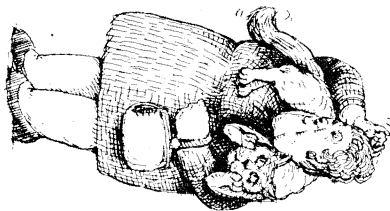

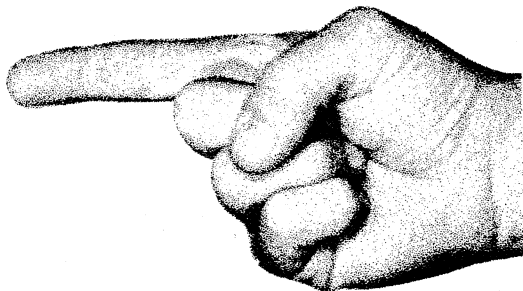
ATTENTION: Students, and Faculty Members

NOTICE TO ALL GRADUATING SENIORS

You are required to take the Comprehensive Exam as part of fulfilling the graduation requirements.

Georgia Lieutenant Governor Zell Miller will be the speaker at the 32nd Commencement Exercises at Southern Tech on Saturday, June 11, according to Dr. Walter O. Carlson, executive director and deand of STI.

The commencement will be held on the mall of the Southern Tech campus beginning at 9 a.m. In case of rain, the exercises will be moved to the gymnasium. Approximately 500 students are candidates for degrees including 288 baccalaureate and 197 associate degrees to be conferred in engineering technology.

In connection with graduation, an awards ceremony is scheduled for Friday, June 10 at 7 p.m. in the Student Center Ballroom.

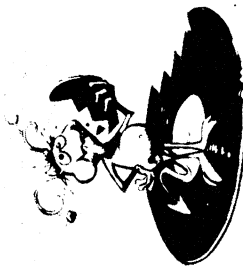

Alice serves up a heaping plate of thumping, but well thought out rock. In some ways, the album looks back to the days when Alice Cooper was a group and not a soloist. Today's Alice is a master of mixing smoothness with shock effects. The current single, "You and Me," is another sensitive ballad that provides an effective contrast to the sleek heavy-metal sounds that otherwise dominate the album. Alice may rock with more sophistication now, but he has not lost any of the old punch and inventiveness in his singing, writing and ease with killer rock rhythm sections.

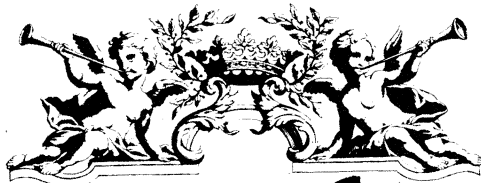
SPEED READING AND OTHER SPECIAL TOPICS OPEN FOR PRE-REGISTRATION

We would like to welcome our new little sisters into the fraternity, they are: Cindy Ballard, Diana Eros, and Barbara Ransom. Congrats!

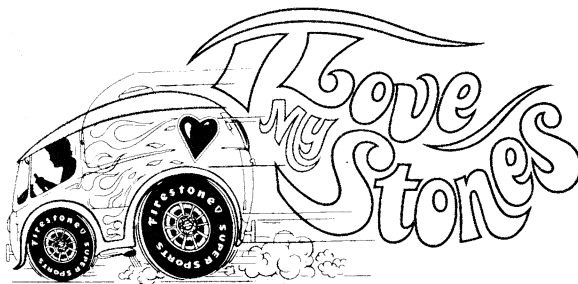
