On Tuesday, November 1, Mr. Mark Spencer resigned as Associate Registrar effective December 31, 1977.

Mr. Spencer has secured other employment in a field more closely related to his degree major.





HOW STI WILL USE \$50,000 CO-OP GRANT

Southern Tech has received a \$50,000 Federal Grant for use in the Co-op program. The Grant will be used to supplement normal Southern Tech support of the Co-op program. The money will be used as close as possible to increase student and faculty participation in the Co-op program.

Faculty members will attend seminars that will develop guidelines for increasing the number of co-op employers. They will also attend national and regional cooperative educational conferences and meetings. This exchange of information is expected to provide better co-op services for everyone. Students will make more field trips to determine job potential. Consultants will be brought to Southern Tech to conduct seminars for students and faculty. Money for a secretarial position and supplies will also come from the grant.

The push is on for increased involvement in the co-op program. See Ms. Doyle in the Co-op Office for additional information about your qualifications.



The TKE football team had a successful week in intramurals. We had victories over the Unknowns and Sigma Nu, but lost a tough game to the BSA.


