




### CLOSING




### Did You Know?

The Center was made possible through the unprecedented cooperation of the private and public sectors. The Georgia Governor's Research Consortium provided \$1.6 million for the physical plant. hat a surprise many students received this fall when they returned to college to find the recently installed parking meters. The locations of the meters are in preferred parking areas only. Chief Howard of the Southern Tech campus security answered many questions for the LOG staff. The parking meters were bought in 1985 and have been in storage pending an important MARTA zoning decision. Until this year, campus planners did not know if MARTA was going to have a stop inside the campus. For whatever reason, MARTA did not come onto the campus and the original positions for the meters became open again. Besides earning extra revenue to help develop campus security programs,




### HOT • SPOTS

American Pie: The place with the general wild party atmosphere and boasts the Busiest bar in Georgia award. Famous for: Upside down drinks.




Things the new President will need to do:

Get Global: Concentrate on foreign issues and economics and their effect on the U.S. economy. If foreign investors get scared away from the nation, the value of the dollar could go down even more and interest rates would shoot straight up. This could cause another Wall Street panic.

Survive the budget wars: The President must act on the budget deficit, taking charge quickly to reassure the financial markets. Bush only has two weeks after he is sworn into office to submit a fiscal 1990 budget to Congress and if he fails, Congress, by law, can start cutting important programs across the board including defense and education.

Defend the Pentagon: The President should also protect the defense budget and cut certain weapons systems so that other, more important systems can survive. At the same time, however, Bush does not need to let our adversaries think that we will not be able to keep expanding our defense or else the arms treaty will be useless.

Bail out the financial system: The sorry state of U.S. savings institutions will cost between \$50 and \$100 billion dollars to fix. Every month the problem isn't resolved, the debt increases 1 billion dollars.


Develop social programs: At a time of low inflation and unemployment, the President should try to help the remaining underclass and struggling working class. Bush could use Dukakis's plan of federal incentives for those who invest in their childrens college by setting up accounts to hold the money.

Consider the nation's health: The high cost of MediCare is a problem that grows with the size of the elderly population and becomes even more pressing with the development of new technologies to prolong human life.



Democratic candidate Michael Dukakis with running mate Lloyd Bentson was not successful in the November 6th election. The following information was taken in part or whole with credit to U.S. News & World Report: Oct. 17 88 and TIME: Oct. 3 88. Dukakis got behind in the debate when he let George Bush portray him as a liberal. Dukakis supported poor children who wanted a

John Sasso was Michael Dukakis's handler. He helped him arrange speeches and coordinated his affairs. In order to help the government gain revenue, Dukakis was prepared to crackdown on tax cheats.

In the end, Dukakis went to the American public on T.V. commercials, hoping it would give the much needed strength to his campaign. It was too late. The Dukakis/Bentson team will have to try again in 1992.

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
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


# Street Dance, USA "1988"

alive. The students noticed and made comments such as "I have never heard a band without a drummer..." The students tried to dance to the music, but the overall crowd was unhappy with the sound.







Percent of Students using Auxiliary Financial Aid 87-88









### Games People Play



Other students choose to people play,








Third place went to Ed Jordan, Miller tub #15, which unfortunately had a few electrical problems during the race . . .




and women drivers who have a legal tub to race.



Bending and stretching ex-





They engaged in the usual cheering and jeering to encourage their team.


Southern Tech's lack of cheerleaders was made up by the North Cobb 8th grade cheerleaders who did an excellent job throughout the game.

good things must come to an end. Freshmen begin their


college careers and the rest of us keep moving up.

Street Dance '89 brought out the "Wild Thing" in everybody who participated. The combination of music and dancing, it was good to reunite with friends.




# OCTOBER

#### **AET: Architectural Engineering Technology**

The primary objective of the Architectural Engineering Technology program is to train students for useful careers in the housing and light construction industry. To this end, courses are offered in the architectural drawing, wood construction, wood structures, and dwelling house design.

As far as developing the students' future careers, the Architectural Engineering Technology program is also concerned with the application of proven techniques as practiced by the architectural, construction, and engineering professions. The objective, here, is to train students in three major areas: architecture, structural design, and construction. The emphasis is on the development of working drawings, rather than design, in the area of architecture. The most common types of structural design and the methods used in practice to analyze a structure are taught. Training in building construction covers materials, methods, and estimating. The overall goal of the program is to make courses as practical as possible from the standpoint of current practice in architecture and construction.



#### **CET: Civil Engineering Technology**

Civil Engineering Technology is a broad field producing technologists with versatile backgrounds in a number of subject areas. Southern Tech graduates of the CET program have the qualifications to enter a career in construction, structural design, surveying, transportation, hydraulics, site planning, and environmental technologies. By taking one of the prescribed sequences of courses, a student can specialize in Surveying, Construction, or Structures.





#### **ApET: Apparel Engineering Technology**

The apparel industry is one of the largest and most basic industries in the United Sates. It provides one of man's most basic and continuing needs — clothing.

From the receipt of raw materials to the shipment of the finished product, the apparel industry offers a creative and challenging career. Opportunities for qualified people to move eventually into executive-level positions are excellent.

Apparel Engineering Technology is designed to train students in all major functional areas of apparel manufacturing.


Construction education is defined by the Associated Schools of Construction as a "... discipline which is designed to instill in future constructors the skills, knowledge and understanding necessary to make the critical decisions which will guide the production and the management processes of the largest industry in the United States. In the major, the traditional areas of the business, engineering, and architecture are combined with specialized courses in construction.

The Construction Administration program provides a broad range of studies in construction related courses as well as general education. The subjects are taught so as to instill skills as well as knowledge. The intent is to create a professional who works well in team situations, and the course work is frequently done on the case or project method, so as to simulate the working environment as much as possible.

#### **CpET: Computer Engineering Technology**

The development of the microcomputer has developed the need for engineering technologists with a specialized knowledge of computer and control systems. The CpET program was created to meet this need.


The emphasis of the program is on the micro-computers and their application to the solution of industrial problems relating to robotics, control, instrumentation, monitoring, and data communications.




#### **EET: Electrical Engineering Technology**

Electrical Engineering Technology is a branch of engineering education that emphasizes the practical aspects of engineering rather than abstract concepts or theories. It is a blend of the application of science, engineering, knowledge, and technical skills used in support of engineering activities.

Electronics is a relatively new science, but it has given birth to a industrial giant. Computers, medical electronics, automation, communications, instrumentation, radar, and robotics are but a few fields based on electronics.







#### **IET: Industrial Engineering Technology**

The field of Industrial Engineering Technology offers the student a challenging career in business, industry, or government. Industrial Engineering Technologist deal primarily with the efficient management of money, materials, and manpower in a business environment. They solve problems dealing with the location and layout of plant facilities, materials, handling, work-station design, wage and salary payment plans, quality control, personal selection and placement, occupational safety and health, and economic cost studies.



#### MET: Mechanical Engineering Technology

Mechanical Engineering Technology is concerned with the practical aspects of the following: generation, transmissions, and applicators of heat and other forms of mechanical energy; the design of tools and machines; and manufacturing processes and techniques.



#### **TET: Textile Engineering Technology**

Students in Textile Engineering Technology are trained in three areas common to all Southern Tech engineering technologists. These are communications, basic sciences, and supervision.

In the fourth area, Textiles, the student is given a broad program of courses in textile manufacturing.


## HORNETS
