







Potato Relay

The fun has just begun because right after our exciting potato relay, we have the famous three legged race. A couple tied together at one leg running a race against time. Togetherness, that's what counts, right?











The annual dance and the crowning of the new queen followed that evening. This year's queen is Debbie Jordan.






















Our hats are off to Coach Charlie Lumsden and the 1978 Slugginn Hornets, and our expectations are great for a promising team in the future.























As the year comes to a close, so comes the SGA elections.


APATHY . . .! That word spells out the turnout for this year's Student Government Elections. For the first time in history a female has been elected as president of this illustrious organization.

Even though only 15% of the student body participated in the election the new slate of SGA members promises to be a good one. Next year they will face many serious problems, not the least of which is separation from Georgia Tech.

our new president barbara ransom

Carrying 52% of the vote, Barbara Ransom was elected the first woman SGA President at Southern Tech. With only 15% of the student body voting, apathy is one of the problems that Barbara hopes to get rid of. One of her campaign slogans was "Vote Barbara in. Vote Apathy out." Since we are a predominantly male school, it is unusual that a woman be elected. Barbara feels that it was her ability, not her sex, that got her the position. Having served as sophomore class president, Barbara, an industrial engineering major, says she had a good opportunity to get to know people around the campus and become familiar with the issues that most concern students. "Communication is our biggest problem," Barbara says. "I want

to get the communication level up and hear from the students about their problems. I feel that I know who to go to on campus to get answers and who to ask for information." One of her projects will be the parking situation at STI. There are 60 acres of unimproved land that the school owns, which will be converted into two parking lots this summer. Another platform was to make Southern Tech more visible in the community and make more people aware of what the school has to offer. One of her pet projects right now is to win the right to have alcoholic beverages served in the student center for

private parties, a move that she feels would encourage more groups to use the on-campus facilities for parties and receptions.

The stickiest problem that Southern Tech faces is its relationship with Georgia Tech, she says. To help straighten out and get more information about separating the two schools totally, she wants to see a Regents' Study Committee formed that would include faculty, staff, and students from both institutions and some

"unbiased" members from the local community.

Barbara has a busy year ahead of her but the students (what little of them voted) have put their trust in her to make Southern Tech grow and expand in all areas in the way Tom Samford's administration did so admirably.



Most of all a Southern Tech student serves on a core, s/he knows that technology will lay the foundation for our next decade."



Either a loved one or our own. But life must go on. Yes, we've come a long way to reach maturity and still have a ways to go, but I'm sure we can succeed.


When the wind does blow, we'll make sure it carries memories of our lives, and success, and care, and love we've left behind.



With the warm weather, people move outdoors. In place of pool comes the tossing of the frisbee, softball or just lying in the sun.



The First Annual LOG Award Presented to Robert Azar






During the years that I have spent on this publication, I have come to realize much about the Southern Tech student and the various other people who make up this college campus.


