

Four Students Selected To Receive Scholarships

Four Southern Tech students have been awarded scholarships amounting to \$900, according to an announcement by William J. Glenn, Southern Tech counselor. The scholarships which take effect this quarter are the Regents' State Scholarship, the Marietta Optimist Club Scholarship, and the Marietta Masonic Temple Company's plan for student aid.

Robert Lewis Clements, Wrens, and David Louie Patrick, Decatur, were the recipients of the Regents' State Scholarships. This financial aid is available at all colleges in the University system, and it is restricted to those having a definite need and showing exemplary scholarship. Both Clements and Patrick were approved to receive aid through the summer quarter.

The Marietta Optimist Club Scholarship-Loan, which begins this quarter, was awarded to George B. T. Reese, Charleston, South Caro-

lina. This loan is restricted to those who have high academic achievement and who satisfy the faculty committee as to their worthiness. Reese who is a third-quarter freshman will receive aid from this fund through the fall quarter.

Kenneth M. Smith, Acworth, was approved to receive funds from the scholarship set up by the Marietta Masonic Temple Company. Smith replaces Arthur J. Braswell, who had been selected for this scholarship for the entire school year. Braswell transferred to the Georgia Tech Evening School in the winter quarter. Worthy students who make their homes in Cobb County are given preference for the Masonic assistance.

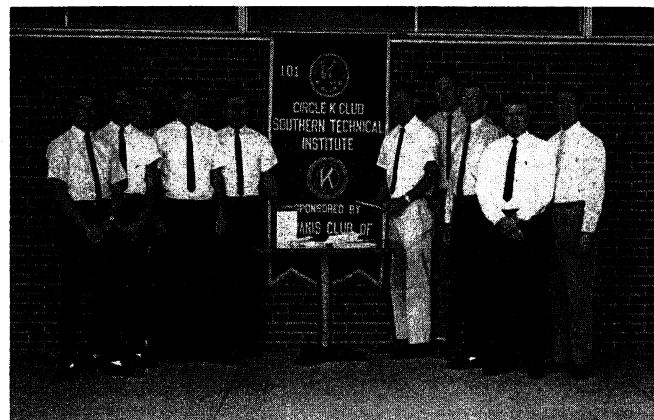

After seven months of preparations, the Circle K Club of Southern Tech placed the 1962-1963 edition of the Student Directory on sale April 4.

Anyone who did not purchase a directory and wishes to do so should contact Mr. W. S. Newman, advisor of the club, in room 503. The price is ten cents per copy.

The directory is the result of a joint effort involving the Marietta and Metro Kiwanis clubs, who gave guidance and assistance; the businessmen of Marietta and Cobb County, who placed ads in the directory; the Lockheed Company - Georgia Division, which did part of the printing at no cost; the Dunn Printing Company, which did the remainder of the printing; the STI cashier's office, which handled the financial arrangements; and the Circle K Club of Southern Tech, who organized and expedited the entire operation.

The club reports that some names or information were omitted, but these omissions were not due to the club. Any student who did not fill out a directory questionnaire at the beginning of the fall quarter, or who did not fill one out completely, did not get his name or other information printed. Any student who registered after the fall quarter was not listed because the lists were typed soon after the fall registration, and new names could not be injected in the alphabetical lists.

Southern Tech men with a C average or better and belong to less than three clubs on the campus are eligible to join Circle K. The club meets in the motion-and-time-study laboratory each Wednesday night at 7:30.

Hays Member Of Panel Discussing Writing Reports

The University of Tennessee, Knoxville, Tennessee, was the scene of two conferences attended by two Technical Institute, during the past week.

Professors George L. Carroll, R. W. Hays, and M. E. Blair were present at the Southeast Regional Meeting of the American Business Writing Association on Saturday, April 6, 1963. Professor Hays was a member of a panel discussing the presentation of engineering reports.

Professors Jesse J. DeFore and William Hurst attended the Southeastern Section Conference of the American Physical Society, April 3-6. Colleagues teaching physics in southeastern colleges presented research and teaching papers at the conference.

Equipment Given By Southern Bell Being Installed

W. O. Spaeth has a problem — a telephone problem. Right now he has more than two telephone lines for each possible user at Southern Technical Institute.

Spaeth is not a telephone company official; instead, he is in charge of Southern Tech's Telephone Option program in the Department of Electrical Engineering Technology. His two thousand possible telephone party-lines are part of the Southern Tech equipment for teaching future Telephone Engineering Technicians.

Southern Tech received the two-thousand-line system as a gift from Southern Bell Telephone Company in 1961. Southern Bell had replaced its equipment in the Temple, Georgia, exchange and made the surplus equipment available for teaching engineering technicians. Southern Tech offers the nation's only two-year Associate in Engineering Degree in telephony.

Spaeth says the system — if it were not used as a training aid — could serve as a campus telephone system for Southern Tech's more than nine hundred students and sixty faculty. Under Spaeth's instructions, the future engineering technicians are installing the equipment, with its more than 80 thousand connections, in a communications laboratory on the Marietta campus.

Technician Log Completed; Delivery To Students, June 1

The *TECHNICIAN'S LOG*, the Southern Tech Annual, was sent to the printer, Foote and Davies, Inc., on April 11. It is scheduled for delivery on June 1, but it may be available earlier. Many hundred hours of work were spent preparing the *LOG* for the printer. In addition to the eight-member staff, there were five faculty members, two students, and many club officials who spent time making pictures, gathering materials, making selections, writing, checking captions, and arranging the parts for publication.

Emphasis has been placed on new and expanded features in the 1963 edition, which depicts the activities

for the school year in more detail than ever before. Through the efforts of photographers Gary Neill and Kenneth Mitchell, with help from professors Hays, Carter, Burton, and Smith, the school activities are presented by a multitude of photographs. Sports editor Bob Deaton, with the help of Dennis Weaver, has placed more emphasis on sports. Bill Poulos worked with the officers of the fraternities and clubs to obtain new material for the club section.

Engineering School Filmstrip Features Campus Photographs

Southern Tech's campus, classrooms, and laboratories served recently as backgrounds for some of the photographs in a filmstrip which will be viewed nationally. A professional photographer visited the campus on April 1 and 2 to secure these photographs. The filmstrip in which the pictures will appear will be accompanied by a recorded narration and is intended to depict the level and scope of Engineering Technology Education.

It will show the work which is done at colleges offering Engineering Technology curricula and the areas in which the graduates of such programs become employed. The firm producing the

filmstrip chose Southern Tech as representative of the colleges offering degree programs in Engineering Technology.

A photographer spent two days on campus attempting to capture the spirit and philosophy of the school; more than 600 pictures were taken during the photographer's visit.

The sound filmstrip is being produced under the sponsorship of the Technical Institute Council of the American Society for Engineering Education. Two Southern Tech staff members, Director H. L. McClure and Professor J. J. DeFore, are members of the TIC-ASEE Committee supervising the production of the filmstrip.

Testing Machine Purchased For Civil Department Use

Recently Southern Tech purchased a Universal Testing Machine. This machine is manufactured by the Tinius Olsen Machine Company, and it will go to the Civil Department for the purpose of testing construction materials. The Universal Testing Machine will be able to test materials both large and small in mass and record very accurately on its electronic recorder many stress and strain readings.

This electronic recorder plots the

increasing or decreasing stress and strain of a material, and it magnifies the slightest motion up to a thousand times on its large 8½-by-11-inch recorder chart.

This machine was purchased because it is the type used in industry for testing materials.

This machine is under the supervision of Mr. R. L. Myatt and Mr. M. W. Corey. The Universal Testing Machine will be used mainly in Civil 114.

Registration Indicates Record Spring Enrollment

The enrollment of Southern Technical Institute, has increased 4.5 per cent over that of the 1962 spring-quarter enrollment, according to L. Y. Bryant, Registrar.

The total enrollment includes 803 men and 2 women. Of this total, 113 students have come to the Southern Tech campus from out of state, and 56 students are taking courses for the first time.

Southern Tech is a unit of Georgia Tech's Engineering Extension Division. The Engineering Extension Division also offers Southern Technical Institute courses in an evening school program. The spring-quarter enrollment for this

evening program is up three per cent over the same quarter's enrollment of a year ago. Total night-school student enrollment is 206 in technical institute courses.

On the STI campus for the first time are 55 new freshmen. Some 19 of these newly-enrolled students chose the various options of the Electrical Engineering Department as their major. Other technological majors of incoming students are as follows: Gas Fuel Engineering, 2; Industrial Engineering, 3; Heating and Air-Conditioning Engineering, 5; Civil Engineering, 5; Building Construction, 4; Industrial Management, 4; Mechanical Engineering, 10; Textile Engineering, 3.

Evening School Courses Include Adult Education

Georgia Tech's Engineering Extension Division has announced its night school courses in technical-institute and adult education programs for the coming summer quarter. Registration for these courses will be held on June 24, according to Mrs. Blanche Turner, Registrar. Applicants may register early during the week of June 17 through June 21 by coming to the night school office during the daytime.

Night-school courses parallel regular Southern Tech technical-institute courses, including instruction in surveying, electrical engineering technology, industrial engineering technology, mechanical engineering technology, drawing,

English, mathematics, and physics. The evening school regularly offers courses in six Southern Tech degrees.

This summer the evening school will also offer adult education courses in motion and time study, law, machine shop, and remedial English. Some of these courses will count toward the evening-school certificate program in industrial supervision.

Mrs. Turner has cautioned that all applicants who will be attending evening school for the first time must have all application forms submitted by June 7. Information about application is available either from the Georgia Tech evening school or from Southern Tech.

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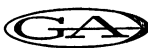
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Golf Team Wins Three Matches

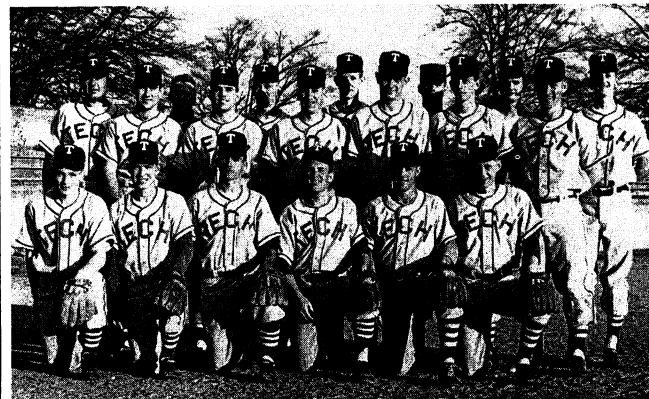
Don Stewart dropped a double behind first base and scored on Tom Dudley's single.

Some of the other members are Tony Laurito, Robert Galpin, Gary Weil, Bob Thomas, and Mac Murray.

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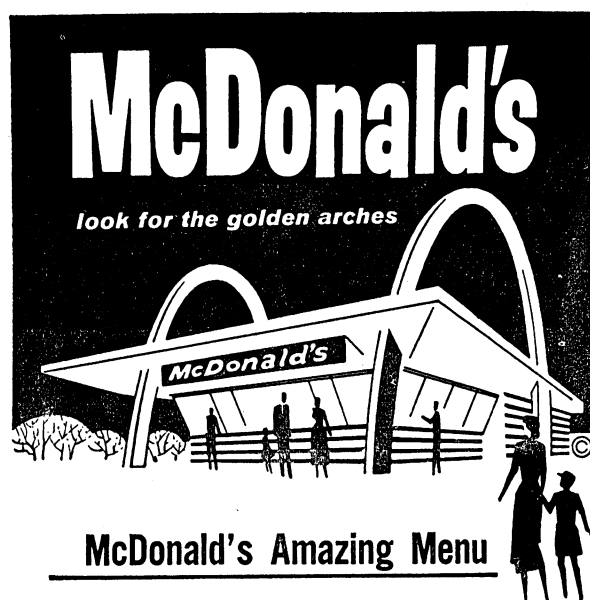
