STAY AND SEE AMERICA IN GEORGIA

Southern Technical Institute will have an exhibit at the 1976 "Stay and See America in Georgia" exhibit at Lenox Square, July 19-24.

According to STI public relations director Robert Azar, the theme of the college's exhibit this year will be "Technology and a Free Society."

"It will focus on three areas" said Azar, "communications, ecology and archeology." This year, as last, the week will have a red, white and blue color scheme and a bicentennial theme.

Last year, Southern Tech won 2nd place among educational exhibits.

Over 300,000 persons are expected to view "Stay and See America in Georgia" which is sponsored by the Georgia Chamber of Commerce. The week will feature places to live, historical points, colleges, industries and towns in Georgia.

Live entertainment will be presented during the entire week and, of course, the "Miss Stay and See America in Georgia" beauty pageant will be held.

GEORGIA POWER CO. CO-OP BANQUET

The first Georgia Power Co. and Southern Tech cooperative education banquet will be held Monday evening, July 19, in the seminar room of the college library.

Southern Tech has about 80 students who alternate their on-campus education and their work experience. Usually, a co-op student will work a quarter for a major company and be a full-time student the next quarter. Approximately 50% of Southern Tech's co-op students are with the Ga. Power Company.

David Bromberg has signed an exclusive recording contract with Fantasy Records. The announcement was made by Ralph Kaffel, president of the label, and Bromberg's manager, Gary Haber.

Bromberg's first project for Fantasy is a double album. One record will contain material recorded on June 18th and 19th at the Great American Music Hall in San Francisco; the other record is now being recorded at Fantasy's Berkeley studios. The performances the evenings of the recording were superb. The band is a tightly-knit, versatile unit of seven musicians who are genuinely excited about their possibilities for growth. The David Bromberg Band delivers a magnetic, perfectly natural and exciting show, a factor that will no doubt be heard on the record. Steve Burgh is producing; Peter Ecklund, who used to play with Bromberg, is doing the horn arrangements; and Evan Stover is handling the string arrangements.

David Bromberg has long since surpassed his "folkie" image from his mid-Sixties days in the Village. A thoroughly professional working unit, the David Bromberg Band has been exciting audiences in North America and Europe for the past two years. A veritable institution in New York, Bromberg mixes different musical styles, forms, and idioms, somehow coming up with what the Village Voice called "a potpourri that's a bit more than the sum of its parts." "My goal in being a musician," says David, "is not to be a rock and roll star...I wouldn't say that I wouldn't ever want to be that; I wouldn't run away from it. It's just that that's not exactly where my particular values in life are. I imagine I'll be playing like this for the rest of my life."
