New SGA President

Jeff Culverhouse has become the new Student Government Association president following Donnie Lindsay's resignation.

On October 8th, with one senator abstaining, the entire membership of SGA voted unanimously to request Lindsay's resignation for "failure to fulfill the duties and obligations" of his office.

Recently re-elected Senator Charlie Copeland commented: "We had virtually no SGA during the summer quarter. There was very little participation of the officers. We had no faculty advisor and practically no

interest from the student body. You just can't make policy without a quorum, and only once all summer did we have a quorum. Now the people on SGA are trying to get organized again so that SGA can be a viable force in student affairs."

A week prior to the vote secretary Victor Gary resigned. The new SGA officers are Jeff Culverhouse, president; Howell Swain, vice-president; Judy McBurnett, secretary; and Beverly Martin, treasurer.

Two professors were approached during the summer for the job of

advisor, and the question of them becoming co-advisors -- to which both were agreeable -- was thoroughly debated. A majority of SGA members were against the compromise, and Bowman Davis was approved with a substantial majority during the October 8th meeting.

Senator June Rowland, who was elected after a fill-in appointment this summer, said, "I'm amazed at the enthusiasm every one of the current SGA officers and senators has shown. I believe we're going to have a great year in spite of our initial problems."

Money

KJC has money to give away!

Sounds unlikely that a college would beg students to take its money? Director of Student Financial Aid Tom Patterson agrees that it is unusual.

"In years past, students have beaten down our door looking for money. But this year we wonder where everybody's gone. KJC has \$30,000 left in the BEOG Program alone, plus several other programs still contain funds yet to be disbursed."

Mr. Patterson stressed that even students whose family incomes are well above poverty level may still qualify for aid. "The assessment of need is not based on income alone, but rather on a balance between income and expenditures," he said. As an example, a family could earn \$20,000 annually but have unusually high expenses because two dependents are in college. Add that cost to high mortgage payments and

other monthly expenses, and the student might qualify for financial aid.

"Evidently many students are under the impression that they must have poverty-level incomes in order to receive assistance. This is simply not true. I urge any student who is not sure whether he would qualify or not to have our office assess his finances. It won't hurt to try, and I feel many students will be in for a pleasant surprise."

Three major programs containing funds are:

BEOG [Basic Educational Opportunity Grant] Program is federally funded and provides awards up to \$800 a year. Qualifications for this aid is based on financial need. The only restriction is that your college education must have started after April 1, 1973, making this an ideal program for recent high school graduates. This program is a grant, not a loan. (\$30,000 remains in

the BEOG Program alone; as many as 37 KJC students could receive maximum benefits.)

Regents Scholarship still has grants available. Students must show financial need and superior academic standing (top 25 percent of his class) in order to qualify. A maximum of \$500 a year is awarded to each student. Again, this is not a loan but a gift.

College Work Study Program is a federally funded program offering part-time employment at \$2 to \$2.50 an hour. Requirements are financial need and good academic standing (which is defined as "not being on scholastic probation").

Several other loan programs and grants are available as well. Further details may be obtained from the Financial Aid Office in the Administration Building.

Might as well go talk to Tom Patterson. You have nothing to lose and you could gain a great deal--money.

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
VIBRATION

Lodged In The Lungs

Swallowing something "the wrong way" can cause trouble. Even tragedy.

Instead of traveling down the throat and into the stomach, objects can drop into the windpipe. Some restaurants now have special instruments to remove the major causes of choking catastrophes: pieces of steak and big portions of food. If the portion completely blocks the windpipe and cannot be dislodged in minutes then death occurs.

Offending objects can pass beyond the windpipe and into the air passages of the lungs. Blocking an air passage can cause a lung disease called bron-

chiectasis. In some cases, surgery may be required to remove the object.

Tiny tools are now being tested to avoid these traumas. Threading these tools through a flexible, nylon tube with a lens on one end, two investigators at the University of Iowa College of Medicine have recovered an amazing variety of items from the inner recesses of animals' lungs. The tools are just big enough to grasp a peanut. When they are squeezed through a flexible, lighted tube, the tools can be controlled by the researchers' hands. They can pick up paper clips, beans, seeds, coins, chicken bones, screws, and safety pins.

In research supported by the American Lung Association, Drs. Donald C. Zavala and Mitchell L. Rhodes have found these techniques effective with animals. But more investigation is necessary before the procedures can be attempted on humans. The doctors believe that the tools will be useful in dislodging objects from the lungs of all but very young children, who have small and delicate air passages. Dr. Zavala, however, is now testing tools to use on infants and toddlers.

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
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
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
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
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
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

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WITCHCRAFT

Witchcraft is an interesting hobby for some people. For others, it is their religion and moral philosophy. Large publications such as **Look**, **Post** and **Time** have published articles dealing with the witchcraft revival.

Halloween is only a few days away, and the serious Witch -- I mean the one who believes in the religion -- will not be flying around the sky on a broom but, rather, meeting with his or her coven for a Sabbath day. It is called All Hallows Eve which comes at summer's end and is based on the ancient Gaelic fire festival. In Scotland, non-witches would bar their doors and place candle-lit pumpkins to frighten the evil spirits away; hence the custom quite a number of us practice today.

To properly cover the total history of "Wicca," as modern Witches call their old religion, a large number of volumes could be written, and the subject still would not be complete. So this short article will generalize on some of the values, interests, and concerns of the Witch of today.

First, a few guidelines and definitions. Reading about Witchcraft and the Occult is a hobby for many people, and the line for those readers is clearly drawn. Reading about Witchcraft is one thing, but I assure you the practice of it is quite another matter. "Witches," and the term refers to both men and women,

tend to follow their own interpretations, philosophy, instincts, and desires when it comes to the nitty-gritty of practice.

A **coven** is a group of Witches that are the comrades in the Witch's work. It can consist of any number, but thirteen is the best number because of its magical significance. Thirteen has always been associated with magic, for instance the Bible speaks of the ancient Hebrew Tree of Life.

As to exactly what a Witch's work entails, it can range from the blessing of a baby to the cursing of a gossipy neighbor. Witchcraft history is full of absolutely horrifying stories, but, on the other hand, what was done to the Witches in the name of Christianity would also turn many people's stomachs. (See **The Supernatural** by Douglas Hill and Pat Williams for the details.)

Today, happily, very little of this kind of perversion goes on in the truly serious study of Wicca. In the papers, especially in California, newstories will appear about the latest sex-orgy-occult-witch group and will set people aghast for a few days -- until they forget it. The Satan-worshippers have also gained headlines, but all of this fly-by-night groups only **claim** to follow Witchcraft.

Most Witches deny the Satanists and, in fact, use their own acclaimed abilities against them. As Stewart Farrar states in his book **What Witches**

Do: The Modern Coven Revealed, "If today 'Satanist' covens do exist, they are not witches but a sick fringe." Modern Witches, particularly of the Alexandrian cult, of which Mr. Farrar is a member, believe in one God, in the non-material sense. How He is personified in Wicca is what is often misunderstood. For example, the two deities of Witchcraft are the Horned God and the Mother Goddess. The Horned God has been translated into Satan, although the Horned God can be traced back to the late Paleolithic period. The figure of a man clothed in stag skin and wearing the horns of a stag has been preserved in ancient cave paintings in France. The idea that a man can paint a picture and somehow can intuitively control nature has been with us since our three-climbing days and is still with us. Many, for instance, still carry a rabbit's foot or will not drive on Friday the 13th.

The Mother Goddess is on the opposite pole of the Horned God. The one half of the balance man sees in nature; man and woman, day and night, life and death. Neither gods were evil but rather a different way of viewing indirectly the complete unknown. Mr. Farrar points out a fact that most historians will agree to: "The gods of an old religion always become the gods of the new." When Pope Innocent VIII's Papal Bull of 1484 condemned witches as heretics, somewhere the Horned Gods image

became altered and mixed in with Satan... Indeed, during trials of the witches the Horned God's name would be changed to the devil's name instead. There were self proclaimed witches who did in actuality worship the devils.

Today most covens spend their holidays and coven gatherings practicing healing and problem solving for someone who is in need. Witches usually practice their craft in the nude. They refer to this as skyclad. By being completely natural they believe their psychic power will have more freedom to work. Non-believers sometimes gain the wrong idea from this. They associate being skyclad with sexual orgies and such. Modern white Witches reject whole-hearted practices. As one young Witch from England expressed it: "We believe that sex is nothing to be ashamed of nor should it be overdone." On the other hand, most covens have nothing whatsoever to do with any rituals involving sex.

Some covens worship the Mother Goddess more than the God and some are just the opposite. The actual rituals and spells used by various covens remain secret to outsiders. Perhaps the way to see exactly how sincere a Witch is, is to question his or her activities of the coven. A serious and sincere Witch will either refuse to answer or tell you a bunch of nonsense just to quell your interest. By revealing the secrets,


a Witch will betray her coven and lose some of her powers. Most cults keep their power sources directed toward such acts as granting wishes, healing, giving advice, and to making love potions and other brews. Most Witches, with Sybil Leek an outstanding example, are competent herbalists and botanists.

Well, Halloween is on its way and I hope this article has cleared up some misconceptions concerning Wicca. Again, let me stress that I have covered only the barest details. Wicca is a serious religion followed by the sincere and the insincere.

Why is Witchcraft in a revival especially in our time of modern science? There are many theories. One is that institutional religion is losing its influence and modern man is becoming dissatisfied. Another is that science does not have all the answers. Man has a need to be sure, to have security, a sense of control over his world. Wicca does not claim to have all the answers, but its sincere followers have as deep a feeling of security and faith as the true Christian believer does. Perhaps it is because Wicca traces its roots to pre-Christian times. It is as old as the race of man, and every continent has a form of magic, as for instance, in Africa's tradition of voodoo.

Wicca has as complex a set of teachings as those

The opening day of football at KJC began Wednesday, October 9 with doubleheader action. The first game at 3:00 p.m. was the Flying Beaver team going against the Gorilla team, and the second game at 4:00 p.m. seeing the Trojans playing the Heroes.

Gorillas Hang One on Flying Beavers

In what might have been one of the most evenly matched games this year, defense was the name of the game. The first quarter brought the crowd to their feet as on the opening kickoff the Trojan quarterback took the ball and raced 40 yards for a touchdown then turned around and completed a pass to STEWART for the 2 point conversion play.

Minutes later the Trojans scored again as RANDY KRISE lofted a 40 yard touchdown pass to JIM HENDERSON. The try for the extra point was no good. The first quarter ended on a strong rush by Trojans lineman RICHARD HUMES who caught Heroes quarterback STEVE FARMER in his own endzone for a 2 point safety.

Second quarter action saw the Trojans on the move again as KRISE directed his team downfield and finally found "BIG RICH" HUMES wide open and connected on a 35 yard touchdown pass. The extra point was good as quarterback KRISE took the snap and rambled around the end. Late in the second quarter the Heroes finally got unhitched and began to move the ball. The key play of their drive was a 50 yard pass play from quarterback FARMER to wide receiver RON GRAVINO. The next play FARMER on a keeper ran the final 11 yards for the Heroes first touchdown of the year. The extra point attempt failed, and at the end of the first half the score was Trojans 23, Heroes 6.

The second half began with the Heroes receiving the kickoff and starting their drive downfield. Just as it seemed they might score again, Trojan back HENDERSON intercepted a FARMER pass. The Trojans now faced a desperate Heroes defense and were unable to move the ball. Midway through the quarter the

Heroes duplicated the pass that set up their first score as FARMER hit GRAVINO on another 50 yard pass play. It seemed they might get back in the game on another touchdown pass but alert Trojan safety KEITH ARNOLD make a timely interception in the Heroes endzone to kill the Heroes' drive. Tough defense prevailed the rest of the quarter with both teams exchanging interception. FARMER snagged the first one, but two plays later STEWART of the Trojans returned the favor.

The clinching Trojan touchdown finally came in the fourth quarter when KRISE sprinted untouched around left end for 6 more Trojan points. KRISE then tossed a 2 point conversion pass to DOUG BRAMBLETT concluding the scoring.

It was an excellent showing for the newly formed Trojan team with outstanding officiating by referees BARRY STOVER and JIM TURNER. Dr. Hudson also did a good job controlling the mob of fans and the scoreboard.



Hint Parade

The province of Alberta, one of the Western provinces, produces 70 per cent of Canada's oil and 81 per cent of its gas, and is the source of about 42 per cent of the country's native coal. When we're in need, there's a northern friend indeed!

The estimated population as of January 1, 1970 was 21.26 million. Over two-fifths is of British stock; 30 per cent are French speaking descendants of the original French colonists; the remaining are of other origins. That whole country, like ours, is made up of a bunch of foreigners!

John Cabot, a Genoese navigator, claimed a large portion of the Atlantic seaboard, including Cana-

da, in England's name over 465 years ago. However, no settlement occurred at that time.

The true founder and settler of French Canada was the French explorer Samuel de Champlain, who established tiny settlements between 1604 and 1634. British attempts at settlement occurred as early as 1628.

The British North America Act of 1867 created a new Canada, embracing four provinces--Ontario, Quebec, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick. In later years 6 other provinces entered Confederation, the latest being Newfoundland in 1949.

Alberta, Saskatchewan and Manitoba constitute Canada's "bread-basket of the world."


Canada has a par-

liamentary system of government with Queen Elizabeth II as Queen of Canada. The Queen's representative in Canada is the Governor General, who is appointed by recommendation of the Prime Minister, generally a five-year period.

Canada's first diplomatic mission, the Canadian Legation (now Embassy) was in Washington and was opened in 1927. With friends like us who needs enemies!

Canada exceed 3,200 miles in breadth and almost 3,000 miles in depth from its southern border to the northern tip of Ellesmere Island.

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

"I want," I calmly stated, "you to exorcise the spirit!"


