

SAMFORD TALKS WITH THE BOARD

At the December meeting of the Board of Regents, members of the Student Advisory Council were allowed to participate in an open question and answer period with the Board. During this period I asked the following question:

"I would like to ask the Board to consider the unusual relationship between the Georgia Institute of Technology and Southern Technical Institute. This relationship has, and is causing major problems in communications, responsibilities, loyalties, finances, curriculum, and the overall development of the campus. Because of this, the campus appears to be and is in a state of stagnation.

"The nature of Southern Tech is geared toward applied engineering technology and must be allowed to change as industry makes advances in technical areas. Speaking for the students and a major portion of the faculty at Southern Tech, this relationship with Ga. Tech is detrimental to the future of Southern Tech as a viable engineering technology school.

"Therefore I would like to ask the Board if you have looked into this relationship, and if not, will you in the near future."

At this point I will try to relate, to the best of my knowledge, the gist of the dialog that followed.

Chancellor Simpson rose to say that he and Dr. Pettit had studied the situation some time ago and had made administrative changes to correct the problems that they had found.

I felt, from his statements, that he was relating to the Board that they had personally perceived the problem and solved it, and that all was well. By then I had lost the floor and another school was recognized. After that question had been dealt with, a Southern Tech student, Pat Moss, was recognized and reopened the Southern Tech issue.

Pat relinquished the floor to me and I attempted to relate to the Board that it had been due to the action of the Southern Tech Faculty that the problems had surfaced and that some sort of action was necessary. I further stated that the changes had only treated some of the symptoms of a much deeper problem.

Vice Chancellor Hooper rose to relate in detail the changes that had been made when Dr. Pettit came to Southern Tech and spoke to us in the Gym. He followed this by stating that the Chancellor's office has yet to determine how engineering technology fits into the overall educational system. He went on to state that "every junior college wants to be a senior college, every senior college wants to be a university, and every engineering technology school wants to be an engineering school."

I could not let that statement go unchallenged so I stated that in my five years at Southern Tech I had seen no movements in that direction and that the faculty seemed to have a clear concept of our purpose. With this Dr. Hooper agreed that it had been two years since the changes had been in effect and that maybe the time had come to check on the results.

If you remember this question and answer period was between the Board and the Student Advisory Council. The dialog took place between the Chancellor, Vice Chancellor and myself in front of the Board.

I have been at every Board meeting since July and it did not take long to realize that the Board of Regents relies heavily on the input from the Chancellor's staff concerning problems with the University System. This is the reason that I brought this issue before the Board and this is why I am relating it to you.

If we don't raise the issue of separation it will not be faced or dealt with on any higher levels. The issue is two-fold; what is the role of engineering technology; and do we have the intelligence to be autonomous?



NEW COORDINATOR OF STUDENT DEVELOPMENT

On Monday, February 20, Dr. Dick Bean begins his employment with Southern Tech as our new Coordinator of Student Development. [He replaces Jack Selter, who left over a year ago.]

His resume is, to say the least, quite impressive. Born in Mobile, Alabama in 1944 Dr. Bean is married to Katherine Sollee. He graduated from Childersburg High School and then attended the Univ. of Alabama. His major was in Education and his B.S. was granted in 1967. Later he attended Georgia State University and was granted a Masters of Arts with a Major in Counseling Psychology in 1973.

Coursework done in 1977 on Career Counseling at Georgia State landed Mr. Bean his Ph.D.

Dr. Bean's employment record is absolutely astounding. He has been the athletic director for Atlanta Public Schools; he was the counselor and coach for a Baptist school in New Orleans; and the YMCA youth guidance director in Tuscaloosa, Ala. He was also the counselor and coordinator for Athletes in Action for the SouthWestern Conference in Houston, Texas.

He has held several posts as a consultant and has published five articles, etc. since 1968.

For you sports-fans, Dr. Bean was an All-American in high school and was given a Football scholarship to the Univ. of Ala. While at the University, he was a member of the National Championship team in 1964 and 1965. Dr. Bean was also Coach of the Year for football in 1971 as nominated by the Atlanta Journal/Constitution, the Atlanta Touchdown Club and the "100% Wrong Club."

APPOINTMENT OF AMET/TET DEPARTMENT HEAD

The Board of Regents at their meeting of February 8, approved the recommendation for the appointment of Professor Lawrence Haddock as Head of the Apparel and Textile Engineering Technology Department.

Under the leadership of Professor Haddock as Acting Head the department has continued to expand its activities and further establish the department's reputation in fields of apparel and textile engineering technology.

GROUP LEADERS - Youth groups throughout the country need adults to give special interest demonstrations on subjects like pet care, woodworking, rocketry, and food preparation.



But when the clock ran out, it was 95-91, LaGrange. The Hornets put forth a fine effort and the loss of the game itself isn't very important. This week of February 20, we enter the G.I.A.C. Tournament and the odds on our Hornets are looking good.


