MEDIA INFORMATION

COVERING THE LADY OWLS

This guide was produced to assist the media with their coverage of Kennesaw State University 1999-2000 Lady Owl Basketball. Press credentials are not required for Kennesaw State home games, although KSU sports information director Steve Ruthsatz requests that media interested in covering a game contact one of the sports information offices at least one day prior to the game. Members of the media wanting to cover a practice (usually 2-4 p.m. weekdays) are also asked to contact one of the sports information offices at least one day in advance.

On game day, a list of media will be left at the pass gate, located at main entrance of the physical education building. Only working media who have called ahead of time will be allowed to sit at the press table.

PRESS SERVICES

Updated game notes, rosters, results and statistics will be available to working media prior to each Lady Owl home game. During the intermission, a full halftime box score will be distributed to working media. Approximately 10 minutes following the conclusion of the game, a full final box score, along with a play-by-play account of the game, will be available outside of the main athletic department offices.

If media need a place to work and/or file a story following a game, please let Ruthsatz or another member of the sports information staff know when making the initial phone call. This will allow the sports information staff to meet any needs the media may have, such as a quiet working area, electrical outlet and/or access to a phone line.

A phone line and access to a fax machine are available to working media on game days on a first-come, first-serve basis. Working media are also allowed access to the hospitality room (Room 116), located next to the main athletic department offices.

If at any time media need updated results, statistics, photographs and/or any other information concerning Kennesaw State athletics, they should feel free to contact one of the sports information offices or log on to the KSU athletic department web site, located at KSUOwls.com.

RADIO/TELEVISION

A phone line is available for visiting radio stations to broadcast KSU home games free of charge. Again, as with print media, Ruthsatz requests that radio station personnel contact one of the sports information offices at least one day prior to the game. Only working members of the radio station will be allowed to sit at the press table.

If television station personnel are interested in covering a game and/or practice, they should also contact one of the sports information offices at least one day in advance.

INTERVIEWS WITH COACHES

Lady Owl head coach Colby Tilley, along with assistant coaches Randall Goble, Paula Skinner and Sarah Coleman are available to be interviewed on most weekday mornings. For telephone or personal interviews, the media may contact one of the sports information offices or one of the women's basketball offices.

Approximately 10 minutes following the conclusion of home games, the coaches will be available for interviews outside of the KSU locker room or near the Kennesaw State bench. If the media are having a hard time tracking down a coach for an interview, they should contact a member of the sports information staff.

INTERVIEWS WITH PLAYERS

Lady Owl players are available at different times during the week, depending on the individual player(s) requested for an interview. For telephone or personal interviews, the media must first contact one of the sports information offices.

After home games, interviews with players can be arranged through a member of the sports information staff. Players will be available approximately 15 minutes following the conclusion of home games.

"Eyes on the Prize"

Last season was another outstanding year for the Kennesaw State University women's basketball program. Kennesaw State put together a 28-4 overall record in 1998-99, advancing to the NCAA Division II Elite Eight tournament for the second time in the last three campaigns after winning the Peach Belt Athletic Conference South Division championship (14-2 mark) and a second South Atlantic Regional title in three years. The Lady Owls also finished last season ranked No. 6 nationally, their highest ranking ever.

In order to keep the KSU program competitive at the national level, fifth-year head coach **Colby Tilley** believes his players must continue to play hard and stay mentally-focused for each and every game. Tilley wants his 1999-2000 team to take the court with a great deal of intensity, putting pressure on the ball defensively while being patient on the offensive end.

A solid cast of six letterwinners, including three starters, are back for Kennesaw State this season and will be joined by a fine group of five first-year players. The ultimate goal for the Lady Owls, as always, is to claim a national crown, but Tilley realizes his squad must first contend for a Peach Belt Athletic Conference championship and capture the regional title.

There is little doubt, however, that Tilley and his KSU players will have their "Eyes on the Prize" heading into the upcoming campaign.

Brazenas, Anglin expected to be leaders

Kennesaw State will enter this year with two key returnees Tilley expects will bring a great amount of leadership to his program.



Rima Brazenas led the country in assists last year (8.5 per game) while also finishing fourth in steals (4.0 a contest).

Rima Brazenas, a 5-8 senior guard, led NCAA Division II in assists a season ago with 8.5 per game while also averaging 4.0 steals a contest, good for fourth in the nation (paced the PBAC in both categories). Brazenas was a First Team all-conference and Second Team All-

South Atlantic Region selection last year who set single-season school records for assists (263) and steals (123). She also established herself as being one of the finest all-around players in Lady Owl history by leading the squad in three-point shooting (38 made goals, 40.4 percentage), and tallying 9.2 points and 4.5 rebounds per outing as a junior.

The other player Tilley is really counting on this year is 5-7 senior guard **Amy Anglin**, the only member left in the program from KSU's 1997 Elite Eight team. Anglin, a two-year starter who has improved every season while at Kennesaw State, came up with 9.6 points, 3.2 boards, 2.9 assists and 2.0 steals a game last year while seeing action in all 32 contests. She is the most experienced of the Lady Owls and is a quiet leader on-and-off the court.

Junior **Monika Dajksler**, a 5-9 guard/forward, is the other returning starter from a season ago. Dajksler led KSU by shooting 76.3 percent from the free throw line in 1998-99 while scoring 8.3 points per outing.

Other returnees this year are 6-2 senior forward/center **Fatou Ndoeye**, 6-4 senior center **Ewelina Zmuda** and 5-8 sophomore guard **Krista Kemp**. A very active inside player, Ndoeye appeared in 31 games as a junior with six starts, averaging 7.1 points and 4.3 rebounds every time out. Zmuda, a two-time letterwinner and one of the top shot-blockers in the conference, scored 6.5 points a game last season and made 58.2 percent of her field goal attempts, leading the squad. Kemp, the only freshman on the 1998-99 roster, gained valuable playing experience as the season went along last year and should be ready to make a bigger impact as a sophomore.

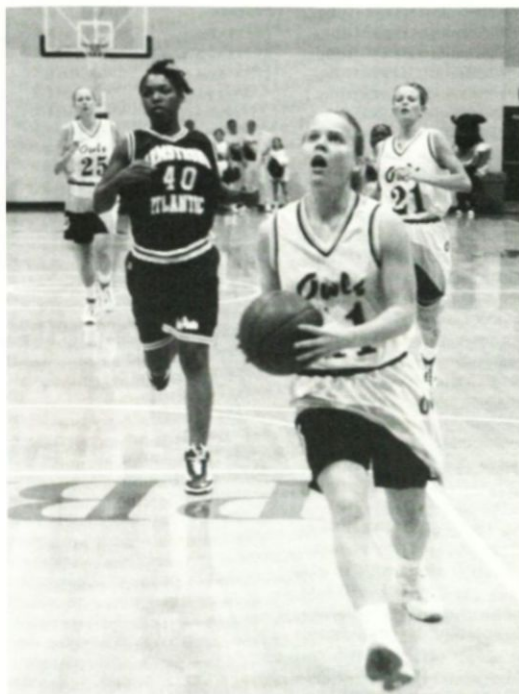
"Everyone is going to have to take on a leadership role this year," Tilley said of his veterans. "Each player has a unique quality about themselves."

Newcomers will need to step up

Kennesaw State will be without two dominating inside players from a season ago in 6-3 forward/center **Dion Thornton** and 6-1 forward/center **Justyna Stanioch**, both First Team All-PBAC honorees. The dynamic duo of Thornton and Stanioch combined for 32.2 points and 15.2 boards per contest as seniors while shooting 56.7 percent from the floor. However, Tilley has brought in a talented recruiting class that he hopes can help fill the voids left by his star post players from a year ago.

A pair of freshmen, 6-0 forward/center **Anna Szaniecka** and 5-10 forward **Zane Hernandez**, should get the chance to prove themselves early this season. The left-handed Szaniecka, a transfer from the University of Poznan (Poland) who has played on the Polish Junior National Team, averaged 16 points and seven rebounds an outing for her club team last year while Hernandez came to the Lady Owls from a fine program at Miami (Fla.) Senior High School, where she pumped in 12.5 points and hauled down 11 boards per game as a senior.

Other promising newcomers include 5-9 junior guard/forward **Amie Kane**, 5-7 senior guard **Chantel Jiles** and 5-6 junior guard **Amanda Anglin**, the twin sister of Amy. Kane, from Senegal, is out of a tremendous junior college program at Midland (Texas) College, where she was the Most Valuable Player for a squad that went 34-3 overall a season ago and ended in third place nationally. Kane

Baton Rouge, La., seems to be fully recovered from her setbacks and should be able to make an impact for Kennesaw State in 1999-2000. Anglin, from Duluth, Ga., has been out of basketball since the 1995-96 season, when she helped lead Sequoyah High School in Canton, Ga., to a state crown. Anglin, a lefty, will battle for playing time in the backcourt.

"There are no 'practice players' on this team," Tilley stated. "Every player can contribute to our success."

Many positions up for grabs

Heading into this year, there will be a lot of players competing for starting positions. Tilley has a good idea of who might be the top contenders for the starting assignments, but nothing is for certain.

"I am excited about the battles that will go on during practice," Tilley commented.

At the point guard position, Brazenas is the projected starter, which should come as a surprise to no one. Jiles, Amy Anglin and Kane can also play the point if Brazenas moves to a wing, which Tilley is considering.

KSU is probably the deepest at the wing positions. Amy Anglin and Dajksler were regulars at the wings a season ago, and may be the frontrunners to start once again, but others may give them a run for their money for playing time. Kane, Kemp and Amanda Anglin will also be looking for some action out on the perimeter.

Returning players Ndoeye and Zmuda are expected to make strong bids for the starting post positions but may be pushed by Kennesaw State's two freshmen. Szaniecka and Hernandez, although not as experienced, are not far behind the veterans and should make the competition for playing time down low very fierce, especially with the lack of depth there.

broke single-season school records for assists and steals while at Midland and should definitely make her presence felt in her first campaign at KSU. Jiles suffered through an injury-plagued career while earning three letters at NCAA Division I Louisiana State University before landing at Kennesaw State. The transfer from

A tough schedule

After enjoying such a spectacular year in 1998-99, the Lady Owls' schedule for this season will be extremely challenging. Whether playing a proven squad or an inferior opponent, a conference game or a non-league contest, Tilley feels "every game is an important game."

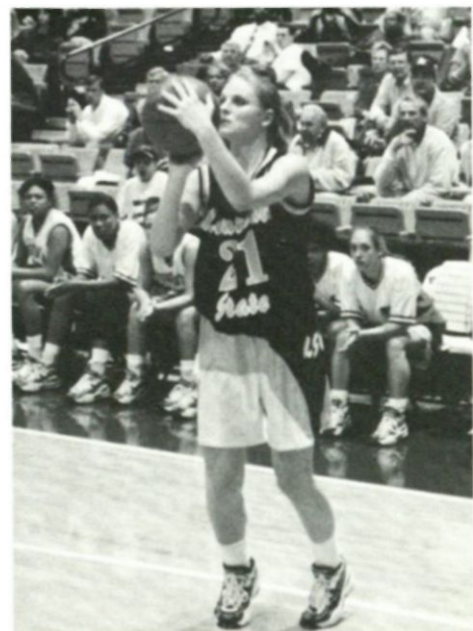
KSU will begin the campaign with two contests at home--where the team was a perfect 12-0 last year--in its annual Ron Walker Memorial tournament (November 19-20) before hitting the road for five games away from the Spec Landrum Centre. Kennesaw State will certainly get tested when taking part in the Gardner-Webb Invitational on December 3-4, where the Lady Owls' first-round opponent will be Wingate, a squad that went 23-7 overall last season, made it to the South Atlantic Regional Tournament semifinals and returns 11 letterwinners, including four starters.

Another competitive non-conference encounter will come just before the New Year (December 30) in Montgomery, Ala., when KSU will face Georgia Southwestern. On a neutral court, Kennesaw State will be up against an NAIA Division I team that finished with a 26-8 overall record a year ago and has 10 letterwinners, including four starters, back.

Once PBAC play gets underway, Tilley believes key games within the South Division will be versus Columbus State University and Georgia College & State University. In the North Division, Francis Marion University and Lander University are the favorites, according to Tilley.

Columbus State posted a 25-7 overall mark in 1998-99 and has eight players, including three starters, returning while GC&SU, 17-11 overall last season, always puts a very athletic and competitive group on the floor. Incredibly, Francis Marion returns all 11 letterwinners, including three first team all-conference performers, from last year's PBAC regular season championship squad that ended 27-3 overall (ranked No. 9 in the national poll) after losing to KSU in the regional tournament finals. Lander is another NCAA Tournament team from a season ago that was 20-10 overall and won the PBAC Tournament title. The Lady Senators have seven players back, including four starters.

"Our conference has gotten so strong over the years that I think any team can beat anybody on a given night," Tilley concluded.

HEAD COACH COLBY TILLEY



Beginning his fifth season as the head coach of the Kennesaw State University women's basketball team is Colby Tilley. A proven winner and builder of successful women's basketball programs, Tilley has compiled an overall record of 545-148 over the past 22 years as a collegiate head coach for a winning percentage of .786. In his four seasons at KSU, he has posted a 93-28 overall mark (.769).

Last year, Tilley led Kennesaw State to its second trip to the NCAA Division II Elite Eight tournament in the past three campaigns. The Lady Owls finished 28-4 overall a season ago while capturing the Peach Belt Athletic Conference South Division championship (14-2 record) and a second South Atlantic Regional title in the last three years.

In 1997-98, Tilley's squad ended with an 18-10 overall mark after he guided KSU to its best season in history in 1996-97. Kennesaw State went 30-2 overall during the 1996-97 campaign, claiming the conference regular season crown (17-1), PBAC Tournament championship and regional title before heading to its first Division II national event. Tilley took over the Lady Owl program in September of 1995 and guided the team to a 17-12 overall record in 1995-96. His first KSU squad just missed making an NCAA Tournament appearance by finishing as the PBAC Tournament runner-up.

Before arriving on the Kennesaw State campus, Tilley spent nine years as the head coach at Auburn University at Montgomery (Ala.), where he started the women's basketball program in 1986. While putting together an overall mark of 218-74 (.747) at Auburn-Montgomery, his teams captured five Southern States Conference titles, five NAIA District 27 crowns and made seven appearances at

the NAIA National Championship tournament. The Lady Senators' best finish was a Final Four showing at the 1994 national event, while his last squad there--in 1994-95--went 34-3 overall, making it to the Elite Eight.

Prior to taking the job at AUM, Tilley ran the women's basketball program at Truett-McConnell (Junior) College in Cleveland, Ga., where he guided the team to a 236-46 overall slate (.837) in nine seasons, including five state championships, four Region 17 titles and a national crown in 1980.

Over his 22 campaigns on the bench, Tilley has garnered several coaching honors, including being named the 1999 and 1997 NCAA Division II Coach of the Year in Georgia by the Atlanta Tipoff Club. He has also been given a Georgia Basketball Lifetime Achievement Award by the same organization for having at least 400 career wins. The 1997 PBAC Coach of the Year, Tilley has also been selected as the District Coach of the Year four times and Region Coach of the Year twice while at Auburn-Montgomery; and Region Coach of the Year on six more occasions at Truett-McConnell. In the Danettes' national championship season, he was selected as the 1980 NJCAA National Coach of the Year. Tilley is also a member of the Women's Basketball Coaches Association.

Tilley began his coaching career in 1972 at Chatham (N.C.) Central High School, where he was an assistant football coach, head track coach and head boys' basketball coach for the freshmen squad. He later moved up to the collegiate ranks at TMC in 1976.

A native of Raleigh, N.C., Tilley received his bachelor's degree from Appalachian State University (Boone, N.C.) in 1972. He went on to earn master's degrees from Georgia Southern University (Statesboro) in 1974 and AUM in 1988. He also got his Ed.S (educational specialist) degree at Auburn-Montgomery in 1992.

Tilley, 50, resides in Kennesaw with his wife, Miriam, and 23-year-old daughter, Sarah, a KSU graduate. He also has a 26-year-old son, Jason, who is a graduate student at Southwestern Baptist Seminary in Fort Worth, Texas.

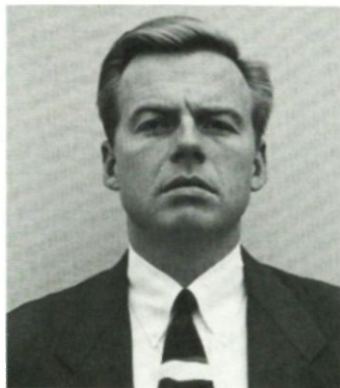

Assistant Coach Randall Goble

The senior member of the Kennesaw State University women's basketball coaching staff is Randall Goble, who has served under three head coaches is entering his eighth season with the Lady Owls. Now in his 10th year as Kennesaw State's athletic facilities manager, Goble is involved in all aspects of the KSU women's basketball program.

During the past seven campaigns that Goble has been part of the Kennesaw State staff, the Lady Owls have posted an impressive overall record of 145-62 for a winning percentage of .700. In his first season as a KSU assistant

coach, the team compiled an 19-11 overall mark, winning the 1993 NAIA District 25 title before advancing to the NAIA National Championship tournament.

Goble came to Kennesaw State in 1990 from his alma mater, Berry College in Mount Berry, Ga., where he was an assistant men's basketball coach for three years. During his time at Berry, he saw the squad improve each season.

An active member of the Women's Basketball Coaches Association, Goble earned his bachelor's degree from BC in 1988. While with the Vikings, he lettered twice as a member of the basketball team. Goble is presently working toward his master's degree from the University of Alabama.

Originally from Calhoun, Ga., the 34-year-old Goble now lives in Holly Springs with his wife, Theresa, and their two sons, 5-year-old Joseph and 2-year-old Nicholas.

Assistant Coach Paula Skinner

Paula Skinner is starting her fourth year as an assistant women's basketball coach at Kennesaw State University. A great asset to the Lady Owl program in a number of ways, she has both played for and worked under KSU head coach Colby Tilley in the past.

Skinner came to Kennesaw State from Auburn University at Montgomery (Ala.), where she served as the interim head coach in 1995-96 following the departure of Tilley. She left off right where Tilley had ended, leading Auburn-Montgomery to a 30-6 overall record that season and final national ranking of No. 4 in NAIA Division I. With Skinner at the helm, the Lady Senators captured conference and regional championships before making it to the quarterfinals of the national tournament. For her efforts, Skinner was named the 1996 Southeast Region Coach of the Year.

Prior to taking over the program at AUM, Skinner was an assistant coach there for four campaigns with Tilley in charge. During her time alongside Tilley, Auburn-Montgomery was 120-21 overall (.851 winning percentage) and went to the nationals each season.

Skinner is part of the Women's Basketball Coaches Association and National Fellowship of Christian Athletes. Before getting

into coaching, she worked in the sporting goods industry.

A fine collegiate player herself, Skinner played two years each at Truett-McConnell (Junior) College in Cleveland, Ga. (where Tilley served as head coach) and Berry College in Mount Berry, Ga. At Truett-McConnell, she played on squads which had a two-year overall record of 47-10 (.825), including one that claimed a state title. After moving on to Berry, her teams got even better, going 62-9 overall (.873) during a two-season span. In 1984, the Lady Vikings finished third at the NAIA National Championship tournament.

After receiving her bachelor's degree in 1985 from BC, Skinner earned her master's at AUM in 1990. The 36-year-old Skinner was born, and is currently living back, in Smyrna, Ga. She is single.



Assistant Coach Sarah Coleman

The newest member of the Kennesaw State University women's basketball coaching staff, but certainly no stranger to the Lady Owl program, is Sarah Coleman. After lettering for KSU and head coach Colby Tilley the past four seasons, Coleman is now beginning her first year as an assistant coach.

During her playing career at

Kennesaw State, Coleman saw action in 97 games, mainly in a reserve role providing a spark off the bench. The Lady Owls posted an overall record of 93-28 (.769 winning percentage) during her time in a KSU uniform, making a pair of trips to the NCAA Division II Elite Eight tournament (1997 and 1999).

Also a fine student, Coleman was twice a member of the Peach Belt Athletic Conference Presidential Honor Roll while a player for Kennesaw State. A communication major, she is currently finishing up work toward her bachelor's degree at KSU.

Coleman, 23, is single and residing in Kennesaw. Her hometown is Folkston, Ga.

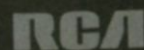




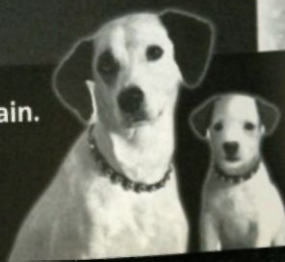

KSU ATHLETIC HISTORY

The intercollegiate athletic programs at Kennesaw State University have enjoyed a rich history. The 1998-99 academic year marks the 17th year of intercollegiate athletics at Kennesaw State. Begun in 1982-83 with the women's basketball program, the sponsorship of intercollegiate sports coincided with the new presidency of Dr. Betty L. Siegel and the University's move from a two-year institution to four-year status.

A number of other sports were added in 1983-84. Also in that year, Kennesaw State became members of the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics and Georgia Intercollegiate Athletic Conference.

KSU's first team championship came in 1985 when the men's golf team captured the state title. Individually, Jennifer Turner became Kennesaw State's first All-America honoree in 1985 at the NAIA Women's Track and Field Championship. Turner would wind up earning All-America status three times while the first KSU male All-America pick was golfer Jon Hough, who was the medalist at the 1986 NAIA Men's Golf National Championship. Since that time, many more Lady Owl and Fighting Owl student-athletes have went on to earn All-America status and national awards.

Prior to moving into Division II of the National Collegiate Athletic Association and the Peach Belt Athletic Conference in 1994-95, Kennesaw State claimed seven NAIA district championships (women's basketball, 1988 and 1993; softball, 1992, 1993 and 1994; men's basketball, 1993; and baseball, 1994); four NAIA softball tri-district titles (1991, 1992, 1993 and 1994); an NAIA area baseball crown (1994) and 1994 NAIA National Baseball Championship. In all, KSU won five GIAC titles, including three in women's basketball (1988, 1989 and 1992) and two in baseball (1988 and 1990).

Since becoming full-time members of NCAA Division II, Kennesaw State has captured three national crowns over the past five years, including back-to-back softball national championships in 1995 and 1996, and the 1996 baseball national title. In the spring of 1996, KSU became just the second NCAA Division I or II member to claim softball and baseball national crowns in the same season. The feat has never been accomplished on the Division I level

and has only been matched by California State University at Northridge (now at Division I), which won both championships in Division II in 1984.

The Fighting Owl and Lady Owl teams have also had tremendous success since becoming eligible for PBAC and NCAA Division II regional championships in 1994-95. Over the last five campaigns, Kennesaw State has earned 18 conference titles (men's cross country in 1994, 1995, 1996, 1997 and 1998; women's cross country in 1994, 1995, 1996, 1997 and 1998; softball in 1995, 1996, 1997 and 1998; baseball in 1995, 1997 and 1998; and women's basketball in 1997); eight PBAC Tournament crowns (softball in 1995, 1996, 1997 and 1998; baseball in 1995, 1997 and 1998; and women's basketball in 1997); and 17 NCAA Division II regional championships (baseball in 1996, 1997, 1998 and 1999; softball in 1995, 1996, 1997 and 1999; men's cross country in 1994, 1995, 1996 and 1997; women's cross country in 1996, 1997 and 1998; and women's basketball in 1997 and 1999).

KSU was awarded the PBAC Commissioner's Cup in 1995-96 and 1996-97 as having the best all-around athletic program in the conference.

On an individual basis, numerous Kennesaw State student-athletes have been selected to All-PBAC, all-region and All-America squads since 1994-95.

ACADEMICS & ATHLETICS

Just as the athletic programs at Kennesaw State University have been making a name for themselves on the national scene, so has the University in general.

In 1986, Kennesaw State became one of the first institutions in the region to be reaccruited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools under its new criteria, which emphasized institutional effectiveness. In that same year, KSU was selected to be spotlighted in *Searching for Academic Excellence* as one of the 20 colleges and universities in the nation "on the move." The University was one of a handful of top "up-and-coming" colleges in the country cited three years in a row by *U.S. News and World Report* in its annual "Guide to America's Best Colleges and Universities." In 1997, the guide listed Kennesaw State among 10 Southern universities with the highest proportion of business majors. *Success* magazine listed KSU's Michael J. Coles College of Business as one of the nation's "Top 10 Up-and-Coming Schools" in its 1996 and 1997 reports on "The 25 Best Business Schools for Entrepreneurs." The editors defined up-and-comers as "schools worthy of investigation for anyone seeking a top-notch entrepreneurial program."

Fighting Owl and Lady Owl student-athletes have not only excelled on the playing fields over the years but also in the classroom. Kennesaw State student-athletes, along with the institution, have grown not only athletically, but academically as well.

Over the past five academic years, KSU has placed 185 student-athletes on the Peach Belt Athletic Conference Presidential Honor Roll. To be named to the honor roll, a student-athlete must have maintained at least a 3.00 grade point average on a 4.00 scale during the entire academic year. With Kennesaw State's student-athlete population usually consisting of just over 100, this means that

approximately one-third of that group has been able to achieve a "B" average or better throughout the school year.

The KSU athletic department not only recognizes its student-athletes for their athletic achievements, but also for their academic accomplishments. At the annual Athletic Awards Night held each year, awards are presented to student-athletes for performing well in the classroom.

The seven student-athletes who have accumulated the highest GPAs over the previous three quarters (now two semesters) are named to the Kennesaw State All-Academic Team. The individual with the highest GPA among all student-athletes is the Yamaha Scholar-Athlete of the Year with the other six members of the team each receiving a Ron Walker Academic Achievement Award, named in honor of KSU's late head women's basketball coach and the athletic department's first academic advisor. For the 1998-99 school year, women's cross country runner Karla Ely was chosen as the Yamaha Scholar-Athlete of the Year. Other members of the All-Academic Team included men's golfer Franklin Abell; softball players Candice Brown, Lacey Gardner and Kathy Le; and women's cross country runners Paivi Mahosenaho and Tiina Manninen.

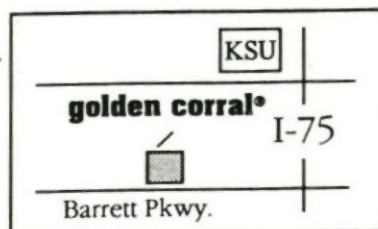

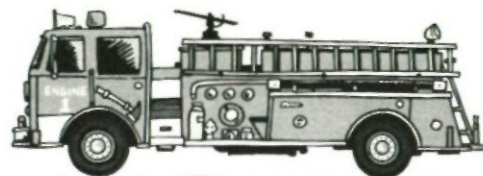

The Home of KSU Basketball

Kennesaw State University's basketball complex, previously known as the Owls Nest, is now called Ron Walker Court at the Spec Landrum Centre (in honor of Kennesaw State's late head women's basketball coach and first athletic director, respectively). The facility, located on-campus within the physical education building, was renamed at the start of the 1998-99 season, and is the first and only "Home of KSU Basketball."

The complex has provided the Lady Owls with a distinct home-court advantage since the women's basketball program was started in 1982-83 (including a perfect 12-0 record at home last year), and served as the site of the 1997 NCAA Division II South Atlantic Regional Tournament,

which KSU won to advance to its first Elite Eight tournament.

New theatre-type seating replaced the wooden bleachers during the summer of 1997, giving the gym a seating capacity listed at 1,008. New scoreboards and shot-clocks have also been added within the past two years. Fans who come see Kennesaw State basketball can now sit more comfortably and still be close enough to the court that they feel like part of the action.

The freshly-decorated Spec Landrum Centre (including the lobby area and gymnasium) displays KSU's many national, regional and conference championship awards, banners and team photographs, among other things, giving visitors plenty to look at besides the game itself.

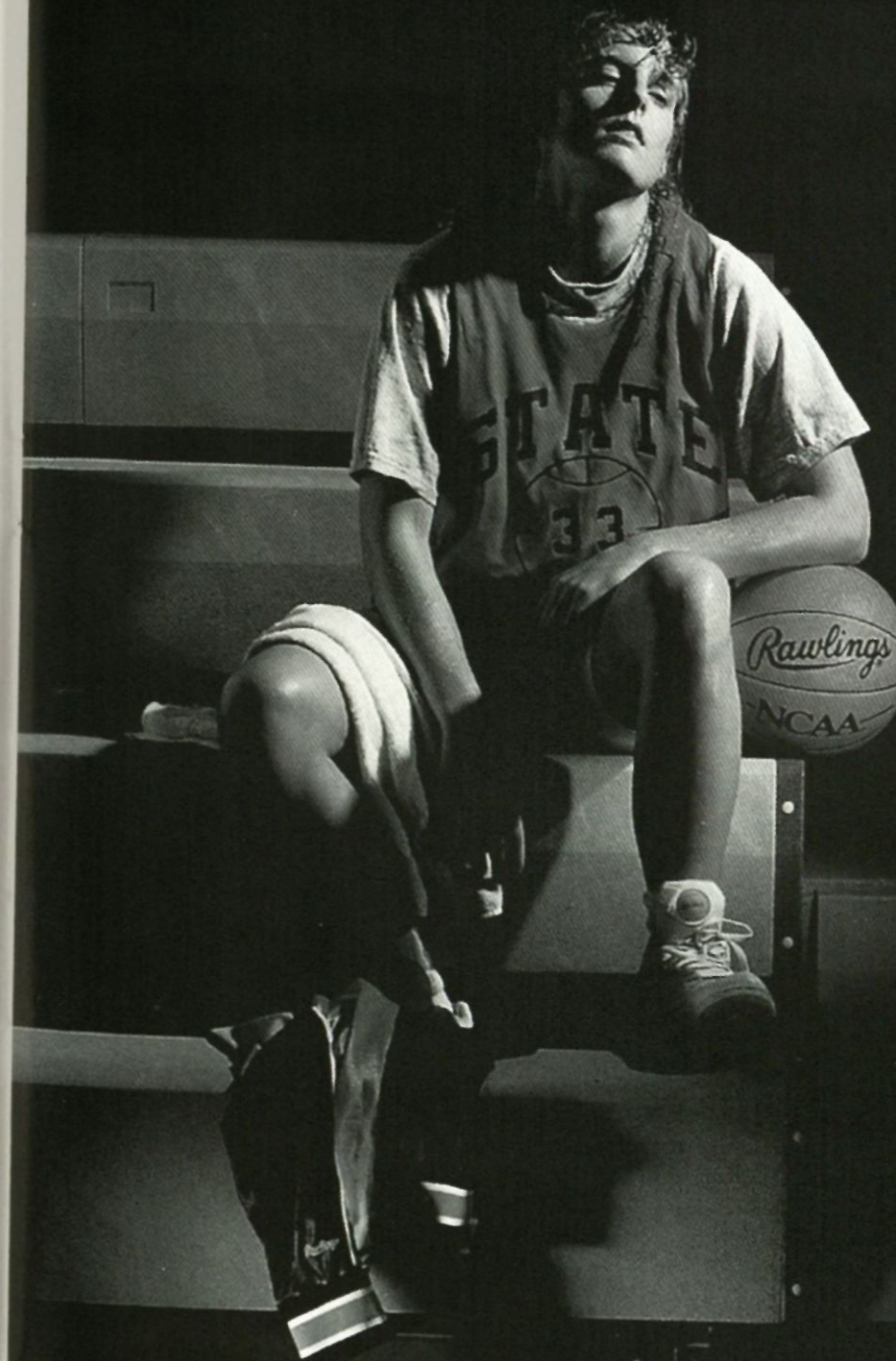

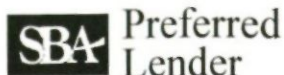

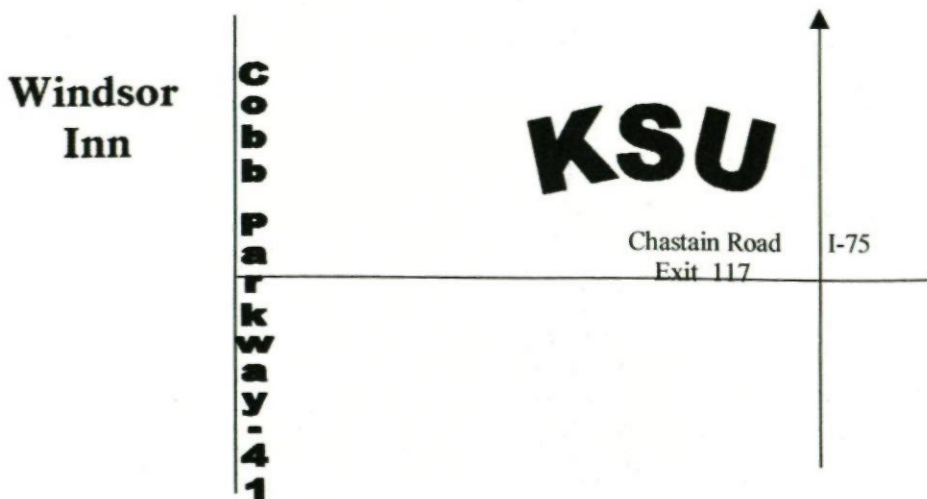

The NCAA—Common Ground of College Athletics

It was the flying wedge, football's major offense in 1905, that spurred the formation of the NCAA in December 1905. Numerous sport-related injuries and deaths had prompted many institutions to discontinue the sport. Others were urging that football be reformed or abolished completely from intercollegiate athletics.

So in 1905, President Theodore Roosevelt summoned college athletics leaders to two White House conferences to encourage such reforms. The Intercollegiate Athletic Association of the United States was officially constituted on March 31, 1906. There were 62 charter members. In 1910, it took its present name of the National Collegiate Athletic Association and, for several years, served primarily as a discussion group and rules-making body.

Now, more than 1,200 colleges, universities, conferences and related organizations count on the NCAA to be the organization through which they speak. It is a voluntary association devoted to the sound administration of intercollegiate athletics.

Through the NCAA, member institutions consider an athletics problem that has

crossed regional or conference lines and has become national in scope. The Association, through its members, strives to maintain intercollegiate athletics as an integral part of the educational program and the athletes as an integral part of the student body. The NCAA also stands for good conduct in intercollegiate athletics and serves as the colleges' national athletics accreditation agency.

The organization and its members recognize that creating an equitable college environment for its student-athletes is among their highest priorities. Working together to enact rules, policies, procedures and organizational goals, its members strive for the common goal of academic integrity for their programs.

Just as integrity is key for the academic process, it is also a component in the competition among NCAA institutions. The NCAA and its staff is charged with enforcing the rules and regulations that the institutions vote and impose on themselves.

While enforcement proceedings involving member schools seem to grab most of the headlines, they represent only a small part of the NCAA's total program.

The NCAA administered its first national championship in 1921—the National

Collegiate Track and Field Championships. Today, the NCAA administers 81 championships in 22 sports for its member institutions, involving more than 24,000 men and women student-athletes. There are 24 championships on the Division I level, 23 on the Division II level and 24 for Division III members, along with 10 sports that have National Collegiate Championships for which all divisions are eligible.

Beyond its annual championships, the NCAA also places a high priority on honoring its members and student-athletes, evident in its honors program and postgraduate scholarship program. The honors program recognizes accomplishments of current and former outstanding student-athletes, while the postgraduate scholarship program annually honors 154 high-ranking college student-athletes who are in their last year of intercollegiate competition by providing them scholarships of \$5,000 each. The NCAA also recognizes the need to assist its members in career development in collegiate athletics and has addressed this area through its women's and ethnic minority enhancement programs. ■



Putting the Student in Student-Athlete

Over the last few years, the NCAA and its member colleges and universities have worked hard to emphasize the student in the term student-athlete. Academic standards and rules have been developed and changed to ensure that student-athletes can excel in the classroom as they do in their sports. The result of these reforms has been that student-athletes are more likely than ever before to succeed in the collegiate environment.

The CHAMPS/Life Skills program was developed by the NCAA to help prepare student-athletes for the challenges of life beyond the playing field. The focus of the program is on commitments viewed as critical to personal growth: academic excellence, personal development, service, and career development. In addition, NCAA schools work hard to offer further academic support programs to help student-athletes prosper. These programs offer access to study facilities and tutors as well as monitor student-athlete progress.

One result of these programs is that NCAA Division I student-athletes have been consistently graduating at a rate higher than the rest of the student body. For the class entering college in 1990, 56 percent of the overall student body at NCAA Division I institutions graduated, while Division I student-athletes graduated at a rate of 58 percent. The rate does not include student-athletes who transfer to and graduate from another institution.

Minimum academic requirements that student-athletes must meet to play sports as freshmen in college are one reason for the higher graduation rates. In 1982, a group of college presidents, sponsored by the American Council on Education, proposed a set of minimum academic standards to determine freshman athletics eligibility. The first set of standards was implemented in 1986. They required that freshmen graduate high school with a minimum grade-point average of 2.000 in 11 core academic courses and a minimum standardized test score of 700 on the SAT or 15 on the ACT to be eligible to play sports and receive an athletics scholarship.

Two years ago, the number of required core academic courses was raised to 13 and in 1996, a grade-point average and test-score sliding index went into effect. This scale allows student-athletes with higher grades to qualify with lower test scores and vice versa.

Wanna Play? Know the Rules

Any high-school student who is interested in playing sports at the NCAA Division I or II level should learn about the standards as early as possible. In addition, high-school student-athletes should talk to their guidance counselors and coaches to learn more.

High-school students can also call the NCAA's Eligibility Hotline, 800/638-3731. This number features recordings with information on a number of freshman eligibility topics, including accommodations for students with learning disabilities. Students can also order a free copy of the "Guide for the College-Bound Student-Athlete" by calling the hotline and following the prompts. Information about the recruiting process and about initial-eligibility requirements is available online at NCAA Online (www.ncaa.org).

The NCAA's Initial-Eligibility Clearinghouse ensures that student-athletes have met the academic requirements and certifies their eligibility to play sports as a freshman. High-school student-athletes aspiring to play Division I or II athletics should register with the clearinghouse after completing their junior year.

Clearinghouse information and registration forms are available from high-school guidance counselors; from the NCAA Eligibility Hotline (800/638-3731) or from the NCAA Clearinghouse, P.O. Box 4044, Iowa City, IA 52243-4044, telephone 319/337-1492. The clearinghouse keeps registered student-athletes informed about the qualifications they have and have not met concerning freshmen eligibility.

Once student-athletes are enrolled in college, there are more academic standards to be met. Student-athletes must show continuing progress toward a degree each year, including a minimum number of credits passed. From the junior year on, these standards place great emphasis on progress made toward a specific degree program and ensure that student-athletes don't accumulate large numbers of credits that won't help them earn a specific degree.

The NCAA also has established various scholarship and grant programs to encourage student-athletes to pursue their undergraduate and postgraduate degrees. The Degree-Completion Grant program assists those who have exhausted their eligibility for institutional financial aid. There are also Women's and Ethnic Minority Enhancement programs and several postgraduate scholarship opportunities.

The end result? Student-athletes are now more likely than ever to enter their collegiate programs prepared and ready to succeed athletically and academically. ■

Vision Statement

The Peach Belt Athletic Conference is committed to providing through its dependent collegiate members, a forum for student participation in athletic, academic, and co-curricular events under the auspices of the National Collegiate Athletic Association, Division II.

We will exemplify the characteristics of a premier intercollegiate conference that prides itself on the inclusion of students of all demographic groups who wish to participate in a well-rounded sports program. Our institutions, our academic goals, our athletic aspirations reflect a communality of purpose and a commitment to excellence in the classroom and on the playing field.

The Peach Belt Athletic Conference begins its ninth full year as an all-sports conference this fall. In 1991, the conference held championships in men's and women's basketball then expanded to the current level of 11 championships in 1991-1992.

The idea for the formation of a NCAA Division II conference was discussed in November, 1988, in Greenville, S.C., with 11 schools represented at the meeting. Five of the colleges at that first meeting, along with two other schools, formed the new conference when USC-Aiken hosted another meeting on Dec. 3, 1989.

The seven charter members were Armstrong State College (now Armstrong Atlantic State University), Columbus College (now Columbus State University), Francis Marion College (now Francis Marion University), Georgia College (now Georgia College & State University), Lander College (now Lander University), USC Aiken and USC Spartanburg. The name Peach Belt Athletic Conference was adopted in January, 1990.

Augusta College (now Augusta State University) applied and was accepted in November 1990, with the effective date of membership on July 1, 1991. With the addition of Augusta College, the Peach Belt Conference had four members each in Georgia and South Carolina. Another college joined the Peach Belt Conference on July

1, 1992, when Pembroke (N.C.) State University (now UNC Pembroke) officially became a member. Kennesaw State College (now Kennesaw State University), located in Kennesaw, Ga., became the 10th full member of the conference on July 1, 1994 and Clayton State College (now Clayton College & State University) in Morrow, Ga., joined the league on July 1, 1995. The conference expanded to 12 members with the addition of the University of North Florida on July 1, 1997.

Former Augusta College basketball coach and athletic director Marvin Vanover was named interim commissioner in April 1990, and served in that capacity until his appointment as the conference's first full-time commissioner in July 1991. The conference has established an office in Augusta, Ga., which houses the commissioner and his staff.

Dr. John C. Stockwell, Chancellor of the University of South Carolina Spartanburg, is the PBAC president for 1999-2000.

The conference will conduct championships in 11 sports, six for men and five for women. Men's champions will be declared in baseball, basketball, cross country, golf, soccer, and tennis. Women's champions will include those in basketball, cross country, softball, tennis, and volleyball.
