KSU's 40-year-old pool will officially close May 26. A recommendation to close the pool was made by the Intramural and Recreation staff, HPS administration, Plant Operations and Student Government to the President's Cabinet. The cabinet approved the proposal at a recent meeting.

Discussion about the condition of the pool started over two years ago when Nova Engineering and Environmental Inc. conducted a study on the pool. The company concluded that the cost to maintain yoga classes] and classthe pool would continue to rooms expands the need for increase. Another factor in the pool's closing is that recent figures show that less than ten percent of students, faculty and staff use the pool.

Outside groups like Tidal Wave, a local youth swimming team, use the pool Monday though Friday for practices, which limit the hours students and faculty can use the pool.

Tara Parker, assistant director of the Student Life Center, said another issue is space.

"There were 55,000 visits to the Student Recreation and Wellness Center in fall 2005," Parker said. The number of visits to

purpose of the conference is to learn how to educate and create ethical leaders for tomorrow.

When she returns after her studies in Oxford, she wants to attend another university for an opportunity to work with graduate students in ethical studies.

"[I want to] move in the direction I've been going, but do When Siegel leaves her so from another platform. The presidency has been the most exciting part of my life," Siegel said. "I want to be teaching. I love to teach and I like being in the classroom."

Through Siegel's presidency and countless speeches, she has quoted from memory a number of prophetic writers and orators. One of these is Anne Morrow Lindbergh, author of "Gift from the Sea."

"When shellfish grow you have to shed the shell in order

to a bigger shell. You are at the mercy of predatory beasts that might feed on you or the flows of the ocean that may take you far away from where you go. However, you must shed the shell to go in search of another shell by being vulnerable," Siegel said, paraphrasing

Siegel looks to head out into another stage of her life by leaving the shell of KSU. Traveling abroad has been important to her, she says, because there is so much to learn from other ethnicities and cultures.

When all is said and done, Siegel will be looked at as the longest running female

# A new era begins for the University College The search is on for the next dean

A decision will be made May 8 as to who is to become dean of the University College at KSU.

Vacancy of the position was announce February, and candidates were informed to submit applications by March 27.

Current Dean, Dr. Mary Lou Frank, is leaving the position, citing a long commute from her current home in Dahlonega.

"It is my sincere hope that the new dean will continue to build on the excellent programs we have started together and support the fine faculty and staff," Frank said.

There were 56 initial applicants for the position. The search committee, composed of staff, narrowed the list down to 12 and performed reference checks and additional screening of application materials. From there, the list was narrowed down to seven and off-campus interviews were conducted. Of those candidates, Dr. Darlene Hantzis of Indiana State University and Dr. Ralph Rascati of KSU were chosen.

"The overall strength of the applicant pool was very high. The search committee is very pleased with our two finalists and will be excited to have either Dr. Hantzis or Dr. Rascati as our next dean of the University College," said Dr. Charles Bowen, Dean of Student Success and chair of the search.

Hantzis currently resides at Indiana State University as Associate Dean of Academic Affairs in the College of Arts and Sciences and Communication Professor and Women's Studies Professor. Her Q & A open forum session was held April 25 where Hantzis concentrated on her concerns with uniformity among undergraduates, counseling and the CAPS center, the importance of student-and-student and faculty-and-student relationships out of the classroom and the significance of general education. Hantzis first visited KSU in 1995 and has worked with staff in the past.

"Kennesaw has always been a place I've known. I always look for challenges and new positions where I can grow. I believe education is the only path

her vision for the University College

to social justice and I think the university college becomes the place on campus that is able to be the most responsive to the academic and culture life of the students," Hantzis said.

She noted that every student should have some sort of relationship with the University College in addition to the relationship that they have with their major department.

"The final goal is to make sure that we are providing the opportunity for every student to meet his or her intellectual and personal goals. And whatever we need to do that is what we should be doing. I assume people are of goodwill and I assume goodwill myself," Hantzis said.

spring. No academic classes will be affected this summer by the construction and the pool will be used during Maymester for a scuba diving class.

The pool area will be transformed into three rooms measuring 1,624 square feet each. One room will be specifically for spinning classes so that the bikes will not have to be moved. Currently the bikes are stored in a classroom and moved onto the basketball court for classes. This limits the use of the court and risks damage to the bikes.

The other two rooms will be divided by a retractable wall to accommodate two classes or larger activities.

The pool is not the only change KSU will see. According to John Anderson, director of facility planning and design, the sports annex [the trailers located beside the tennis courts] and the tennis courts are also scheduled for removal. The annex will be moved either this summer or later this fall. There is no definite schedule to remove the tennis courts, which are to be removed because of old age and damage. The women's tennis team plays off-campus because the courts have become too dangerous to play on.

"A large, large recreation center is what the campus needs," Anderson said. "Major additions will be done in phases."

Parker is already looking at the facilities of local universities like Georgia State and Georgia Tech to come up with ideas about an aquatic center.

"We need an on-campus pool. This one doesn't meet our needs currently," Parker said.

Parker, Anderson and Charles Bowen, dean of student success, are working together to accomplish this goal. A future aquatic center is a possibility provided that funds become available.

"It comes down to cost, condition and space as to why the pool is closing," said Bowen.

"It's time to take action."

Ultimately, the plans will be determined by what the students want. No plans for an aquatic center are concrete. However, KSU is working to meet priorities and is open to student input. Visit the intramural webpage at kennesaw.edu/student\_life/intramurals.shtml for current pool

# President and vice president unopposed in spring election Cotton and Touchton will continue leading Student Government next year

Student Government elections were held on campus April 24 and 25. This year the ballots were far from full. Thomas Cotton, current SG president, and James Touchton, current vice president, ran for their positions unopposed.

"There is a lack of interest," Cotton said. "People didn't want to be involved."

This year there were nine senator applications and three executive applications for about 30 available positions.

Cotton contributes the low interest to the lack of drama and scandal on campus. The drama usually draws attention from students and promotes involvement to fix the problem. Touchton feel this is also because of their success in SG this year.

"The only reason I can think of is that the students are happy with the job we have done," Touchton said.

He contributes their good work to raising money for Katrina victims,

wanting Division I hockey, creating handicap accessibility at the Convocation Center, fighting for aerobic classes in the mini gym and working with other universities for a seat on Georgia's Board of Regents.

Cotton will continue to push forward with plans he is currently working on during this next term. He plans to work with the athletic department to promote school traditions, investigate the KSU Foundation's spending and code of ethics, push for student seats on the Board and transition SG to work with the new president, Dr. Dan Papp.

Touchton, who will be a master's student this fall, will add to the table more options for student housing and pricing, reactivating the forwarding option for KSU email accounts, promoting mandatory advisement, helping all student organizations work on the same page and work to unite the student body.

The Board of Regents governs and panages all of Georgia's colleges and

universities. Cotton and Touchton are working for KSU with the help of almost all the schools in Georgia to promote student activity and input.

"Students are the stockholders in the university system and deserve to have their vote count on issues such as taxes on textbooks, tuition increases and funding for different universities," Touchton said.

Cotton feels the Board and its members are too far removed from college to make some decisions that directly impact students without the voice of those students present. "Times have changed," Cotton said.

SG wants to work with the Board to allocate funding for programs at KSU including more master and doctorate programs, oppose the Board for mandating one server for all Georgia's colleges and universities to use WebCT and determine why the Board wants to charge the health center rent for a location in the University Village which would directly benefit the students.

The presidential transition is another important task SG will undergo in the new term. Cotton was a part of the search for the new president. He has interacted with Papp, but looks forward to more collaboration once spring samester is finished.

"Dr. Siegel is charismatic. She can captivate an audience very quickly," Cotton said, reflecting on the transition. "[Dr. Siegel and Dr. Papp] have

the same leadership qualities."

The promotion of SG at KSU is always a goal.

"I want to make this organization grow and be more active. The only reason we're here is because of the students," Cotton said.



**Police** assisted Gwinnett County's Sheriff's Department Fugitive Division in serving a warrant April 14. The responding officers arrived at the University Village apartments and made entry through an open door to an apartment. Upon entering, the officers found the subject in one of the bedrooms and apprehended him without incidence.

The driver of a black Chevy S-10 pickup truck hit the driver of a motorcycle April 14 and left the scene of the accident. After being struck, the driver of the motorcycle was ejected from the bike. When officers arrived on the scene, the driver was conscious and alert. He gave the officers a description of the vehicle involved in the accident before being transported to Kennestone Hospital.

KSU Police were on their normal patrol route, when an officer heard what he thought was either fireworks or a firearm on April 15. While checking the area of Town Point Drive, an officer observed a white 1997 Ford Explorer pulling out of the rear of Mellow Mushroom.

After noticing the police, the driver of the Explorer began driving at high speeds through the parking lot. The officer finally caught up with the vehicle at the Swifty-Save. After speaking with the driver and pas-

senger, the officer asked them to step outside of the vehicle. While searching the passenger, marijuana was found. He was later charged with violation of V.G.C.S.A (M) and placed into

A female was sitting at the bus stop on Frey Lake Road when a male, wearing a ball cap, pulled along side her in a green four-door sedan. The male asked her to get into his vehicle and she refused. She then began walking in the opposite direction, and the male began driving towards the campus.

Three KSU students were arrested on April 13 for underage possession by consumption of alcohol. The students were in an apartment at University Village listening to loud music, which caused someone to contact the police.

Upon arriving at the apartment, the officers encountered several people in the apartment, but none of them resided there. The officers asked the visitors to contact the owners and ask them to return to the apartment, which they did.

Upon returning, the two residents smelled of alcohol. The officer had each of them blow into an alco-sensor to determine if they had been drinking. Each of them had, so they were taken into custody for underage drinking. The officer then asked them to contact the females who had left the apartment, so that he could return their belongings,

which consisted of a purse and a sweater. The officer was then instructed to go to the girls'

Once arriving there, he noticed that one of the girls had bloodshot eyes, so he asked her to blow into the alco-sensor, which she did. She tested positive for alcohol and was placed under arrest for underage consumption.

A student contacted KSU Police to report a fraudulent cashier's check that he received from someone who was interested in purchasing a vehicle on April 10. The complainant told the responding officer that he was contacted by a male subject who wanted to purchase his vehicle, which was advertised on Autotrader.com. The suspect told the complainant that he was interested in purchasing the car for the company that he worked for in Ontario Canada. After agreeing on a selling price, the suspect said he would send a cashier's check to the complainant via UPS, which he did. However, the check was for an additional \$2,300, which the suspect asked the complainant to wire to a female in Canada. The complainant did not become suspicious about the transaction until after it had already cleared Western Union. At which time, it was too late to stop the transfer. The responding officer took as much information as possible to file a report. The case was also forwarded to a KSU inves-



## The Gospel of Judas The fight over biblical intentions

Judas Iscariot is one of those figures in history who has become renown for betraying Jesus Christ. Now, all of a sudden, the hidden "Gospel of Judas" has surfaced and I am reading all sorts of headlines saying, "Could this be the alternative Gospel which sheds light on the real character of Judas? Did the Church suppress the truth?" I want to shed some light on this issue so that people who do not know much about these "gospels" can have some perspective other than the sensationalism of the media.

For starters, there were many writings that were circulating in the first century A.D. that were "alternative" Gospels. Many of these are attributed to a diverse group of people whom we today calls the Gnostics. This a broad term for many different sects of mystical religious groups who sought after "secret knowledge" [gnosis] and taught many different things. It is spun around in the media [and even in The Da Vinci Code] that the Christian Church of the 4th Century A.D. began suppressing many of these alternative Gospels and other diverse Christian writings in favor of the teachings which supported their views.

This is simply not true. There is no indication in history that the Christian Church ever took many of these "hidden" writings seriously. The books that exist today in mainstream Christianity today are the books which have always been used and disputed in Church history. Other writings were not even considered with the 4th Century Church because Christians did not use these writings. There is a dispute over what is traditionally called "the apocrypha," or "hidden writings" that are used in many Catholic Churches. But books such as "The Gospel of Judas" or "The Gospel of Thomas" have no major support in history.

There were many spurious writings that were circulating in the early Church that the Church deemed heretical from the outset. The Christian Apostles Peter and John, who are attested in the Gospels to have been with Jesus Christ during his ministry and were some of his closest disciples, wrote against heretical teachings that were being taught even in their time.

The fact that another "Gospel" resurfaces today does not mean much of anything except that we have another document from some group of people who were writing "cleverly invented stories," as the Apostle Peter called them. Don't buy what you're reading in the media or The Da Vinci Code if you are really interested in knowing the truth. Look into these matters for yourself and find out the history behind the new "Gospel."

## **Training exists** and is visible

As the head of the training division, I firstly want to thank John Hopper for bringing to the forefront his views regarding the critical nature of the learning tools we provide and how essential they are today both in business and education. Indeed the value in the workshops that we provide is understood at the uppermost most levels of the university, which is why an entire division has been created and funds to support the operation have been allocated. If the purpose of an entire division is to provide workshops for students, then why would it shy away from trying to fill every seat in the class? The author of the above mentioned article has stated his views without conducting a thorough research on the facts regarding the workshops, the times they are offered and their purpose. Due to the fact that The Sentinel is a medium through which knowledge of the workshops can be spread, I have chosen to respond and

clarify the issues.  ${\bf Advertising}-{\rm Information}$ regarding the schedule and workshop curriculum are posted online at http://its. kennesaw.edu/labs/studentworkshop/index.htm. Catalogs with this information are distributed across campus to various locations every semester [the Life-Long Learning Center, the Student Center, the Library, the Education building and the Burruss building are just a few examples]. Furtheremore, a whole bulletin board outside of the main computer lab in the Burruss building is dedicated to workshop information.

Workshop times-Classes are scheduled at varying times during the week. Due to a demand [student information collected through our online evaluation system] for evening and weekend workshops these classes have also been added. Classes run for approximately 2.5 hours per session. Each workshop has approximately two sessions. Reducing this time-frame would require students to come to class more often. Maintaining the same number of sessions but reducing the time would reduce the amount of material that can be delivered. To accommodate student class schedules workshops are specifically scheduled on Tuesday and Thursdays from 12:30 p.m. until 2 p.m., which is a time when no regular classes are in session.

gathered Information through the online evaluation, from students who attend our

workshops, does not show a demand for increasing the number of sessions for a workshop by reducing the time and material provided in each session.

**Location** – the training lab for students [located on the 4th floor of the Burruss building] is ideally located as it sits in close proximity to the main open computer lab for campus. The distance from any other on-campus building to the Burruss building is not significant and can be easily traversed by any student. Moving the lab to another location is not an option at this time given the shortage of space that the University is currently facing.

Offering credit for courses - the workshops are designed to be a tool for students who wish to enhance their knowledge and their skills in various software packages. Associating grades with workshops will force students with no interest in the subject to attend and pay little attention. Furthermore these workshops do not go through any formal sanctions needed for creating grade related courses, but instead are created based on the needs of the students and the software programs that they wish to learn. However some faculty members, realizing the benefits that the workshops provide, have offered extra credit for attendance of the workshops. Certificates of completion are given at the end of the sessions.

Due to a lack of good research by the columnist John Hopper, several key issues have been missed.

The training department offers over 25 different types of software application workshops for students.

At the request of many faculty members, in-class training sessions on any of these applications are conducted by the training team, thereby allowing students to learn these software tools during their regular class periods.

One-on-one help sessions n any supported software applications are provided by trainers to the students who request the same. All that the student needs to do is sign-up for one of these sessions in the ITS open computer lab [BB] 475] or call [770] 423-6110 to

schedule an appointment. Training booklets used during the workshops are available for free download by any registered KSU student. Students who cannot attend a workshop still have access to the material covered. This material can be found at http://its.kennesaw.edu/labs/ studentworkshop/index.htm

Designing the workshops,

creating the material and delivering the information are all a part of what the training team does. Seeking knowledge about the workshops, walking an extra few steps to get to a workshop or accommodating one's personal schedules to be able to attend the workshops should then be whose responsibility?

I could go on about this forever, but want to close with this. DiCecco wrote an article



The KSU Student and Recreation & Wellness Center is more than just a glorified weight room. The Wellness Center was designed to be a place that students could get in shape as well as improve their overall health. Special needs students were also a major factor in the design of the building.

Joe Maher, a self-described "gym rat," who after a motorcycle accident over four years ago is now a paraplegic, and is an avid user of the facilities. Recreation Facility Program Coordinator, Donald Brookshire, said that he purchased equipment with special needs students in mind; such as the orgometer, a cycle machine in which there are hand pedals instead of the normal foot pedals. The

building was also designed to controlled easier movements. be wheelchair accessible, and one can easily tell this by the oversized elevators, as well as the machines themselves many of which have movable features for special needs individuals.

The make up of the facility is like something one might see on MTV's "Cribs," except there are no celebrities showcasing rooms where "the magic happens." Students, alumni, and guests are greeted at the door by friendly helpful

After entering one is exposed to over 6,000 square feet devoted totally to fitness, featuring 48 pieces of cardio equipment. The strength and conditioning area is color coded, with the white machines being free weights, typically used for heavier lifting, and the silver machines signifying plates, for more

There is a two court gym which can be used for basketball, volleyball and badminton. There is also a circuit training room for those who need to get an extensive workout on a minute schedule.

The Center also boasts of group fitness classes, and starting in the fall Brookshire hopes to start a personal training program where students will be able to receive free personal training from the American Council on Exercise certified trainers.

The Wellness center is also the home of the new dance minor, intramurals and a nature bound program which leads to students being able to check out items from bicycles to sleeping bags. Brookshire has arranged a place for students to not only increase their overall health but also to socialize and learn.



The reason that none of the previously mentioned competi-



her last plan to do that, embezzling \$25,000 from a photo finishing company in Durham, didn't turn out so well, she has decided to explore other ways of achieving her goal. This time, it is through the judiciary

Roberts is the seldom spoken of 'second' stripper also present at the Duke lacrosse players' house on the night of March 13, when her fellow working-girl was allegedly raped. Since that much debated night, Roberts has changed her opinion on what she believes happened. Initially, the stripper said she doubted the story of her colleague, who told police she was dragged into a bathroom and raped. But for some reason, Roberts now says she thinks the lacrosse players are guilty.

> Perhaps Roberts realizes that the media has overwhelmingly decided to support the accuser's claims and sees that it would be in her best interest to follow suit.


> But no matter what the majority of the press feels, it is all too obvious that the prosecution lacks sufficient evidence to convict any of the players.

> First of all, at least one of the two players has a legitimate alibi to prove his innocence, and the much-awaited DNA tests that were supposed to distinguish who the alleged rapists were never produced anything.

But perhaps most telling is the behavior the accuser dis-

played when she was found intoxicated in another person's vehicle, "drunk and belligerent" according to the police. Theories that the players may have drugged the stripper are hard to believe considering that this day in age, medical science can prove within minutes if foreign substances are in the bloodstream. If doctors had found it to be true, surely a test would have been performed and we would have heard about it in the news immediately.
