Looking for an education in order to get a good job? Don't forget employers also want people with experience. If you have an Army commission you not only have experience to back up your resume you also have something elso employer's want-training in leadership techniques and management principles.

At Southern Tech you have the ability to receive a commission through the Army ROTC Program. In addition, you have a choice of fice branches in which you can receive your commission: Engineers, Ordnance, Signal, Air Defense Artillery, and Infantry—it's your choice.

If you are a little doubtful if you would like Army ROTC find out. You can take the first two years without any obligation. You do not incur any obligation until you apply for the last two years. Just what is your obligation should you decide to continue? Cadets who enter the last 2 years of the program are obligated for 2 years of active duty but many who desire to do so serve on active duty for only 90 days.

It is also possible to complete Army ROTC in three years or less so don't think you are too late if you are a sophomore. Army ROTC cadets receive \$100 a month during their junior and senior years and every cadet has the opportunity to compete for a full scholarship once he or she is in the program.

MINORITY?


In an effort to expose minority students, their counselors and concerned industry leaders to engineering technology and Southern Technical Institute, the Minority and Female Consortium of Southern Tech will hold a seminar on the campus, Wednesday, February 5.

Over 500 persons, half of them black and female students, are expected to attend the day long seminar whose theme is "Let's change Rhetoric to Reality."

According to Emerelle M. Glover, STI's Director of Financial Aid and Minority Affairs and a member of the consortium, the group hopes to better familiarize high school counselors with engineering technology and Southern Tech.

Mrs. Glover said that the high school mathematics and science teachers and counselors are the key to influencing likely candidates into the engineering technology profession.

The seminar will begin at 9 a.m. with a welcome by STI Dean, Dr. Walter 0. Carlson. The chairman of the consortium is Terry McCready, employment manager of the Atlanta Gas Light, who will give a progress report on the consortium's effort to attract minorities and females to the campus.
