Rockmart upset Marietta to a 12-12 deadlock Monday night, December 6, at the Rockmart Stadium.

The Lemon Street Hornets fought hard during the first quarter, and were unable to score but with four minutes to play in the second quarter, Mack Eppinger (center) switched to left

end and later raced down field to the end zone with the pigskin on his shoulder for a touchdown. Now with only one minute and forty-six seconds to play, Rockmart's fullback completed a pass for a touchdown, but the extra point was termed "no good." At the half the score was 6-6.

As the crowds cheered wildly, Moss scored from the one yard line on an opening play of the third quarter. Then Rockmart picked up courage in the fourth period, and carried the ball to their 20 yd. line but the ball was fumbled, and covered quickly by Frank Tillard, from there the Hornets marched to Rockmart's 48 yard line to kick. Again the ball was taken by the Rockmart fullback up to the Hornets' 20 yard line and was stopped by a host of tacklers. It seemed that there was no halting for them until the Hornets' 2 yard line had been reached, when suddenly Rockmart's fullback was stopped by Kenneth Carter, (quarter back). In the preceding play Rockmart and Marietta scored 12-12 tying up the game.

Each play in the game was a thriller; suspense swept through the whole stadium as these opponents battled desperately.

Long runs were made by Raymond Moss, 50 yards; Leroy Scott 35, and Mack Eppinger 55. Outstanding blocking by Bennie Braswell, Herbert Porter, Edwin Dyer, Frank Tillard and Walter Bates.
