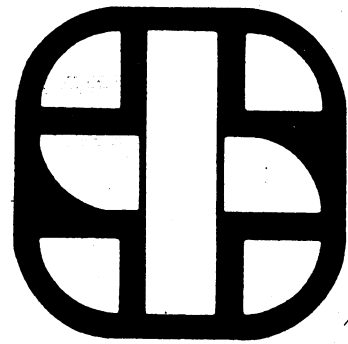

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PARKING !

Parking space at Southern Tech has never been at as much of a premium as it is right now. With the sudden influx of 2400 students, most of them needing a parking space, it really is not surprising that a mad scramble for a spot can take place.

The man who is responsible for handling this situation is Mr. James Robertson who heads the Business and Finance Office at Southern Tech. In a recent conversation with Mr. Robertson, he provided some interesting information on the parking situation here at Southern Tech. He also discussed at length the use of Georgia Theater's parking lot as an auxiliary source of space.

The school has been aware of its need for additional parking spaces for quite a while. It had initially hoped to solve the problem by having more parking lots built before the problem became critical. Unfortunately, the two additional lots that had been requested will not be coming through in time to alleviate the crunch of returning and new Fall Quarter Students at Southern Tech. The entire parking lot situation really is outside of Southern Tech's hands. They have very little control over making any changes. All they can do is try to cope effectively with the situation, proposing alternate solutions and studying the current facts to make adequate recommendations for the future.

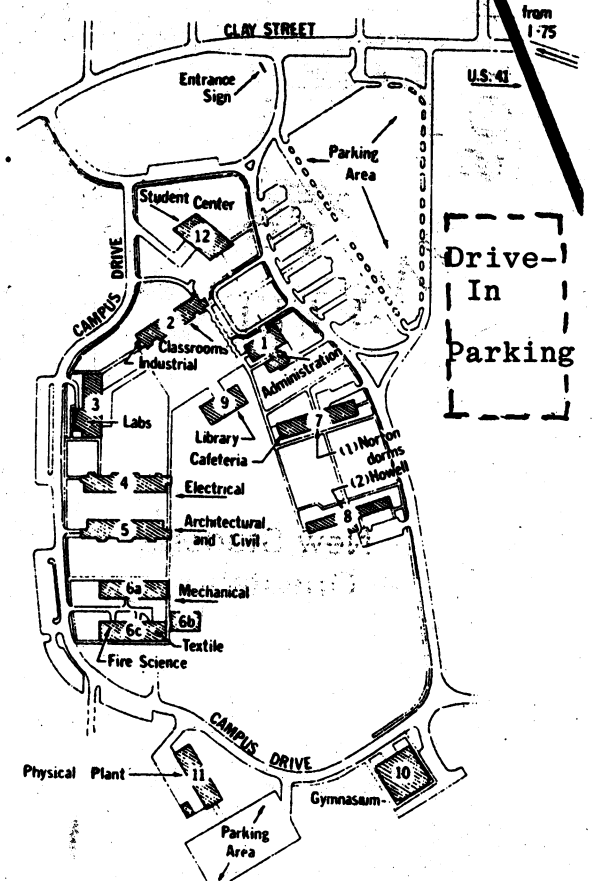
The current parking space on campus was augmented through the use of the extra spaces at the drive-in theater next to the campus. This alternative was chosen over trying to run a shuttle bus system from one of the nearby shopping centers or Lockheed to the campus. By taking advantage

of Georgia Theater's offer, the school can provide a more convenient solution for the students. It can also save some money because the drive-in's owners are not charging Southern Tech for the use of the lot.

However, the only real problem with making use of the Georgia Theatre's lot is that all cars must be gone by 2:30 PM. This means that students who have classes which will last longer than 2:30 PM are strongly urged to move their cars before then. Any cars left at the drive-in lot after 2:30 PM will be towed away at the owner's expense. The cost of this action could be in the neighborhood of \$30.00. Besides the long walk, this plan could prove expensive to the students who don't heed the 2:30 PM deadline.

While these temporary measures are being used, the school is in the process of submitting the paperwork necessary to get an additional +270 parking spaces. They hope to have them by January 1, 1979. But Mr. Robertson was candid in suggesting that it may

be a little longer than that before the new lots are completed.

The request for the parking lots must be made to both the Georgia Department of Transportation and the Cobb County Commissioners. The whole project is a co-operative effort. DOT supplies the materials such as asphalt, while the county does the actual work.

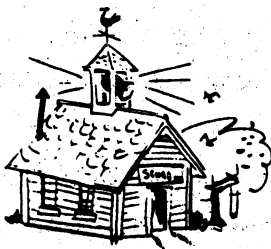

TOM PARKS

When told by his manager that he needed a bio for his press package, Tom agreed to supply the information under two conditions: the bio had to be about him and he could leave out the 1965, (which he couldn't remember anyway.) Hesitantly, his manager agreed. Several weeks later, he received the following information. It was wrapped around a rock, thrown through the window of his office and marked "return postage guaranteed."

The first time Tom Parks ever performed was as the M.C. for a high school talent show. It was at this time, when Tom first

stepped on that stage, in front of all those people, that he decided what he wanted to be; a Certified Public Accountant.

In 1973, armed with a Bachelor of Science Degree in Journalism from the University of Florida, TOM PARKS moved to Atlanta to take his place in society and found it had already been taken. A high school drop-out from Denver got it in 1970 while Tom was taking a final exam in Comparative Religion. The guy is now making \$28,000 a year with stock options. A weaker person, in the face of this kind of disaster, would have given up and moved back in with

his parents. Tom's parents moved and didn't leave a forwarding address. That left two alternatives become a comedian or go into a coma.....so....

The second time he stepped on stage was late in 1973 at the tender age of 23. A career was launched.

Since that time TOM PARKS has appeared with such greats as Neil Sedaka, Red White and Blue Grass, Dr. Hook and The Medicine Show and J.J. Cale.

FINANCIAL AID AT SOUTHERN TECH

The Financial Aid Office plays an important role in the school organization and it is one of the busiest offices at Southern Tech. Hundreds of students have come to this office and have found the means to get ahead and to be able to finish school for a better life that perhaps would have been impossible to achieve under other circumstances. The primary purpose of financial assistance is to provide aid to students who, without such assistance would be unable to attend or remain in school.

The director of Financial Aid is Mrs. Emerelle Glover, financial aid secretary is Mrs. Joyce Barber and student assistants are Diego Bermudez, Shirley Jackson, and Greg Phillips. They are here to assist the student with his or her financial problems.

No, you don't have to be poor to qualify for aid, but you have to prove that you need assistance and show a positive attitude in getting ahead.

Financial aid comes in different forms: grants and scholarships, which do not have to be repaid; loans which generally carry a low interest rate and are repaid between 9 and 12 months after you graduate or leave school and employment usually 15 to 20 hours per week, through which you can earn money to help pay your way.

NEW CHECK CASHING POLICIES FOR ALL STUDENTS, STAFF, AND FACULTY

The Cashier's Office has released the following list of changes and rules that will be in effect for persons wishing to cash checks.

1. No two-party checks except from the immediate family.
2. No STI or Georgia Tech checks except for checks requested by Financial Aid.

Because of the cost, the school could not afford to contract privately for the lots. It would probably cost nearly twice as much as it will cost to have the county and state do the job.

The Georgia Department of Transportation has an engineering service which it has offered to the school at no charge. This service will examine the present parking situation here on campus and determine what is needed. This examination will take place in either the late Fall or during Winter Quarter.

Some things to note about using the Georgia Theater: students will come in the exit road; the entrance road is blocked; Campus policemen will be avail-

able to provide adequate security protection for the cars parked over in this lot. Mr. Robertson also asked that everybody be safety-conscious-to guard against having any wrecks or accidents. Also, one-way parking on one side of the campus drive will also probably be instituted.

The current measure being taken to handle this situation are only temporary. But there is no getting around the fact that they will cause some inconvenience.

Tom is now in the process of writing a book entitled "How To Raise Chinchillas In Your Temporal Lobes", a definitive guide to selecting a college and what to expect from four years of all-night poker, eight o'clock classes and institutional food.

To support his growing need for paper and pencils, Tom is also touring the country speaking on high school fads, college grads, plants in heat and his mother's cooking.

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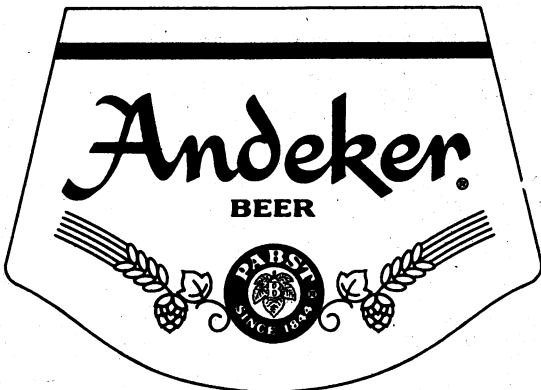
