



Mayor's Report

HISTORIC PRESERVATION

Lately we have been reading about the possibility of the Civic Design Commission digging for artifacts in old wells located near the train depot and the researching of older structures to determine which should be included in an application to the National Register of Historic Places. We also read of the newly organized Kennesaw Historical Society and its concern for the preservation of the past. Who are these groups? should we become involved, and why is it important to all of us that these organizations succeed in their purpose?

The Civic Design Commission is a five member board that is appointed by the Mayor and Council and given broad powers in dealing with applications to demolish. remove or alter structures located within the Historical Kennesaw (HK) zoning district. Commission was created as a part of the revised comprehensive Code of Ordinances passed by the city government in October, 1977. Since all members of the Commission are members of the Kennesaw Historical Society and since the Mayor and the Councilman over the Planning Commission are on the Board of Directors of the Society, there is much interaction of ideas, purposes and goals among the three groups. And this is the way it should be.

I want to be remembered as a person who had the foresight to realize that our

link with the past helps the present and future generations measure the quality of their culture and gives an appreciation for the accomplishments and life styles of those who preceded us. As Carl Sandburg said, "When a society or civilization perishes, one condition can always be found. They forgot where they came from". This idealism may not appeal to all, so let's look at the practical side of historic preservation.

With today's rising costs of labor, energy and construction, the reuse of historic structures is an ecomonic alternative to new development. As people have become more aware of the beauty, practicality and economy of owning older homes, these sections of town have experienced a resurgence, both aesthetically and value wise. Cities which have begun a comprehensive preservation program have experienced a rebirth and interest in the downtown shopping areas and the merchants cash receipts reflect it. An example is found in Marietta where downtown property values have increased (in some cases) 300 percent over the past year because of the revitilization program. Retail space is at a premium. The same thing can be true of Kennesaw if more people get involved.

Lastly, let's briefly look at some sources of preservation funding. Those structures listed in the National Register make private property owners eligible to be considered for Federal grants-in-aid. Also, Historic Preservation Loans are available through HUD. Important tax incentivies for the preservation and rehabilitation of historic structures permit owners to amortize the costs of rehabilitation over a 5-year period. The Facade and Conservation Easements Act of 1976 allows the owner of property located in the Historical Kennesaw (HK) district to grant to a preservation organization or governmental body the visable outer portion of the building. In return the property owner will be reassessed for tax purposes to reflect the reduction in taxable area. This allows the city planners to establish a common motif in certain areas.

There are many other programs available but this gives the reader an idea of how he could benefit from the work being done by the Civic Design Commission, the Kennesaw Historical Society and the City Government. However, the work will go slow without increased citizen involvement. We need copies of historical documents, information from long-time residents of the Kennesaw area, and man-power to help with the historic survey which will provide the factual information needed on the application to the National Register of Historic Places.



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FAMOUS POLICE CASES The Mystery Of The Disappearing Dogs

In the November issue of The Gazette, its verbose Political Editor, Ben "Sherlock Holmes" Robertson soundly admonished the Kennesaw Police Department for having a "dog problem" in the city and for generally ignoring it.

When a Police Officer sees a dog in the street he is faced with several alternatives, none of which are good. He can catch the dog in a noose, shoot the dog with real bullets or a "knockout" drug, call the county dog truck, or follow the dog home to determine its owner. Catching a dog with a noose is virtually impossible, for most dogs can run faster than an Officer and are not the least bit cooperative. To shoot a dog with bullets or a tranquilizer is strictly illegal now (unless its a "mad dog") and to do so would make the Officer liable for either a \$500.00 fine, six months probation, or both.

The Cobb County Pound Truck comes to our area only when called and usually long after the dog has disappeared. Since the city does not currently have a dog truck or a full time and equipped dog catcher we must depend on the County for this service. To add this function to the Police Department's duties would mean adding another taxpayer expense of about \$15,000 a year. Additionally, our previous experience with using a patrol car to transport captured dogs has been anything but successful, usually resulting in extensive damage to the car and requiring additional work to make the vehicle suitable for human occupancy. Also, if we caught dogs, where would we keep them until they were claimed or

transferred to the County Pound? The last alternative of

following the dog home to determine its owner is not much better than the first three. First, the dog has to go home and if it does is it in the right yard? Will the owner admit ownership? Will the owner even be at home? These are just a few of the questions that complicate the matter. The situation can be so flustrating that one Officer tried to express it in a humorous manner. He wrote in his report that he had followed several dogs home and questioned them at length. None of the dogs would give the Officer their name or the name of their owner. All they would do was wag their tails, grin, and stay in the yard where the Officer couldn't go and get them. To make matters still worse, the Police Department has limited manpower on any given shift and dog cases are very time consuming and take our Officers away from more important duties. Recently an Officer was tied up three hours on a call. Granted, dogs running loose on the streets is a problem but it is a problem that is very difficult for us to resolve because of its complexities and the many restrictions we face. The problem would be greatly reduced if all of our

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



Since they lived in the valley they had no T. V. reception. They entertained themselves. Judy says, "Believe me, you've never lived until you have to play the monkey in "Gitarzan" while your husband and son does Tarzan and Jane".

They talked about Kennesaw and "home" so much it became well known in the

barracks. "A little ole town in Georgia bout 28 miles north of Atlanta".

Judy and David changed their money into D-Marks. Our dollar was worth about 38 cents. There was no way to make ends meet. You simply survived. Judy said, "We ate chicken and dumplings made out of a 19¢ can of chicken broth. were lucky. We never went hungry. Some soldiers in Europe are hungry even now. They have no families in the immediate area they can turn to. German nationals are giving them care packages".

Judy and David say its so good to be home, to be able to watch television, have central heat, hot water, and a regular dollar in their pocket.

The soldiers in Europe call the U.S.A. "the world".

Judy and David say it's easy to take necessities and pleasures for granted when you have them at your fingertips, but don't try to tell them anything bad about Kennesaw. They've seen the other side of the world. "No thank you," they say. "We're home to stay"



Is the Kennesaw Police Department going to be a "Political Football" again? Is the incoming City Council going to fire Chief Howard and other officers? It seems that almost every Chief the city has ever had is misused, abused, ostracized, penalized, scolded, and folded. Folded, that is, into a neat little package that fits the description his tormentors have for him. Then, he's unceremoniously run out of town. If the rumors are correct this political nonsense is fixing to happen again, and again our city has to suffer the embarassment of the unfavorable newspaper publicity, the T. 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


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
