

WE BLEW IT!

HERE'S WHY!

Southern Tech recently lost an opportunity to get as much as \$180,000 in funds to set up a veterans counseling program. The money was made available through HEW by the Cranston Amendment. This amendment provided a maximum payment of \$300 for each full-time equivalent veteran on the STI campus plus an additional payment of \$150 for each full-time equivalent veteran enrolled in programs aimed at giving an educational opportunity to those who normally would not qualify for entrance to a college. STI has an enrollment that includes over 400 veterans. The only stipulation was that STI have an increase in the veteran population on campus in excess of 10%. For the last three years, the veteran population has increased by 40%, 12%, and 13% respectively.

Questions about the reasons why STI did not receive its share of Cranston funds produced these answers from the Goatshed. (1) We did not know about any funds being available. (The VA sent copies to all colleges.) (2) I saw that on some desk but I don't remember where. (File cabinets are available, complete with tabs for file folders.) (3) We called some lady and she said we didn't qualify. (Who this lady was nobody knew. We fit the requirements made by HEW but nobody would argue with a secretary!) (4) We got the information only three days before the deadline for filing. (No proposal or report was required, just simply filling out an application blank.)

The fact that we missed out completely on the Cranston money points out several problems to this reporter. First, the State of Georgia is remiss in not providing funds for a (continued on page)

Since the present Southern Tech Student Government officers were elected on April 23, there has been much activity. Jeff Tucker, SGA president, points out the following accomplishments:

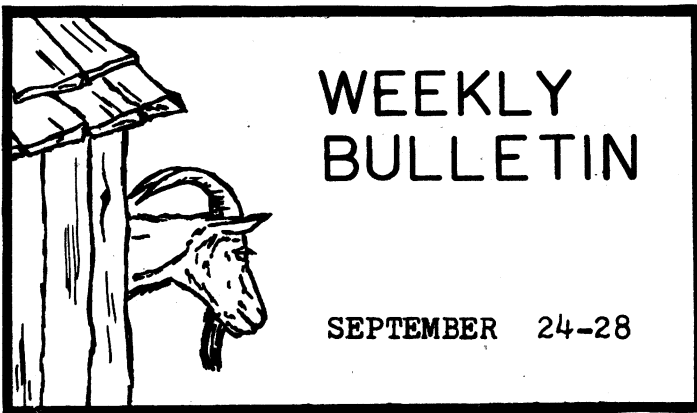
1. Worked with Regents' representatives and Georgia Tech officials for the construction of the new STI athletic field.

5. Furnished student representatives for "Stay and See Georgia" exhibit at Lenox Square and for Cobb County's "Expo '73".
6. Worked with the STI administration for the placing of needed signs on the tennis courts.
7. Sponsored the Bathtub Race and Freshman Orientation.
8. Initiated "Who's Who In American Universities and Colleges" selections at Southern Tech.
9. Submitted report to the Regents regarding the activity fees paid by evening school students.
10. Appointed Prof. Douglas Black as faculty advisor to the SGA.
11. Met with Georgia Tech President Pettit regarding Southern Tech-Georgia Tech relationship.
12. Reactivated STI Judiciary Board and the Presidents' Club and established relations between the SGA and the Dormitory Council.
13. Supported the Boosters' Club and the Minority Recruitment Conference at Southern Tech.
14. Advocated the giving of limited academic credit for military service.

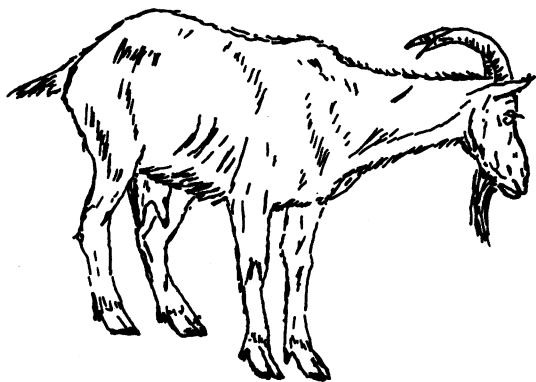
GOAT DAY '73

Dean Carlson Stated:

It is a dynamic group working for you and I just can't imagine a student not wanting to be a part of SGA or should I say "the real Southern Tech."

Paul Smith, Placement Office:

My philosophy is that a college is not in tune with the needs of society or students unless a well established SGA is "functioning." This body of representatives should have a student on every administrative council or advisory committee if such a group relates to the college or its many areas of activities.

The word "functioning" as used above has the following meaning:

- A. Structured as an official college body and a part of all decision making.
- B. Complete authority to make policy and budget which are direct responsibilities to their role.
- C. Should not be a Dean of Students toy.
- D. Should be responsible for their actions to the Dean of Students if any correction is needed.
- E. The SGA should become more interested and concerned about the curricula and the faculty.
- F. The SGA should be more involved in Student Recruitment.
- G. The SGA should be involved in departmental curriculum development so as to be aware of the objectives of such degree programs.
- H. The SGA should offer seminars to assist the students in becoming more knowledgeable and aware of Southern Tech and its needs and problems.

The above remarks are made in general context; however items A-H should be required of the Southern Tech SGA. (continued on page 7)
