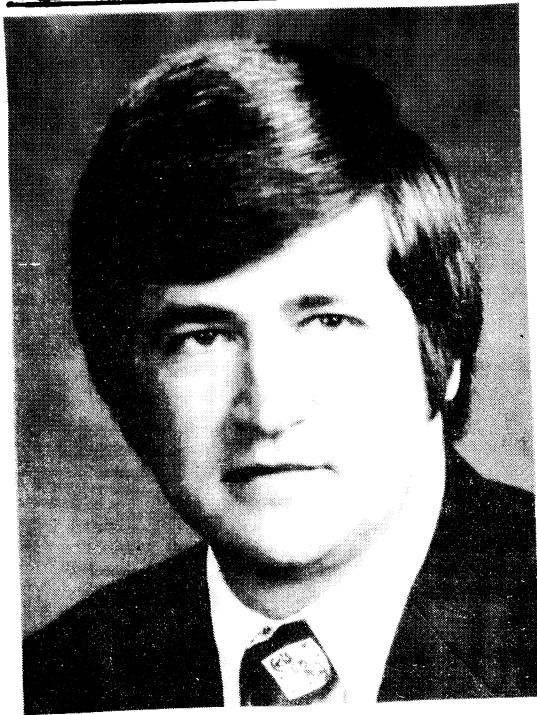

This week, a review of an album we've been playing for the past couple of weeks on WSTB: Saddle Tramp by the Charlie Daniels Band.

Charlie Daniels is one of a small group of artists whose appeal cuts across the board from progressive and Top 40 to country audiences, a tribute to his versatility. This album features the same combination of country, Southern Rock and good instrumental work that has characterized his previous material. Daniels and Tom Crain are good on guitar; their efforts are backed up by guest performances by such greats as Marshall Tucker and the Allman Brothers. The album has a number of good tracks, including the 11-minute title track which features a heavy instrumental break in the middle.

Two other albums worth mentioning from which we play tracks frequently are Nazareth, Close enough for rock 'n roll ("Carry out feelings" is a big one from this LP) and Jethro Tull's Too old for rock and roll, too young to die.

It's exam time! Here's a few steps  
to keep from blowing your cool during  
exam week:

- 1) Realize that exam nerves aren't  
a total loss. Direct your energy  
in preparing for the exam.
- 2) Some people flunk themselves. You  
can avoid it. Dismal past test  
performance leaves many students  
with little or no confidence. Start  
preparing mentally with a "can do"  
attitude.
- 3) Spend your energy on the exam, not  
on fear. Exam nerves can distract  
your thinking and direct your  
concentration on fear. Think about  
the work and not the worry and focus  
your energy on the test question.
- 4) Respect your "right" answers. Don't  
get hung-up being a perfectionist  
and answer questions you know first.  
It will help build test confidence.
- 5) P R E P A R E ! A solid training rule  
for avoiding panic and anxiety is pre-  
paration. Don't wait until the night  
before the exam. Review and mentally  
reinforce reading material, class notes  
and teacher handouts by discussing them  
with fellow classmates and writing sum-  
maries of the material.

## PREREGISTRATION FOR FALL QUARTER 1976

Students who will not be in school during the Summer Quarter are reminded that preregistration for the Fall Quarter 1976, will be held during the summer.

Preregistration for Fall 1976 is scheduled as follows:

### Night Students

5:00 p.m. - 7:30 p.m. Wed., Aug. 11

### Day Students

9:00 a.m. - 4:00 p.m. Th., Aug. 12

Students will be allowed to preregister at any time during the above schedule depending on their day or night school status.

Students who are not in school during the summer are encouraged to return to campus if possible in order to complete their preregistration for Fall Quarter according to the above schedule.

Students who preregister will not be required to return to campus on Registration Day, September 21, but should return for the first day of classes on Wednesday, September 22. New students will report on Monday, September 20, for Orientation.

Remember, you can avoid the hassle of registration by completing your preregistration in August.
