IT'S RACE-TIME!

The 11th annual world famous Southern Tech Bathtub Race, the world powered by a 175cc Kawasaki engine only motorized bathtub race on land. will be held Sunday, May 8 at 3 p.m., on the STI campus.

the race will be 75 laps, 82.5 miles, over the tortuous 1.1 mile asphalt track with its s-turns, hairpins and straightaways that goes around the campus.

Over 20 racing bathtubs powered by 175cc motorcycle engines are expected to race for the first place trophy.

Favored to get the checkered flag is #96, the red, white and black tub of driver Tom Preacher, winner of last spring's 60 lap race and the 40 lap winter '77 previewThomas' red and black tub is race held in February for only press

and sponsors. Preacher's machine is and has a chrome moly frame. A unique feature of this tub is the replaceable fuel tank which enables For the first time in its history, Preacher's tub to be refueled in seconds simply by mounting a completely new fuel tank. It also features an RCA CB radio which gives Preacher a communication line to his pit crew at all times.

> Other racing tubs expected to seriously challenge Preacher for the number one spot are #11, "Fireball, driven by Tommy Thomas and #17, the red, white and blue racing machine of Mike Van Steenburg. Thomas and Van Steenburg finished 2nd and 3rd in the winter '77 preview race. powered by a 175cc Yamaha engine ->



and will be carrying the banner of Southern Tech's first sorority, Alpha Xi Alpha. Van Steenburg, a favorite with the crowds at Southern Tech racing, holds the track record with 68,2 seconds or an average speed of 58.6 mph on the 1.1 mile track. Van Steenburg also won first place in the '75 spring race and the '76 winter race. His racing tub is powered by a 175cc Bultaco engine.

Trophies are given for 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place winners, the Best Engineered Bathtub and the Best Pit Crew.

The Southern Tech campus will have all the color of Sebring or Road Atlanta on race day. The track around the campus drive will be lined with safety barriers to protect the spectators and flags and pennants familiar to all race fans. There will be refreshment stands, live music, beauty queens, sports cars, programs and local celebrities.

At 2:50 p.m. raceday, a sports car will lead the racing bathtubs in a parade lap around the track. Then, at 3 p.m., in LeMans fashion, a gun will be fired, the helmeted drivers will run across the track, jump in their racing machines, buckle their safety belts and start the spring '77 edition of one of the most exciting unique racing events in the world.

Bathtub racing started on the Southern Tech campus about 11 years ago when fraternities, using bathtubs mounted on wheels as a means of storing and transporting beer, spontaneously began a race on the campus. Other clubs and organizations picked up the idea. The original tubs were pieced-together with little more than ropes to guide them and powered by the energy of unfortunate pledges. Soon motors were added and the race has evolved into a major racing attraction that draws national attention. Admission is free and the general public is invited to attend.

FACTS ON THE FIRE TECHNOLOGY DEGREE

Contrary to some beliefs, the Fire Science Technology Department here at Southern Tech does not teach an extensive program of fire suppression technique. Rather, a 2-year associate degree is offered, which could more aptly be entitled, Fire Protection Engineering Technology.

The curriculum consists of extensive studies of physics, chemistry and other applied sciences, as well as highly technical areas of fire protection. Fire protection courses deal with items such as Hazardous Materials, Building Construction, Hydraulics, Fixed Extinguising Systems, as well as Personnel Management and Administration.

A graduate is not only prepared for advancement in the fire service, but more importantly the graduate can secure employment in many other areas of the fire service, Insurance detection and suppression systems, legislative enforcement as well as engineering.

At present fire technology courses are also being taught at Floyd Junior College, outside Rome. The future expansion of the joint degree program is totally dependent upon the availability of qualified students and faculty members.

As the potential danger of fire rises with advanced technology, so the Fire Technology Department

Supporters of a student government presidential candidate at Arisona State U. succeeded in delaying a recent State Press press run by more than an hour. The group objected to the publication of an article about their candidate they claimed was libelous. They entered the State Press's off-campus publishing plant and told pressmen they wanted to check out the entirety. The manager of the printing plant said the stoppage cost the Press about \$300 and that students would no longer be allowed into the plant if they didn't have press credentials. "This action of the students smacks of sophomoric, juvenile attempts at tricky politics. I hope they will learn it is not profitable to try to intimidate the press," Peplow said.

Like most college administrators, Dean Carlson's biggest problem is financial. Springtime means "fix-it" lists and building repairs along with new faculty pay raises and higher than expected Student Center bills.

Another problem concerns a number of vacancies in the Administrative Body with certain crucial departments having acting heads. As Executive Director/Dean, Dr. Carlson is responsible for the total operation of the campus and depends on his administrative staff and academic department heads to provide effective support. When questioned on his goals towards solving these and other problems, he replied, "I would like to see the Southern Tech Foundation blossom into an organization which can provide supplements for faculty salaries and support valuable nontate funded activities like

tate funded activities like leadership workshops and faculty leaves of absences for extended study. Something they could do for the students might involve expanding our recreational facilities."

Dr. Carlson stated that a primary objective must be to inform potential employers of engineering technologists about Southern Tech's degree programs. It would further assist our job searching seniors. Reaching out to inform potential students about our educational opportunities would definitely benefit school and faculty. Constant revisision of curriculum as industry's needs change will insure STI maintaining its national leadership and recognition in engineering technology education, said Dr. Carlson.



ACADEMY SECOND SPACE CONTINUES NEW PLAYS



Richard Taylor, AIA, of Taylor and Collum-Architects will address the May 3 meeting of the AIA Student Chapter in the Student Center, room 120 at noon.

Mr. Taylor will discuss the solar heated and cooled community center his firm designed for the Shenandoah development. This building is the larges of its kind in the world and features an ice skating rink, exhibition hall, meeting rooms, and offices. This community center was the main attraction when Shenandoah hosted the recent Solar Fair.

Solar power is the energy source of the future, so-- this will be one meeting you don't want to miss.

MORE ON SOLAR POWER.....

About 8 years ago, the concept of a satellite solar-power station was introduced. According to Dr. Peter E. Glaser, in a February issue of Physics Today, detailed studies regarding the feasibility and design of such a program are now in progress. The general concept works as follows:

- Solar energy is converted to electricity on the satellite.
- 2. This electricity is used to generate microwaves, to beam the energy back to the earth.
- 3. At the surface of the earth, the microwave energy is reconverted back into electricity.

Dr. Glaser points out a number of advantages of such a system. Some of these are nearly continuous energy and light construction. In addition, the proposed satellites would remain stationary with respect to points on the earth's surface. Hence, they could be placed above places using large amounts of energy.




THE PRATER'S MILL COUNTRY FAIR






Detective is a group of veterans of various levels of rock stardom.




GI BILL TO CHANGE

A change in GI Bill payment procedures, effective June 1, will bring checks at the end of the month.



MISSISSIPPI DECRIMINALIZES MARIJUANA

Mississippi has become the first state in the South to decriminalize minor marijuana offenses. Governor Cliff Finch signed a comprehensive new drug bill on April 15, 1977, which includes provisions eliminating arrest and jail for first time possession of up to one ounce of marijuana. Under the new law, violators will be given a traffic ticket-like citation adn will face a \$100-250 civil fine.




