Awards Day

Dr. Noah Meadows, former director of internal medicine at Kennestone Hospital and former president of the Cobb County Medical Society, was awarded the Benjamin Franklin Medal at the 3rd annual Awards Day at Southern Technical Institute.

Dr. Robert Fischer, head of Southern Tech's English and Social Studies Department, which presented the award, stated, "that Dr. Meadows well represented the blend of idealism and practicality that Franklin symbolized and which Southern Tech strives to achieve in its curriculum."

Dr. Meadows was the second recipient of the Franklin Medal which was conceived to be given periodically to recognize professional achievements and service by community figures in promoting useful knowledge in the humanities and technology. Last year's recipient was Dr. Phil Secrist.

Named "Outstanding Student of the Year" was senior Jim Hunter, who was given the Elizabeth and Calvin Hays Award which goes to the outstanding student at Southern Tech. Hunter, cited for his organizing of the STI "pep" band, received a plaque and a \$25.00 savings bond in memory of Calvin and Elizabeth Hays, parents of STI faculty member Robert Hays, for whom the award was named.

Chosen for the "Faculty Member of the Year" awards were professors Robert Hays, an STI English faculty member for 24 years, and David Summers, head of Southern Tech's Electrical Engineering Technology Department.

The "Outstanding Student of the Quarter" award went to Joe Deadwyler, a senior majoring in Industrial, who has served as editor of the college's yearbook the past 3 years. Deadwyler also received a special award from the Student Government Association for outstanding service to STI. Also, receiving special SGA awards were Jack Agee, acting head of Southern Tech's Physical Plant Department, and Frank Jahelka, head of the college dining hall.

For the first time, an award was presented to the "Outstanding Woman in Technology." The Lillian M. Gilbreth award went to Carla Wilson, a senior majoring in Electrical Engineering Technology.

Dean of Student Affairs Lewis G. Van Gorder presented the "activities" awards to the "Best All-Around" students. Chip Langlois, who is graduating with a 4-year degree in Civil, and Robert Godwin, who is getting a 4-year degree in Industrial, received the "activities" awards for their involvement in all aspects of college life, academic and non-academic, according to Dean Van Gorder.

Departmental and professional societies presenting awards included the Physics department giving the Science award. Gregory A. Biasseti, an Electrical graduate, received the award. Accepting for his son, who is already working in Texas, was Mr. Al Biasseti, manager of the Marietta Country Club. The Math award went to Mike Windom, a senior majoring in Architectural Engineering Technology.

The Georgia Architectural and Engineering Society awards went to Jim Martin and Chip Langlois. Martin was cited as the "Outstanding Architectural Technology Student" and Chip Langlois was named the "Outstanding Engineering Technology Student."

The American Institute of Industrial Engineers award went to Glenn Welch, a 4-year graduate. This award goes to the outstanding Industrial student and is voted by the Atlanta Chapter of AIIE.

The American Society of Mechanical Engineers presented its award for the outstanding Mechanical student to Louis Bondurant. William E. Fulwood, a senior majoring in Industrial, received the Lockheed Management Gold Key Award. It is awarded to the graduating senior majoring in Mechanical or Industrial Engineering with the highest overall average based on at least six complete quarters at Southern Tech. The award consists of a \$100.00 check and an appropriately inscribed gold key.

The Marietta Housing Authority, which sponsored a design competition for Southern Tech students in the Architectural Engineering Technology department's building design course, presented the winner of the contest with \$100.00. Mr. Louis Sohn, chairman of the Board of Commissioners of the MHA, presented the first place prize to Lawrence L. Hughes, a senior majoring in Architectural Engineering Technology. Second place prize of \$50.00 went to Jimmy Currier, also a senior. The other four contestants were awarded \$25.00 each by the MHA for their drawings consisting of floor plans, elevations and perspective views of a proposed building on urban renewal land in Marietta.

BICENTENNIAL COURSE

This summer, Southern Technical
 Institute will offer a unique
 course in honor of the nation's
 200th birthday, according to Dr.
 Robert Fischer, head of the college's
 English and Social Studies Department.

According to Dr. Fischer,
 "Bicentennial America," a ten week
 course, will survey the three
 hundred and sixty-nine year history
 of the United States, from its
 colonial origins to its role in
 the present world.

"Instead of tracing political
 history," says Fischer, "the
 course will focus on the social
 and intellectual aspects of
 American life in an effort to
 answer "What is America?"

Seven professors from the
 English and History Department,
 as well as guest speakers, will
 explore American history "from
 the bottom up" each week, says
 Fischer.

Some of the topics include:
 "Slavery, Sectionalism, and
 Strife: The Civil War;" "Capitalism
 and Consumerism: The Role of
 Government;" "E Pluribus Unum:
 America, the Melting Pot;" and
 "And Here Lies the Remains of a
 Great Nation..." "The Future of
 America."
