FINAL PLANS

Before the race begins, about 1:00 pm, the Southern Tech pep band will provide race fans with some music. At about 1:50, drivers will line their tubs up for the parade lap around the track. After the parade lap, the pit crews will line the tubs up again for the LeMans start Starting position in only this race will be determined by the driver's drawing for it. In the previous races and in the future, time trials determine position.

Practice for the race will be Saturday, Feb. 7, 10 am - 1 pm. All cars, students or otherwise, must be off the track by 8 pm, Friday evening, Feb. 6 or the cars will be impounded. Also cars must be off the track by 8 pm, Friday, Feb. 13, or they will be impounded. The reason for this is obvious. However, remember the danger only one car can pose to a driver and his tub if its on the track during practice or the actual race. Please move your car so we don't have to impound it, and especially so no one will be exposed to danger,

This race will be closed to off-campus spectators and there will be no pre-race publicity. However, invitations have been sent to members of the media and tub sponsors and major companies in the racing scene.

RECOMMENDATIONS

25 Jan. 76

Dear Mr. Chairman:

As is our responsibilty, under the SGA Constitution, the Student Judiciary Cabinet met on 20 Jan. 1976, at 5:05 P.M., to conduct a hearing on alledged violations of the SGA Constitution by the executive and legislative bodies of the SGA. The following is a list of the Cabinet's interpretations and recommendations.

1. It is the interpretation of the Judiciary Cabinet that the Executive and Legislative branches of the SGA are separate and distinct bodies, and that members of the Executive Branch of the SGA have no legislative powers. The exception to this is the SGA Vice-President where duties are delineated in the SGA Constitution.

- 2. It is the interpretation and decision of the Judiciary Cabinet that in the absence of an official, documented and up-dated Constitution, the Constitution contained in the 1973-74 "Green Hornet" publication, shall be the official SGA Constitution. From this day forward all action by the SGA will be conducted in strict compliance with the regulations contained therein. Exceptions to this will be obvious, typographical errors and documented proof presented to the Judiciary Cabinet of properly concluded amendments to the SGA Constitution.
- 3. It is the recommendation of the Judiciary Cabinet that the student council immediately cause a thorough search to be made for the purpose of locating and up-dating the past and present student council records.
- 4. It is the recommendation of the Judiciary Cabinet that the Student Council form a committee of four for the purpose of updating the SGA Constitution. If it is the desire of the Student Council, the Judiciary Cabinet will provide two members of this committee. This should be done as quickly as possible in order that the recommended changes be incorporated prior to spring elections.
- 5. It is the recommendation of the Judiciary Cabinet that the Student Council set up a finance committee if one is not already active in order to oversee the administration of the SGA budget. At the present time there appears to be nothing that sets forth the procedures for expenditures, from the SGA President's salary, to the conduct of routine business. These recommendations and interpretations offered by the Judiciary Cabinet will not be accepted by some and have already been derided by others as a lot of unnecessary adminstrative paper work. However, if you reflect you will agree that the SGA is a business with an annual budget of approximately \$100,000.00. You cannot run such a business with hearsay rememberances and slipshod procedures, augmented by an annual turnover of leaders. You eventually have chaos.

We, as elected leaders of the student body must accept the challenge of our offices to rectify past errors and to provide a viable base of contiuity for the betterment of the Southern Tech student body.

The resolution, printed last week in the STIng, has been overwhelmingly adopted (18 for, 1 against, 1 abstention) by the Student Council. It will be forwarded to a coalition of students, from institutions throughout the state, which is attempting to bring about a change in regents policy.

Specifically, as stated in the resolution, the Student Council proposes that allocations of your Student Activity Fees be made solely by you, through your elected representatives.

At present, allocations made by the Student Council are subject to a veto power held by the Dean of Southern Tech.

Since its inception the Student Council has allocated over a quarter of a million dollars in Student Activity Fees, during this time, the dean has chosen to exercise his veto only one occasion. The record, therefore, clearly indicates that students are quite capable of responsibly allocating their Activity Fees

Right?, right! say ninety percent of the Student Council; wrong! says Student Body President Doug Laird. Forsaking any logical pattern of debate and remaining steadfastly immune to simple deductive reasoning, Laird has refused to sign the resolution. He states, "I would not like to see ' the power of the purse string' put into the hands of one group of students, faculty or any other decision making body on this campus." Notice, if you will, that that covers just about everyone at Southern Tech. I can only wonder who Laird would like to see with this power. Well let's see, that leaves the Post Office, the Physical Plant, and of course there's the Police Dept. You don't suppose that would make dealing with all those "irresponsible" students somewhat easier wouldn't it Doug.

Well, fortunately, Laird's refusal to sign affects neither the intent nor the impact of this resolution.

It is interesting to note, this situation displays an important aspect of constitutional republics which may very well be the essence of their strength, that being, that the collective majority opinion of the elected representatives of the people cannot be negated by one dissenting voice.
