

Advanced Registration Taps 1,159

A total of 1,159 students participated in advanced registration for the winter quarter. This number represents 68 percent of the fall quarter enrollment.

Based on the advanced registration figures, a final schedule showing cancelled classes is available in the Registrar's office. Professor Richard Denning, who is head of the advanced registration, says students should check their schedules against this final schedule. If any changes are necessary, they can be made on registration day, January 3.

Those students whose advanced registration schedules require no changes may pay fees during exam week at the Registrar's office and thereby delay returning to the campus until January 4.

Those students who need no schedule changes and who wish to pay on registration day must report to the gym between 9:30 and 10:30 a.m. (or 5:30 to 7:00 p.m.) to receive fee cards.

Students who need to make changes in their advanced registration schedules must report to the gym between 10:30 and 11:30 a.m. on January 3.

Seniors who have petitioned to be graduated at the end of the winter quarter should report to the gym from 9:00 to 9:30 a.m. on January 3. Freshmen and transfer students report according to instructions sent by the Director of Admissions and the Registrar.

Returning students who did not participate in advanced registration must report to the gym at 1:30 p.m. or from 5:30 to 7:00 p.m. on registration day. Late fees apply beginning on January 4.

The Sigma Pi colony (formerly Sigma Delta Phi local), formed in April of 1972, became the first chapter of a national social fraternity to enter Southern Tech.

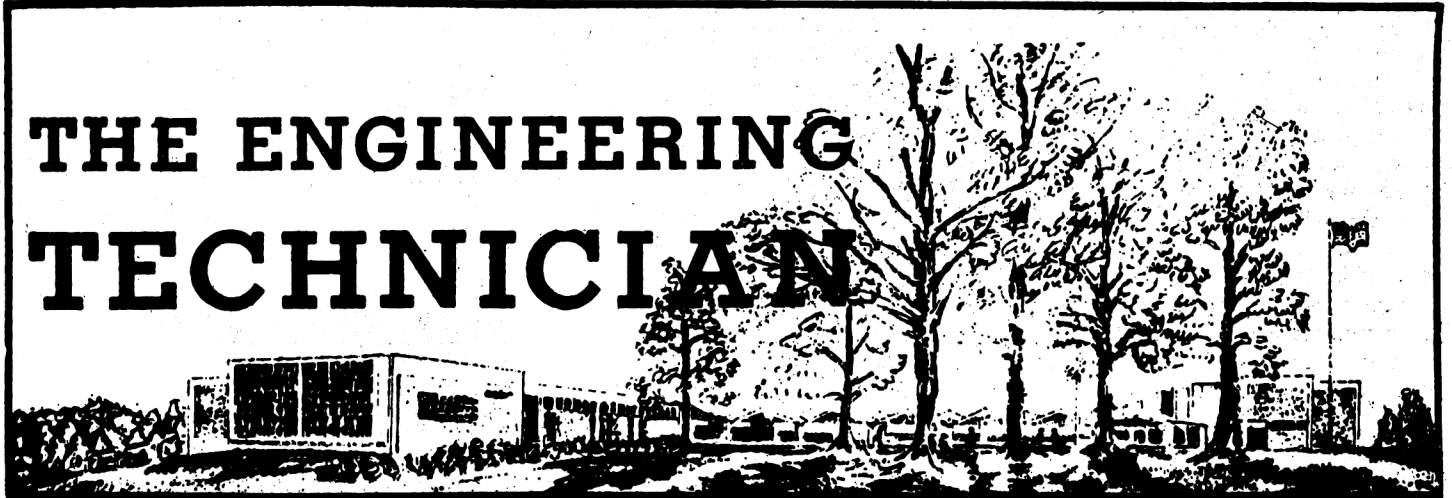

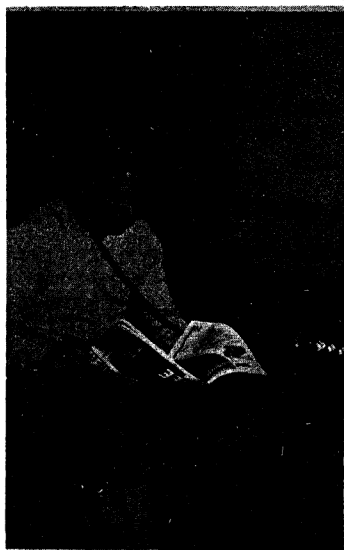

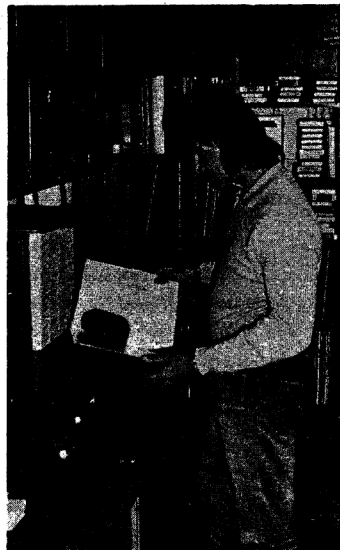

Self-Paced Plan Courses Added

Professor Harry Schenk, head of the Physics and Chemistry Department, says that the "self-paced" study program will be extended to all required physics and chemistry courses beginning next quarter.

Started in the spring of this year with Physical Science 10, the program was extended to 111 in the summer. This quarter, 112, 201, and 202 were added. Next quarter will include Physics 203 and Chemistry 201.

"We are very pleased with the program, so far," Professor Schenk said. In explaining the program, he pointed out that a few changes have been made from the original method, but they are only minor.

In the conventional teaching approach, he went on to say, the instructor aims at the level and pace of the average student.

"The superior student is apt to be bored," Professor Schenk said. "He certainly is not helped in gaining knowledge beyond that designed for the ability of the average student. The slow student," he continued, "is really discriminated against. He finds that he cannot keep up and soon realizes that falling behind usually results in failure in a course such as physical science."

In the self-paced program, the student proceeds at his own pace. Courses are not scheduled for regular hours but are offered on an "open room" basis. Two rooms will be used. Room 206 will be open throughout the school day (except Wednesday) with a variety of materials available to the students for working on their individual assignments. An instructor will also be on hand to answer any questions a student might have concerning a whole unit of work or a particular problem. The room will also be open two nights a week.

The other room (205) will be used for taking quizzes when the students are ready.

Details of the program are explained, as follows:

The minimum amount of material to be covered is divided into units. These units must be covered in order. The assignments will include readings in the textbook, problems, and other materials to assist the student in learning the required subject matter. If the student runs into a snag, the instructor will be available to help as already mentioned.

When the student feels that he has mastered the subject matter of a particular unit, he may take a quiz on that unit. The quiz procedure is as follows:

1. Quizzes will be graded immediately on a "pass" or "fail" basis (80%).
2. If the student passes the quiz, he may go on to the next unit.
3. If the student fails, it does not count against him. As soon as he feels that he is ready to take another quiz over the same material, he may do so. The student may make as many attempts as necessary to pass a unit's quiz.

When the student has passed the quizzes on all required units and all required lab work, he will have earned a minimum course grade of "C." At that point, the student may take his "C" and retire from the course.

If he wishes to raise the grade to an "A" or a "B," he must take a final examination which covers all the material on the basic units. The final examination may be taken as soon as the student completes the basic units. Poor performance on the final quiz cannot lower a student's "C."

Laboratories also will be on an unscheduled basis. The labs will be open at announced hours; they will be staffed so that the student can check out the necessary equipment and perform any experiments required. Here too, instructors will be available for help.

The student may proceed at his own rate, doing as many experiments in each day as he can. Lab reports will be graded whenever the student presents them to the lab instructor. The reports will also be graded on a "pass" or "fail" basis. It is required that all assigned experiments be performed satisfactorily before the end of the quarter during which the student completes the basic units. If lab work is incomplete the course grade will be lowered by one letter grade.

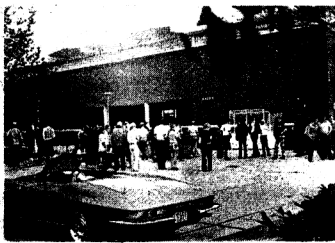
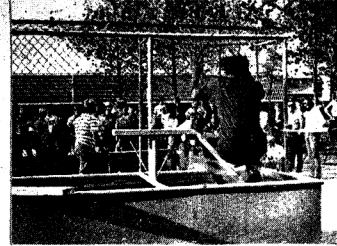
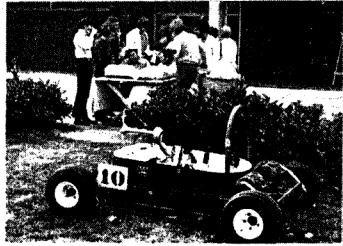
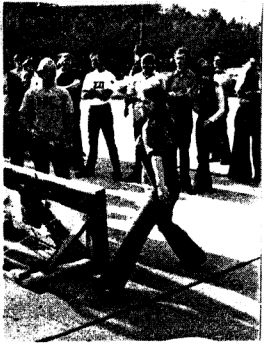
If a student does not complete the required units during the quarter, he will receive an "incomplete." The "I" can be converted to a "C" if the student completes the work during the next quarter. An "I" cannot be converted into an "A" or a "B." If an "I" is not removed during the next quarter, it automatically becomes an "F."

If a student completes a self-paced course during the quarter, he may start on his next scheduled course at that time. He must register for this second course at the beginning of his next quarter in school.

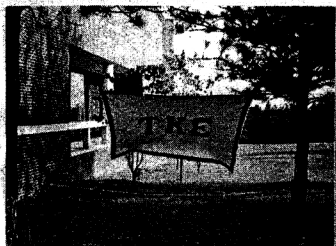
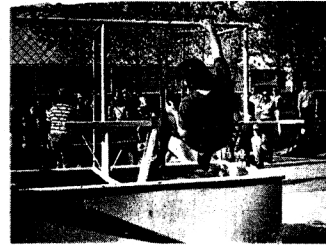
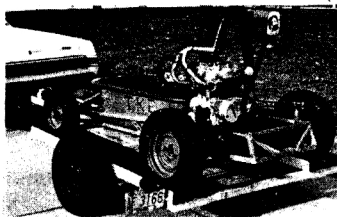
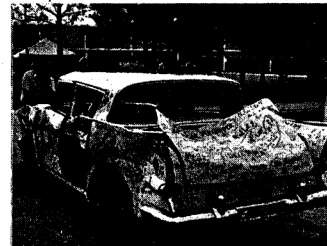
Professor Schenk emphasized that the student must register his next quarter. "No credit can be given except in the quarter in which a student is registered," he said.

If a student follows this procedure, he may have to register for two physics courses in one quarter even though he has already completed the work. But, in any event, he will get all the credit due him.

"Besides the obvious advantages to a student under this plan, it will also make scheduling easier," Professor Schenk said. "A student will not have to be in either a class or a lab at a particular scheduled time. If a person has a lab in another course one day a week, he could simply attend his physics lab or work session at another time or on another day."

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History of Goat Day

It seems that a few facts need to be made clear concerning "Goat Day" and just how it got started.

On September 28, 1972, Coach Fran Florian spoke to the Southern Tech Lions. He asked for support and suggestions concerning student apathy toward activities on campus, especially athletic events. We had a good discussion and made plans for some possible avenues of correcting lack of interest in basketball games.

Our regular meeting was adjourned at 9:15 p.m. We reconvened a few minutes later to hear Mary Ann Murray, who had come to the meeting to ask for support and suggestions for the forthcoming "Miss STI Contest." We had an exchange of ideas relating to the contest. We decided that a definite date was necessary to start to formulate plans for the pageant, so Mr.

Wynn made a motion that November 11, 1972 be our target date.

A planning committee was formed to get some ideas together and to try to get other clubs and fraternities interested in the contest. Mr. Wynn was made chairman. Also on the committee were Charles Day, Jeff Perdue, Robert Woodland, Leo Pietrcolo, Kerry Drake, and Jim Axley. The chairman asked the committee to meet in his office the next day, September 29, 1972, at 12:00.
