
Goat Day itself will be different this year. It will not be a money making operation, but rather a day for great fun and cool refreshments.




Finally, any suggestions by anyone which might mean a better intramural program at this college will be taken into consideration.

"I think we should've beaten them." said a very disappointed Clancy Head. Southern Tech's cross country coach, after his team had just suffered a bad defeat Wednesday at the hands of Emory.

Emory scored 15 points and Southern Tech went down with 40.

The meet, run over Emory's half-asphalt and half-gravel 4 mile course,

saw Emory runners cross the finish line in the first five spots. Tech scorers took second five positions.

Leading the Emory pack were Charles Widmer, first place, 22 minutes and 53 seconds; Alan Brecher, 2nd sport, 23:02 and Larry Ault, third with 23 minutes and 15 seconds. Fourth and fifth spots were taken by Emory's Katz brothers, Ira and Steve, who crossed the mark in 23:25.

ST's Tommy Nelson was the first Hornet across the finish line taking sixth spot in 23 minutes and 30 seconds. Tech's outstanding runner Louis Pannell finished seventh in 23:55.

Other Hornets racking up points were Rick Terry, eightth place, 24:06, Lee Thomar, ninth, 24:20 and Shad Atkinson, last in 24:28.

Emory's track and cross country coach John Chatelain said this meet was as good as an Emory team has done in a long time.

"I guess we had better runners and more experience," said Coach Chatelain.

When asked what beat them, ST coach Clancy Head replied, "Over-confidence after last week's win."

Tech's cross country team is now 2-1.
