


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

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Time to elect new student leaders

Students get a chance to choose their SG leaders

Student government elections will be held Apr. 13-14 from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. in the Student Center Atrium. This is the students' chance to choose the people who will be representing the student population for the next year.

The voting process will consist of ballots, just like years before. However, this year the roll of students will be taken on a laptop instead of in a notebook as it had been done in previous years.

SG is made up of 27 senate seats. Each department has at least one senator to represent and voice the needs of the department. The different senators include the American minority, At-Large, which is the school as a whole, the arts, business, education, science and math, health and human services, humanities and social science, international students, KSU place, University Place, non-traditional, traditional, student athlete, student disability, freshmen, undergraduate and graduate.

The senators for each of these seats represent their department and bring to the group the issues relevant to their department. Elected members discuss and vote on issues that affect the university as a whole, keeping students in mind. Not only do they discuss issues relating to the KSU community, they discuss issues presented on the state level, such as the HOPE scholarship.

SG is the group that makes the decisions for the student body. Voting for these individuals that will lead the student body for the next year is essential.

"It's incredibly important essentially because it's the representative body for the students and if you don't vote for the representative body, your input in the whole process is diminished," SG President Kort Peterson said. "So, it allows you input in the representative process. In general, it's a way to be more involved as a student."

These are the people who will be making the decisions for the student body of the 2004-05 school year. Make a difference in what happens at KSU and vote!

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

Crank up the radio

A student-run radio station is coming soon

Following several months of discussion, the high student interest for a campus radio station is finally being recognized. On April 1, a group of students along with Assistant Director of Student Life, Ed Bonza, held the first official information meeting for WKSU-FM.

"A radio station at Kennesaw would be a good idea," said undeclared freshman Ross McAfee. "It would give updates of what is going on at Kennesaw and give great opportunities to students who are interested in that field."

An email from Bonza was sent to faculty and staff March 19, not only informing them about the informational meeting, but also explaining that the administration and the Students Activities and Budget Advisory Committee has each agreed to fund half the total cost of the student-run radio station. The radio station, which will be known as Owl Radio will be a registered student organization and will operate under the advisement of the Student Media Board. Currently, the Media Board oversees other student media groups, including: The Sentinel Newspaper, Talon Feature Magazine and Share Art & Literary magazine.

Tentatively set to hit the airwaves in Jan. 2005, there is much work ahead, and many questions to still answer.

KSU has decided to team up with LPB Communications. LPB Communications specializes in supporting and helping to build college radio stations nationwide. Currently, the team has tentatively decided to pursue a radiating cable FM system. By choosing this form of broadcast, the university will be able to broadcast without requiring any FCC licensing.

If the team decides to go forward with this form of broadcasting, the radio station will initially be heard in the student center, KSU Place, University Place and possibly the upcoming new campus housing. There is also speculation to allow for the station to offer broadcast via internet steaming. Internet streaming will allow the campus, alumni and others to listen to the station through their computers.

Students interested in participating in the campus radio station should continue to listen for updates and announcements on upcoming meetings. Students may also contact Ed Bonza in the Student Life Center with any questions or suggestions.

"I think a campus radio station will be a good thing to have as our school continues to grow," said physical education junior Michael Couch.

ISSA makes new home

Internet security, tricks to secure your system and data, and a free version of Norton Anti-Virus software for your laptop is available for Kennesaw students through the Student Chapter of the Information Systems Security Association.

Christopher Russell, an information systems senior, a certificate holder in Information Security and Assurance, and president of ISSA, said the recent outreach clinic served over 150 students. Originally designed to help students lessen their chance of catching PC viruses and infecting university networks, the group now responds to the needs of the students in all aspects of PC security.

"We show them how to get rid of spyware and archive their data," Russell said, while pointing to charts of the Spring Outreach Clinic. Forty-three installs of Norton Anti-Virus software as well as 20 Windows updates were just a few of the services performed. Many students were unaware that KSU provides a place to store, or archive, up to 20 megabytes of

files on KSU maintained servers. There was one warning, this storage should be used for files that are school related, not extracurricular.

"If you use the student accounts," Russell said, "conduct yourself accordingly."

The ISSA staff will teach students how to use the Windows update tools as well as the best strategies to avoid viruses,

worms or blended threats.

According to Russell, the best defense against the ever-increasing dangerous computer threats is to be suspicious

of any attachments. If a file is received, even if it is from a friend, delete it unless the file is expected.

Russell has taken PC security a step further by installing a non-Windows operating system on one of his PCs and he uses that system exclusively for email downloads. If this were an idea a student would like to implement, a stop by the ISSA office is in order. While installing a new operating system is not for everyone, Russell recommends always using a firewall (DSL or cable modem) connection to the

Internet. Otherwise, he says, "you are asking for trouble." An additional resource for free PC protection software is a Google search on "free firewall" and "free anti virus."


Another avenue of inexpensive software for students is the university bookstore. Many popular and expensive programs (i.e., Macromedia DreamWeaver, Adobe Photoshop) are available at academic discounts.

The KSU ISSA is the student chapter of the professional ISSA organization. The group, aside from promoting information security, offers professional development and certifications for Information Science students and professionals. According to the ISSA web site (issa.kennesaw.edu), the ISSA is the "largest international, not-for-profit association specifically for security professionals." The board of the professional organization includes a who's who of security and technology professionals including the staff of "...Dell Computer, EDS, Symantec and Washington Mutual." Visit the group's web site, <http://issa.kennesaw.edu>, to see upcoming speakers and group meetings.

"All majors are welcome," Russell said, "and all people should be concerned about securing their systems."

Student Success & Enrollment Services suspended the student from

the class pending a CAPS Center Evaluation.

A fire at the KSU Center set caused minor damage March 26. A caterer hired to help host an event for the Burrus Institute told police that she was setting up the banquet room and saw a small fire under a dish. People on scene were able to extinguish the fire prior to the fire department's arrival.

A man driving on Paulding Avenue was observed by the officer that had arrested him in February for driving with a revoked license and without insurance. When officers stopped the man, he became very agitated and began hitting the steering wheel. **The man was re-arrested for driving without insurance and with a revoked license.**

Officers stopped a Chrysler Sebring after observing it make a **left turn from a right-turn-only lane.** After a series of field sobriety evaluations, **the driver was arrested for DUI.** The state breath test indicated a blood alcohol concentration of .098 grams.



New department chair announced

KSU is stepping up higher education by adding a new faculty member. Following a nationwide search, Dr. Victor E. Kane accepted the position of department chair for the College of Mathematics. Kane, who learned of the position through the "Chronicle of Higher Education", was chosen from 40 candidates who applied, and of those 40 only three were interviewed on campus. With the selection made, Dr. Kane will be joining the faculty July 19.

The dean of the College of Science and Mathematics, Dr. Laurence Peterson, took part in the selection process, along with the entire mathematics department, including the department chair of CSIS, Merle King, as well as several other department chairs across campus that work closely with the mathematics department. The variety of department chairs from other colleges on campus were important in the selection to ensure the position would be filled by an individual that would work well with others in different academic areas. The position of department chair is one that involves many extra tasks that exceed the necessary qualifications of a professor. Those qualifications were represented by Kane according to

Peterson. With regard to necessary requirements that Peterson was looking for he said, "An individual who would have the respect of the faculty within the department, a breadth of experience in the field of mathematics, a person who would ensure quality programs for our students, facilitate collaborations across the university and would be able to provide strong leadership within a rapidly growing university."

Kane was chosen for the position because of his leadership qualities, which were deemed impressive. He was chosen because of his breadth of experience, as well as his strong interest in undergraduate education. "His ability to work with all of the different constituencies within and outside the department, and his strong interpersonal skills were important factors in the selection as well," Peterson said.

A Florida State graduate, with a PhD in the field of Biostatistics, Kane's resume was one that included an extensive background in administrative positions including a career with the Ford Motor Company, where he was a plant manager. "Dr. Kane was responsible for 2,200 hourly and over 300 professionals in Cincinnati," Peterson said.

In addition to managerial experience, Kane also has in-

depth international experience working with employ-

ees from different cultures. Internationally, Kane was the plant manager for one of Ford's Canadian plants, and prior to that he was the quality director for Ford Motor Company's Techni-

cal Center in Germany. This center was responsible for ten plants in Europe, including one in Brazil, Mexico and South Africa.

As for Kane's scholarly work, he has 16 peer-reviewed publications in recognized journals and also holds the title of author for a textbook on defect prevention.

Kane will be teaching mathematics courses in his field of study, which may include introductory statistics, applied statistics and biostatistics. Kane can now add department chair to the list of his accomplishments, and as he is thrilled about the position he has been offered, so is the faculty and staff at KSU.

"Our ability to attract an individual with the great breadth of experience, excellent professional qualifications and proven leadership abilities are testimony to the excellence of the

Mathematics Department and the outstanding reputation of Kennesaw State University," Peterson said.

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

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Don't mistake fear for safety

Does the term "war president" make you feel safe? Does the mentioning of the phrase "national security" fill you with the desire to vote Republican? The Bush administration certainly hopes it does. Since I doubt that even Barbara could refer to her son as a "compassionate conservative" with a straight face; the cornerstone of the Bush-Cheney re-election platform is that America is safe only with Bush in the White House.

The argument runs as follows: no terrorist attacks happened under Clinton, but he must have set the stage for the 9/11 attacks that occurred during Bush's watch, since no more attacks have happened on U.S. soil Bush must be doing a good job fighting terrorism. This gives Bush a free pass for his extremist policies. Even though the Patriot Act and an unjust war in Iraq are doing absolutely nothing to end terrorism, Bush tries his best to make the American people live in fear in an effort to gain support for his flawed actions.

The effort to present Bush as an anti-terrorism super hero has hit a snag— that snag being Richard Clark. The swiftness and ferociousness of the White House's attacks on Clark reveal two key facts: his story is largely (if not entirely) true and Bush is afraid voters will finally know the truth. Clark's allegations that the Bush Administration did little to prevent the 9/11 attacks and that Bush was obsessed with going to war against Iraq are very serious. And while the administration tries to smear the character of a man who served under four presidents (three of them Republican), the facts cannot be ignored. While it's true that the Clinton administration acted painfully slowly after the Trade Center bombings in 1993; it's hard for Bush to claim that terrorism was a high priority— especially when his administration had been warned specifically by Clinton aides about al Qaeda. Clark states that in January 2001 he requested that Bush hold a meeting of principal officials to discuss the al Qaeda threat. Condeleeza Rice postponed this meeting until September 4th; this seven month gap doesn't indicate that an anti-terrorism agenda was a top priority.

Clark's allegation that Bush was pushing for a war with Iraq, regardless of terrorism is even easier to see. Clark says that even when Bush was told that al Qaida— not Iraq— was behind the 9/11 attacks Bush replied, "I know, I know, but... see if Saddam was involved. Just look. I want to know any shred." Bush should have already known that there was no connection between Hussein and 9/11. Daniel Benjamin, the director of counterterrorism at the National Security Council in the late 1990s, has stated, "In 1998, we went through every piece of intelligence we could find to see if there was a link between al Qaeda and Iraq. We came to the conclusion that our intelligence agencies had it right: There was no noteworthy relationship between al Qaeda and Iraq. I know that for a fact." Also, it seems odd timing that the Pentagon pulled the Fifth Group Special Forces, the group most equipped to find Osama bin Laden, from Afghanistan in March 2002 in order to pre-position them in Iraq.

For those who understand the situation, Bush proclaiming himself the sole protector against terrorism is an insult. Thousands are dead in Iraq (including over 560 Americans) and civil war threatens. Afghanistan is in a constant state of unrest. Pakistan's nuclear profiteering has been exposed, but not stopped. Al Qaeda is still elusive and dangerous. The attack in Madrid makes it clear that terrorist threats are still very real. But Bush has played right into al Qaeda's hands by over-using military force in the Middle East and isolating the U.S. from the rest of the world. The administration laid out specific evidence revealing Iraq as a threat, requiring a pre-emptive war and the mainstream (translation: conservative) media presented it without hesitation. Bush misled the world at the United Nations. Back home, in several speeches, he misled Congress and the nation.

And he continues to mislead now, distorting facts that contradict what was said a year ago when the war began. To mislead does not simply mean to misrepresent facts— it means a failure to provide strong leadership and that is exactly where Bush has failed. Pushing a nation to the brink of violence doesn't increase safety and it certainly should not get a president re-elected.

Race melting is unlikely

I read with interest Joel Guerra's recent articles concerning interracial dating. Despite working for the same section here at the Sentinel, I do not know nor have I even met Mr. Guerra. While his perspective is insightful and makes some points with which I agree, he obviously sees a very different America than I do. I wholeheartedly support interracial relationships, but I have several problems with his ideas that "cultures are beginning to cross over or "melt" into each other" and "the future of America is assimilation".

Considering that less than 2% of marriages in the U.S. are interracial (2000 census), Mr. Guerra's articles seem based more on wishful thinking than reality. Also, his second article concerning the poll results is very misleading. I would hardly consider eight out of eighteen thousand a "sample of KSU students", at least not one that means anything. He also fails to mention the poll is dependent on students to voluntarily go to the forum section and answer the questions. His claims that 8 of 10 and 9 out of 10 students are inaccurate considering one of ten submitted the same information three times.

Aside from the technicalities of his poll, I disagree with several of Mr. Guerra's statements. Blending the "races" until all Americans are some middle shade of tan will take more than a few generations. By concentrating on how an American should look, I think Mr. Guerra is missing the point of what makes us uniquely American today. The analogy of America as a "melting pot" is a misnomer. In some textbook I read long ago, the U.S. was more accurately described as a "tossed salad" where the individual pieces are not melted together but, taken together, create a distinctively American flavor.

Next, although we have made tremendous strides toward equal opportunity for everyone and things have definitely improved since the 1960s, we are nowhere near actually practicing what we preach. Racism may not be as openly practiced as in the past, but it is definitely alive and manifests itself in a million little ways.

I suggest, to anyone who really wants to see firsthand just how far we, as a society, have actually come in terms of looking beyond skin color, a field trip to the Cobb County jail on any given day. Just go into the lobby area and have a look around.

I have personally had the privilege of spending about eight hours waiting in the comfortable plastic chairs while those highly efficient government employees worked their magic. While I waited, I noticed two very striking facts. The people who were there for business reasons, employees, police officers, lawyers, etc. were predominantly "white" and those there as "clientele", inmates and their families and friends, were overwhelmingly not "white". This is the case even though, per the 2000 census, 72.4% of Cobb County population is classified as "white".

Of course, this phenomenon can be found all across

the nation, not just Cobb County or even the South. It's common knowledge that death row inmates are disproportionately "black". Even though, again according to the 2000 census, only 12.8% of the nation's population is classified as "black" and 82.2% are deemed "white", yet, according to www.deathpenaltyinfo.org, only 45.56% of death row inmates are classified as "white". This pattern doesn't seem to be changing. Apparently non-white teens are much more likely to be tried as adults than whites. In a recent article in the AJC, "Throwing Away the Key", Martha M. Ezzard cites a study in which minorities represent 80% of juvenile cases in adult courts. Does anyone truly believe "white" people just aren't as prone to criminal behavior as people of color? I certainly don't.

If that doesn't convince you, try noticing how often white people use skin color in describing people of color even though, in most cases, it is irrelevant to the conversation at hand. People say things like "There's this black guy at work and he told me the funniest story..." or "I was at Wal-mart and the cashier, she looked like a Mexican or something.... anyway, she rang up my stuff wrong and..."

Or check out this study, <http://econ.ucsc.edu/faculty/nuclear/econ1/hotnews/blackwhitenames.htm>, in which two sets of resumes were sent out, one set with common "white" first names and the other with common "black" first names. The result was that those with "white" names were 50% more likely to be called for a job interview.

Mr. Guerra uses many examples from the entertainment industry to illustrate his point. It is this same industry that plays The Beastie Boys and Eminem regularly on "mainstream" radio stations but rarely, if ever, Ludacris or Jay-Z. It is also the industry that has, in seventy-six years, given only eight acting Oscars to blacks, the majority in supporting roles.

Also, who said cultural "assimilation" or "melting" is a good thing. In order to achieve such a thing, we will all be forced to lose at least some of our heritage and traditions. In my youth, I wanted to shed myself of my hillbilly ancestry, but, as I've grown older and a little wiser, I've realized that where we come from is as important as where we're going. So I will take the traditions and heritage given to me by my parents, improve upon them to the best of my ability, then pass them on to my children.

Will the elimination of "races" by mixing them to the point of homogeny realistically solve our problems? Even if skin color is eliminated as a divisive tool, there will always be others, gender, religion, annual income, geographic region, education, eye color, or shoe size. Therefore, the only way to truly free ourselves from the chains of bigotry is to learn to evaluate everyone on an individual basis, value those who practice honesty, integrity, and open-mindedness, and teach our children to do the same.

The Keegan Neill Foundation

Support for families of children coping with cancer

Keeagan was a 9-year old boy at the time of his diagnosis. He was a healthy, active child until the day he complained of a headache and dizziness, which prompted his parents to take him to the doctor. They never expected a neurosurgeon to come out to the waiting room and tell them their son had an inoperable brain tumor called brain stem glioma and that he only had only six months to two years to live.

Keegan died January 5, 2003, two months before his 11th birthday. He endured six weeks of radiation, four different experimental chemotherapy protocols, high doses of steroids, surgery for the installation of a port-o-cath (a device used for administering medications and drawing blood), constant double and blurred vision, paralysis to his left side, and a feeding tube. He was eventually bedridden, no longer able to walk. After a long, difficult battle, he died peacefully in his sleep.

Brain stem tumors are perhaps the most dreaded cancers in pediatric oncology. Brain cancer accounts for 25 percent of all cancer deaths in children and brain stem tumors account for about 10-15 percent of childhood brain tumors. Brain stem gliomas tend to occur in children between 5 and 10 years old. Most tumors grow widely spread within the brain stem, making it difficult to treat surgically. Their cause is unknown and they are not thought to be hereditary.

Keegan taught everyone around him that life is short and that we should all appreciate what we have, be kind to others, and treat people with compassion and respect. His family was motivated to start a foundation in his memory to offer other families of children with brain tumors emotional, informational and financial support and assistance.

"Our starting the Keegan Neill Foundation was inspired by Keegan's compassionate and caring personality," said Rosaleen Neill Schmidt, Keegan's mother and Director of the foundation, "This is Keegan's legacy, living on. We hope to be able to help many families in the future who are going through very difficult times. It is our goal to bring whatever relief we can to these families." During his illness, his family discovered how little financial assistance was available for families dealing with this devastating situation.

"In addition to trying to cope with your child's illness, families then also have to struggle with trying to figure out how to pay the bills," said Mrs. Neill-Schmidt. Keegan's family received some financial and emotional assistance from friends and family members, but found there were not many organizations that exist to help families financially. Insurance only covers so much, and all other expenses must come out of pocket, which puts a tremendous financial strain on families already dealing with a very traumatic situation.

Keegan's mother knows all about these burdens because she had no choice but to quit her job to care for him after he was diagnosed. She sympathizes with other families going through the same thing and wants to repay the kindness she and her family were shown by offering assistance of their own.

According to the the Keegan Neill Foundation's website, "Keegan wanted to be a writer when he grew up. He loved to write and did so, up until the day he died." From his wonderfully creative imagination sprung Captain Cheese, a piece of cheese brought to life and given super powers to fight crime by a toxic waste spill. His vivid imagination

also created villains like the evil Mr. Mean Midget who wants to destroy the world with his high-tech laser, along with other characters like The Plant-Eater and CellPhone Man.

In his comics, Captain Cheese always triumphs over his enemies in the end, but not without a fight. Keegan put up a brave and valiant fight of his own, but alas, he lost his battle in the end. One of his last requests was to have his comics published. The first edition of the Captain Cheese comics was printed thanks to assistance from his uncle who works for a printing company in New York. Keegan was able to see a finished copy of the first edition of his creation 18 days before he died.


"We want to get Keegan's comic books into bigger stores but we haven't been able to find a publisher that will help us get them printed because of course, that would involve money we just don't have," said Mrs. Neill-Schmidt. Ideally they would like to see the comics be printed and sold in hospitals, cancer hospices and bookstores.

"He had the wisdom of an adult, and he endured so much pain during his illness. He rarely complained. I know he was often hurting much more than he let on to me.

He was my heart and soul and I miss him terribly. I am forever changed by losing him. But I know God has a much bigger purpose for him in Heaven. I picture him up there making everyone laugh, and watching over us, his family, and probably many others, too."







Under the big top of Cirque Du Soleil

There is a sense of mystical magic when first arriving at the site of the Cirque Du Soleil. The yellow and blue tents are filled with music from the show, and the patrons' moods are excited and happy.

There is a diverse demographic attending the show with children as young as infants and adults who could very likely have three digits in their age. It feels like a circus atmosphere with the various clowns wandering through the audience before the show.

The thrust stage creates a wonderful view since 3/4 of it is surrounded by visitors. There are various levels and places to hide, and as the show goes on, there will be magical and seamless transitions for the different acts.

Most patrons are unaware of the beginning of the show, because there is a horn that sounds but the lights stay up for the first few minutes. For those paying attention, the ringmaster and his birdlike characters come out and begin to move about the stage. As is the case with most of the show, there is little said and it is the movements and reactions of the players that create the story of *Alegria*.

As the lights begin to set, the band strikes up a celebratory tune and travels through the audience on their way to the stage. They stop once in every section to pull a member of the audience up to dance and celebrate briefly. Then they exclaim "Alegria" and move on.

As they proceed to their place on the stage, out come two beautiful singers, one dressed in white and the other in black. The one in white is belting out a won-

derful French song. For those who do not speak or understand the language, the voice and the music is enough to draw interest. It is a voice that maintains a dominant presence, but it is merely one aspect that bombards the senses.

The costumes and make-up designs of the show are vibrant and detailed. It is impossible to credit just one source of inspiration, because there is a diverse cast of characters in the show. While some are fully covered in tight fitting material, others are barely clothed at all, and the clowns are wearing baggy materials.

The same is true for the make-up, because while almost everybody has white on their face, none of the styles are the same for the different acts. There are also very elaborate masks that are hard not to stare at.

The show offers a combination of 13 different elements and acts. The singers, the musi-

cians, the clowns, the ringleader and his characters are all intertwined elements of the show providing music, humor and joy. The various acts that left the audience exhilarated and in awe included a contortionist, synchronized trapeze artists, a fire-knife dancer, a flying man, a flexible dancer and a man who shows amazing strength and body control as he balances himself on one hand.

Other acrobatic acts included the Aerial High Bar team that worked from the top of the tent, the Russian Bars team and the well-choreographed Fast Track team who were bouncing around on various trampolines built into the stage.

The Cirque Du Soleil's show *Alegria* is a fascinating combination of circus acts, theatrical costumes and even magical illusions. In a little over two hours, the mind and eyes will be overwhelmed and simply blown away.

EASports hits homerun with MVP 2004

EASports released MVP 2004 on March 9, to follow-up on its disappointing baseball game last year, MVP 2003. This year, EASports released a game that is absolutely the best baseball game released to date. The game is plain ol' fun. MVP 2004 introduces new features (playable AAA and AA minor league teams) that are not available anywhere else and combine it with great game play. MVP 2004 is a must play for baseball gamers everywhere.



GAMEPLAY

The most important feature of a game is its game play. MVP 2004 is fantastic. When playing this game, you get the feeling that you are a part of the game. Every aspect of baseball is controlled by the player. Gone are the days when you just push a button to throw a pitch. In MVP 2004, each pitch is controlled by a pitching meter. Similar to last year, the meter controls the "oomph" behind a pitch and the accuracy. If you want to throw a 93 mph fastball on the inside corner, you must manipulate the pitching meter just right. The meter is also used when trying to pick a runner off a base. That makes for some interesting pick-off moves.

The reality that goes into each pitch and each throw puts the gamer into a uniform and out on the field. You are truly a part of the game in MVP 2004.

As for batting, this ain't your arcade style homerun contest. Timing and pitch placement play a big part in your success at the plate.

MVP 2004 set itself apart from ordinary baseball games by including the minor league teams for each ball club. There is a Triple A and Double A affiliated with all 32 baseball teams. Even better, you can play a whole minor league season with the any of the teams or all of the teams. MVP 2004 gives you the

option to play, manage, or simulate every AAA, AA, or Major League game in a season. This feature also allows you to promote or demote within your organization. But, player attitude is greatly affected by a demotion from the Bigs to the minors, and you might find yourself with a team full of unhappy, unproductive millionaires. Once again, the reality of this game is mind-numbing.

There is no single season mode in MVP 2004, only a Dynasty, which allows up to 30 years of baseball.

GRAPHICS

MVP 2004 has great player models and animation. The players move like real players in every aspect, whether running, diving, swinging, or celebrating.

The worst aspect of the game is the stadiums. Every stadium has the same feel to it. Although the scenery is different, there is no real tangible difference. The stadiums look as if they are a still photo placed into the game.

Another negative that has to be mentioned is the audience. The fans look awful. The first 10 rows are 3 dimensional and react to the game play, but when they applaud their hands look like a seal clapping; very strange, but not enough to be distracting.

SOUND

The sound in MVP 2004 is fan-

tastic. The sounds of baseball are "In the game" like EA's motto. Players can hear teammates yelling "...Two away, plays at first" and other helpful reminders. The fans also have good audio, like, appropriately when Chipper Jones was at bat, New York Met fans yelled, "Overrated!" The fans also react appropriately by cheering the home team for hits or runs, and boo when an error or bad call by the ump is made.

When playing a minor league game the fans and atmosphere changes. No longer do you have the deafening sounds of 50,000 cheering people, but a modest roar of 15,000 dedicated fans.

OVERALL

MVP 2004 is an outstanding game. The realism of baseball is captured in every aspect. There are some shortfalls to the game, like the computer players being a shade bit faster than the human player, a recipe for too many triples. But, most of the game play can be adjusted using meters.

If you are a baseball fan and a gamer, please do not miss out on MVP 2004.

As for MVP 2004's competition, ASB 2005, ESPN Baseball, and MLB 2005 are expected to be released in the coming weeks. MVP 2004 has set the bar very high. They better bring realism, accurate game play, and a uniqueness that matches MVP 2004, or the choice will be clear.

- The working title of this movie was *Sweating Bullets*.




The Prince and Me (movie released 4/2)



- Piper Perabo graduated summa cum laude from Ohio University in 1998.




In Living Color - Season 1 (DVD released 4/6)

"Eeeewww!" Molly cried holding up the results for examination. "Isn't it nasty?" Bushybrows disappeared for the rest of the night.


Bushybrows still makes his weekly appearance, but he does not come very close to Molly and he no longer follows her about.



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

Beaker proving she will finish on a high note

Looking back at Lisa Macki's journey

Growing up in Lolo, Montana usually does not lend itself to a highly successful collegiate softball career. With the town's meager population of about 2,400, and a state that does not even have a college softball program anywhere. Do not tell that to KSU pitcher Lisa Macki, better known as "Beaker" to her friends and teammates.

A former teammate gave her the nickname on her first day of practice. Whenever Macki gets excited, her voice becomes high-pitched like the *Muppet Babies* television character Beaker. The name became permanent during her first game when Head Coach Scott Whitlock screamed it from the dug-out in frustration with Macki's play.

Macki's parents, Mike and Peggy, are competitive softball players. That means that she was always at the ballpark when her parents were playing. It became a natural sport for her to pick up, and her father has been a coach and mentor for Macki her entire career.

The process of recruiting was a reverse role for Macki. "I recruited schools," Macki said. She made highlight videos of herself playing and sent them out to the schools she was interested in. One of those schools knew Coach Whitlock.

"I recruited her solely off of videos," Whitlock said.

Macki liked the idea of going to a college with a different culture than the one she grew up with. "I thought it would be a lot warmer than it is," Macki said.

She also had to adjust to people's mindset. "Some of the people aren't as open-minded as I

think I am," Macki said. "They are already set in their ways."

Macki has always been the underdog, even when she arrived on campus. She was one of two freshmen pitchers brought in that year. The other player received more accolades than Macki, "but Lisa flat out-pitched her," Whitlock said.

She led her squad to the national tournament in her freshman and sophomore seasons. Macki also led the team with 439 innings pitched, 390 strikeouts, 45 complete games, 17 shutouts, four no-hitters and a 50-13 record. "It was just amazing to be part of something like that," Macki said.

Her statistics and leadership have helped Macki to gain the respect of her team and coaching staff. Senior Janna Maughon remembers when Macki came in as a freshman.

"She's better than I thought she'd be," Maughon said, "being as wild (a pitcher) as she

seasons, Macki began to experience some of the wild, raw tendencies that she had before starting at KSU. "She would be in the bullpen throwing anywhere the catcher would position the glove," Whitlock said. "Then when she would go out onto the mound, she would lose that control."

Maughon noticed the control problem the first day of practice when Macki hit her with a pitch.

As a junior, Macki had her least productive year as an Owl. She never let her struggles get in the way of the team, and Whitlock noticed that she handled the challenge like a true professional. Macki cheered her teammates on, and she gave everything she had whenever the coach gave her the ball. "I love her commitment to the team," Whitlock said. "Not me, the team. The idea of the team. It's rare you find someone that practices what they preach."

Whitlock said that she is the hardest working pitcher, in terms of practice,

bullpen and working to get better, that he has ever had at KSU. He feels that is part of her problem. She thinks too hard.

All-American sophomore catcher Cambria McKay has had an instrumental part in getting Macki back to her dominating form. "It's part of my job to help a pitcher when she is struggling," McKay said. "If you mention something, she truly takes it to heart."

The next hurdle Macki had to get over was deciding if she would even return for her senior year. "I wasn't sure if I wanted to come back and deal with all this again," Macki said.

Lisa has come into her last season giving everything she has. To dare, she has performed well. She has seven shutouts, an ERA of 0.95 and collected her fifth career no-hitter. "When she's on, she's the best pitcher we have," Maughon said.

Softball back on top

The Peach Belt Conference played musical chairs for first place, as KSU lost the top spot last week and is now back on top, after sweeping Augusta State and UNC-Spartanburg. Meanwhile, Armstrong Atlantic and North Florida split a double-header with each other allowing KSU to rise in the standings.

A wild ride for KSU last week had the previously unbeaten Owls aiming for a university best 44 straight wins. The Owls fell short of the mark, as they lost to PBC foe North Florida 4-1.

After the loss, the Owls were 38-1 and a step ahead of Armstrong Atlantic and two games up on North Florida.

On March 27, the Owls suffered an unusual defeat to Lander (23-20), after five errors by the Owls gave the Bearcats three unearned runs, which ended up being the margin of victory.

The Owls were just a week separated from having not lost a game and being first in all the polls, to losing two games and dropping to third place in the Peach Belt.

First place Armstrong Atlantic hosted KSU on March 30 in Savannah for a double-header. The Owls Janet Kearns (19-0) started the game against the Lady Pirates. AASU had

Katya Eronina toeing the rubber. Eronina was trying to break a PBC record of 25 consecutive victories.

Eronina started off untouchable, striking out eight of the first nine Owl batters. The situation looked bleak as the Lady Pirates scored one run in the first and three in the third off Kearns. The Owls never got

their bats going, only punching three hits against Eronina, who struck out 15 Owls and went on to pitch a complete game and win 4-1, breaking the PBC record.

KSU must have been saving all their runs for game two, as the Owls scored three in the first thanks to a Keri McKee three-run homerun. AASU's freshman outfielder, Chelce Culberson went yard in the bottom of the second inning to make the score 3-1. Owl's short stop Jennifer Nolan doubled off the wall in the top of the third, followed by a Jenille Edwards single that scored Cambria McKay, who had walked to start the inning. The Owls added more runs when Kate Winstel singled home Nolan and Edwards. The four run inning was enough to send the Lady Pirates out to sea. The Owls won the pivotal nightcap 7-4.

After splitting with AASU, the Owls were still behind North Florida and Armstrong Atlantic, but within a few percentage points of both. KSU got much needed help from Georgia College and State University, as they swept a double header against the UNF Ospreys on April 3, as the Owls swept Augusta State the night before, 9-1, 9-0. With the GC&SU sweep of UNF, the Owls moved into second place behind Armstrong Atlantic.

On April 4, KSU faced PBC rival UNC-Spartanburg, and UNF played Armstrong Atlantic.

Senior pitcher Shannon van Wyck threw seven solid innings for the Owls on March 31, against Columbus State, but the Cougars topped KSU in the bottom of the 12th inning 3-2 for the win.

"It's tough to see such a good outing go to waste," Head Coach Mike Sansing said.

It was the longest appearance for van Wyck on the season. He usually comes out of the bullpen to finish games.

CSU notched a one run lead in the bottom of the fourth inning. KSU struck right back in the top of the fifth inning. Jon Love reached base on a two-base error. Dustin Atkinson laid down a sacrifice bunt to advance Love to third base. Then Clint Watters picked up his 34th RBI of the season on a ball hit to the second baseman to tie the game at one.

The Cougars regained the lead in the bottom of the fifth inning at 2-1. Scott Hendrix tied the game at two with his seventh homerun of the season to left field in the top of the sixth.

The Cougars wound up winning the game in the bottom of the twelfth inning on a single to right field that plated the winning run.

Blake Whitaker pitched the final 4 2/3 innings and received the loss for the game.

KSU (21-16) bounced back from Wednesday's loss to win a close game on the road against Alabama-Huntsville 5-4 on April 1.

Sansing was pleased with the close win over UAH. "It's a good bounce back game after the Columbus State loss," Sansing said.

Ryan Apple started the scoring for the Owls by knocking in Hendrix on his double in the top of the first inning.

The Chargers came back in the bottom of the first inning to tie the game at one.

Brett Campbell picked up his 17th RBI of the year when he singled in Apple in the fourth inning to put the Owls up 2-1.

In the fifth inning, Watters led off with a walk. Adrian Colton stepped up to the plate and slammed a two-run homerun to give him nine homeruns and 41 RBI's on the season. Colton was happy to contribute with his homerun. "We might have lost without it," Colton said.

Later in the inning, Apple collected his second RBI of the game by hitting a sacrifice fly to centerfield, scoring Hendrix and giving KSU a 5-1 lead that would not be relinquished.

The Chargers added one run in the fifth, sixth and ninth innings closing the gap to 5-4.

The Owls got another solid outing from its pitching staff. Jason Wimberly picked up his fifth win by throwing 5 2/3 innings and only giving up three earned runs. Sammy Reed pitched the final 3 1/3 innings to get his first save of the season.

KSU are taking a road trip this week to play Erskine April 7, and at GC&SU April 9 and 10.
