
#### AIIE

RPM is a weekly column in the STIng featuring a review of a new or recently released album and other bits of trivia related to music and broadcasting.

This week, we listened to the new LP from Chicago, Chicago XI. It should become their next in a long series of gold (over a million sold) records. This album represents their most lushly orchestrated work yet. Throughout the album, the funky, often riveting jazz arrangements maintain a thumping pitch, enhanced by strong horn action. Complex rhythmns and melodies with tight brass and string arrangements combine to produce a sound typical of Chicago's last ten albums. Most of the songs on this LP are uptempo featuring the same powerful vocal effort characteristic of their past music. Among the best tracks are "Take Me Back to Chicago," "Till

the End of Time" and "Little One."

One of the things we do in this column is push radio. In particular, we push Southern Tech radio which some folks refer to as WSTB. This column is written by various WSTB staff members. Tentatively the gym will be open on Saturday from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m., and on Sunday from 4 to 10 p.m.


If enough interest is shown, these hours will remain the same. Otherwise, we will change the hours or omit them entirely.
