
S.A.E. Race Car Competition

The Formula SAE competition is for engineering students to conceive, design, fabricate and compete with small formula style racing cars. Restrictions on the vehicles chassis and engines are limited so that the knowledge, creativity and imagination of the students are challenged. The cars are built over a period of approximately one year and taken to Detroit, Michigan to compete with approximately 80 other competition teams from across North America.

This year's Southern Poly Formula SAE team, competing against 77 other college and university teams, finished 14th overall.









The competition is divided into two broad categories: Static Events and Dynamic Events. The Static Events include a Cost Analysis of the race car for production purposes, a Presentation Event where the students must sell their car to a potential customer, and the Design Judging where the design team must justify the myriad of decisions made in the production of their race car. The Dynamic Events include a Skid Pad test where the vehicle's lateral acceleration is computed, an Acceleration test where the race car's acceleration is timed over a 100 vard course, the Autocross where the car is timed around a series of pylons placed around one of the large parking lots of the Pontiac Silverdome, and finally the Endurance/Fuel Economy event where the vehicles must complete 24 laps around a similar autocross course with a mandatory driver change at half distance.


Southern Poly's SAE team finished 10th overall in the Dynamic Events and 16th in the Design Judging to finish 14th overall out of the 77 teams represented. The top three finishers were: 1 Cornell University, 2 The University of Texas at Arlington, and 3 Rochester Institute of Technology.

The team received two special recognitions: an award from the Transportation Research Center for Safety/Crashworthiness and an award for being one of only 22 vehicles that successfully completed all of the events.

A.S.C.E. Bridge Competition





Each year the American Institute for Steel Construction holds the National Steel Bridge Building competition. Engineering and Engineering Technology universities from across the country are invited to compete to be the best. Only the first and second place winners from each region are invited to compete in the national competition. After many months of preparation, the Southern Polytechnic State University Steel Bridge Team was ready for battle. The scene of the battle was at California Polytechnic State University in Pomona, California. Among the enemy were well known and respected engineering universities. However, after the regional competitions, it was already known that the University of Florida was the team to beat.

Each bridge at the competition is ranked in the following categories: Construction Speed, Stiffness, Economy, and Efficiency. The champions are determined by adding up the rankings for each contest; the lowest score winning.


Upon arrival, each team draws a starting position; which determines the order in which the teams are to construct and load their bridges. The







construction and loading is overseen by a panel of judges that keeps each team abiding by the rules.


Southern Poly drew fourth in the order to construct their bridge. This is sometimes bad because the first few teams allow the judges to build a rhythm and determine what is exactly legal. While constructing their bridge in what is believed to be their fastest pace ever, the judge stopped Southern Poly's construction for laying web members across the deck. This procedure was perfectly legal and was not considered a safety

hazard, therefore they should not have been stopped. This considerably affected their construction time. although they drew no penalties. As the day progressed they found themselves tied for first place. After protesting to the head judge, they were to reconstruct their bridge. At this point they had to make a decision. If they could beat 2 min. and 20 sec., they would have first place. If they got a penalty they could fall below second place. Southern Poly has been second in the nation in the past and had worked too hard to settle for second this time around. As a team they decided to go for the gold, especially since it was their arch rival the University of Florida who was tied with them for first place.

Like a father who had just watched his son hit his first home run, Professor Orlandella stood proud and in full agreement with the decision they had made.










After they had rebuilt the bridge, Professor Orandella looked like he had gotten coal for Christmas. Southern Poly got a penalty for stepping in the river, knocking their overall position back to fourth place. A gamble for first they had taken; a gamble they had lost. If you ask "Would they do it again?" the steel bridge team would have to say "Absolutely!". The decision they made was that of courage and competitiveness, that of champions. They left no doubt that they meant business and that they would settle for nothing less than the gold. Their supporters deserve nothing

less. It was a very pressure packed and exciting situation, the team can only apologize for blowing it. However, they do not apologize for going for it. Next year, with hard work and the little bit of luck, the gold will come back to the Southern Poly Steel Bridge Team for the students, faculty, and all of their supporters, and we can all relish in victory.














Funded primarily by the Southern Polytechnic Foundation, TECHFEST has developed into an event that draws thousands of people of all ages from throughout the state






These winners came closest to solving the murder mystery.

In six games, the Atlanta Braves defeated the Cleveland Indians for the 1995 World Series title. Braves pitcher Tom Glavine was named the Series MVP.










Israeli Prime Minister Yitzhak Rabin was assassinated in October by a Jewish extremist. In the square where the assassination took place, thousands paid homage to the slain leader.

Nearly a million African-American men gathered in Washington, D.C., for the Million Man March, a call for "atonement and reconciliation."

Citing the stress brought on by two and a half years of legal battles, Shannon Faulkner left the Citadel after only five days. Faulkner, who had fought to be the first woman admitted to the all-male military school, spent most of her first week in the infirmary, suffering from heat exhaustion.

Retired Gen. Colin Powell toured to support his book, *My American Journey*, while the country wondered if he would make the run for the presidency in 1996. Powell announced in November that he would not run at this time, but did not rule out any future political endeavors.



broke Lou Gehrig's record of 2,130 consecutive games played. Many looked at Ripken's streak as an antidote for fans who were disgruntled by the recent baseball strike.

U.S. gymnast Kerri Strug epitomized the Olympic spirit for many. After falling on her first vault in the women's team competition and injuring her ankle, and unsure whether her score was needed to capture a gold medal for the U.S. team, Strug landed her second vault. The U.S. won a total of 101 medals.

Perhaps the best-kept secret of the year

was the September wedding of John F. Kennedy, Jr., and Carolyn Bessette. Only 40 guests were invited to the intimate ceremony on Cumberland Island, Ga., and everyone involved signed an agreement of confidentiality. The couple's return to New York thrust them back in the spotlight, and tabloid reports of marital strain soon followed.





Rap artist Tupac Shakur was killed in a drive-by shooting in Las Vegas in September. Shakur, whose violent "gangsta" image was reflected in both his life and music, was 25.



The New York Yankees returned to the ranks of baseball's elite when they defeated the Atlanta Braves in the World Series, four games to two. It was the Yankees' first World Series appearance in 18 years, and the 23rd championship won by the team.



The Hornets finished the conference schedule with a record of 8-6. They finished second to conference champs Georgia Southwestern. The Hornets played hard and fought for every win.



Baseball

The Southern Poly Baseball team had a great 1996-97 season. The team finished with a 31-11 regular season record and qualified for the District 25 G.A.C. playoffs as the second seed. The Hornets played consistent baseball all year.

Southern Poly finished second in the district playoffs and advanced to the regional playoffs in Homestead, Florida. The Hornets were the number four seed in Homestead and their first opponent was Saint Thomas University. The Hornets played well but lost 10-5. The second and final game for the Hornets saw them play Brewton Parker. Brewton Parker beat Southern Poly for the fifth time this year, the only team to get the best of the Hornets all year.

The Hornets had a balanced team this year. The pitching was good and the hitting jumped to a new level. Randy Black and Jon Arnold led the way on the pitching staff. Randy was 8-3 with five complete games, 86 strikeouts and an ERA of 3.04. Jon came on in the second half of the season with a 5-2 record and four complete games. The pitching staff had an overall ERA of 3.81.

The offense was led by David Carroll. David batted lead-off and hit .424 for the season. The Power of the Hornets attack came from four hitters:Matt Griffin, Trey Hall, Todd Hewett, & Tom Paciorek. Matt batted .368 with 10 homers, Trey hit .354 with 9 homers, Todd hit .341 with 8 homers, & Tom hit .384 with 7 homers.


The Hornets showed they could play defence as well. The team had a fielding percentage of .948. Nine players had percentages better than .900.


















































Aerial Robotics Team




Baptist Student Union

Millions around the world mourned

the tragic death of Princess Diana. who was killed Aug. 31 in Paris during a high-speed car crash. Diana. 36. and her companion. Dodi Faved, were reportedly being chased by photographers who were following them from the Hotel Ritz. Fayed, along with chauffeur Henri Paul, also died when the Mercedes crashed in a tunnel along the Seine River. The news sent shock waves around the world and sparked an international debate about the paparazzi's role in the tragedy. An autopsy later revealed Paul was driving legally drunk.

Although a Cambridge. Mass.. jury found her guilty Oct. 30 of second-degree murder in the February death of infant Matthew Eappen, British au pair Louise Woodward, 19, was sentenced to time served and released by Judge Hiller Zobel. State prosecutors promised an appeal in 1998.







Lambda Chi Alpha

Commanders, MLB manager and the list goes on.



WGHR originally began in 1969 as WSTB, an on-campus-only AM station on 1280, transmitted on a wire loop antenna running from building to building. A few years later, the "Stubby" (as it was nicknamed) applied for and eventually was granted a low-power FM license, one of the last to be issued. Southern Tech Broadcasting gave up the 'STB call sign to an already-licensed station in Ohio, and became WGHR - Green Hornets Radio! The newly-independent college had its own radio station, broadcasting a top-40 format (hey, it wasn't our idea!)

independent college had its own radio station, broadcasting a top-40 format (hey, it wasn't our idea! as well as news. Since then, the station has moved to "alternative rock", and then to a more diverse format representative of the student body. Today's programming includes everything from urban, techno, and punk, to trihop and acidjazz, and the station works to provide the area with the best in noncommercial radio - avoiding the overly-commercial in favor of the more progressive (yet not obscure) styles.

The '96-'97 year was a rough, but relatively, successful one for WGHR - Southern Polytechnic's own radio station, pushing out 16,500 milliwatts on 102.5 FM. It began during the Olympics, with the station broadcasting news and features from over a a dozen countries worldwide during the two-week event, making it the first station in the history of the Games to provide such a service for the host city. (The new Amateur Radio Club played an instrumental role in this, helping the station to resurrect its old satellite receive dish.) Later, WGHR began fall quarter with a new programming format, taking the chaotic scheduling of previous years and organizing it into more regular alternating-weekday formats, and even adding a country music show by student demand. The first week of class ended with a bang! - a fireworks show, with a diverse musical score put together by our staff and broadcasting live on WGHR.

The FM Stations's 15th anniversary was on October 7th - and appropriately, WGHR threw a birthday party for students, complete with cake and ice cream, and the craziest happy birthday song we could find (We declined to replay the first song broadcast on 102.5 in 1981: Barry Manilow's "Looks Like We Made It". Nobody seemed to mind.) Later, after the annual Halloween night show (with appropriate decor in the studio, of course), the station helped organize its first annual holiday food drive; and, after joining forces with the Delta Sigma Theta sorority's perennial food drive and the Campus Activities Board, managed to raise over 60 units of food for those in need.

WGHR also returned to the local sports scene during the year, first by broadcasting Wheeler High School's fall football games. In a unique arrangement, the station worked with Wheeler students taking a mass media studies course at their school, even teaching some of them how to run our on-air console. Come winter quarter, Green Hornet Radio broadcast all of SPSU's home basketball games on Saturday nights, and the Hornets made it all the way to the playoffs as well.


Our last big event was in May, with a very successful Techfest bringing hundreds of visitors to the campus and dozens through the radio station. Our staff manned both the studio and an outdoor remote, answering many questions about WGHR and radio in general, and giving many of our guests their first look inside a real broadcast facility (however short of equipment it may be).

The year ended with a new vision for the station - which after many idle years, finally began to realize its full potential. Even as many students leave for the summer, many of us are hard at work, using our "time off" to keep the momentum going and improve the station even further. The years ahead hold great promise for WGHR and SPSU, and we will not let this incredible opportunity pass us by. The task at hand is enormous, yet not so large that it cannot be achieved by the dedicated people of our organization. The time is now, and the <u>Wave of the Future</u> is on the air!

Word to all the people that helped out WGHR this past year, including the station staff, guest DJ's, our sponsors, and our listeners! Without the support of all these folks, our station would not be possible.
