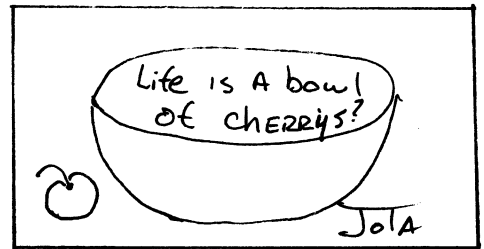

THE GOATSHED ANSWERS BACK

In the winter quarter of 1976, Jack Pitts, a STI student, wrote a letter in the STIng criticizing Southern Tech for not having facilities that would allow handicapped students free access to the campus. Mr. Pitts was invited by the Associate Executive Director to come in and discuss the matter. Although, Mr. Pitts was not handicapped, he had a friend who was and his criticisms made sense.

Mr. Pitts agreed to pursue the matter further and he enlisted the aid of several other persons including Dr. Frank Taylor of the Chemistry and Physics Department. From this beginning, a committee has been formed consisting of four students, the head of Physical Plant, and three members of the faculty and administration.

The Committee has submitted an overall general plan of modification of the campus which would make it completely accessible to handicapped students. A detailed cost for the entire plan has not been made, but complete implementation would be several hundred thousand dollars. Meanwhile, those things that can be done now are being started.

A case in point is the ramp to the first floor of the library. A card catalog is provided at that level and a phone will be provided to allow the student to call upstairs for what he needs. As funds become available, a lift will be provided to the main library floor.

If you have suggestions or complaints that relate to facilities on campus for the handicapped, please forward them to Dr. Frank Taylor who is chairman of the Committee.

PARKING FEES

There has been concern expressed, and questions voiced, concerning the increase in parking fees. The facts briefly are these. Southern Tech's parking areas and roads are now sixteen years old and the life of a blacktop surfacing is estimated to be fifteen years. This means that the entire campus needs to be resurfaced as soon as possible. While we hope to get some

help from the County and the State in this endeavor, the project still is going to cost us some money. Also, we have a growing need for additional parking space as evidenced by the vehicular congestion this fall quarter.

Because of the urgent needs for higher priority facilities on college campuses in the State for several years, the Board of Regents have had a policy of supplying no funds for maintaining or expanding parking facilities. In other words, it is up to the individual college to handle this problem.

Last year, we requested permission to set up a separate account to be used for the maintenance and expansion of parking facilities and to place all parking fees and parking fines in this account. We were authorized to do this.

What this means now is simply that any money you pay for a parking fee or a parking fine will be placed in this fund, and when enough money has been generated, necessary repairs or expansion will be undertaken. Your parking money will be spent on parking facilities.

Some students have been upset that a decal for a second car now costs an additional \$6. A fairly widespread practice had developed of one person buying a decal and then purchasing decals for several other cars at the reduced rate. These additional decals were then distributed to other students. Because so much police time was being used in running down these violations, the only workable solution that the Parking Committee could devise was the charging of the same fee for each car.

Graduating seniors have also voiced disapproval of having to pay the full fee for only one quarter. Unfortunately, the positive identification of graduating seniors at the time of purchase is virtually impossible because of the time required of the Registrar's Office. The Parking Committee will review this particular phase however, to see if an alternative method might be feasible.

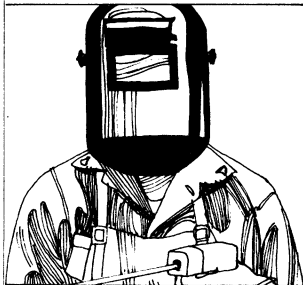

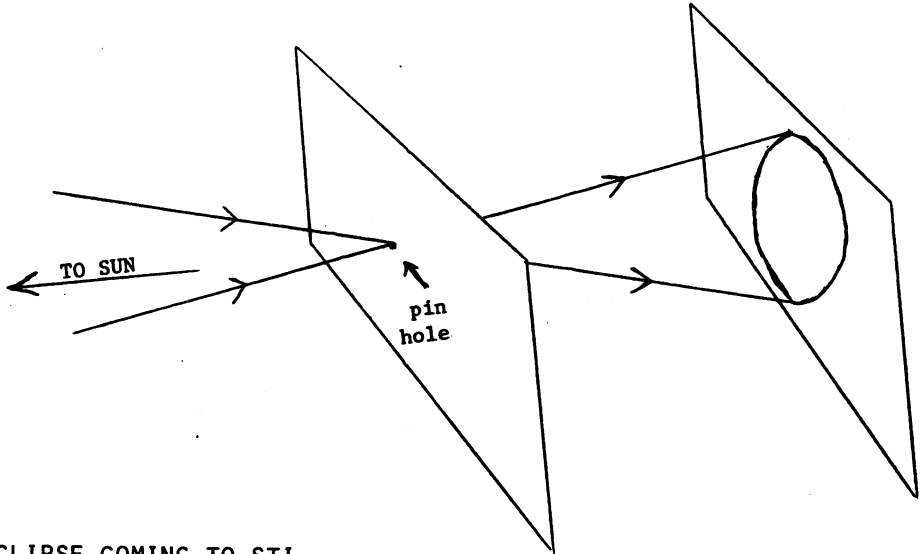

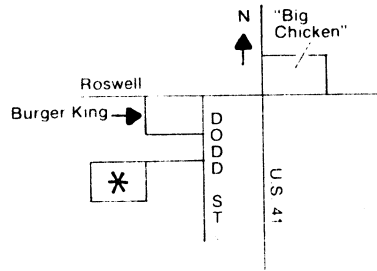
At the fall of the checkered flag, it is over---there is only one "National Class Champion," the rest will have to start all over again ---year!!
