## **Enrollment for This Fall** Stands at 1,759 Students

Enrollment figures total 1,759 students attending the 1972 fall quarter at Southern Tech. In accounting for an unexpected two percent decrease in enrollment from last fall, a **Charters** statistical breakdown shows that the largest decrease occurred in the number of incoming fresh-

Last fall's freshmen numbered 322 as compared with 252 this fall - a decline of nearly four percent. Although the number of transfers has increased tional fraternity. two percent over last fall's 132, there are significantly fewer students returning this quarter for study beyond their associate de-

Due to a 25 percent rise in the number of admission applications processed this year over last, this fall's enrollment was expected to be nearly 1,960. Although emphasizing STI's 1972 fall quarter enrollment as at a healthy level, Sam Baker, Director of Admissions and Registrar, points out that STI is sharing in a general enrollment slump typical of Georgia's University Sys-

Mr. Baker attributes low enrollments primarily to lessened financial aid made available too late because of slow congressional action this year upon the critical federal financial aid bills. Other plausible explanations for STI's low enrollment this quarter include the following:

The growing tendency of graduating high school seniors to delay college a year or to continue their education at vocational institutions,

- The absence of new draft deferments for college students,

Sigma Pi fraternity on the Southern Tech campus is an extremely active fraternity. Sigma Pi is active in all intramural athletics, community involvement, charity work and school activities. For the past two years Sigma Pi has been awarded the distinction of being the Number 1 organization on the Southern Tech campus.

This accomplishment was achieved through hard work, using the guidelines established by the administration.

Sigma Pi will be the first local fraternity to get an official charter from a national fraternity. Dues for this quarter will be \$65.00, of which \$20.00 will go to the local chapter and \$45.00 will be sent to the Sigma Pi national headquarters in Vincennes, Indiana. Dues for pledges will be \$5.00 higher this quarter than the dues for the brothers. Beginning winter quarter, pledge dues will be \$125.00.

Activities begin early this quarter with a charity football game at Georgia Tech for the M. S. charity drive.

Final arrangements for the new conference were made at a meeting in July at the Continuing Education Building on the University of Georgia campus in Athens.

#### 6-Member Conference

The six-member conference will be made up initially of Augusta College, Armstrong State College, Valdosta State College, West Georgia College, Columbus College and Southern Technical Institute.

Coach Fran Florian says that the teams will compete in basketball, baseball, track, crosscountry, golf and tennis. He says that other sports may be added.

In discussing the new conference, Coach Florian says that he feels that the new conference will help create interest in sports played at the member schools. "We have all worked towards this for a long time and are very pleased with the progress we have made so far," he said. "We also feel that the schools will be competitive."

### 8-Team Limit

Coach Florian also said that they hope to limit the conference to eight teams so that each team can play every other team in the conference every year.

The next meeting of the member schools is scheduled for October 12 in Atlanta, where committees will be organized. The creation of the new conference will have no effect on the games scheduled for this year.

Southern Tech's radio station, operating on an AM frequency of 1280 kHz, has begun operation as a legal carriercurrent station. At the same time, the station is planning an FM station for the Atlanta area.

WSTB serves as a campuswide service organization, supplying the campus with news, sports and weather, plus music of today. Soon to be installed is an Associated Press teletypewriter which will supply up-tothe-minute information. The service was scheduled to be available on October 4.

## Fire Institute Official Resident

The Georgia Fire Institute is now officially in residence at STI. The Institute was originally organized in 1958 for the purpose of bettering fire prevention and control methods. As such, it was included as part of the Industrial Education Department, Engineering Extension Division, at Georgia Tech.

Due to gradual but extensive reorganization of the Engineering Extension Division, the Fire Institute was moved to STI to facilitate the accommodation of proposed additions to the operation of the Fire Institute. In view of its more nearly technical orientation, Southern Tech seemed a likely site for the complete operations of the Fire In-

The Institute functions under the direction of STI's associate dean, Hoyt L. McClure. According to Dean McClure, the financial appropriations and physical specifications have been secured for the building of the necessary classrooms and faculty offices for the Fire Institute.

The site for the classrooms is to be in the area now occupied by the Physical Plant Department. (The construction of a new Physical Plant building is imminent.) The site for the faculty offices is proposed to be an adjunct to the southeast corner of the existing Administration Building. However, it is still unclear as to exactly when actual construction might begin on either site. Both sites are expected to be temporary until further funds are made available,

Also included in the approved plans for additional construction are a fire tower, fire test laboratory, and a lake. These are to be situated in a semi-circular area southwest of the gym parking

With more than 25,000 Lions Clubs in 147 free countries, the Southern Tech Lions Club is a "miniature of Lions International." Eleven countries and five states other than Georgia are represented in the membership.

The Southern Tech Lions carry as much prestige as do Lions in other communities. Any member of the Southern Tech club may transfer his membership to another Lions Club when he leaves the campus. This means that when a student is just out of college and is getting established in a new job and community, he has a ready-made means of joining in community activities.

Southern Tech's Lions Club meets twice each month for a dinner meeting and works to raise funds for worthwhile projects. Members share one advantage that non-members do not have: a foot in the door of any community where they may work after graduation.

The local group is working to lp boost school spirit by ting students and faculty inbers served on the Freshman gineering Technician.

# lent Conduct Code

Following is the student conduct code taken from the revised edition of The Green Hornet. The student handbook was last revised in 1966. Because there are some changes from the earlier edition, it was thought to be advisable to furnish each student with a copy of the new conduct code.

It was prepared by the Committee on Student Regulations. Members of the committee included: Associate Dean Hoyt L. McClure; Registrar and Director of Admissions Sam Baker; Dean of Student Affairs Lewis Van Gorder; Professors Ben C. Sparks and Ralph Youngblood; and Pat Stanley, secretary of the SGA, and Jeff Purdue, president of the student body.

#### I. Academic Irregularity

- 1. No student shall receive or give assistance not authorized by the instructor in the preparation of any essay, laboratory report, examination or other assign ment included in an academic course.
- 2. No student shall take or attempt to take, steal or otherwise procure in an unauthorized manner any material pertaining to the conduct of a class, including but not limited to tests, examinations, laboratory equipment
- 3. No student shall sell, give, lend or otherwise furnish to any unauthorized person material which can be shown to contain the questions or answers to any examinations scheduled to be given at any subsequent date in any course of study offered by the college, without authorization from the instructor.
- 4. Plagiarism is prohibited. Themes, essays, term papers, tests and other similar requirements must be the work of the student submitting them. When direct quotations are used, they must be indicated and when the ideas of another are incorporated in the paper, they must be appropriately acknowledged.

#### II. Alcoholic Beverages

The possession or consumption of alcoholic beverages on college property or at events sponsored or supervised by the college is prohibited.

#### III. Damage to Property

Malicious or unauthorized intentional damage or destruction of property belonging to the college, to a member of the college community, or to a visitor to the campus, is prohibited.

#### IV. Disorderly Assembly

- 1. No student shall assemble on campus for the purpose of creating a riot, or destruction, or disorderly diversion which interferes with the normal operation of the college. This section should not be construed so as to deny any students the right of peaceful, non-disruptive assembly.
- 2. No student or group of students shall obstruct the free movement of other persons about the campus, interfere with the use of college facilities, or materially interfere with the normal operation of the college.
- 3. The abuse or unauthorized use of sound amplification equipment indoors or outdoors during classroom hours is prohibited. (Any use of sound amplification

equipment must be cleared through the Student Affairs Office.)

#### V. Disorderly Conduct

- 1. Disorderly or obscene conduct or breach of the peace on college property or at any function sponsored or supervised by the college or any recognized college' organization is prohibited.
- 2. No student shall push, strike or physically assault any member of the faculty, administration, staff, or student body or any visitor to the campus.
- 3. Conduct on college property, or at functions sponsored or supervised by the college or any recognized college organization, which materially interferes with the normal operation of the college or the requirements of appropriate discipline, is prohibited.
- 4. No student shall enter or attempt to enter any dance, social, athletic or any other event sponsored or supervised by the college or any recognized college organization without credentials for admission, i.e., ticket, identification card, invitation, etc., or in violation of any reasonable qualifications established for attendance. At such college functions a student must present proper credentials to properly identified college faculty and staff upon their request.
- 5. Conduct and/or expressions which are obscene or which are patently offensive to the prevailing standards of an academic community are prohibited.
- 6. No student shall interfere with, or give false names to, or fail to cooperate with any properly identified college faculty, administration, or staff personnel while these persons are in the performance of their duties.

The possession or use (without valid medical or dental prescription), manufacture, furnishing or sale of any narcotic or dangerous drug controlled by federal or Georgia law is prohibited.

#### VII. Falsification of Records

No student shall alter, counterfeit, forge, or cause to be altered, counterfeited, or forged, any record, form or document used by the college.

#### VIII. Explosives

No student shall possess, furnish, sell or use explosives of any kind on college property or at functions sponsored or supervised by the college or any recognized college organization.

### IX. Fire Safety

- 1. No student shall tamper with fire safety equip-
- 2. The unauthorized possession, sale, furnishing or use of any incendiary device is prohibited.
- 3. No student shall set or cause to be set any unauthorized fire in or on college property.
- 4. The possession or use of fireworks on college property or at events sponsored or supervised by the college or any recognized college organization is prohibited. Fireworks are defined as any substance prepared for the purpose of producing a visible or audible effect by com-

#### bustion, explosion or detonation.

5. No student shall make, or cause to be made, a false fire alarm.

#### 'X. Weapons

Students are prohibited from possession of firearms on college property or at events sponsored or supervised by the college or any recognized college organization. The possession or use of any other offensive weapons is prohibited.

#### XI. Hazing

All rites and ceremonies of induction, initiation or orientation into college life or into the life of any college group which tend to occasion or allow physical or mental suffering are prohibited.

#### XII. Joint Responsibility for Infractions

Students who knowingly act in concert to violate college regulations have individual and joint responsibility for such violation and such concerted acts are prohi-

#### XIII. Student Identification Cards

- 1. Lending, selling or otherwise transferring a student identification card is prohibited.
- 2. The use of a student identification card by anyone other than its original holder is prohibited.

- 1. No student shall sell a testbook not his own without written permission of the owner.
- 2. No student shall take, attempt to take, or keep in his possession items of college property, or items belonging to students, faculty, staff, student groups or visitors to the campus without proper authorization.

### XV. Unauthorized Entry or Use

#### of College Facilities

- 1. No student shall make unauthorized entry into any college building, office or other facility, nor shall any person remain without authorization in any building after normal closing hours.
- 2. No student shall make unauthorized use of any college facility.

#### XVI. Gambling

The playing of cards or any other game of skill or chance for money or other items of value is prohibited.

#### XVII. Repeated Violations

Repeated violations of published rules or regulations of the college, which cumulatively indicate an unwillingness or inability to conform to the standards of the college for student life, are prohibited.

#### XVIII. Violation of Outside Law

Violation of local, state or federal law, on or off the campus, which violative act constitutes a clear and present danger of material interference with the normal, orderly operation and processes of the college, or with the requirements of appropriate discipline, is prohibited.
