The classes that we take right now in 10, 15 or 20 years may not seem important in whatever career that we choose but to us they are important right now.



























Life Vs. Sct

Student Center Dedication




SAC






Joe Mack Wilson demonstrated through his many years of public service, that a man's greatest rewards come when he has given his all to help those who are not as privileged as others.















Once we finished with the core classes and started getting more involved in our major classes, we learned that it was not as smooth as we once thought. But, we kept on going until we reaced our goal.



















Southern Tech, A Freshman's Point Of View

Starting college is a tough transition for most students. First, the student must decide what major they will be pursuing. Secondly, they must set up a class schedule. In the "D" Academic Building there is an Arts & Science department, where students can go to get advice on different majors. Also, students are allowed to visit any of the departments at Southern Tech to find out more about various majors/minors. If a freshmen is having a tough time finding something at or around campus, they can ask at the Student Center's Information Booth.

As a freshman this fall '93 I have chosen to become involved in various clubs around campus. A few of these are the Sting, Log, Student Government, and Alpha Delta Pi. Joining clubs/organizations helps freshmen adjust easier to a new surrounding. College students come from many different cities, states, and countries.

Class Schedules, Absence Policies, and Bookstore/Library/Lunchroom hours were among the top concerns of students. Many freshmen have become frustrated with registering for classes when they have to register last and have to take the left over classes. A common question asked on campus "Why are teachers so strict on attendence?" Recent Highschool graduates have to get used to not being allowed to miss more than five days in a class. In high-school, a student could miss twenty days and not be penalized. Most freshmen practically died when they found out that the Library closes before midnight. Students, who moved into the dorms, about died when they discovered that the Cafeteria is not opened on weekends. There are many small details students worry about, but at least there are not any severe ones.

Student activities are essential to keeping currently enrolled students from feeling homesick. After getting into the groove of classes, I decided to explore the extracurricular activities of Southern Tech. I had read the Sting a few times and decided to join the newspaper staff. Cheshier Addresses SGA On Fee Increase

President Cheshier attended the July 6, 1993 Student Government Association meeting and accepted responsibility for not warning students that the fee increase to pay for the indoor recreation complex would begin this quarter. He also gave a complete explanation about why the fee increase was necessary now, and not when the building actually opened, as was originally promised.

According to President Cheshier, the original plan was for the Southern Tech Foundation to borrow the money to pay for the

building. They could then use the \$1 million that Southern tech had already raised by donations from the community to make the yearly payments due on the loan until the facility opened. The student fee increase would go then into effect to make the payments.

Then new Vice Chancellors for both Fiscal Affairs and Facilities were hired by the University System. who urged that Southern Tech instead get approval from the Georgia Legislature to make this a "payback" program. This would mean that construction would be guaranteed with bonds sold by Georgia while

securing a lower interest rate to pay for the project. The plan at this time was still to use the previously collected \$1 million to make the \$240 thousand yearly payments to the state until the rec facility opened.

After a tremendous effort, the Legislature did approve the project in late March, during the final days of their session. Unfortunately, once consent was given, it was discovered that the two new Vice Chancellors were mistaken about exactly how a " pay-back" project worked.

With Legislative approval, the project was turned over to the Georgia State Fi-

nancing and Investment Commission, who is responsible for selling the construction bonds. The GSFIC requires that all money to pay

for a project be turned over to them before they will do anything on a project. So the \$1 million had to be turned over to them immediately.

At 3:37 AM on Saturday, January 24, 1994, a person who was not attending Southern Tech tried to enter the Female Floor of the Howell Hall dormitory.

Resident Assistant David Mediate and Resident Director John Stevens were returning to their rooms after supper when while entering the building, a suspicious person entered after them before the door could close.

Mediate questioned the person as to whether he was a resident of the building. The person said that he was a resident and produced a key that

resembled a dorm room key.

Mediate allowed the persontocontinue, but he followed him to see where he was going. Mediate observed the person walk into a second floor bathroom and overheard him ask another student where the girls floor was. Mediate then asked the man to prove that he was a student.

When the person failed to cooperate, Mediate asked the person to leave the building. Mediate the called campus safety to report a strange person in the dorm.

Between the time Mediate called and campus safety arrived, the person re-entered the building and attacked him.

Both Mediate and the assailant fell down a flight of stairs during the fight. Mediate suffered scrapes on his back, a black eye, and a knee injury where he had been kicked.

Sergeant George Scott arrived after the incident, and told the person in question, Jason C. Reynolds, that if he returned he would be arrested for criminal trespass.

When asked for a comment on the incident, Leigh Boros, a female resident of Norton Hall, said "They should have a check-in counter," but that the doors to the girls' floor should be open from noon to six o' clock due to the number of students who study together.

Plant Ops Responds To Editorial

The replenishment of soap in the restrooms remains a problem that Mr. Welch is addressing. He admits that sometimes the soap is not replaced in a timely manner and that he is working on correcting the problem.

Crime Wave Sweeps Student Center

On Friday, January 28, 1994, two members of the Campus Activity Board (CAB), were shopping for Casino Night gifts with what they believed was a \$1000 cash advance from the bank. However, it was later found that \$300 was missing.

In an interview with Russ Bagwell, one of the CAB members responsible for buying gifts for Casino Night, Mr. Bagwell stated that he and another member of CAB were to pick up the money at 2:00 PM from the Student Activities office and then go buy the gifts. According to him, once the money was handed over to him in the envelope, he put it in his jacket pocket and never touched the money until it was time to pay for the gifts. It was quite a shock for them to realize that they did not have enough money to pay for the merchandise. Mr. Bagwell then stated that he immediately called Ms. Hewitt and informed her that \$300 was missing.

In an interview on Thursday, February 3, Barry Birckhead, Director of Student Activities, and Vicki Langston, Section Supervi-

sor, described what happened on the 28th of January. According to them, former Program Advisor, Kelly Hewitt, went to the bank to pick up the \$1000. After counting it again to make sure it was all there, Ms. Hewitt then brought the money to Mr. Birckhead and Ms. Langston who then placed it in the safe in the Student Activities office. Then the money was taken out of the safe and transferred to Ms. Langston's desk, where it was locked. The money was to be picked

up by the two CAB members at 12:00 PM, before the office staff left for lunch. However, the two CAB members did not show up. Making sure the money was safely locked in Ms. Langston's desk, they went out to lunch. Upon returning to the office, Mr. Birckhead and Ms. Hewitt took the money out of the locked desk. Mr. Birckhead stated that when he fanned out the money to look at it, that it did not look like \$1000, however, he thought that maybe some of the bills were stuck

together. Thinking that nothing was amiss, Mr. Birckhead and Ms. Hewitt have the money to the two CAB members.

This was not the only money that was taken from the Student Center. On Monday, January 31, 1994, \$122 was taken out of Ms. Langston's locked desk. The money was the Thursday and Friday receipts from the recreation room. Forty dollars of Rec Room money was taken from the student center information desk that week, also.

Students Sponsor Teacher Evaluations

The Sting and the Student Government Association are once again sponsoring teacher evaluations. The purpose of the teacher evaluation is to give all students the opportunity to hear the opinions of other students regarding professors in their field of study.

In a recent interview with SGA President Scott Wages, and Editor-In Chief of *The Sting*, Jennifer Waller (who also heads the public relations committee in SGA), Miss Waller stated that the idea for teacher evaluations came about out of one professor's comment about the need for a student-funded teacher evaluation. After getting support for this idea from SGA, Jennifer Waller and then-SGA-Vice-President Scott Wages worked diligently at getting the first teacher evaluation printed. The evaluations are based on a model that Emory University has printed up for students.

SGA council member, Beth Meeker, expressed concerns that many of the faculty in her Total Quality Management (TQM) class had over the fairness of student-funded teacher evaluations. The major concern of the faculty, according to Ms. Meeker, had to do with students' giving professors a bad rating just because they did not do well in the course.

SGA President Scott Wages' answer to council member Meeker was to say that the faculty concerns would be taken into consideration and that a new version of the form would be printed; however, that these evaluations are made by students and only for student use.

When interviewed at a later date, Mr. Wages and Miss Waller were asked to go into greater detail about the concerns of the faculty against students giving bad evaluations.

Mr. Wages again stated that the evaluations were not being done to demean or degrade the faculty in any way. He then went on to say that if the faculty felt threatened in any way, maybe they have something to worry about. However, professors who are doing a good job do not have anything to worry about.

A total of 178 Georgia students attending Life College have racked up \$9,830,478.23 in bad HEAL loans. That puts them up there with Brazil and Iraq, and Life wasn't required to release any hostages. Who was in charge of financial aid, Christopher Drogoul?

That's what is wrong with this country, borrow-

ing money from the government and being expected to pay it back (Kenneth L. Hundley, Dallas, \$127,845.41). Seriously, we forgive loans to other nations, we've let countries nationalize private U.S. companies, and we've looked the other way when human rights abuses might interfere with a profit. The least we can do is forgive a few hapless souls who wished to pursue a pseudodegree in back rubs (John Duker. Smyrna. \$104,406.08).

And what to make of Wayne W. Rice of Marietta defaulting on \$610.52? Should we assume he took out a large loan and has made a conscientious effort t pay it back, or should we laugh at his diminutive effort while his classmates were walking off with the treasury (Roseann Spears, Marietta, \$98,023.56)?

Every quarter, students taking over six hours pay their student activities fee, a thirty dollar fee that is stated in the Student Handbook as being used " ... in direct support of the various student activity programs of the college including the operation of the student center, the recreational sports program, the campus radio station, the student newspaper, the student yearbook, and various activities of the Campus Activities Board including dances, movies, concerts and other entertainment programs." The purpose of the student activities fee is clearly spelled out. The money is to go toward student activity programs. Some proposals have been made, however, to use the

money to support other services on campus.

A request has been brought to the attention of the Student Government that some of the money that students pay to fund the many different student activities be used to extend the library and computer hours that fall far short of what students need and deserve. At first thought, this idea seems like what could possibly be a good solution to an existing problem. But on the other hand, when you actually takes a few minutes to consider exactly what this type of suggestion could do the school, you can plainly see the problems that will be caused if this idea is implemented.

I know that most students agree that the current hours of the library are not

sufficient to accommodate students (see Bill's editorial). This problem was magnified a few quarters ago when the library hours were cut. For some reason, the school couldn't seem to find enough money in its \$20.4 million budget to keep the library open during the hours that the students desire. Now, what makes anyone think that the students should have to pay for these extra hours from the relatively puny \$300,000 that we pay for leadership skills training, entertainment, and plenty of resume fodder?

Some council members raised quite a strong objection in the last Student Government meeting when the idea of our (meaning "student's") money funding outside departments was raised, since this is not the purpose of the student activities fee. This will obviously be setting a bad precedence for the use of the fee, since using the money for the wrong purpose will create an all-new wave of "Hey! If the students want [fill in your favorite service here] let them pay for it!" Robbing student-funded, student-run organizations of their money is not the answer to this problem.

We don't need to start the habit of tucking our tails between our legs and reaching for the Student Activities wallet anytime we are deprived of what we, the customers of Southern Tech, deserve. The outside departments will not be "ashamed of themselves" or "embarrassed" at the idea of students paying for the extra hours. Like anyone else, they would be overjoyed by the thought of getting extra money after not putting what they were originally granted to its best use.

Since hindsight is almost always 20/20, when the library hours were originally cut, the Student Government members should have sent a loud, demanding, "OH NO YOU AREN'T!" to the offending parties. But it's too late for that now. We have to demand that the hours be extended. We must not pay for additional hours for other departments with Student Activities fees, since that would be making the mistake of being too passive again.





SECOND WOMAN APPOINTED TO SUPREME COURT







TECHFEST also attracted technology from the surrounding area. Many local and national companies brought displays.


TECHFEST gives the Southern Tech campus the opportunity to introduce the surrounding area to the latest trends in sophisticated technology.





TECHFEST was a good way for campus organizations to earn money by selling chicken, hotdogs, and baked goods.




The International Festival was also being hosted the Joe Mack Wilson Student Center Ballroom. Offered along with the International Student Association was a luncheon buffet and international entertainment.



The Hornet Basketball team enjoyed great success in the 1993-1994 campaign once again making it to the second round of the playoffs and for the first time in the history of the rivalry defeating Life College 70-63.

The Hornets led off the season with a resounding 93-39 victory versus Allen University to start off the home season. After losing on the road to Montevallo University 50-62, the Hornets returned home and defeated Allen University by the score of 72-51 and won the seasons second meeting against Montevallo 77-54. The Hornets took the opener in the Hornet Classic against Nova 72-65 and lost in the championship game by the heartbreaking score of 71-72.

The Hornets hit a bit of a rough spot losing three of their next four games. The Hornets lost to Tennessee Temple by a score of 57-66. Next the Hornets were defeated by Kennesaw State 46-52, and Selma in the second round of the Faulkner Invitational to end the month of November, but they picked up the pace in December defeating Tennessee Temple 79-55, Selma University 65-46, Tennessee Wesleyan 81-56 and North Georgia College 52-45 to give the Hornets their first Conference win of the season.

The Conference schedule was brutal in the Hornets new district. Southern Tech was defeated by Brewton-Parker 48-54 and Clayton State 51-66 before they earned their second conference win of the season against Berry College 68-65. The Hornets lost to LaGrange on the road 72-73 before defeating Shorter 78-63. Georgia Southwestern was next for the Hornets. The Hornets emerged victorious 77-70 before moving on to defeat Piedmont 75-63 before losing to North Georgia on the road 56-57.


Then the second game of the season versus Life came where the Hornets won for the first time ever in front of a very enthusiastic crowd 70-63. Following that victory the Hornets travelled to LaGrange winning by a score of 98-76. Brewton-Parker was next up for the Hornets. The Hornets handily defeated them 66-49. This put the Hornets at 7-4 in the conference just weeks away from the playoffs. The Hornets beat Piedmont 79-69 before returning home to face off against Clayton State in a losing cause 68-83.

A narrow victory against Shorter 55-53 upped the Hornets conference record to 9-5. Consecutive losses to Kennesaw 59-64 and Georgia Southwestern 51-63 slowed some of the momentum the Hornets had before winning their final regular season game over Berry 67-66. The Hornets finished the regular season with a respectable 19-13 record overall with a 10-6 record against conference opponents.


In the first round of the playoffs the Hornets defeated LaGrange 61-60. The Hornets season ended in the second round against GA Southwestern 62-78.

































NATIONAL SOCIETY OF BLACK ENGINEERS

GAMMA PHI BETA
















International Student Association
















Institute Of Industrial Engineers


The Institute for Industrial Engineers (IIE) student chapter is an exciting way for students to learn about their profession.









Log
