PRESIDENTIAL SEARCH CONCLUDES

Papp selected to lead KSU

President elect to take office in May

The Board of Regents has chosen Dr. Daniel S. Papp to become the next president of Kennesaw State University. The decision was made Feb. 16, 2006, after the University System of Georgia Chancellor Erroll B. Davis Jr. offered his recommendation to the board in a conference call.

"I will start coming out to Kennesaw beginning of April to have all the folks on campus catch me up to speed," Papp said. "That way I'll be able to hit the ground running."

"The special meeting was called to select the president of Kennesaw State University. After the recommendation from Chancellor Davis the board selected Daniel Papp for the position," said John Millsaps, director of Administrative External Activities and Facilities.

The university system has been working to bring in a new president to campus since June 2005. The Presidential Search Advisory Committee, chaired by Dean Joseph Meeks, was asked to finalize a list of five candidates to be submitted to the board.

During Papp's campus visit, he discussed the state of the university's strategic plan.

"The campus faculty and staff have been moving forward with the new strategic plan, when Siegel announced her retirement the progress slowed down. A lot of work has already begun and efforts have been underway. That is one thing that will begin shortly after my arrival in May."

President Betty L. Siegel is the second president at KSU following Horace B. Sturgis. Siegel presided for 25 years of the 43-year history. Her stepping down from the presidency was not an easy decision to make.

In an interview with Papp, he expressed his great involvement in athletics and student organizations at all of the schools he has been a part of

including Georgia Tech and Southern Polytechnic State University. Students will be an extensive part of his job as president.

"Dan Papp is a wonderful choice. We have known each other for over 20 years. Dan is very accomplished academically and he will serve the presidency with distinction," Siegel said.

Siegel, who is vacating the presidency in May, said that she will be doing her last commencement speech as president this semester after 25 years of service.

Siegel was the first female president in the Georgia university system. She is also one of the longest standing woman presidents in the nation.

"I've known Betty since the first year or so since she took office," said Papp. "She's taught me that I don't look anywhere near as good as her in red

glasses."

Papp has served as senior vice chancellor for Academics and Fiscal Affairs for the University System of Georgia since 2000. He led Southern Polytechnic on an interim basis from 1996 to 1997 and was the executive assistant to the president at Georgia Tech.

His job for the university system included creating a strategic plan for the 35 schools the board oversees. This will be one of the tasks that KSU will need to address in the coming years. The current strategic plan is nine years old, according to Papp's university visit.


"Since he's been in the University System of Georgia for a while he's up to date with the current stuff that is going on. He's focused not only on the faculty, but the students as well. He's very easy to talk to and a very good listener," said freshman marketing major and family friend of Papp, Jordan Cox. "I definitely think he's going to do a great job. I was happy to hear he accepted the position."

When Kennesaw was first selected by the Board of Regents to receive a college in Northwest Georgia there were few roads and fewer ways to get to campus. Interstate 75 was not built.

When President Siegel stepped in, the college had no residence halls and dramatically fewer buildings than the ones that dot the campus today. It was the

work of President Siegel that earned a name for the northwest commuter college. In 1996 the college was officially changed from to a four year University.

Today, with the incoming of President-elect Daniel S. Papp, KSU sports are Division I and the public is becoming more and more aware of the third largest university in Georgia.

Nursing majors beware

Selective program shows impressive statistics

The statistics for the nursing baccalaureate program alone are "dumbfounding" according to Program Development Officer Tim Ste. Marie.

"We are the most popular program on campus," said Marie, and the statistics prove this. There are between 800 and 1000 applicants for the fall semester and only 75 of those applicants are accepted in the program. The spring semester is much the same, with only 75 positions available for up to 800 applicants. The acceptance of those students is grade-based. According to Fran Paul Herzig, academic advising and admissions coordinator, students must have a 2.7 GPA to be considered. Students who go through the baccalaureate program must take the NCLEX Exam. The average results from KSU nursing students are in the 90th percentile.

Aside from a challenging baccalaureate program, KSU also offers two masters degree programs: Nurse Practitioner and Advanced Care Management Leadership. Both

are 15-week programs, and classes take place every other weekend.

"We are the only weekend program in the state of Georgia," Marie said.

This allows for students from areas like Augusta, Chattanooga, Macon and the Alabama border, who would otherwise not be able to come to KSU's nursing program, to drive up for the weekend to take their classes. It is not an easy street for these students, explains Marie. "Students have to be dedicated for the 15 months but then they get their masters degrees, and in the state of Georgia, with a master's degree you can also teach."

There are some former students who are part-time members of the faculty.

Another feature of the nursing program is that students cannot go from the baccalaureate program directly to the masters program. "Students must have three years of work history," said Marie, unless they acquired their BSN from KSU. In that case, "we will look at two years [of work experience]

Hopes of a national championship die early

Ineligible player causes Ice Owls to forfeit second half of games

On Feb. 5 everything seemed to be going smoothly for the KSU hockey team. The Owls had just finished sweeping the Atlantic Coast Hockey Association Division III South Regional Tournament, which included an intense overtime victory against UGA. The Ice Owls were ranked first in their division and the ACHA D-III National Tournament was right around the

corner.

However, on Feb. 10, the team announced that it had unknowingly played an ineligible student and that all the games that the student played in would have to be forfeited. The Ice Owls' second half record dropped from 24-4-1 to 15-13 and the team dropped from first to ninth in the division standings. Only the top four teams get to go to the national tournament.

According to the ACHA rule book, all players must have successfully completed nine credit hours per semester and that these hours must be directed toward the major. This would include core and major classes and are referred to as impacting courses. According to Bill Morrison, the director of hockey operations, the player

in question had signed up for a regency class and was unaware that it did not count as an impacting course.

Playing an ineligible student is not uncommon in the ACHA, because the teams normally do not have access to the registrar. Both Georgia Tech and the University of Colorado played ineligible students this year and had to forfeit games.

"Since hockey is not an official team of KSU, we did not have access to the information and must rely on students to bring us their transcripts," said Morrison. "We thought that he had taken the appropriate amount of classes, it was just a simple misunderstanding."

because we know the excellent background they got attending KSU," Herzig said.

The Nurse Practitioners Masters program only accepts 35 students a year out of about 70 applicants and is a "cohort" program where all students begin classes together and stay together, in the same classes for four straight semesters.

"It is a full-time degree, they all start together and they end together," said Marie.

The Advanced Care Management Leadership program is a new program. Only ten students are accepted to this program because "it is very focused," according to Marie.

The first graduating class from this program graduated last December. The GRE is required for both masters' degree programs.

Genie Dorman, the coordinator for graduate nursing programs, developed both master's

degree programs. Ms Dorman received her Nurse Practitioner degree from Emory University.

"We have an excellent faculty who possess the knowledge and expertise needed to prepare the students at the graduate level," Dorman said. A majority [71 percent] of the faculty in this program hold doctorates. "Our faculty is outstanding and they attend a lot of classes to keep up with the latest in nursing, the high NCLEX and board exam test scores are attributes to their teaching," Marie said.

The reputation of the nursing program is what has shaped it into what it is today, according to Dorman. "We receive outstanding support from the community with regard to expert content lecturers and preceptor placements," she added.

Although KSU currently does not offer any PhD programs, Marie hopes that the nursing department will be the first to do so.

Besides an excellent baccalaureate program, two challenging masters programs, a deservedly high reputation and

an outstanding faculty, the program also offers both an accelerated program as well as an international program. "We take graduate students to Oaxaca, Mexico once a year," Marie said.

The program has undergone enormous growth. In 1968 the first nursing program began at KSU. At that time it was an associate degree program. A baccalaureate program was developed in 1985, which included both an RN [registered nurse] program and a BSN [Bachelor of Science and nursing]. Now two master's degree programs have been added, with hope for a doctorate program in the future.

All nursing programs at KSU proudly hold the accreditation of the National League for Nursing Accrediting Commission. Furthermore, the BSN program holds a preliminary approval from the Collegiate Commission on Nursing Education, according to the KSU nursing website.

Presidential search now complete

Papp's salary as the university system's senior vice chancellor exceeds Siegel's salary. A pay raise may be coming to match the salaries of other university presidents. The salary for university presidents is \$216,000. Salary information is available for search at the Georgia Department of Audits and Accounts web site.

The story was leaked and printed in the Marietta Daily Journal on Feb. 15 that Papp would be the next president. The conference call the next day was Chancellor Davis giving his recommendation to the board. The article attributes their source as a "KSU trustee and longtime supporter of the university."

University Relations released a statement to The Sentinel one full day after the leak to the MDJ and just hours prior to the announcement to the campus community.

Marietta Daily Journal Publisher Otis Brumby Jr. is a trustee emeritus of the KSU Foundation.

According to the web site of The Office of the President during Siegel's tenure, "The university has evolved from a four-year college with an enrollment of 4,000 students and 15 baccalaureate-degree programs to its current university status, with enrollment exceeding 18,000 students and 55 undergraduate and graduate degree programs."



Spring breakers, take extra caution BBB warns consumers of false travel contests and offers

The Atlanta Better Business Bureau are warning travel consumers of deceptive promotions in a Feb. 1 press release.

Many of these deceptive promotions sit on counters in restaurants, cat-call you in the mall and are even tacked up on posters around campus.

The BBB reports that consumers are encouraged to offer their names, addresses, email addresses, telephone numbers and other personal information in order to be "entered" into a drawing or to be considered for a free vacation. Many promoters will offer "the cheapest prices" or a "trip of a lifetime." With spring break just around the corner, many students will be enticed to enter these drawings for a cheap, fun time. The BBB says to check, double-check and triple-check the source before falling into a trap.

"Get all details of the offer in writing. Check the reliability of the company by going on bbb.org and entering the company name. This will give you a Better Business Bureau reliability report for any place in the country," said Fred Elsberry, president of the BBB serving Metro Atlanta, Athens and

Northeast Atlanta.

The press release reports, "fraudulent travel deals can be hard to distinguish from legitimate ones. Their intent is to lure people into buying vacations." Some companies may even have deals with tiny print at the bottom or misleading wording.

"Check with ASTA [American Society of Travel Agents] to be sure the people you are dealing with are affiliated or independent. If independent, be sure you check with the airline/hotel/tour operators directly to be sure your arrangements can be confirmed through the person you are dealing with. Get any refund/cancellation policy in writing," Elsberry said.

He also said that if an offer is too good to be true, it probably is. If the company asks for any personal information pertaining to your money as in credit card information, bank account information, or any type of identification, Elsberry says to walk away. These companies could use your information for fraudulent charges to your account.

The Government Office of Consumer Affairs also had some precautions to use when making travel plans.

"We want those going overseas to be especially cautious of their travel plans simply because any regulations are not being enforced by the United States government," said Spokesperson Shawn Conroy.


"If you're reserving something that needs a deposit, use a credit card. Credit cards will give you additional dispute rights in the event that you are a victim of a scam. Be cautious when you are dealing with a company you are not familiar with. Go with someone you trust, get recommendations and speak with the company personally," Conroy said.

Technology has made travel promotions even more dangerous. Beware of pop-ups and banner ads on certain websites trying to attract customers, promising money or travel offers; they are equally as dangerous as offers on counters or over the phone and require the same precaution.

"Somebody out there is going to sign up for a travel plan without planning correctly and show up on a plane somewhere and not have a room. Then they will be in a real gauntlet," Conroy said.

When asked about recent reported cases of fraud, the BBB had none to currently disclose.

Dow leaps to a four and a half year high

For the week ending Friday Feb. 17, Dow Jones Industrial stocks pushed the index up to a 4 half-year high. The Dow gained 1.8 percent, the S&P 500 rose 1.6 percent and the Nasdaq was up 0.9 percent. After the three-day rally to Thursday, the slight selling Friday was partially attributed to option expiration and disappointing results from Dell Computers [Nasdaq: DELL]. Although Dell reported a fourth-quarter profit, analysts were not impressed and a Bank of America downgrade sent the stock lower by nearly five percent.

Ben Bernanke, the new Federal Reserve Chief, addressed the Senate Banking Committee saying that the first quarter in 2006 "will see a significant rebound from the fourth quarter." Bernanke sees the economy growing so fast that he plans to raise short-term interest rates in an attempt to slow it. The Fed uses short-term rates to help increase or decrease the economy's growth rate. By raising rates, businesses and consumers are discouraged from borrowing more. Conversely, by lowering rates, busi-

nesses and consumers are enticed to borrow more to finance big projects. On a different positive note, home builders took advantage of a warmer-than-expected January to begin building new homes at a rate not seen since March 1973.

Warren Buffett, the famed "Oracle of Omaha [Nebraska]" said last week that he will be stepping down from the board of his company **Berkshire Hathaway** [NYSE: BRKA] at 75-years-old. Buffett, on behalf of Berkshire Hathaway, said in a statement concerning Coca-Cola's Chairman and CEO Neville Isdell that Coke has the "right strategy to create value for its shareholders." Forbes magazine has listed him as number two in wealthiest Americans with \$44 billion, much of his wealth coming from BRKA where one class A share currently goes for \$87,675. Class B shares which move congruently to class A shares go for a mere \$2,900 per share.

"Investing Commandment Number Two" from Jim Cramer's "Real Money: Sane Investing in an Insane World" is "Your first loss is your best loss." As opposed to investing which takes a longer-term approach, when you put on a trade, you need to be right about the direction of the stock almost immediately. You take a trade based on some news or anticipation of news because you think that the stock will go higher very soon. If it turns out that you were wrong about the trade and it starts moving against you, then it is time to be disciplined and take your money off the table. In investing, you can afford to buy expecting it to not go up immediately. In fact, as it comes back down even lower, you can buy more to improve your cost basis. If you buy a stock at 72 and it comes back to 70 and you double how many shares you have, the price is averaged and your new cost basis is 71 per share.



KSU police responded to a call regarding a theft at University Village Apartments on Feb. 12. The complaint told the responding officers that she had gone to a friend's residence along with three other friends. While there, the complainant realized her keys were missing. She arrived at her apartment to find that some of her personal items were missing, including: a black Compaq laptop, cord, charger, black cloth carrying case, Elementary Statistics book, English book, TI-84 graphing calculator, scan disk and a USB flash drive.

The complainant suspected one of her friends had taken her key chain, and gone back to the apartment to steal the reported

items because they were having a disagreement at the time. The officers took the information about the alleged suspect, and filed a report.

A University Village resident contacted KSU Police to report a theft on Feb. 11. The complainant was contacted by his roommate earlier that day, because the roommate had noticed that several of the complainant's belongings had been taken from the "common" area in the apartment. The complainant described the missing items as: an Insignia DVD Receiver, Microsoft Xbox, five Xbox games, two VHS tapes of two seasons of "That 70's Show" and an Insignia center speaker.

The responding officer contacted the complainant's roommate to inquire about how he realized the items were missing. The roommate said he returned to the apartment and found the door lock broken. After contacting Place Properties maintenance, he was instructed to remove the plate from the lock, and then remove the dead bolt. He

did as instructed, and found that the lock was broken. He was informed that the lock would not be repaired until the next day, so he left the apartment and did not return until midnight.

At that time, he went to bed, and was awakened by a neighbor the next morning. The neighbor asked him if the complainant had removed his electrical equipment from the apartment, which prompted the roommate to contact the complainant. The lock has been replaced on the door, and KSU police have filed a formal complaint.

KSU student contacted the police to report a missing cell phone. The phone was stolen from the complainant's apartment when her roommate had visitors at the apartment the day before. The complainant left her cell phone on the coffee table in the common area and went to bed while the guests were still in the apartment. Upon waking, she noticed her cell phone was missing and contacted the police to file a report.



Boehner of the Month GOP: impotent on ethics?

With John Boehner's election to House Majority Leader on February 2nd, Republican leadership effectively went limp on ethics reform. With Tom DeLay barred from keeping his House leadership position amid indictments concerning ethics violations, the GOP was forced to elect a new leader. With this election, Republican representatives had a golden opportunity to show that their party was not going to tolerate a dysfunctional head in the House. Freedom Project - Boehner's political action committee - received \$31,500 from various Indian tribes associated with Abramoff. Apparently this did not faze Republican leadership seeing as Boehner beat out Roy Blunt (who also has ties to Abramoff) for the leadership seat.

Why would Republicans attempt to squelch allegations of unethical behavior rooted in GOP leadership by electing someone with known ties to the same corrupt lobbyist that forced the last leader to step down? That makes

as much sense as proposing a law that would repeal or reduce various air pollution controls and naming it the Clear Skies Initiative. Oh, that really happened? Oops.

Where is Karl Rove when the Republicans desperately need him? Surprise, surprise - he's also being investigated as a suspect of yet another ethical crime: the felonious revealing of undercover CIA operative Valerie Plame. It appears Republicans are caught between a rock and a hard place, but Boehner's chances of softening the blow of

ethics criticism are slim-to-none. How much outright hypocrisy will the American public take? The media is doing little to galvanize interest in this issue. News outlets were all but silent over the fact that Boehner was in no position to be much harder on ethics reform than DeLay. It seemed as if the story of Boehner's pro-lobbyist past could not be sustained by the media much longer than what seemed like... let's say... four hours?

Surely we want our representatives to hold the highest

standards in ethical integrity but several questions must be answered. Are we getting an ethical hard-liner in Boehner?

What does this say about the rest of our representative in Congress, including the ones who voted to elect Boehner the head of the House? Should we be assured in the claim that Boehner will stand up strong in sustaining opposition to the influence of corrupt lobbyists?

Mistakes turn accident into public relations debacle

At first, Vice President Cheney's failure to ensure that the public was duly informed of the accidental shooting of a fellow hunter on a Texas ranch seemed nothing more than a severe lapse in judgment. It was a mistake, but perhaps understandable under the circumstances. But Cheney's silence for nearly four days and the inept way the entire incident has been handled guaranteed that this hunting accident would turn into a big national controversy.

When the vice president of the United States shoots someone, albeit accidentally, he and the government have a duty to inform the public as quickly and as fully as possible. Remarkably, this elementary proposition seems to have escaped the vice president.

In an interview with Fox News Wednesday, Cheney admirably, if belatedly, accepted responsibility for the shooting. "I'm the guy who pulled the trigger and shot my friend," he said. The vice president is not one to display his emotions in public, but he was clearly distraught over the event.

Yet even so, he remained utterly unapologetic for the way in which the information was temporarily withheld from the public, even as he conceded that he knew the shooting would turn into a big deal. It was left to the owner of the ranch to call

a local newspaper the next day.

Cheney said he had no press aide with him on his private hunting trip to Texas, but that's no excuse for failing to put the news out through the regular White House channels. That would have been the easiest and most effective way to deal with the story.

The public needs no reminder that this administration has an image problem, to say the least, as it relates to telling the truth - from the cost of a multibillion-dollar Medicare drug program to intelligence on Iraq. Cheney himself has a well-known propensity to operate under a veil of secrecy, sometimes from that famous undisclosed location.

But he and all other public officials should be mindful that, along with the power vested in them by virtue of holding public office, there is an obligation to undergo public scrutiny and, yes, even answer questions from pesky reporters from time to time.

There is no evidence that this was anything other than an unfortunate accident, but giving an interview to one individual, particularly in a forum deemed friendly to the administration, is unlikely to silence the criticism.

There are more questions to be asked and other angles to be pursued. The vice president should hold a news conference and answer questions from a larger circle of interviewers if he wants to put this public relations debacle behind him.





Stripping away women's rights

Georgia's attempt to destroy a woman's right to choose

A soon-to-be hotly contested debate will take place this week in the Ga. House and Senate. The debate will be centered on a bill with far-reaching nullifications; mainly those of women's rights. It is a bill that, if passed, would void a woman's right to choose. It is House Bill 243, the aptly named "Unborn Victims of Violence Act," and its main concern is, though not stated, voiding a woman's right to an abortion. The bill's main provision would change "Georgia's feticide laws to allow for the prosecution of anyone who causes the death of an unborn child, regardless of the stage of pregnancy." The bill is veiled in the protection of pregnant women and their unborn children and would prosecute the murderer of a pregnant woman with two counts of homicide. But do not be fooled, this bill will have dire consequences if passed and could destroy abortion rights on a state-wide level.

The bills main proponents, both female republicans, use phrases such as "a fetus [is a] person" and "feticide can occur at any stage of development", which clearly show where this bill's real focus rests: in the illegalization of abortion. Currently, Georgia law defines feticide as "the killing of an unborn child that has reached the quickening stage"; a stage characterized with fetus movement which typically

occurs around 20 weeks into the pregnancy. This bill would replace the stipulation of the quickening stage with any stage at all, including conception.

This bill is clever in that it suggests those who oppose it are for the killing of fetuses and, therefore, children but what it gains in self-righteous rhetoric and a seemingly just cause (that cause being the protector of children), it lacks in justification for two reasons: 1) it im-

plies that life begins the moment sperm fertilizes the egg (an argument neither defined nor concluded) and 2) it absolutely obliterates abortion rights for the sake of giving legal rights to an embryo. The bill is essentially stripping those rights of a woman to live and to do with her body what she chooses and places them in the "hands" of her embryo. And for what? To protect the embryo because it is a child and, hence, needs protection, as all children do? Not likely. What is closer to the point is the pushing of the anti-abortionist agenda

through a bill that nullifies the abortion debate by defining a life as starting at conception.

The problem with this bill is not its protection of women and their children but that its definition of life is flawed, or at the very least incomplete, if only because no clear-cut line exists for the definition of life. Once that line is drawn, then a bill can, and should, be passed in protection of pregnant women. But until then, there should be no law defining that line until a clear definition is translated. Let us hope that this bill is will not become that definition lest women lose their right to choose.

Zachary Smith, candidate for the District 41 of the State House of Representatives and senior history major at KSU, was featured in the news section of the Feb. 15 issue, in which corrections need to be made.

The theme for Smith's campaign was incorrectly referenced, as "A Better Day in Georgia." The correct terminology of the campaign's theme is "A Better Day for Georgia."

In addition, Smith is quoted in the article as supporting one education reform, when in fact he was speaking of two different education reforms in the interview, one of which he supports and the other opposes.

The following incorrect quote appeared in the Feb. 15 issue: "There is a bill in the House introduced by Governor Purdue to give 65 cents of every dollar given to the school system to teachers to use for these expenses. That is good for now, but we need to push for more," Smith said. However, there is no such legislation in the State House.

Smith informed The Sentinel in a Feb. 19 email of the errors by stating:

"I support Governor Purdue's proposal to give teachers a \$100 gift card to classroom expenses that typically teachers pay out of their own

pocket. I believe that this is a good start for assisting our teachers, but more should be done.

I oppose Senate Bill 390, also known as the '65% Solution' which would require school districts to spend 65 percent of every dollar they receive on 'in the classroom' spending. I oppose this bill along with the Georgia PTA and the Georgia Association of Educators for many reasons. The first is because the definition 'in the classroom spending' does not allow for the funding of teacher training, transportation, nurses, counselors, administrators, food services, or media centers. All of these factors not covered under this definition are integral parts to our children's education. For example, it does not matter how much money you spend 'in the classroom' if students cannot get to school; their teachers are not constantly being supported to become better educators, and their libraries are out-dated. This bill also takes away control from local school districts that know where their challenges lie and where they need to spend their money. Finally, there is no link between this arbitrary percentage and student academic achievement.

On Thursday, Feb. 16 Senate Bill

390 passed the State House 102-70.

The final correction that needs to be made pertains to this quote [printed in the Feb. 15 issue]:

'People are tired of parties and politics, especially the youth,' Smith said.

I love political parties; I think that they allow people to express themselves easily with other like-minded people. That is why I am proudly running as a Democrat. I also love politics, which is why I am running for State House. I think people are tired of partisan politics. I think that we do not need to elect people who will just vote the party line and do not think about legislation that comes before them. That is why I am pursuing policies and ideas that all people can get behind."



The play "Yellowman," written by Dael Orlandersmith, is performance at its best. This compelling journey deals with hard-hitting issues not often discussed in mainstream society. Themes such as racism, love, broken homes, abortion and death are all addressed in this provocative performance about two people whose childhood friendship turns to true love.

Alma, played by Atlanta debut actress Jade M. Lambert-Smith, is a dark-skinned black girl, while her best friend Eugene, played by recent Morehouse College graduate, Will Cobbs, is a light-skinned black boy. As their friendship turns to love, they face the issue of racism within the black race from peers at school and their own families. Both Eugene and Alma struggle to live up to the expectations set forth by their parents. Their relationships with their own parents are shattered. When Alma gets the opportunity to go to college in New York City her relationship with her true love is shaken by the distance and Alma begins to change her attitude. The end of the play holds a twist that will leave the audience stunned.

"Yellowman" actors Lambert-Smith and Cobbs spoke with The Sentinel on Feb. 14, following the show:

Q: Can you relate to the characters that you played on any level?

Cobbs: I know not so much with the racial issues, but with the father and son issues based on pride and ego.

Smith: I can relate more in the way people carry themselves, more than what they say.

Q: How long have you been performing and what inspired you to take up performing arts?

Lambert-Smith: I come from a line of performers, my mother is a classical performer and I like theatre because it encompasses a lot, you can be a triple threat in theatre.

Q: What do think the audience can get out of this performance other than just entertainment?

Cobbs: It is something that we don't really talk about much and now it is exposed. I re-

member growing up, we had darker people in my family and lighter people in my family but being up north it was never something we discussed, although looking back on it there was definitely little things and little comments made here and there that let you know that it exists. In our community we tend to turn a blind eye.

Lambert-Smith: I think the playwright is so wonderful in that she gives this play so many elements that we all have a strong opinion about.

Q: How long have you two been rehearsing? There are only two of you in the performance, how do you do it?

Lambert-Smith: Well the standard rehearsal time in Atlanta is three to five weeks. We rehearsed for three and half weeks, and that's normal.

Q: What kind of relationship do you have now, having worked together so closely?

Cobbs: [laughs] Jade is always my rock, she has been my rock since day one. As an actress Jade is very easy and open and that is something that is always the hardest part about acting. If the other actor is not open, then it makes it difficult. Fortunately, we were both willing.

Lambert-Smith: I am going to be hard pressed for the rest of my life to find someone as easy to work with as Will.

Q: Is it challenging doing a performance with just one other actor?

Cobbs: In a way it was easier for me just because there was no point where I was worried about her ego and that can be a huge thing. If you are working with a group of actors that carry egos, it can mess it up for everybody. Even if one of us wanted to have an ego, there wasn't a space for it after day one.

Destined for failure: "Final Destination 3"

Third act should be the final act

"Final Destination" should do well for itself at the box office. The previous "Final Destination" films brought in over a combined \$100 million domestically. That's a pretty large pot considering the fact that both are R-rated horror films. So why does the general public subject themselves to such utter brutality?

The answer is simple: people love violence. For whatever reason, the public cannot get enough of people being physically hurt. All "Final Destination" films have the same formula, where everyone dies off in an interesting variety of ways. There isn't much else to them.

The problems with this film are myriad. The story essentially retells the previous two movies. High school photographer Wendy [Mary Elizabeth Winstead] has a vision of a terrible accident on a roller coaster that will kill everyone on board. Wendy escapes the coaster with her soon-to-be partner Kevin. Eventually Wendy and Kevin realize that death is coming back to finish the job on those that escaped the coaster. They try to warn everyone, and also try to find a way to beat death in the process.

The same plot is in FD3's predecessors, and of course, no one lives. By now anyone who has seen at least one of these films should get the gist of it. Redundancy is not a good thing, but what makes money will

ultimately produce a sequel or two.

The carnival scene at the beginning of the film, which is supposedly the high school senior carnival, seems to have been shot on location at Six Flags. The Devil's Flight coaster, the death coaster if you will, seems to be a construction of a major theme park, not a rinky-dink traveling group.

The death scenes, which are what attracts people to the film in the first place, are just as redundant as the previous films. How many times do we need to see a head smashed or bodies burnt? How many times do we need to see cliché characters in films? From the arrogant jock on down, this film showcases overused stereotypes, and treats human beings like cartoon characters.

The cliché valley girls of this film, Erin [Alexz Johnson] and Ashley [Chelan Simmons], are just that. A cheap rip off of the plastics from Mean Girls, these two show up dumb and by the second make the audience feel dumber. Not only are they oblivious, but they also show off their well-toned bodies as a cheap way to keep the audience's attention. What ensues is the most disturbing death scene of the entire trilogy.


A lack of originality is one thing, but the filmmakers took a step into bad taste. There are countless 9/11 references throughout this film, including a picture of one of the WTC buildings with an airliner's shadow upon one of the towers. The picture was used to further the central idea that photos can somehow predict the death of people. Utter shock passed through me like a lightning bolt. Injecting politics into a horror film is a risk this filmmaker should not have taken.

James Wong directed the original "Final

Destination" as well. He, along with screenwriters Glen Morgan and Jeffrey Reddick, has had a hand in the creative process of every film in the trilogy. These men are public enemies to the art of film and to a society of film lovers who deserve better. However, as long as the money is flowing, they will keep producing these films.

Third acts are generally the final acts of any story. Unfortunately, this franchise seems infinitely repetitive and therefore could continue to cheat death. For the sanctity of film and true filmgoers, let's hope that this franchise will finally rest in peace.





Owls lose three straight to No. 3 Georgia Tech KSU gets great pitching performances but can not overcome a struggling offense

KSU played three tough games against Georgia Tech Feb. 17-19 but could not pull out a win. The Owls were swept, losing 3-2, 7-0 and 5-1.

In game one, KSU struck first in the second inning. Right fielder Adam Cross beat out an infield hit to the shortstop and then promptly stole second base. An error by Georgia Tech's third baseman Wes Hodges allowed Cross to advance to third. Catcher Ray Redden then hit a long fly to right field and Cross tagged up and scored, giving the Owls a 1-0 lead. The lead was short lived as Tech scored two runs in the bottom of the second. Tech would add another run in the third making the score 3-1.

Pitchers Bubba Blalock and Dan Dale would not let Tech score another run in the game. Dale pitched exceptionally well in his 3.1 innings of relief, allowing only two hits.

In the ninth, pinch hitter Zachary Upton got a lead off single for the Owls. Upton, however, was put out at second base when second baseman Matt Hopkins grounded into a fielder's choice. Center fielder Martin Baker then lined out to center field, giving the Owls two outs in the inning. Third baseman Matt Dallas kept KSU's hopes alive with a double, scoring Hopkins and making it a one run game. However, hope would die young as left fielder Jay Morrow popped up to the second baseman to end the game.

In the second game Tech pitchers Lee Hyde and Chris Hicks held the Owls scoreless on six hits.

KSU starting pitcher Michael Bohanna was rocked early allowing five runs, four earned in his 3.2 innings of work. Jamie Spear came in to relieve Bohanna and did a fairly good job allowing only one run in three innings. Justin Freeman came in for the Owls to close the game out, but allowed three hits and one run in 1.1 innings. KSU was out hit by Tech 12-6.


The Owls struggled with relief pitching in the third game against Tech, wasting a brilliant performance by starting pitcher Kyle Muschara. Muschara held the stellar Tech offense scoreless threw the first four innings and then left the game with two runners on in the fifth inning. Casey Rogers came in to relieve Muchara but was ineffective, allowing both of Muschara's runners and one of his own to score. Rogers was then pulled for Micah Sales, who did not fair too much better, allowing two earned runs in only two-thirds of an inning.

The Owls offense did not do much better, managing only four hits and one run in the game. The lone run for KSU came in the top of the eighth, when center fielder Matt Nelson doubled in Upton from second.

The Owls record now stands at 1-4 for the season, but in all fairness three of the losses came against high ranked teams in Division I. KSU's next game will be Feb. 24 at home against Boston College.



In a tight game with three minutes to go against the Owls' old rival North Florida, Golden went up for a shot and came down on the foot of North Florida's Alain LaRoche. The incident resulted in a painful sprained ankle, but Golden continued to play in the game. He was unable, however, to snatch victory away from North Florida as KSU lost 72-68.

Still in his junior year, Golden expects to be back for at least one more season of KSU basketball. He intends to major in sports management with a concentration in marketing and a minor in Spanish. Despite these educational endeavors Golden is considering joining the real estate business with one of his brothers. Golden also expressed interest in following his father's footsteps to become a basketball coach, if the opportunity arises.

"It's a high risk profession, but I think it would be fun," Golden said.

Ingle has recovered from a sprained ankle and plans to play the last two games of the season on Feb. 24 and Feb. 26. Both are away, the first at Belmont and the second at Lipscomb.



Shooting for the future Clarke averaging nearly twenty points a game

Women's basketball at KSU would not be the same without Shavonder Clarke. Clarke scores an average of nearly 20 points a game, twice that of any of her teammates. She has led the team in scoring in 16 out of 22 games and has accumulated 366 points so far this season. As the tallest player on the team at 5 feet 11 inches, Clarke has been able to take a total of 208 rebounds, and the season is not over yet.

Growing up on the tropical island of Exuma in the Bahamas, Clarke spent a lot of time around a local basketball court. Her parents, Lorenzo Clarke and Demris Ferguson, both played the sport that came so naturally to their daughter, yet despite these early signs of promise, Lorenzo encouraged his daughter to pursue softball instead of basketball.

"Basketball wasn't [my father's] sport. He always got injured. So, he didn't want me to pursue basketball," Clarke said.

Even though Clarke considers softball her "first love," she decided that she had a better chance with basketball, which she played for the Bahamas Junior International Team.

After graduating high school in 2001, Clarke became inactive and unproductive. Finally she was approached by her mother with this ultimatum: Clarke had to go to work or go to school. Additionally, her mother informed her, if she wanted to go to school she would have to pay for it out of her own pocket.

Faced with harsh new realities, Clarke decided to call her old coach from the Bahamas Junior International Team, who connected her with the head coach of Miami Dade Community College's basket-

ball team, Susan Summons. In April 2002, Clarke tried out at Miami Dade and was offered a full scholarship on the spot.

Because Miami Dade had yet to become a four-year school, Clarke was forced to continue her education elsewhere. The best place for this, she decided, was KSU.

"It seemed like the best offer to me," Clarke said, "I loved the place. It's so close to Atlanta. I loved the players when I came here to visit. They really showed me a good time."

In her first year at KSU, Clarke quickly distinguished herself by averaging 18.4 points per game, the highest average in the Peach Belt. She played in all 30 games of the season, starting in 28. Clarke was honored twice as Peach Belt Player of the Week and led her team in ten categories, including points, rebounds and steals. Clarke played three games in which she topped thirty points and in her second game against Tusculum she bankrolled 38 points. Her accomplishments landed her a place on the All-Peach Belt Conference First Team.

Outside of basketball, Clarke plans to major in sports management. Unfortunately, she will not be able to graduate this summer due to credit hours that were nontransferable from Miami Dade. As for her future, Clarke wants to see how far basketball will take her. If she hits a dead end, she plans to fall back on marketing, journalism or sports recreation. Whatever she does, Clarke wants to be involved with sports, which have been a great source of fulfillment in her life.

The 2006 season will be Clarke's last. When she leaves KSU she will miss her coaches and all of her teammates, especially best friend Jade Robinson. "They've kind of been like my backbone these last few years," Clarke said.

Media attacks on "The Great One" are unfounded

Legendary NHL player being wrongfully accused of gambling

Very few men could withstand having their good names dragged through the mud by the media concerning an incident in which they are completely innocent. Wayne Gretzky, "The Great One," is one of those few men.

I really must tip my cap to the greatest NHL player of all time for the poise and patience he has displayed throughout this whole multi-million dollar gambling ring scandal. Reitsma closing for Braves?

If so, then 15th division title in jeopardy

According to the Atlanta Braves web site, Chris Reitsma will be the closer for the 2006 season. This is very shocking for many Braves fans because after last year's performance it would be hard to even consider him on the 40-man roster. Reitsma choked every time he was brought into a clutch situation since 2004.

Last season, Reitsma took over the job of closer after Dan Kolb proved to be a huge mistake. Kolb was an All Star in Milwaukee, but when the bright lights of "Hotlanta" shone upon him, the pressure got to him. The prior closer, John Smoltz, was too big an act to follow for these mediocre pitchers. That being said, Kolb is now back in Milwaukee, and the Braves are in a sticky situation.

After Reitsma took over, he did okay. That is, until August rolled around and he couldn't locate a fastball to save his life. Reitsma is the most over-worked pitcher in the bullpen with 84 appearances in 2004 and 76 in 2005. The problem is Reitsma, like Smoltz, used to be a starting pitcher. Smoltz has often said closing is much more difficult on the arm and the psyche than starting.

Reitsma couldn't cut it as a starter in Cincinnati, and thus far has proven to be a non-factor in the late innings in Atlanta. In his two seasons in Atlanta, Reitsma has had a combined total of 33 save opportunities and has converted on only 17 of them.

There is no such thing as a sure thing in sports; however, former closer Smoltz came pretty close to that. No one was worried when Smoltz pitched the ninth. Now, after a season with Kolb and two seasons with Reitsma, one has to wonder if Smoltz should go back to closing.

The answer is no. He is one of the greatest post-season starting pitchers in history and he has a record of 15-4 to prove it. He is Mr. October for the Braves. With Smoltz as a starter, though, the bullpen woes will continue for the Braves.

To be a closer, one must have guts. Reitsma has shown very little. Kyle Farnsworth was picked up before the trade deadline in 2005, and

replaced Reitsma to become the Braves' final closer of the season. Farnsworth, who was known to be more of a set up guy than a closer, was dominant, saving all ten of his opportunities in the regular season. He looked to be on top of things heading into the first round of the playoffs, but soon found that October baseball for Atlanta is nothing but heartbreak. He blew his first save for the Braves in game four against the Houston Astros. The Braves' season came to an end.

Farnsworth left the Braves for more money and a set up job with the New York Yankees.


He left the heartbreak hotel for a New York high rise. Can you blame him? He gets to set up Mariano Rivera, the best closer of them all. New York is a pressure cooker, but his 98 mph fastball should bring them to their feet. Atlanta's general manager John Shuerholtz has been scratching his head ever since.

Shuerholtz couldn't afford a free agent closer, and to this point has yet to find one worth trading for. Braves manager Bobby Cox loves Reitsma, so Reitsma will probably be the go-to guy when April 3 roles around in Los Angeles.

Expect a demotion by mid-May. However, in a division that holds the vastly improving New York Mets and the pesky Washington Nationals, it could be too late.

Since the incident, Morrison has taken great strides in improving communication between the hockey team and the Registrar's office to prevent such an event from happening again. Working closely with William Hamrick in the Registrar's office, Morrison is hoping to correct the problem by having the Registrar's office check the player's records twice a semester to confirm eligibility.

"The ACHA commissioner has

always looked at our hockey team as a role model for other teams trying to start out," said Morrison. "It was kind of a heartbreaker for a team that was playing so well, but by working with the Registrar's office and the KSU Athletic Department we can prevent something like this from happening again." Since the hockey team lost the ability to compete in the championships, the team has added on some new games in March that should be exciting to the

players as well as the fans. The Ice Owls will be playing a series of games, including one against UGA, at Philips Arena. The exact dates are still pending, but there are hopes that one or two of the games will be televised. "The major concern now is getting these players on the ice and letting time heal the wounds," said Morrison. "We are only going to lose three seniors next year and we have 14 freshmen who should keep us competitive for a long time."
