for the growth of this institution; however, it could have been planned better and carried out in a more efficient manner. One of the main ideas behind Pre-Registration is to allow the students to know their schedule before actual Registration day and to attempt to prevent cancellation of classes after people have registered for them. While Pre-Registration achieved its primary goals, it inconvenienced many people to the point that they now oppose the entire concept. It would have been better carried out if the Pre-Registration form had a space for the building and room number, which students had to fill out on a Class Schedule form at Registration. Also, if students could fill out their class schedule cards and Student Information cards at Pre-Registration and place them in the envelope with the class cards, there would be that much less for them to do at actual Registration, thus speeding up the lines. The long lines, which were what most people objected to, could have also been better alleviated by having time-slots for groups to come to register based on the alphabet or on their Social Security number. The wait for people having to change their schedule is, of course, unavoidable. However, if the lines of people who had Pre-Registered had not been so long and so confused, actual registration would have been a much more pleasant experience for all involved.

Dear Editor:

I have spent many pleasant and informative hours rapping with fellow students about many subjects, but one of the more popular themes seems to be political systems. Many of my fellow students profess a desire, or at least see merit in some type of socialistic government. A few have even indicated that, "Red

China really may not be such a bad place." Owing to the fact that Red China has a communist regime and that communism is a hypothetical state of socialism, and also that since Red China is now a fellow member of the U.N., I felt that it would be timely and provocative to relate a few tidbits of information to the reader.

William Buckley, Jr. reported recently, in The Nashville Tennessean, that a member of the academic community Professor Ping-ti Ho, a University of Chicago professor of history and Far East languages and civilizations, said of his recent trip to mainland China, "...what China has achieved in the past 22 years may already be the envy of the Third World." Perhaps Professor Ho is speaking of the price of meals in restaurants, as he continues, "I purposely took my meals in the extremely crowded backlane restaurants of Shanghai and other large cities. A northern Chinese style breakfast or lunch which would cost

me at least \$2 in New York or Chicago cost me only seven to fifteen cents in China. Because restaurants are owned and operated by the state, they do not make profits. Meal prices are therefore extremely low."

Right on! Seven to fifteen cents for a breakfast sounds great doesn't it, or does it? No it does not sound good, at least not to me. You see, the good professor neglected to add a few facts that makes the whole idea sound lousy.

The average wage for a Chinese who works in a city is \$25 per month. At three meals per day he would eat half his salary. If he is married and bearing in mind that she also eats, that means he has spent \$2 over his salary for food. I wonder if he has any children? So far I don't feel very envious, but let us go a bit farther.

In Chairman Mao's country a wristwatch costs more than one year's salary. That's enough to give Mickey Mouse heart seizure. Also, in the envy of the Third World, the citizens are allowed to buy 18 feet of cloth goods per year. A wash cloth counts as one foot. And even though 85% of the working population is engaged in the production of food: rice, meat, and even cooking oil is rationed. Only vegetables and fish are not rationed.

Farmers in the United States insist on making a profit. These farmers, who constitute about 12% of the working population, produce a gross excess of food. But, perhaps I am not being fair in comparing the U.S. with Red China. Let's compare Red China with some other Far East countries. Countries where the profit concept is practiced.

The Japanese, having studied all the available figures, calculate that the per capita income of the Red Chinese is \$80. The Taiwanese have a per capita income of \$300. The Japanese have a per capita income of \$1,200. Sorry, Professor Ho, I still don't see how any member of the Third World could be envious of Red China, nor do I see any merit at all in their political system.

# President Nixon's Reversal

In the 1968 presidential campaign, candidate Nixon implied in almost every public speech that he would end the Viet Nam war by winning the conflict. Further, he stated that he would get the economy moving again without increasing government regulation.

He would not tell us how he planned to do these things. Instead, he insisted that he had a plan which he would reveal at the proper time. Based on his actions since 1968, one gets the feeling that all his plan really amounted to was to do whatever became necessary to win the 1972 election.

In foreign policy, the closer the election comes, the faster he withdraws U.S. troops from Viet Nam. One even suspects his coming peace trips to China and Russia have been strategically timed for the best election results.

In the economic field, while he never told us what he would do, he did tell us in 1968 what he would not do. He would never impose additional public regulations on the business community, and most of all, he would not impose wage and

price controls. When public opinion polls indicated in July, 1971, that the public was going to hold him responsible for not taking strong regulatory action, then he reversed his position completely.

During the first two years of his administration, he was highly critical of student protest. However, he stopped the criticism as soon as the new constitutional amendment gave the students the right to vote in '72. Indeed, he is so determined to capture the youth vote, that his spokesmen have recently announced they not only planned to abolish the draft completely in the long run, but that now it might be possible to get along without the draft for much of 1972.

While he was noticeably silent about environmental issues in 1968, now that public opinion has swung in favor of strong environmental measures, Mr. Nixon has ordered U.S. attorneys to take strong action. He could have ordered the action in 1969. However, the election is in '72 and the U.S. attorneys all over the country have brought suits timed for adjudication in 1972.

While one may take heart in knowing that at least in an election year, the American people can have a great deal of influence over the direction of public policies, one also realizes that popular opinion can be short-sighted. Public opinion favored expansion of the Viet Nam war in 1966 and President Johnson acted accordingly. Public opinion did not favor wage and price controls during the Johnson administration and Johnson would not go against popular opinion. Now public opinion has been reversed and President Nixon has fallen quickly into line.

The task of leadership is to be able to see beyond the clamor of immediate popularity and to give the nation a sense of long range purpose and direction. The task of the people is to think with their leaders in terms of long range goals and to be willing to sacrifice some of their immediate comforts in order to reach these goals. While the American public cannot be too proud of President Nixon, the public cannot be very proud of its own unwillingness to sacrifice until it has absolutely no choice.

## REFLECTIONS

On Friday, January 12 every Negro celebrated Martin Luther King's birthday. Many activities were planned honoring his birthday. Motown Recording Corporation sponsored a big show at Atlanta Municipal Auditorium featuring Marvin Gay, The Jackson Five, Moms Mabley, The Supremes, Gladys Knight and the Pips plus many other entertainers.

Dr. King was born January 15, 1929 in Atlanta, Georgia. He was assassinated in Memphis, Tennessee in April of 1968. His father is the pastor of the Ebenezer Baptist Church here in Atlanta. A bright student, Martin finished high school at the age of 15 and was enrolled at Morehouse College which is also in Atlanta. In 1947 he was ordained a Baptist minister.

In December, 1964, he became, at 35, the youngest man ever to be awarded the Nobel Peace Prize.

He was an outstanding leader in the movement for Negro

rights in the United States and the chief spokesman for the non-violent methods of protest.

In 1955 he received a Ph.D. in theology at the Boston University. In his studies, King was particularly impressed by the teachings of Mohandas K. Gandhi, whose campaigns of passive non-violent resistance helped free India from the British rule.

King soon had a chance to test these methods. He led many boycotts, voter-registration drives, and campaigns against discrimination all over the United States. He was president of the SCLC as well as a member of the NAACP.

On April 4, 1968, King was assassinated by a sniper in Memphis, Tennessee. The violence of King's death shocked the nation and caused rioting in many cities. FREE AT LAST, FREE AT LAST, THANK GOD ALMIGHTY, I'M FREE AT LAST. — Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.

## Innate Ability and Success

Most of us develop along the way pet theories concerning our profession or possibly life's character in general. One might say that such theories are worthless in that they are often based upon no hard data, no statistical analysis, no scrutinizing research. On the other hand, who is to say that such perception based on day-to-day contacts with those of our profession, intuitive thought based upon years of undergraduate and graduate work, and possibly refined or polished "horse sense" is of no value. Well, so much for the argument of hard data versus soft data. If you live in a world of facts, figures, correlations, and chi-squares and see no value in the wisdom of intuitive thought, you should probably read no further. (No, you should probably read on, too, as there is nothing more boring than listening to someone condemn an approach or theory of which he knows nothing about. This little catharsis will, no doubt, add to your arsenal of anti-philosophy machinery.) With this preface, let me try to relate my philosophy of innate ability.

Innate ability, as I use the term, refers to the phenomenon whereby one is born with the ability to perform certain tasks or functions in certain ways. I once had a student ask me "how does one become a counselor?" (Ah Ha! Now you experimentalists really have some ammunition for you now know that I am one of those strange breed of pseudo-psychotherapists.) Any-

way, in answer to the young lady's question, I replied, "One does not become a counselor. One is born a counselor." You say, "My God! That's pretty radical or 'way out' to say the least." Maybe. However, what I meant and tried to relate to her was that to do anything, or at least to do anything well, one must have an innate ability to function in this way. In other words, to perform a highly skilled task or to function within a highly specialized field one must possess a non-learned ability and interest. At least, the learning and the increase in interest were not acquired consciously or cognitively. This is not to say that the skill does not have to be developed, for it most certainly does. To let such an ability lie dormant would be analagous to letting a potentially good race horse do nothing but graze and breed, or to letting a potentially good fighter do nothing but watch TV and drink soda pop. Neither would ever be very competitive. On the other hand, working the horse to near death or training the fighter to exhaustion would probably be for naught if the ability were not present to begin with. One cannot develop a skill that does not exist.

I began the above paragraph with a reference to innate ability and counseling. It should be obvious by now that I do not strict my assumptions to one field. In fact I think an analogy or example can be found on most any level of

human analysis. My little girl, who is fifteen months old, is very happy, most always smiling, and generally pleasant to be around. We have probably all been around children who appeared to be continually frustrated, unhappy, and trying to be around. Can I take credit for my child's pleasant personality? I think not. She has basically been this way from the outset, certainly after the first week or two (after she had gotten over the shock of being thrust from the womb into a hostile world of sound, sight, touch, pain, and hunger). She was born, I think, a pleasant little kid requiring only food, shelter, and a reasonable degree of attention.

On a different level, I had the opportunity recently to sit in on a music workshop in which guitars were played and some explanations were given with respect to technique and style.

One question from the audience was, "How can I become a good musician?" The reply was, in substance, that one does not become a good musician but is born a good musician and can expand upon this 'given' talent.

I once heard a respondent relating an idea concerning college majors and degrees of financial compensation. His proposal was that one should not choose a college major with expected financial reward as the primary factor of consideration. If one enjoyed his college work and later his livelihood, he would likely function in this capacity far better than his less enthusiastic peers and that financial reward would present itself almost as a happenstance. People are rewarded for most anything they do well, and the only way to gain such a degree of competency is to have possessed the ability and interest before striving to perfect it.

As a counselor, I see a great deal of this kind of almost insane striving for goals which are not suited for the individual. A hypothetical case would be a student on the verge of failing out of school. We discuss the whys and wherefores of his dilemma. At some point, I might ask, "What is your major?" His reply, "Business administration." "Why business administration," I would ask. "Because it's where the money is and/or

my parents thought it was the thing to do" might well be his response. Here we may have arrived at the root of the problem. Maybe, some interest testing is in order here. One very real direction for this student would be to temporarily forget the idea of majoring in anything (although our computers tend to develop symptoms of diarrhea, expelling little white cards and data sheets when 'area of study' is not properly punched) and for a time, shop around with various fields. Maybe by doing this he may find an area that he belongs to and can become involved in. Within a reasonably short time the student should have either discovered a more suitable area with respect to ability and interest or have discovered that an entirely different type of learning, experience is more appropriate, i.e., trade school, technical school, etc.

In conclusion, I have tried to relate to the reader a very subjective thesis concerning what I feel is the relationship between innate ability and success. To me they go together like a hand and glove, soup and sandwich, or a beer bust and Alka-Seltzer.



## Job Corps Program

Job Corps is a program designed to benefit young people between the ages of sixteen and twenty-one. It instructs young men and women alike, useful trades such as drafting, carpentry, and machine operators for men and nursing, secretarial skills, and cosmetology for women.


The program is set up so that each individual can work at his

own pace. This enables each to develop his or her own schedule.

The Job Corps has many benefits. There is an abundance of free recreation such as bowling, basketball, skating, wrestling, and pool. The cafeteria also serves meals free of charge. Each student is given an allowance of thirteen dollars bi-monthly; and an additional seven dollars and fifty cents is issued to students

who go to class off of the center. If the student has any children; day-care is provided.

The student may take up to two years to finish his or her program. At the end of the program the student graduates and is placed at the job for which he was trained. On departure from Job Corps they are given fifty dollars for every month they were enrolled.



## Cultural Lecturer; Ralph H. Stephens

The Winter Quarter lecture series sponsored by the Humanities Division opened on Thursday, January 20, with a program on poetry by Ralph H. Stephens, director of the University of Georgia Press, in Athens. He spoke in the Seminar Room of the Kennesaw Junior College Library at noon. The public was invited.

A native of Wrens, Georgia, who grew up in the newspaper business, Mr. Stephens draws on a varied background "to entertain and help foster an interest in and appreciation of poetry," as he explains his purpose.

After receiving his B. S. degree from Georgia Southern College in Statesboro, he served as superintendent of Scott, Georgia Junior High School before becoming principal of the Marshallville, Georgia High School.

Returning to the classroom as a student, Mr. Stephens was named a graduate fellow in the English Department of the University of Georgia, where he taught English and for one year also coached the varsity debate team.

He next joined the University of Georgia Press as assistant director and, for a while before entering the Army in World War II, as acting director, a position he held for another short time after his return from military duty.

When the director of the Press resumed his office, Mr. Stephens remained as assistant director and business manager of the quarterly magazine published at the University, *Georgia Review*. He left the Press for the classroom for a year, during which he taught journalism. He has directed the Press since 1950.

A member of Phi Beta Kappa national honor society, Mr. Stephens is presently treasurer of the University of Georgia chapter. He has also continued as a member of the editorial board of the *Review*, which he has read and discussed at various writers' conferences and student groups.

In announcing the lecture, Gary M. Fox, assistant professor of English and chairman of the Humanities Cultural Activities Committee, expressed the pleasure of the college to have Mr. Stephens visit the campus.

"We are delighted," Professor Fox declared, "to welcome such a distinguished Georgian and man of letters as our first lecturer this quarter and the first of the year from outside this area."

The program is part of a varied group of activities sponsored by the Humanities Division for students, faculty, and staff members of the college. All of the lectures in the series are open to the public.

The attitude most commonly held among today's chess players is best expressed in an incident concerning Aron Niemzovich, the late Danish International Grand Master. Once, after blundering in a game against a less experienced opponent he knocked the pieces from the board, leaped onto the table and screamed, "Why must I lose to such an idiot!"

In the K.J.C. Student Center you can occasionally hear a similar enraged bellow or deeply felt expletive. It's the sound of your fellow students as they test their skill in the two basic types of chess; that is, chess for fun and chess for blood. You play a game of chess for blood after you've lost the game you played for fun.

And more people are playing the game than ever before — chess is, in fact, at an all time high in this country. This is the third peak of popularity the game has achieved.

The first was during the life of Paul Morphy in the last century. A Louisiana aristocrat, Morphy was to become the United States' only World Champion. In some circles he is considered the greatest chess player of all time. The second peak was in the early part of this century when such greats as Alekline, Capablanca and Niemzovich were at their peak. Today the United States has a good chance at a second World Championship. Bobby Fisher will play Boris Spaski, the current Champion, for the title in the spring. Still, with more people playing chess than ever before, the game is not getting the backing its supporters feel it deserves.

In the Soviet Union, chess is the national game. There are chess classes and outstanding students are rewarded. If you are good enough you are allowed to devote your full time to chess. As a result the Russians have at

least four men who have held the World Title.

In the United States, on the other hand there are only two men who can and do make their living completely on chess; Bobby Fisher and Samuel Reshevsky. If America is ever to be able to compete with the Russians, Americans must back their players. They must develop interest.

The best way to develop interest is in organized competition. The best place for organized competition is through your local chess club. There are certainly enough interested players on the K.J.C. campus to warrant the organization of a school chess club. If you are willing to devote a little time each week to such a club, please contact Joe Corbitt or Don Taylor in the Student Center about noon. They're easy to find. Wherever there is a chess board they will be near-by.
