

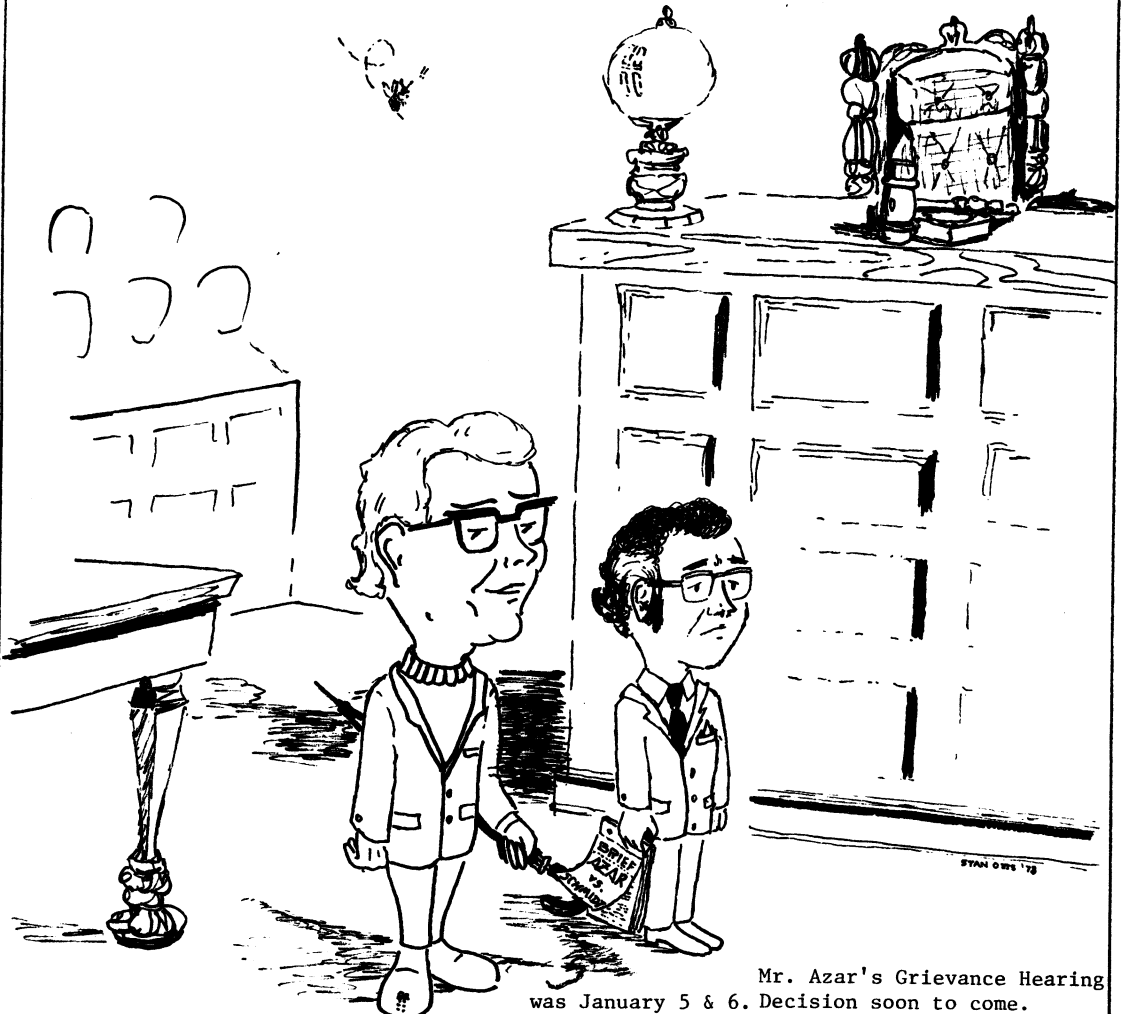

DANA *Speaks*

Welcome to winter quarter '78!
It's good to have everyone back and to see so many new students. We're glad to have you!

At the end of fall quarter, I had an appointment with Georgia Tech President Joseph Pettit. I went primarily as a "concerned STI student" to find out just what his attitude was toward Southern Tech.

He was very gracious, but I was very disappointed with the meeting as a whole. He spent a good deal of time talking about STI's history. His answers to my questions were pretty vague. He told me little I had not known. In response to questions pertaining to the recent changes going on here at Southern Tech, Dr. Pettit gave very brief answers as if he would rather not talk about it.

I did find that he believed Southern Tech should stay under Georgia Tech's wing rather than try to make it on it's own.

I also got the feeling that the Board of Regents as well as Dr. Pettit himself approved Paul Smith as Director of the newly formed Office of Development almost entirely on STI's Dean/Executive Director Walter O. Carlson. If this is true, it is very unfair. The usual procedure for filling open positions has been quite a process. There are many meetings and screenings with prospective candidates and faculty, staff and students included in these meetings. Why was the procedure changed for the Office of Development? The STIng hopes to find out.

I think my main mistake in my meeting with Dr. Pettit was not having more definite questions prepared. I must add that Dr. Pettit holds an "Open Door Policy" which means any student wishing to speak with him is welcome at any time. Anyone interested in seeing him, should by all means make an appointment.

I regret to announce at this time that I am submitting my resignation as Editor of the STIng. I feel I am no longer able to give the STIng the time it deserves. I will remain as Editor Emeritus in a sort of roving reporter capacity.

I have developed a fondness for the STIng and find it very hard to submit this resignation. I have watched the STIng change and grow in the year and a half I have been associated with the paper.

I would like to express my appreciation to Professor Al Hunkin (ex-STIng advisor) for his great patience and support. Our new advisor Dr. George Kennedy has also been a great asset to the STIng as well as to Southern Tech. I also would like to add that ex-STIng editors Joe Taylor and Nick Gordeuk were very instrumental in developing the STIng into the quality paper it has become. Thanks to you all.

We are now interviewing for the Editor's position. If you are interested, please drop your name and box number in the STIng box or contact Dr. George Kennedy in the English Department.

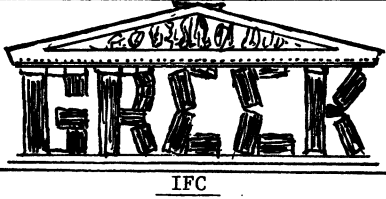

Jackson Browne

This latest LP from Jackson Browne was recorded during a recent cross-country tour. It offers 10 outstanding tracks dealing primarily with experiences of the road. Most of the songs were recorded onstage during performances but a few were recorded between engagements in Browne's hotel room.

The music itself is a mixture of easy rock ballads and pounding, uptempo songs. Craig Doerge plays keyboards, Leland Sklar is on bass, Danny Kortchmer on Guitar, Russ Kunkel plays the drums and David Lindley plays electric fiddle. Browne, of course, is on piano.

Among the best tracks: "The Loadout," "Stay," "Love Needs A Heart," and the title song.

At the Board of Regents December 1977 meeting, approval was granted for Southern Tech to contract with ARA Food Service Company to operate the campus food service program. The contract will begin on January 3, 1978. The decision to contract with ARA followed a lengthy and in-depth analysis of the Institute food service operation. The new program will bring innovative food service concepts to the campus and provide a wide variety of quality food.

The Student Center food service will offer not only snack items, but also two hot entrees, a variety of vegetables, hot breads, baked pastries and hot desserts. Menus will be posted a week in advance to inform of menu choices available. A salad bar, providing self-service salad is a new feature. Every day for lunch, a low cost special plate of the day will be featured.

Special functions and spirit lifters are planned from time to time and catering for organizations, groups and campus activities will be available.

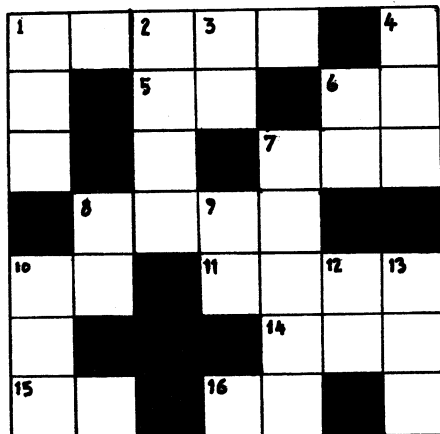
