Much to my regret, Tom Root announced his resignation as editor of The STIng today. Tom agreed to give the job a try only this quarter, but has found that his own academic schedule simply cannot coincide with his duties as editor. So we are more or less back where we started less than a month ago: we need an editor for this newspaper!

Since I took on the advisorship to The STIng in September, the editor's revolving chair has also become a revolving door. Perhaps this is as it should be: new editors help to give new looks to The STIng. But we also need a certain consistency and continuity of leadership if the paper is to continue with at least a modicum of success. I continue to believe that The STIng has a beneficial role on campus: it provides space not only for the rather routine announcements of campus events, but for generally thoughtful statements about campus life. If it is not to decline into a mere bulletin board. if, in fact, it is to perform in the proper journalistic tradition of speaking to and about issues on and off campus that concern us all, we must have someone to guide it responsibly and consistently.

One of the troubles with The STIng, of course, is that it is not published to make money. The advertisements rates are promulgated to provide a cushion for a small budget and more space (more pages) when the times seem right. Ads are not solicited to create profit for the paper, though they are indeed remunerative to individual solicitors. Since we cannot rely on a money ethic to stimulate interest in working for The STIng, we have to rely on its journalistic function and the opportunity it creates to practice writing and management skills to keep the paper moving.

Perhaps this opportunity is now beckoning to you. I hope so. Student activities cannot continue without student participation, and of course there is no reason they should. I asked myself as I sold hot dogs and pop corn for the basketball tournament, where are the students who might be doing this? I ask now as a vacancy occurs in the editor's office, where are the students who should be doing this? If you are one, and want to give it a try, come by and see me: George E. Kennedy II, Room 275, extension 203. (By the way, the editor's job pays a modest salary of \$150 a quarter.)



The Southern Tech Campus in Marietta, Ga. is a peaceful place. During the day, at least, I've never seen an arguement, much less, a disturbance. So I've often wondered why our Security Police must carry side arms.

A conversation with Officer Clive Roundtree has provided a satisfactory, answer: Our Security Police are sworn in as Deputies of both the Marietta and Cobb County Police Departments. If the need should arise, our Security Force may be called upon to aid the Marietta or Cobb County Police. This mutual aid agreement works both ways: if our Police ever need assistance, they need only ask.

Unlike at least one Northern State System, college campuses in Georgia are considered to be within the town or city in which they are located. Therefore town or city police may enter our campus at any time.

Our Police Force has been trained in the proper use of their weapons. Officer Roundtree assures me they would be used only as a last resort, as in a case where someone's life were actually threatened. So given the good natured attitude of our students, and unless some outside fugitive takes refuge at Southern Tech, I doubt if we will ever see a Patrolman draw his gun.

THE INDOCTRINATION OF PROFESSOR GATES

On April the tenth, nineteen-seventy-eight, Professor Roberta Gates of Southern Tech, received her PhD in Educational Leadership with a major in English. Dr. Gates will be awarded her diploma on June tenth, nineteen-seventy-eight. Dr. Gates has studied since nineteen-seventy-two for this honor. Dr. Gates' disortation for the degree was a Grammatical Analysis of Foreign Students' Compositions at Southern Tech. Much of this was achieved through the use of multiple computer runs. This process is mainly called a Quantitative Analysis.

We, at Southern Tech, would like to congratulate Dr. Gates on her achievement and wish her the best use of it throughout the future years. V.R. White, Veterans Administration Regional Office Director in Atlanta, has a friendly reminder for GI Bill students who might overload themselves with summer courses.

"The VA doesn't pay GI Bill students for dropping courses," White pointed out. "In fact, a veteran who drops a course mid-term can find himself owing the VA money or at least having his monthly educational payment cut proportionately," the VA official said.

That's why the VA encourages GI Bill students contemplating dropping "problem" courses to use GI Bill tutorial assistance benefits to avoid both educational and financial setbacks. It's a free service to the veteran which isn't charged against the veteran's basic educational entitlement.

The governmet did not pay for tutorial assistance for World War II and Korean conflict veterans, but under present law VA will pay as much as \$69 a month for such help up to a maximum of \$828.

In addition to veterans and active duty servicemen, tutorial benefits are available to widows, widowers, spouses and children studying under the VA's Dependents' Educational Assistance Program.

Veterans and servicemen attending school at the post-secondary leval on at least a half-time basis are eligible if they have a deficiency in a subject required in an approved program of education, VA said.

Applications, certified by the veteran's school, should be made on VA Form 22-1990t within a year of the tutoring and should be submitted to the VA Regional Office which maintains the veteran's claim folder. Campus veterans offices or local VA offices have the forms and details.

NATIONAL ACTION TO DRAW THE LINE AGAINST NUCLEAR ECONOMY"

A major rally hosted by the Palmetto Alliance will take place in Barnwell, S.C. on April 30, 1978, with participants coming from as far as Hiroshima, Japan. Barnwell is home of Allied General Nuclear Services, the site of a nearly completed nuclear fuel reprocessing plant and nuclear waste storage facility. Although President Carter has cancelled indefinitely the commercial entry of nuclear fuel reprocessing, the facility receives \$14 million in federal subsidies and is being considered by federal officials as a major storage site for foreign spent nuclear fuel.

The Barnwell Rally will begin with a legal march to the AGNS plant where a written petition will be delivered to the major stockholders of the AGNS on March 27, demanding their presence at AGNS on April 30, to meet with Palmetto Alliance representatives to negotiate the conversion of the plant to a non-nuclear function, or its permanent closure. If the demands are not agreed to there will be a Human Petition delivering itself to the gates of AGNS the next day, May 1. They will remain on AGNS property until our demands are met or they are arrested.

Extensive non-violent training and preparation for the demonstration is being organized by the "Radioactivist Units of the Natural Guard."

MARIETTA CIVITAN CLUB STUDENT LOAN FUND AT SOUTHERN TECH

Mr. Lamar Barrett, President, Marietta Civitan Club, has recently established an emergency student loan fund for Southern Tech students. This fund will assist students in emergency situations where a small amount of money is needed (sickness, books, etc.).

Dr. Walter O. Carlson, Executive Director/ Dean accepted this fund from the Civitan Club and expressed our gratitude to the Club for their support of the college.

PLUTONIUM PROTEST PLANNED

Jackson Browne, talented song-writer and singer, will appear April 30, at a rally along with other environmental activists to protest the development of the Barnwell Nuclear Processing Plant. The coalition of three local concerned citizens groups has resulted in a three-day non-violent demonstration against the Allied Chemical Corporation owned plant which has been designed as a nuclear waste recycling and storage plant. The dangers of radiation poisoning will be explored and alternative energy sources will be presented by the Palmetto, Catfish and Dogwood Alliances.

"No Nukes is Good Nukes," says Brett Bursey, Spokesperson for the Columbia, South Carolina based Palmetto Alliance. Bursey says his group plans to rally April 29 at a site three miles from the Barnwell plant for a peaceful value-sharing training session to petition the Allied Chemical Corporation against further development of the nuclear plant. The rally site covers 20 acres rented by the Palmetto Alliance.

April 30, the Palmetto Alliance will sponsor an alternative energy fair at the rally site where Jackson Brown will appear with other musical and theatrical groups. Brown has actively endorsed environmental ecology endeavors both in his musical works and as a speaker. April 21, Jackson will perform a benefit concert in Township Hall, Columbia, S.C. for the Palmetto Alliance. John Sebastian and Dave Lindley will also perform.

Dr. John Gofman, co-discoverer of plutonium, Dr. Helen Caldicott and other nuclear experts, will hold an open forum at the April 30, rally. A delegation from Hiroshimia, Japan, will attend.

On May 1st there will be a non-violent, orderly march from the rally site to the gates of the recycling plant. There the marchers will present themselves as a human petition against further plutonium developmen

GUIDELINES OFFER SOLUTION ON SEXIST LANGUAGE

The McGraw-Hill Book Company's "Guidelines for Equal Treatment of the Sexes" (1221 Avenue of the Americas, New York, NY 10020) offers a solution to the problem of complaints about "sexist" language in writing.

Originally written for McGraw-Hill authors and editors, the guidelines detail alternatives to everyday expressions that can be termed sexist, such as substituting the word "student" for "co-ed," "poet" for "poetess," "homemaker" for "housewife," "human race" for "mankind," and "fire fighter" for "fireman." It also asks writers "to avoid unnecessary references to women's marital status and the 'gee-whiz' attitude to women who perform competently in jobs.

The booklet also discusses the use of masculine pronouns: "Avoid when possible the pronouns 'he,' 'him,' and 'his' in reference to the hypothetical person or humanity in general."

The guildelines are easily understood and comprehensive. Although the main emphasis is on sexist wording about women, the guide gives useful ideas on avoiding sexist statements against males and females alike.

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

If you plan to come or would like to help Marvin organize this bash, then give him a call or sign up at one of the name list placed on the ASCE bulletin board.


