STAY AND SEE GEORGIA WEEK

For the first time in four years, the Southern Tech exhibit at Stay and See Georgia Week at Lenox Square, July 25-30, did not win an award, but it did receive enormous response from the more than 300,000 persons who passed through the mall, according to Robert Azar, director of public relations.

"The rapport between the crowd and us was excellant," said Azar, "and the interaction between our STI family and the visitors was very good."

Also, said Azar, even though we did not win an award, we still received enormous publicity with the exhibit shown on two television stations, listed in paid newpaper advertisements and the official program book.

"We talked to person from California to New York and throughout the southeast, " said Azar. "Also, persons from various other countries stopped by to talk, as well as prospective students, and STI alumni."

"It takes a lot of hard work and dedicated people to build and staff an exhibit for six 12-hour days," said Azar.

According to Azar, sincere appreciation should be given to professor Ed Muller for designing the structure which was used, to physical plant for building and hauling it, and to student Tony Chupp, who created an appropriate exhibit from the structure.

STI will offer a refresher course in engineering technology fundamental September 6 - October 27.

Completion of the course should help recent and not-so-recent graduates of engineering and engineering technology colleges perform more proficiently on the State Professional Engineers Examination.

The 32-hour course, with classes scheduled from 7:00 to 9:00 P.M. on Tuesday and Thursday evenings, will be held on the Southern Tech campus. Course fee is \$90 and registration deadline is September 1. The following subjects will be covered: math, physics, chemistry statics dynamics, strength of materials, fluid mechanics, electrical theory, thermodynamics, engineering economy. Other pertinent subject matter is nucleonics, materials science, and a mock EIT exam will be provided.
