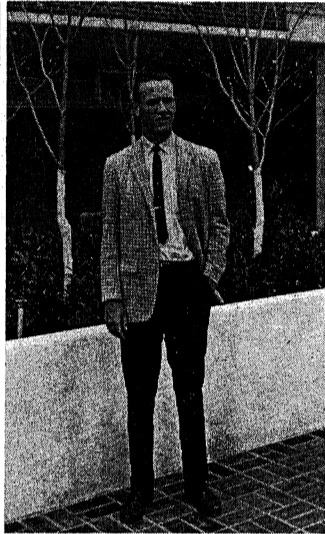

Board of Regents Bestows 1964-65 Student Grants

The Board of Regents has announced that nine Southern Tech students will receive State Regents' Scholarships. According to STI Counselor Mr. W. J. Glenn, the scholarships will go to eight STI seniors and one incoming freshman. The following students, all from Georgia, are the recipients: Thomas L. McElveen, Brooklet; Thomas J. Carnes, Atlanta; Stephen B. Howard, Bainbridge; Lynn W. Smith, Bremen; James R. Davenport, McCoysville; Nesbit N. Grovenstein, Sylvania; Terry L. Hightower, Tifton; Robert F. Thompson, Marietta; Homer L. Wray, Jr., Marietta. Smith is the only incoming freshman ever to win the scholarship.

The granting of Regents' State Scholarship is based on exemplary academic achievement and a definite need for financial aid. All applicants for this scholarship must submit a detailed statement to the College Scholarship Service of Princeton, New Jersey. The CSS recommends the amount of aid each is to receive, and Southern Tech awards a sum based on the CSS recommendation, the money available from the state, and the number of approved applicants.

Pro-Goldwater Club Forming On STI Campus

A new campus organization, politically inclined toward Senator Barry Goldwater and entitled "Young Americans For Freedom," is to be formed during the fall quarter. According to Professor William Newman, one of the originators of the idea for making it a campus organization, plans for the political club would not be definite until students showed an interest in joining the club by contacting him at his office in Building 5.



New Dorm Looms at Edge of Campus

Students To Occupy First Dorm By Winter

The first of Southern Technical Institute's new dormitories will be completed by the latter part of December, 1964, according to statements recently made by the builder, T. C. Brittain. This building will provide living accommodations for 186 students, and dormitory supervisors.

The building is centrally located on the campus, and is conveniently near the classroom building and the technical specialty buildings. Construction work on this unit has been in progress since the beginning of the year, and its completion has been eagerly anticipated by both school officials and the students.

The architecture of the first dormitory is similar to that used for the other buildings on campus, featuring reinforced concrete structure with brick wall areas and screens of decorative block in the glass areas. The living quarters will be heated by gas from a circulating water system and cooled by electricity with a central air-conditioning system.

A second, larger, new dormitory is also under construction, at a spot on

the campus just below the first dormitory. Construction of this facility is by the ABCo Builders, and has been underway for about a month. This dormitory will house 300 students, and will require about one year for completion. This will mean that housing conditions will not be fully adequate for at least another year. It is estimated that one-half the total number of students enrolled might be in need of housing facilities, and with the enrollment moving above the one-thousand number, at least two dormitories are badly needed.

Industrial Student Participates In Sky Diving Event

Southern Tech student Lee Winde, an industrial major, participated in a sky-diving demonstration here in Marietta on Labor Day. Two other jumpers took part in the demonstration jump held at the K-Mart Department Store.

Winde's jump was made from an exit altitude of 7500 feet. He took a 30-second free fall before pulling the ripcord. All three jumpers landed in the pre-designated target area—a field behind the K-Mart. The demonstration was witnessed by several hundred spectators.

Winde has been a parachutist since 1960 when he received paratrooper training with the Army. Since then he has made 223 jumps of which 180 were diving free falls. He is presently training officer for the Crescent Sky Divers in Marietta. He holds a jump masters license.

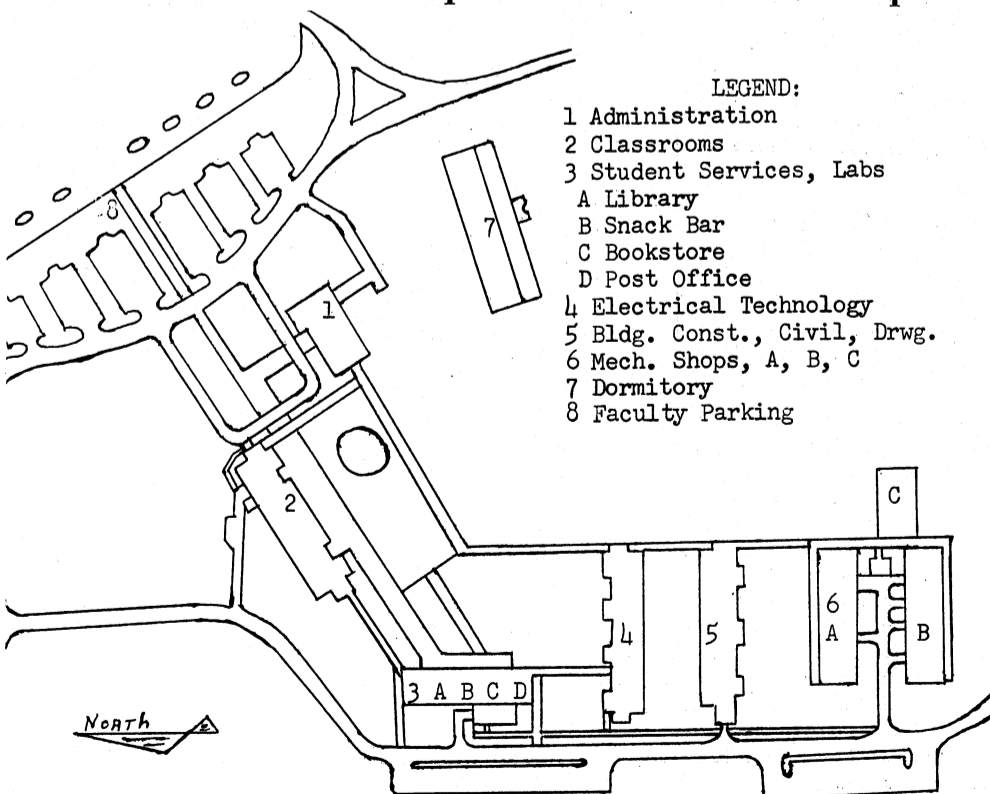

GIVE THE CLASS OFFICERS SOMETHING TO DO

In the January 1964 issue of this newspaper we ran an editorial outlining what we believed to be the best ways to place some responsibility on the shoulders of class officers. In the past these offices have been honorary ones, and we thought then that the time had come to make some changes: we are of that same opinion now. We do understand that some verbal action has been taken by the student council to work out a solution but that no official steps have really been decided upon.

To be sure that the Student Council realizes our stand on this matter, we repeat the responsibilities that we listed in January: Each class officer should

- (1) be given a vote in the student council,
- (2) be given an office in the student council (at least for each class president),
- (3) be duly sworn in office by the Director of Southern Tech,
- (4) become a sort of ambassadors-at-large, representing STI at community functions, when opportunities arise, such as luncheons, dinners, fairs, etc.
- (5) escort "Miss STI" when she is on campus or at community affairs,
- (6) be available to the administration for announcements that would affect the student body,
- (7) meet with the Director from time to time to discuss student matters,
- (8) have at least a 2.5 average,
- (9) have a part in the presentation ceremony of "Miss STI,"
- (10) become aware of student problems by conversations with the students themselves.

These class officers are the only students representing the student body who have been elected in a campus-wide activity. We would suggest that these officers be given responsibilities or that the offices be disbanded since as of now they serve no real function.

Southern Tech Meets Challenge of New Technology Advances

When you look around the new Southern Tech campus, you can see all the buildings are new. Everything seems to be new, and indeed, it is, even the products of STI—the technical engineers.

Since World War II our technology has moved so fast that the loss of time between a scientific discovery and its application has been reduced from years to months. This change in our technology has required mathematics and physics, and less in the applied or operational fields.

The engineering technician fills the gap between the engineer with his highly technical training and the craftsman trained to work with his hands.

Education of the engineering technician includes scientific technology and mathematics, but it is mostly in the field of applied or operational applications of scientific ideas and discoveries. The engineering technician is trained to take the ideas and designs of the engineer and scientist and find practical applications for these ideas.

The educational program at Southern Tech is designed to give the student a high degree of proficiency in his chosen field, supported by a working knowledge of English, mathematics, basic sciences, and technical principles in that field. South Tech graduates are finding a multitude of jobs opening up for them because of this.

Wanted: Letters to the Editor

Southern Tech Policy On Student Riots And Demonstrations Explained

Southern Tech, as a unit of Georgia Tech's Engineering Extension Division, operates under policies set by Georgia Tech and the Regents of the University System of Georgia. Dr. E. A. Harrison, president of Georgia Tech, has formulated the following policy:

The Georgia Institute of Technology does not condone student involvement in riots or in demonstrations and disturbances likely to become riotous. Students who do involve themselves in such situations will be instantly dismissed (expelled) from the institution. Moreover, students should understand that any action, anywhere, tending

to instigate or add emphasis to a riot, demonstration, or disturbance; using pyrotechnics, making inflammatory statements; inciting a riot; obstructing law and order; or perpetrating acts of this general nature will be considered sufficient grounds for immediate dismissal.

All students should also know that should a riot, demonstration, or disturbance occur, they are to go immediately without hesitation, to their place of residence and remain inside and quiet. Students in classes, the library, etc., should remain where they are until instructions are given otherwise.

How To Survive Registration:

Or A Tale To Be Read While Standing In Line

In between the instructions were pictures of the faculty. They were very funny and the young man laughed aloud at them.

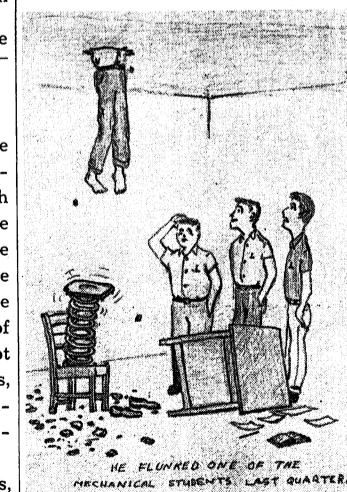
Finally, the young man got to the

Fraternities And Organizations Open For Student Membership

The Student Council — composed of two representatives from each department — one a senior and one a freshman, elected by the department they represent, and two representatives from the dormitory. Each representative is elected for a term of two quarters. To be eligible to serve on the Council a student must have an overall-point average of 2.00 and must not have any permanent offenses.

DEPARTMENTAL FRATERNITIES

Alpha Beta Sigma — for members of the Building Construction Department.

Sigma Chi Tau — for students of

the Civil Engineering Technology Department.

Epsilon Pi Chi — for the Electrical Engineering Technology Department.

Gamma Phi Kappa — for those who are studying Gas Engineering Technology.

Iota Tau — for students of the Industrial Engineering Technology Department.

Alpha Mu Sigma — for members of the Mechanical Engineering Technology Department.

Tau Epsilon Sigma — for students in the Telephone Engineering Technology Department.

Sigma Delta Phi — for members of the Textile Engineering Technology Department.

CAMPUS-WIDE ORGANIZATIONS, ACTIVITIES

Society for the Advancement of Management (SAM) — a national organization which gives its members the opportunity to improve their knowledge of business management and efficiency, so that they become better supervisors and managers.

Toastmasters Club — an international organization for those who are seeking to improve themselves in the arts of speech and leadership. The Southern Tech chapter is one of the few student chapters in the nation.

American Society of Tool and Manufacturing Engineers (ASTME) — a student chapter of an international organization interested in all phases of tool and manufacturing engineering.

Monogram Club — Southern Tech's club for athletes, open to any student who has earned a letter in sports at Southern Tech.

Ham Club — The school's Amateur Radio Club, whose purpose is to promote interest in communication and service over the facilities of Southern Tech's radio station.

Geechee Club — Primarily a social club composed entirely of students from Savannah, Georgia (inactive last year).

Tau Alpha Pi — National Honor Society, first organized at STI in 1948. It is now a national organization with several chapters in the United States. Candidates must have 3.00 honor-point average for at least 30 completed hours and must demonstrate high standards of character.

Circle "K" — the college-level Kiwanis Club. This was the first club organized at Southern Tech which was dedicated to service. It is sponsored by the Marietta Kiwanis Club.

Booster Club — first organized at STI in 1963. Its purposes are (1) to foster and promote scholastic achievement at Southern Tech by aiding deserving students and (2) to promote, encourage, and develop sports, sportsmanship, and school spirit at Southern Tech. It is not a school organization, but it has student and faculty members. It is made up of people (in the community in the industry) who are interested in Southern Tech. Membership for students is \$2.00.

Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers (IEEE) — while not an exclusive departmental club, IEEE members come mostly from the electrical department. The club is designed for those interested in this phase of engineering technology.

Baptist Student Union — a social and religious club for interested members of the student body.

Tech Annes — an active club for the wives of Southern Tech students.

The Free Enterprise Club — organized for the purpose of promoting an interest in free enterprise and to provide services which make students aware of the fact that free enterprise is important.

Hard Work Awaits You At Southern Tech

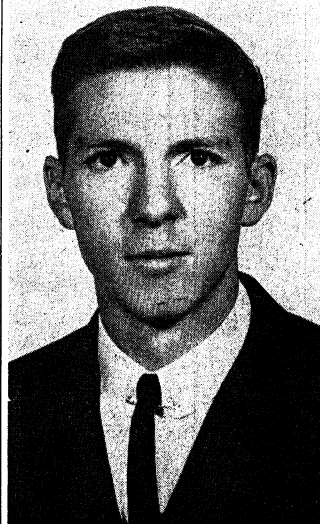

PARKING AND TRAFFIC REGULATIONS: EDITORIAL

All cars and trucks operating on the campus other than those of visitors and school owned vehicles must be registered and have a Southern Tech parking decal showing on the rear window of the car.

Parking tickets will be given for

(1st Offense)
Fine

1. Speeding on the campus\$10.00
2. Parking in reserved places 3.00
3. Parking on service roads, driveways, and walkways 2.00
4. Parking on unpaved areas 3.00
5. Operating or possessing an unregistered car on the campus 5.00
6. Parking in the entrances or exits of parking lots 3.00
7. Failure to properly report a change in auto tag number ... 2.00
8. Giving false information and/or falsely registering a car.... 10.00
9. Parking so that more than one space is used 2.00
10. Reproducing or defacing a parking decal 10.00

The above fines are for first offenses. For the second and third violations the fines will be increased. For continued violations disciplinary action will be taken and car will be subject to being impounded.

Cars will be impounded for parking in the driveways leading from the service to the boiler rooms, and for parking on the service road and driveways so as to impede the regular flow of traffic.

Parking tickets must be taken care of before the end of the next school day after the ticket was issued or the fine will be increased.

Be sure the number on your parking decal is always legible. Should the number flake off or anything else happen to make it illegible scrape the remains off and get a new decal without extra cost. This same procedure is to be followed if the car is traded. Please bring remnants of decal into the office when applying for a new one.

If it becomes necessary for a student to temporarily use a car other than his own, he should pick up a temporary decal.

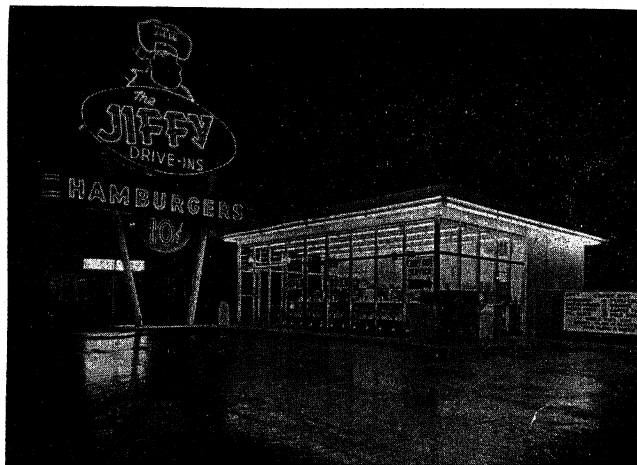

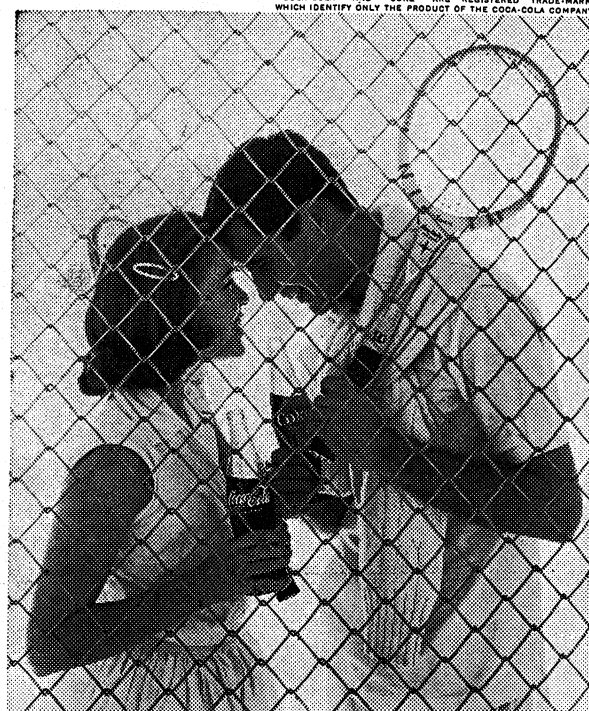
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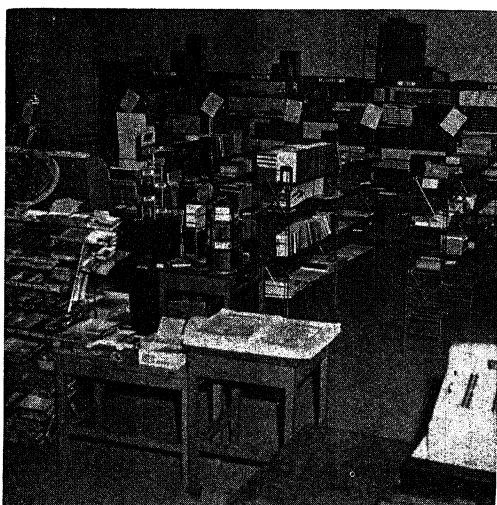
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
