

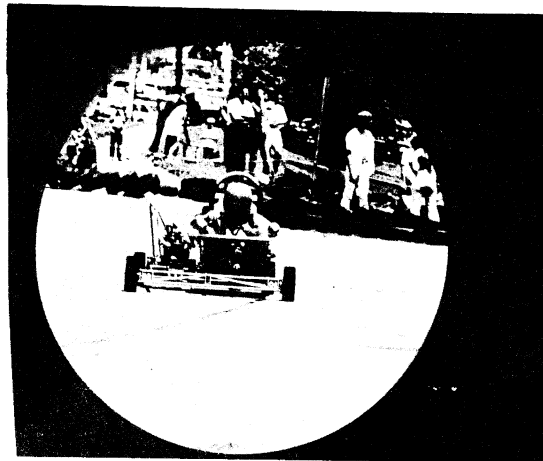
SPRING RACE 60 LAPS!

Once again, the eyes of the world turn to the Southern Tech campus in Marietta where on May 8, at 2 p.m., over 15 helmeted drivers will run across the race track, jump in their racing machines and begin the world-famous Southern Tech Bathtub Race, the only motorized bathtub race on land anywhere in the world.

The 10th annual Bathtub Race, Spring '76, and another first, 60 laps around the 1.1 mile track, 10 laps more than previous spring races. Why? Because last spring winner Mike Van Steenburg in ASME's "Overnight Wonder" captured the checkered flag after only 69 minutes. Too quick, said some members of the press. The Bathtub Racing Association wanted 75 laps, however, the safety committee, composed of students, faculty and administration, recommended 60 laps. The result is expected to be more emphasis on driving ability and a well-built machine able to hold together for the extra 10 laps. Will the drivers chance full throttle for 60 laps?

BRA, composed of drivers, pit crewmen, communications personnel, safety workers and any STI students interested in putting together Southern Tech's unique race, has been meeting every week since September. Their goal, to give Southern Tech students, sponsors and spectators the greatest racing extravaganza ever held on the campus. Their problems, unimaginable!

Safety first. Insurance for drivers and spectators or no race. Ten off-duty policemen will be brought in to beef-up Chief Billy Howard and his Southern Tech police force who will put in long hours before the race ends. Also, four



track marshals per racing bathtub will circle the track. And the always present tires, the barricades between the spectators and the racing machines, must be thrown and picked up. This hard, sweaty work belongs to the drivers and their crews, and, of course, Jack Agee and his excellent Physical Plant Department, who with

the racing association, spend more time on the race than any other group. Communications, another difficult task. About 40 persons at various locations around the track with walkie-talkies and flags familiar to all race drivers. Once again, Road Atlanta safety and communication personnel will be on the scene with student Hugh Greenlee and his STI safety and communications workers to man the turns warning the drivers of hazards, wrecks and faulty racing machines.

A sound system! This job falls

on Ben Stapp and Steve Westbrook, engineers on the college radio station, WSTB. Their job, to make sure everyone at the race can hear the announcer, the music, the messages. They've done it before, experts in filling the raceway with the sounds of the race.

Posters, about 500 of them, to be taped, tacked and stapled by BRA and other students throughout the metro area in every imaginable place. Richard Chupp and other Sigma Pi's even took some to Daytona.

The public relations office starts to write the story of the Spring '76 Bathtub Race, notifying every newspaper, radio and television station in Georgia, the Associated Press and United Press International and out-of-state newspapers.

Last year, Autoweek carried a story; this year Road and Track has assigned a photographer to cover the race, thanks to Bob Fischer, who queried them. Last year, Stars and Stripes took the race around the world with AP and UPI photos. And this year, too! The race will go around the world.

What's left? A thousand endless details! A beauty queen wants to come, parade cars, starting gun, trophies, start/finish banner, signs at the front of the campus, safety meetings, publicity interviews, race programs, refreshment stands, lap counters, judges, notices about parking to students, ambulances, fire equipment, lining the raceway with pennants and flags of a major oil company, last minute repairs

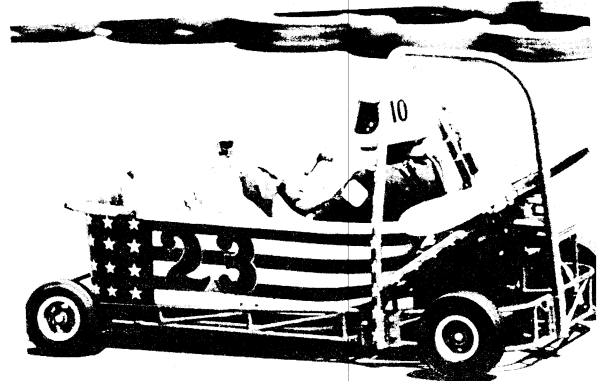
and adjustments to racing machines, time trials, inspections, impoundment, drivers breakfast and finally, it's race time!

In fall quarter '75, the Student Government Association voted \$2500 to open an Auto Repair Shop on the Southern Tech campus.

According to SGA president Doug Laird, Southern Tech is the only college in the University System of Georgia where the Student Government has opened an auto repair shop.

"We did it," said Laird, "to help the students save money on auto repairs and learn how to repair their own cars through their friends knowledge.

Located in Building 6, the Ga. Fire Academy Building at the south end of the campus, the auto shop has a floor jack, 8 jack stands, 2 metric tool boxes, 4 American tool boxes, a dwell-angle tack, timing light, sun machine, and oil changing facilities. All tools for minor car repairs.

The auto repair shop has five stalls. According to Laird, the shop can handle more traffic than it now gets. "The students are using it, but I would like them to use it more," said Laird.

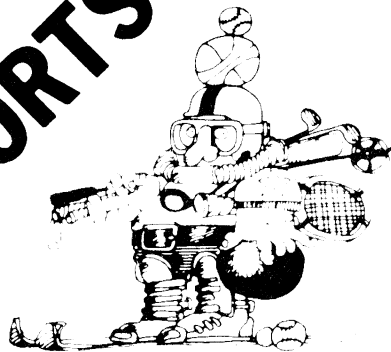
The cost is cheap! Only 50¢ a day. However, if your car stays over night, additional charges are added per day. A student is always on duty to help anyone who needs it.

The Southern Tech Hornet track team came in second in a 4-way meet recently with 58 points.

DeKalb Central took the meet with 130 points. Ga. Southwestern College scored 29 points to finish third, followed by 4th place DeKalb South with 20 points.

In the 440 intermediate hurdles, the Hornets took 1st, 2nd, 4th and 5th spots. Chip Sloan led the way in 60.3 seconds followed by Dean Fambro in 63.0 seconds. Tom Schenderleir took 4th spot in 64.8 seconds and Joel Roe finished 5th with 65.8 seconds.

Hornet Mark Stroud finished 1st in the javelin with 152'8", and STI's David Poteet came in 1st in the 440 yds. with 49.8 seconds.

DESIGN COMPETITION TO BE HELD

The Marietta Housing Authority is sponsoring a design competition for Southern Tech students, according to professor Robert L. Myatt, head of Architectural Engineering Technology at Southern Technical Institute in Marietta.

"Although it is quite common for government authorities, civic organizations and private industry to sponsor design competition at architectural-engineering schools," said professor Myatt, "this is the first time in Southern Tech's 28-year history that a design competition has been held for STI students.

Students enrolled in the AET Department's Building Design course will be allowed to enter the competition which will be held during this spring quarter. Entries will be reviewed by members of the Marietta Housing Authority, practicing architects in Marietta, and members of the Southern Tech faculty.

Louis S. Sohn, chairman of the Board of Commissioners of the Marietta Housing Authority, stated that two of the competing projects will receive awards. A first place prize of \$100.00 and a second place award of \$50.00 will be given to the students whose architectural solution shows the most merit.

Background information for the competition was developed by STI professor William F. Newman's Site Planning Class. Professor Newman's class made extensive studies of undeveloped urban renewal land in Marietta and made recommendations for possible use of this land.

Building Design students will use the study prepared by the site planning class and develop building plans for the urban

renewal land. Drawings prepared by students will consist of floor plans, elevations, and prespective views of their proposed buildings. Southern Tech assistant professor James G. Fausett will be the faculty advisor for students entering the competition.

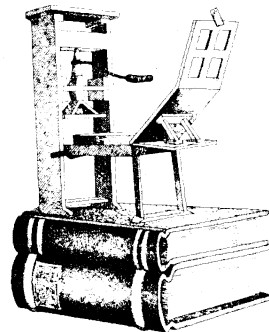

New Book News

The people, organizations, institutions, movements, and events which culminated in one of the most cataclysmic periods in German and world history are thoroughly investigated in the monumental Encyclopedia of the Third Reich by Louis L. Snyder, the first reference work of such magnitude to be devoted entirely to Nazi Germany (McGraw-Hill, 448 pages; \$24.95).

Bringing more than 40 years of study and research to the preparation of this definitive volume, the author has included nearly 2,000 articles, alphabetically arranged, about every conceivable aspect of the Nazi regime, from the 1923 Munich Beerhall Putsch to the life of Heinrich Himmler. All the principle personalities and events of Germany and Europe during the Hitler years are featured, as is every important social development in such fields as music, art, literature, theater, education, and justice. The major events of WWII, as they related to the history of the Third Reich, and all the Nazi political, police, and military organizations are also discussed in the work of extraordinary scope.

The Encyclopedia begins with a chronology of all significant dates in the Nazi period, starting with the fall of the Weimar Republic and ending with the close of WWII. An extensive bibliography of every important work ever written on the subject, and an additional list of the principle articles published in both English and German scholarly magazines and journals, are also contained in this well-illustrated volume. Actual documents, many of which had been previously difficult to locate, have been incorporated into the text.
