## Symposium '74 Begins Today

### William F. Buckley To Speak At Closing

(KJC-PIO) William F. Buckley Jr., syndicated columnist and host of television's "Firing Line," will headline a roster of six speakers at Cobb County's two-day Symposium '74, Thursday and Friday, April 18 and 19.

"Some of the Problems of Freedom" will be the topic of Buckley's talk at the symposium's concluding dinner session April 19 at the Atlanta Marriott.

"The Struggle to communicate" is the theme of the ninth annual symposium, which will be held Thursday and Friday. All sessions, except the dinner meeting, will be held in the Kennesaw Junior College gymnasium.

Other speakers will be former Secretary of State Dean Rusk, Dr. Beverly Mead, Dr. Jonas Robitscher, Dr. Henry Malcom, and Bishop Bennett J. Sims.

Topics explored by symposium speakers will be communication between nations, sexes, professions, and generations.

Buckley, who considers himself a "radical conservative" writes a syndicated column, "On the Right" which appears three times a week in over 300 newspapers across the country.

During the six years of his weekly television show, "Firing Line," he has hosted such notables as Richard Nixon, Barry Goldwater, Norman Mailer, Truman Capote, Otto Preminger, Jack Anderson, Billy Graham, and Bernadette Devlin.

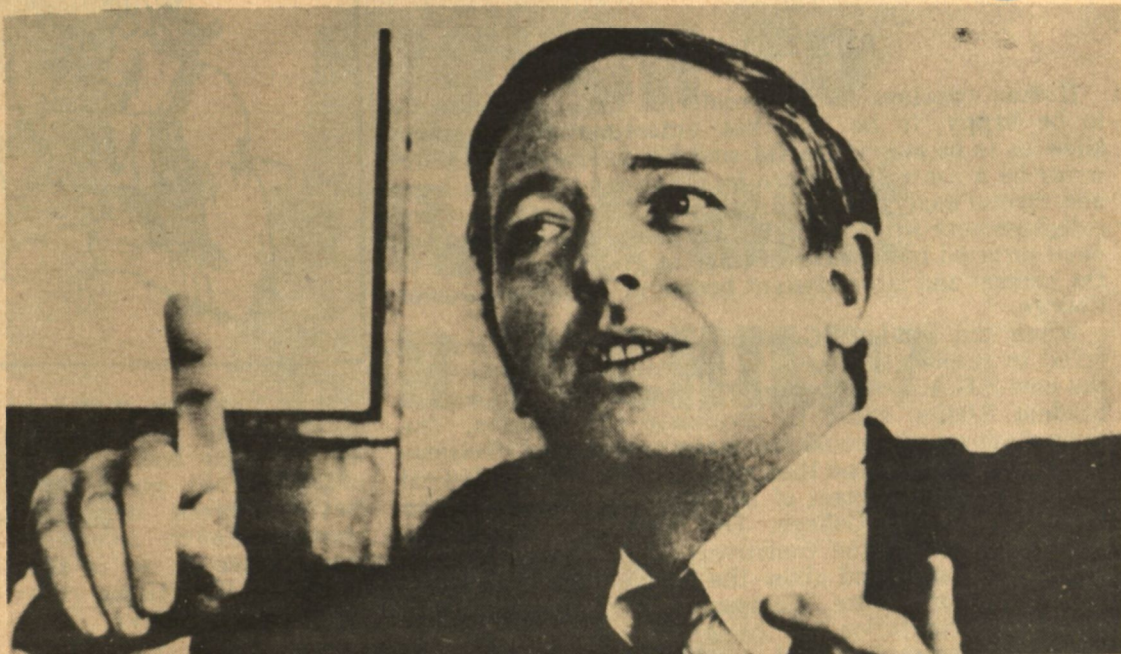
Celebrated for his wit, Buckley has been described by Claire Booth Luce as "that rare thing: a very opinionated man who listens very courteously to the other fellow."

Symposium sponsors are the Cobb County Medical Society Committee on Medicine, Religion and Law, the Cobb County Judicial Circuit Bar Association, the Marietta-Smyrna Ministerial Association and Kennesaw Junior College.

All sessions are open to Kennesaw Junior College students free of charge except Friday luncheon and dinner. Dr. Henry Malcom will be on campus all day Thursday for informal sessions with students.

On May 5, student nurses will be helping with the open house. They will act as hosts and hostesses and will direct people to various parts of the campus. Various films will be shown on nursing. All are invited to attend.

## New Vet's Bill In Congress

A bill is currently proposed to increase veterans' benefits 23% and extend the entitlement period from 36 months to 8 years. Passage is virtually certain, however, there is a move to water it down in Congress to an 8% increase.

Veterans and concerned students at schools around the country are organizing a campus effort to exert pressure on representatives to support the bill at its full 23% level.

Western Union has made available its Mail Gram facilities to students to express themselves on this measure. The Mail Gram is a new form of communication at 1/7 the cost of a telegram with the same impact.

The price is \$1.00 for this effort, instead of the usual \$2.00.

This electronically transmitted message is delivered the day after sending by the U. S. Postal Service.

With a maximum (investment) of \$3.00 a Mail Gram to each State Senator and his district congressman, veterans can help insure themselves of up to \$600.00 more a year.

Voting is in early May, so there is still time to make your voices heard.

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## Blindmen, Blind Decisions

Human emotions can be wonderful. Emotions allow us to be happy, to be sad; but unfortunately, emotions allow us to be angry, fearful, and blind. Emotions should never be a controlling force in situations requiring logic and careful analysis. Yet, in an era of supposed student enlightenment in concern for fairness, violent emotions have surfaced to obscure an issue of great importance to the current and later student bodies of Kennesaw Junior College.

When the Student Government Association leaders failed to resolve the issue of the contested election on the new S.G.A. Constitution, Dr. Carol Martin, Dean of Student Affairs, chose to invalidate the election. The same students who could not make even minor decisions concerning the election then rose out of their apathetical rut and voiced a protest of Dr. Martin's decision to the President of the College, Dr. Sturgis. Dr. Sturgis decided to return the controversy to the full Student Advisory Council and allow the Council to resolve the issue by majority vote. We assume Dr. Sturgis did this by his interpretation of the official statutes of the college. Interpretation of the statutes of the school and their final enforcement is Dr. Sturgis's right, duty, and privilege. His decision, by itself, did nothing to ensure an unfair and biased decision on the Constitution by the Council. However, his decision was lacking in finality, we feel, and Dr. Martin's decision did clear a complicated mess.

When the issue of the Constitutional election reached the full Council, it was clear what the nature of the decision would be. The officers of the S.G.A. have shown continually to be unable to remove emotions from their minds and elected instead to allow emotions to rule the day. The full effect of Dr. Sturgis's order was realized when the Student Advisory Council approved the new S.G.A. Constitution. The members of the Council chose to ignore a committee's research which showed many irregularities in voting procedures and practices. They instead chose to approve a Constitution that may be for the ultimate benefit of the student body, but is a Constitution that we feel has been ratified by blind men.

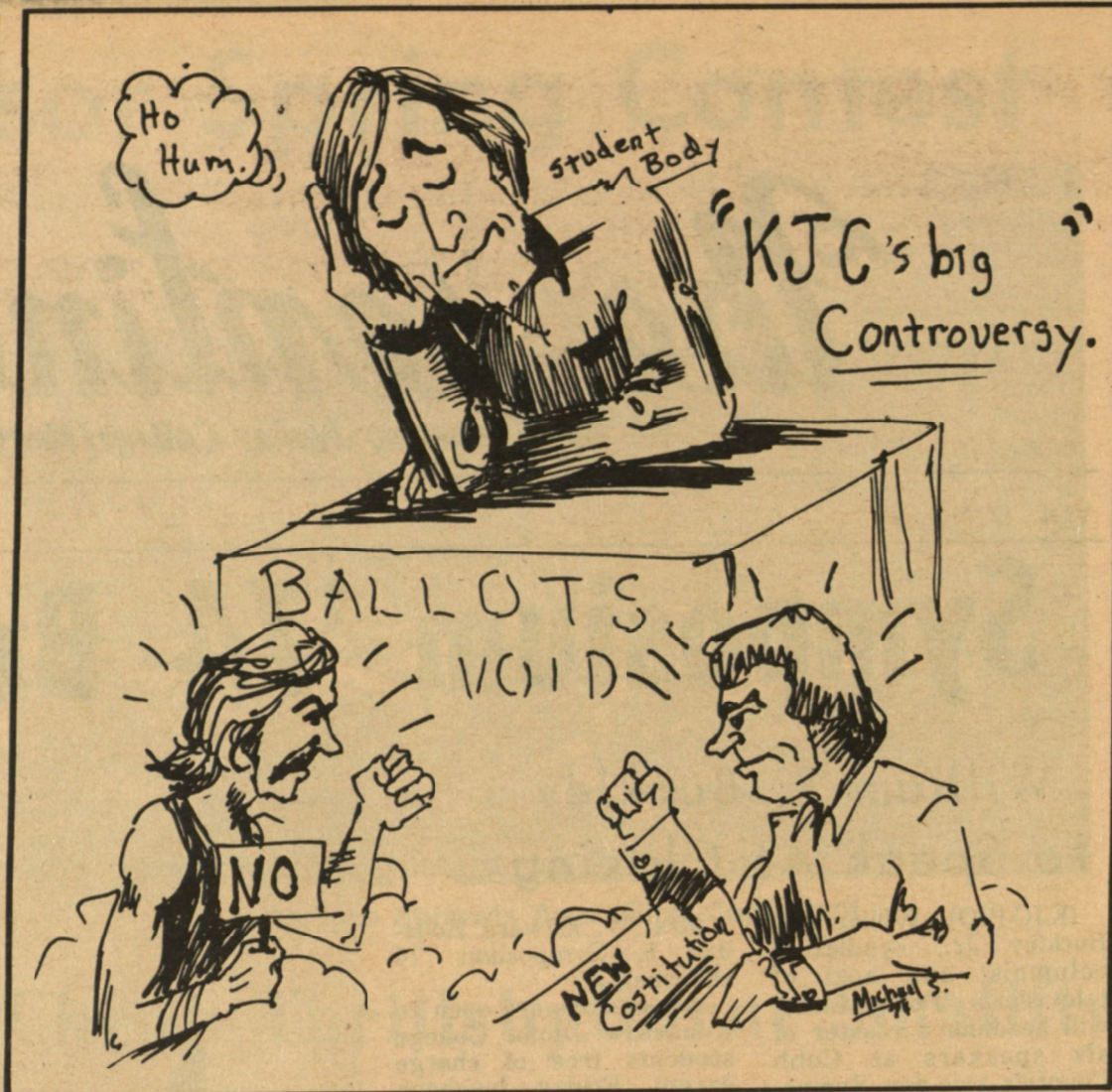

DEAR EDITOR:

If Kennesaw Junior College is a non-profit

educational organization, where does the 25% profit go the Bookstore collects on each used book they resell?

For those students who do not know it, the Bookstore will buy back a used book for 50% of its original retail cost; they then put the books on the shelf for resale at 75% of its original retail cost. This means 25% is made off of each book turned in. 25% is definitely a profit - no matter what anyone says! Considering the fact that a profit is made from the original sale of the book plus a profit made on each resale, substantial profit is made both at the beginning and the end of each quarter.



It is time the students at Kennesaw Junior College wise up and stop all of this profit going into this non-profit organization. If each student would place an ad in the Sentinel advertising the books they have for resale, they would be helping themselves and their fellow students. Students selling used books could sell them at a price between 50% and 75% of their original cost to students taking the same course the following quarter. The student selling the books would get more money from his used books, and the students buying them would save money by getting them for less than 75% used book cost.

I propose that we all join together in helping ourselves by saving money from buying books through each other rather than through the bookstore.

### Hang In There

"The elections of officers (President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer) will be held the Monday and Tuesday of the fifth week in Spring quarter (April 22 & 23) under the direction of the Election Board. The vote shall be by ballot and a majority shall elect. New officers shall assume their duties at the beginning of Summer quarter." Terms of offices shall be for one year.

"Candidates for any office shall file a written petition (can be obtained in the Student Government office) with the Dean of Student Affairs and the Election Board stating his or her qualifications for office. Deadline for these petitions is one week before the election (April 16). Candidates must be enrolled for 10 quarter hours and have earned a minimum of 15 quarter hours at this school prior to taking office with a 2.0 average or 2.0 for the preceding two quarters."

No late petitions will be accepted for this year. The Cobb County Ordinary's office has volunteered the use of their voting machines - so be prepared to vote.

## Museum Without Walls On KJC Campus

The Museum Without Walls series is now being shown at Kennesaw Junior College. These films deal with a wide range of topics that include architecture, art, and Greek temples. The next film to be shown is "The Impressionist" which will be shown April 16 in the library seminar room. This film presents the origins and development of Impressionist painting from Carot and Barbizon painters to Monet's Water Lilies."

Other films to be shown include "The Greek Temple" on April 23, "Le Corbusier" on May 7, "The Cubist Epoch" on May 14, and "Germany-DaDa" on May 28. "The Greek Temple" shows the evolution of the structure and decorations of temples in Magna Grecia through the Doric, Ionic, and Corinthian styles. It was filmed at the site of all the great temples. "Le Corbusier," a film by Carlos Vilardebo, deals with Le Corbusier's revolutionary ideas on architecture and urban renewal. It depicts photographically their practical applications in his most important buildings in Europe and Asia. "The Cubist Epoch" offers a comprehensive survey of

Cubist art in the context of its period. Germany-DaDa" provides a unique insight into the aims and activities of this revolutionary group of artists and writers.

These films have proven to be very informative and all students are urged to attend.

# Dean Rusk And Bill Buckley To Speak At Symposium '74

The ninth annual Cobb County Symposium, entitled "The Struggle to Communicate" will take place on Thursday and Friday this week.

Mr. Buckley, the torch bearer of American Conservatism, has conducted the "Firing Line" on television for 11 years. He is the publisher of the "National Review", a biweekly magazine, with influence far beyond what circulation would suggest.

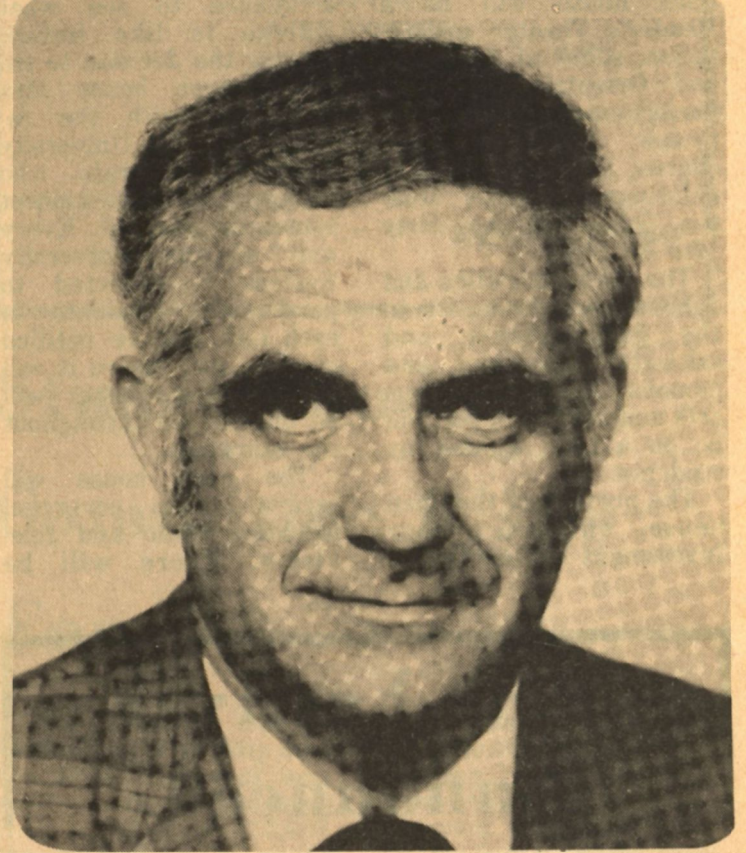
Mr. Rusk is a native Georgian who rose to be the only Secretary of State who lasted two Presidential terms (1961-1969). He is professor of International Law at the University of Georgia.

Other speakers will be Dr. Beverly Mead and Jonas Robitscher, psychiatrists, and Henry Malcom and Bennett Sims clergymen.

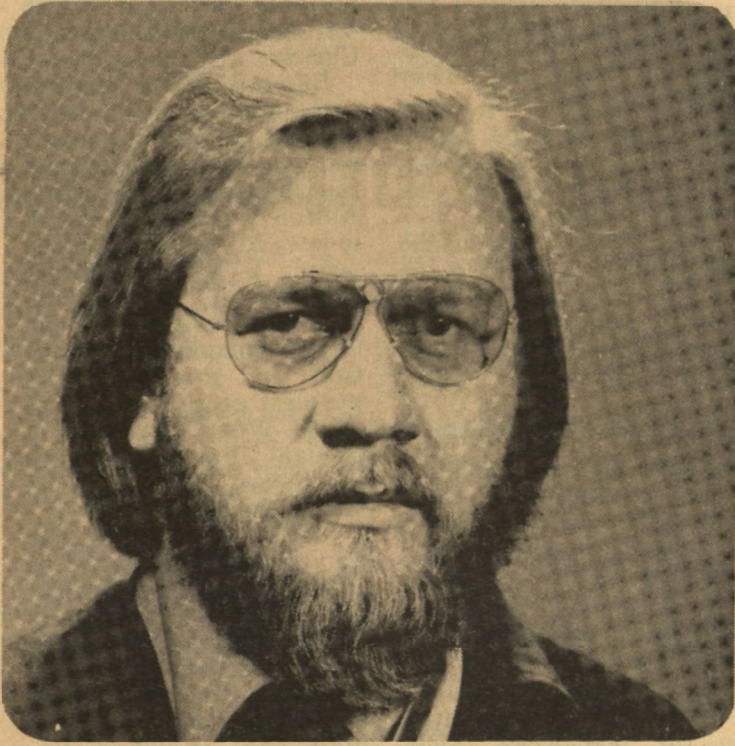
The entire event will be moderated by John L. Pruitt, producer-anchorman of W.S.B. - T.V. Evening Newsroom. The Cobb County Symposium began in 1965 as a joint effort of doctors, clergymen and lawyers in order to promote co-operation between disciplines and common problems.

They have grown since then to be the major intellectual event of Cobb County. Speakers have ranged from conservative Senate minority leader Hugh Scott to Anglican priest turned Eastern mystic, Alan Watts.

The Symposia have gotten major news coverage in the last few years, and the University of Georgia student-run television station, channel 8, will tape for telecasting.



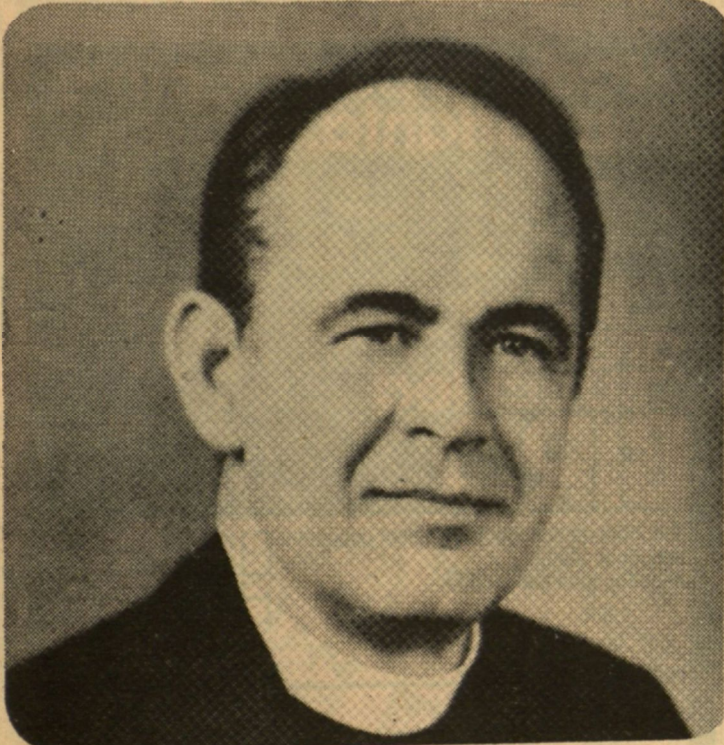

The other activities and exhibits includes visits to the green house and saltwater aquarium and demonstrations of various arts and crafts. These will be on a tour, guided by students.

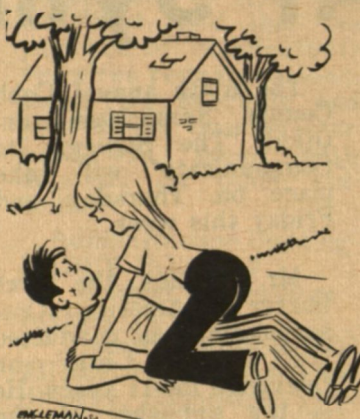
The purpose of the open house, entitled, "Your Investment in Quality," is

# Peyton Place Del Sur: A Book Review

The High Valley, by Jessica North, belongs to a genre that many have thought was blessedly extinct, the type of novel that used to be serialized in the Saturday Evening Post, and which your grandmother used to use up a whole box of tissue reading.

The novel is a typical example of its genre. The plot is basically a long, involved flashback, certainly a clumsy way of telling a story. It concerns a young woman who is suffering from a tremendous inferiority complex brought on by her late, overbearing, actress mother.

This young woman (Allison) travels to Puerto Vallarta, quitting her job, when her blind fiancée jilts her. She stays in Puerto Vallarta with the rich widow of the family doctor (which explains

why she's a rich widow).

After a few mandatory paragraphs coming under the heading of "quaint local customs," conversations around the widow's (Margaret) villa settles around the Mysterious Macho, who is a vital part of this kind of novel. The macho in this case is one Don Carlos Romano, who has led an improbably life fighting bulls and, away from the bull ring, cow-punching on his comparatively work-a-day, four-hundred-year-old hacienda. Well, as luck would have it, the macho turns up at a party given by a wealthy Texas oilman (there's a lot of them around Puerto Vallarta, you know) which our heroine happens to be attending. Straightaway, he hires her to teach his blind stepmother from Pennsylvania to get along in life. Now ain't 'dat a coincidence?

There she meets Carlos' churlish brother who broadly implies that Allison is supposed to be Carlos' mistress. He puts her into another standard fixture of this sort of fiction, the Room with a Past. This room contains, among other things, a handkerchief purported to be the one with which Veronica wiped the face of Christ.

By and by, a servant girl comes up with another startling coincidence - everybody around the house is mistaking Allison for Carlos' sister-in-law. At this point in the novel, I was wondering whether it was worthwhile to review a hopelessly complicated story told in some of the purplest prose this side of 1901. What the hell, I thought, it was something to review, so I read the whole thing.

Ms. North, I found, has an interesting way of filling up her pages when her creative invention is running low, or when her plots are moving too fast. She rushes in battalions of stereotyped characters to man the breeches between the plot. And that, in effect, is the whole substance of this story.

Allison accepts and, before you know it, she's travelling on a grave-lined mountain road to a place in the boondocks called "The High Valley," which is Carlos' hacienda. The Whole Valley!

## Arts Festival Announced

The Arts Festival of Atlanta announces as part of its performing arts program a blue grass and old-time music festival to be held on the opening and closing days of the Festival week, Sunday, May 12 and Sunday, May 19 in Piedmont Park.

The highlight of this program will be a contest held on Sunday, May 19.

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# Student Budget Committee Plans For '74-75

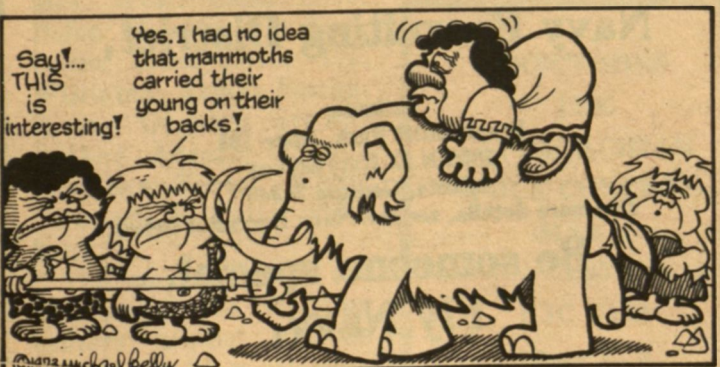
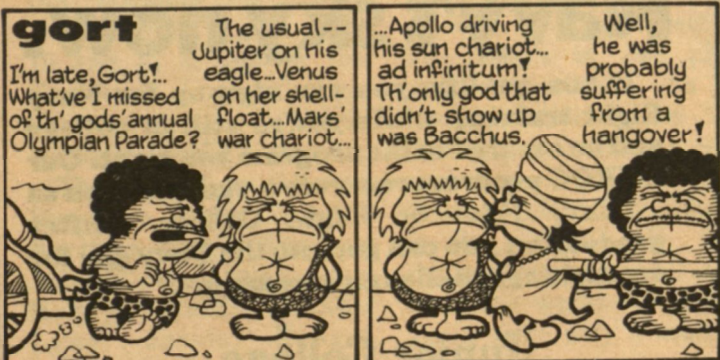
The Student Budget Committee is mulling over the 1974-75 student activities budget. Working from a budget of \$75,000, the committee is giving out to student organizations ranging from the Black Students Alliance to the Canoe Club.

The Committee has been plagued by problems of poor communication with the various organizations, some of which have not even submitted budgets. Many of those who have submitted budgets have not made their revisions. "We need the active participation of each group in the revision of the Budgets...but since we can not get any participation from some groups these will get last consideration," said one member of the committee. At first, the total sums

of the clubs budgets came to \$100,000 dollars, exceeding the available funds by \$26,000. These demands were sent back for revisions twice: they still total more than the available funds. Members of the committee warn that apathy is a bad word to use in this case. "I would like to call it more of a lack of involvement," said another committee member.

This same member commented that the lack of permanent equipment brought up the cost of club requirements. The Canoe Club, for instance, has to rent equipment because the school has forbidden them from purchasing them. This drives up the budget, whereas it would actually go down if the equipment were already available.

## Spring Intramurals Underway

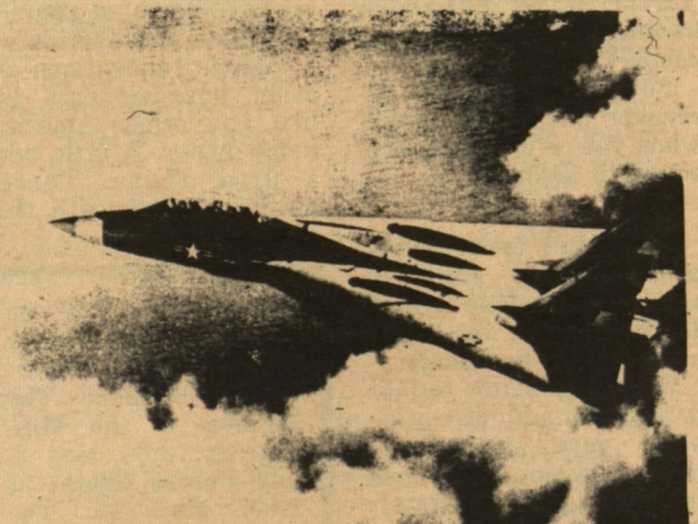
