BREAKFAST TOPICS

After a hearty Southern-style breakfast of eggs, bacon, grits, toast, hash browns, juice, and coffee, several students got down to the business of asking Dean Carlson some interesting questions on several aspects of life here on the Southern Tech campus. Although Breakfast with the Dean was a pay-your-own-way affair, it proved to be a good chance to talk to Dr. Carlson on the students' own ground, away from the confines of the administration building, amid the normal coffee-drinking, paper-reading crowd of students and faculty at the Student Center snack bar area unobtrusively. Yes, everyone sat on the regular chairs and put up with the same wobbly tables— even Dr. Carlson.

Besides Dr. Carlson, Mr. Charles Smith (Dean of Students) joined nearly a dozen other students to take part in this question and answer time. Sue Konrad, Student Center Activities Director, was also there.

One of the first topics brought up was the public image, or lack of, that Southern Tech has. Dr. Carlson commented on this topic by agreeing that we do have a problem in this area. He then went on to mention that he had recently returned from a conference in Chicago where he presented a paper outlining the differences between engineering schools and engineering technology schools. Excerpts from that paper will be published at a later date in the Sting. He stress-

ed that the main confusion is in the terminology and what people are conditioned to expect when they hear the word "technology." Out of this comment came the suggestion that a segment on explaining the difference between engineering and engineering technology be incorporated into the next freshman orientation. It was mentioned that the ASCE in the Civil Department has done this, and that they have had good success with their program.

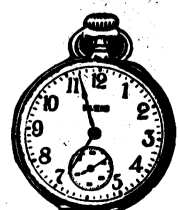
The problem of offering more electives as well as being able to transfer more non-technical credits from courses such as sociology, art, and music, and other liberal arts-type subjects was also discussed. Dr. Carlson replied by stating that in fact, the total number of credit hours that are now required for a four-year degree have decreased to only a little over two hundred. If the number of hours needed for graduating were increased, people could take more electives, and then students would have the chance to become more well-rounded. But the general consensus was that this suggestion would not be very popular. It was mentioned that the problem of getting transfer credit would be reduced if Southern Tech did offer more non-technical classes in humanities. Many students transferring to Southern Tech would have the chance to transfer more hours.

Several of the members from one of the fraternities on campus asked Dr.

Carlson about a vacant piece of land on campus. The main reason for the question was because of a desire to see the land used for fraternity houses or a "fraternity row". Dr. Carlson gave some background information on the land. It is surplus government land which is currently being used for proposed parking expansion, ecological observations, and as a softball field. Dean Smith commented that the land is being considered for more expansion of the athletic field, which is badly needed. He also made some pertinent comments on the problems of financing the building of a fraternity

house. This is mainly because most lending institutions will not lend money for construction on land that they cannot hold the deed to for collateral. This would be the case with this tract of land located opposite the Civil Building on the south west corner of the campus. The legal complications involved were also mentioned as a major obstacle.

The breakfast ended on an optimistic note, and it was certainly an unusual occasion to get together with Dr. Carlson.

Message Number 2 (SGA Members)

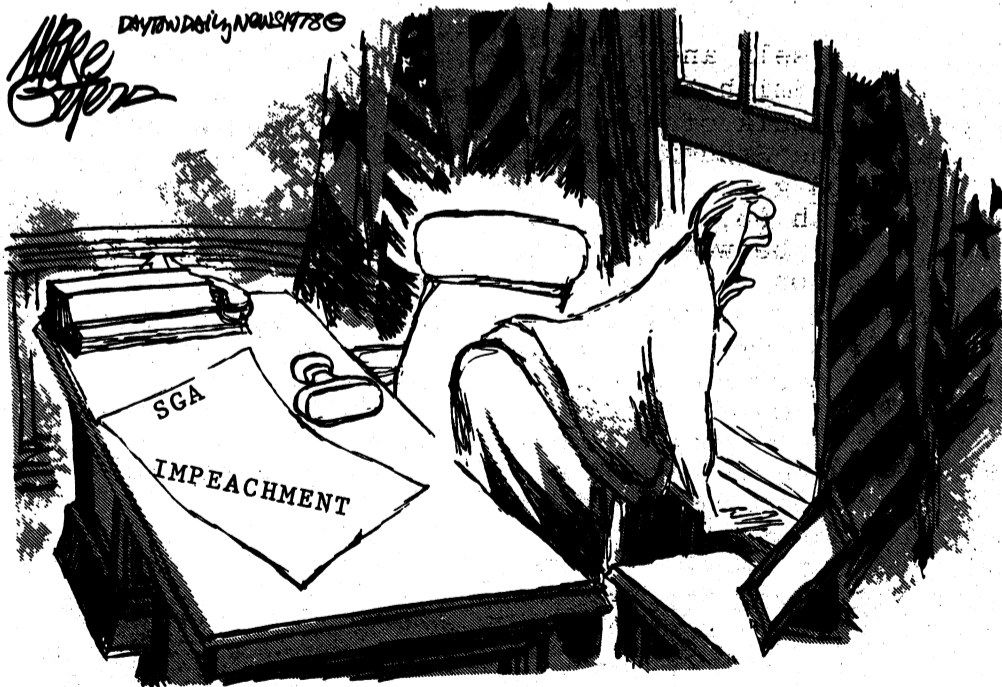

The following article is in response to Mr. Taylor's article. It is written by SGA President Barbra Ransom. Both writers have pressed their own opinions. Both articles are being run as they are received.

In responding to the article entitled "Impeachment," I am reminded of a sign on Highway 41 entitled "The Four-Way Test." Is it the truth? Is it kind? Is it fair to all concerned? Will it promote good will and better friendships?

The Southern Tech SGA is perfectly capable of fulfilling its duties as the governing body of Southern Tech student affairs. We meet once a week on Wednesday at 7:00 p.m., and we work hard, but we've only met twice for this quarter. Minutes of these meetings are available in the library. Please read them.

There is a constitution in effect. It was rewritten and is in the process of being finished as far as adding amendments to the old constitution goes. The Student Government passed this and the students overwhelmingly approved the amendments in a referendum vote. This was the exact procedure for amending as outlined in the Old Constitution.

ARTICLE IX, SECTION 2-AMENDMENTS
Amendments to this Constitution may be proposed at regular meetings of the SGA by 2/3 of the members present, if a quorum exists, or by a petition of 10% of the Student Body. Amendments become part of this Constitution by ratification by 2/3 of votes cast in a special election, which the President of the Student Body shall call, provided the proposed amendments have been published at least one week prior to the vote by the Student Body and further provided that the proposed amendments be approved by 2/3 majority vote of the active membership of the Student Council.

I hope that clears up Charge #1. As for Robert's Rules of Order, Joe is right. We need a stronger knowledge of Parliamentary Procedure. I think this is a fairly common weakness in organizations and many people don't realize that Robert's Rules of Order is a cumbersome, formal procedure designed to protect the rights of members. However, it is useful in conducting business and maintaining a serious atmosphere." Point well taken, Joe.

As for the \$95,000, I wish we had control that money. However, \$95,000 is the projected amount of Student Activity Fees to be collected in the year 1978-79. This

money was allocated in a proposed budget prepared by Tom Samford last Spring Quarter. As President of the Sophomore Class I voted to approve this budget in a Student Council meeting. It was then forwarded to the Student Activities Committee for review and approval, which it received. Finally, it becomes effective upon the approval and subsequent action of the Dean/Executive Director.

As of this moment, the SGA has around \$3,000 for entertainment and \$4,000 set aside for the Bathtub Races. The SGA Treasurer is responsible for maintaining the books for the STing, LOG, WSTB Radio Station and the SGA itself. All receipts from these groups have

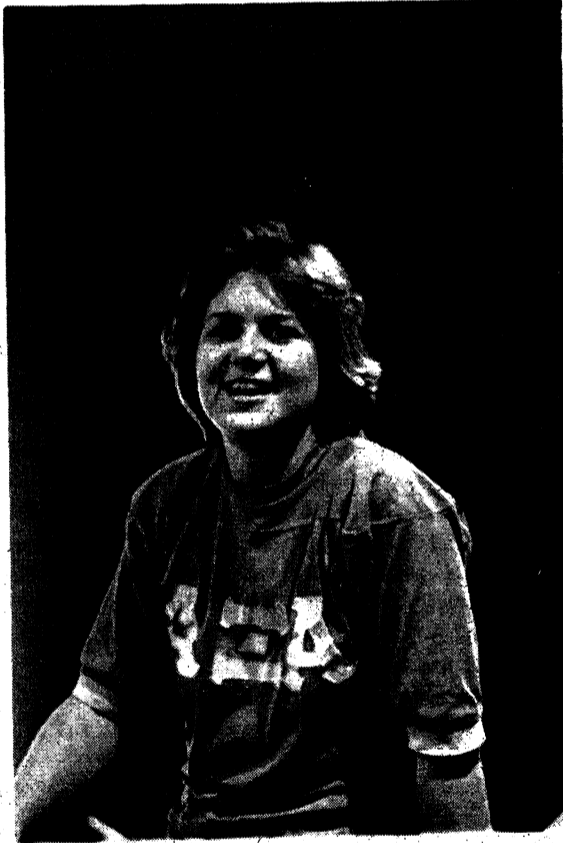

to be signed by myself and Dean of Students, Dean Smith before they will be paid. The bulk of the 95,000 is allocated to the Student Center (\$56,000); The LOG gets \$12,454.50; SGA comes next with \$8,637.40. The remainder is split between the STing, Radio Station, and Entertainment (around \$4,000).

As for the Judiciary Cabinet, we haven't had one in the past because there weren't enough students interested in serving on this cabinet.

ARTICLE VI JUDICIAL SECTION 1 ORGANIZATION

"The Judiciary Cabinet is duly constituted as the Supreme Judicial Body of Southern Technical Institute and has the responsibility to review all violations of the Student

Rules and Regulations of Southern Technical Institute with the exception of Academic Rules, the Judiciary Cabinet also has the power to review and interpret this Constitution and its By-Laws and all other actions of the Student Council as they pertain to these documents.

SECTION 2 MEMBERSHIP - PARAGRAPH A
The Judiciary Cabinet is composed of ten justices and one Chairman elected by the Student Council not later than the second meeting of the Student Council in the Fall Quarter. Their term of service held shall be one year.

PARAGRAPH C
The Justices and Chariman will be elected from the roster of students enrolled that quarter.

PARAGRAPH D
Members of the Student Council will be excluded from being members of Judiciary Cabinet.

I need students interested in serving on this cabinet to fill out an Institute Committee form and write-in Judiciary Cabinet. These forms are on the SGA President's door. We will hold elections in two weeks, on Oct. 25, 1978.

In conclusion, the duties of the Student Government Association as stated in our valid constitution:

ARTICLE IV SECTION 6 PARAGRAPH A CLAUSE A.

The Student Council represents the entire Student Body in all matters affecting student interest, exercises general supervision over all student activities, and charters all student organizations.

CLAUSE E.
The Student Council determines the non-academic rules and regulations necessary and proper for the general well-being of the Student Body not already covered by the statutes.

CLAUSE F.
The Student Council establishes governing boards and councils for the Student Body to determine policy, rules, regulations, and makes decisions on matters which fall within the jurisdiction of the Student Government Association.

If the SGA didn't care about students we would impeach ourselves, just to escape the extra responsibility. We are working for the students and we want your suggestions, ideas, and constructive criticism. We should be installing some SGA Suggestion Boxes around the campus - please take time to forward your suggestions and let us work together for you!

WHAT PARKING PROBLEM?

Dear Editor:

Some students may recall the Oct. 5, Iranian students propaganda table in the Student Center. I mentioned to these Iranians that their literature was incorrect in claiming that Islamic Marxist were not responsible for the Aug. 21 terrorist arson attack on civilians in Iran. I was promptly told to go to Hell. When I didn't go to Hell, these Iranians (at the table) lapsed into the use of Communist dogma and called me an American capitalist pig. I thought this rather funny. Noting their use of esoteric and egalitarian diction, I asked if any of these Iranians knew what capital (root word of capitalist) is. One Iranian looked at another and, with a puzzled look on his face. Even some whispering among countrymen did not produce an answer that would indicate even a rudimentary knowledge of economics.

When a man does not understand the slogans he mouths, how can he know if he supports or opposes that which the slogans represent? I submit to all students that Iranians who oppose the Shah do not know what they are talking about, do not understand what they are doing, do not know the probable consequences of their activities, and just plain don't care that they are wrong.

The Iranians at the propaganda table said that they wanted the Shah deposed so that a democratic government could be established. So why do they solicit support from Americans when the word democracy does not appear in our Declaration of Independence, our U.S. Constitution, our "Bill of Rights", or any of the constitutions of any of the 50 states? Democracy is majority rule - the law of the lynch mob. Right or wrong, the mob rules and there is no law but the inconsistent whim of the mob. This is chaos. What these Iranians want (whether they want to realize it or not) is this same chaos mixed with a lot of anarchy because there cannot be a Communist takeover in Iran without it. Afgani-

stan, to the north of Iran, has been taken by the Communists so there is a real and present danger of Communist aggression.

I do not wish to infringe upon the right to speech or press, but if these anti-Shah Iranians persist in disseminating their own propaganda, students should take action. Anti-Shah Iranians can be asked to show their Green Card (Blue Card, Tan Card), suspicious Iranians can be reported to the Immigration & Naturalization Service (881-4677), comments-for-the-Record can be sent to GBI, FBI, and CIA. Also responsible Iranian students can take action by policing their numbers and getting it together so they can live in harmony with sane moral Americans.

Since at least one anti-Shah Iranian group has allied itself with the Socialist Workers Party, students should write Congressman Gillis W. Long urging action on House Resolution 48 to re-establish the House Internal Security Committee (see me for details).

Have you received a parking ticket for parking in a reserved space? Have you been late to class because there were no parking spaces at all? I'm sure that you will be relieved to know that the Georgia Department of Transportation (DOT) had definitely approved the construction of a new parking lot with a capacity of approximately 270 cars. The bureaucratic red tape is in the process now and the funds have already been committed for the project.

Mr. Jim Robertson, of the Business and Finance Office, told me that the additional parking could possibly be ready for use as soon as Winter Quarter, and if not, then definitely by Spring Quarter. The Georgia Drive-In has been accommodating approximately 200 cars daily, so this new lot should help to a great extent. The location of the new parking lot will be south of the existing faculty parking lot servicing buildings 5 and 6 (see map).

Mr. Robertson also said that there are plans to submit another proposal to the DOT for an additional 250-400 parking spaces to be located northeast of the gym. This proposal will be submitted before January 1, 1979. This will be done with the cooperation of the Cobb County Board of Commissioners, who will share in the cost of the additional parking facilities. Cobb County shares in the expense because they agreed to maintain the roads on campus when Southern Tech was first built.

It may seem that the construction of these parking lots has been a long time coming, but just like anything else that requires money and design, the time it takes is an unfortunate necessity.

I hope this information will make you feel a little more optimistic while you are making a mad dash for that last parking space; so in the meantime, happy hunting.

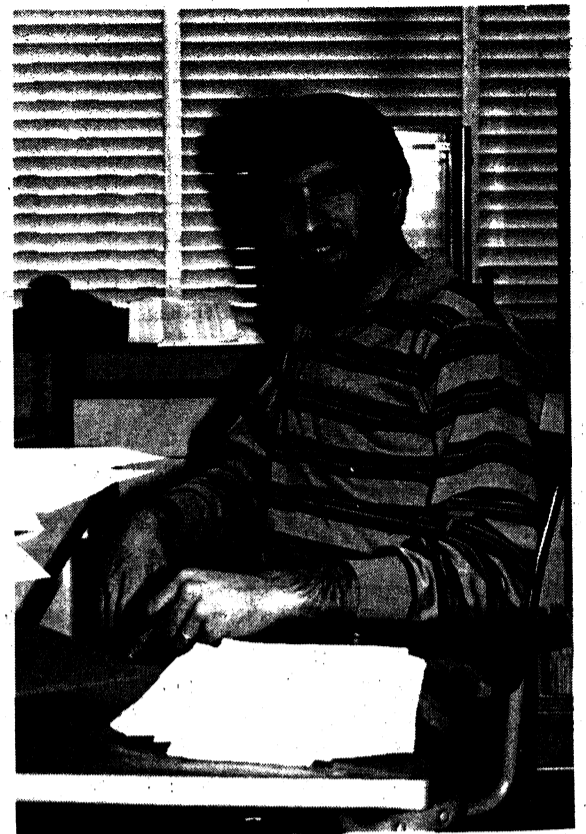

STI LIBRARY GETS RARE PRINTS

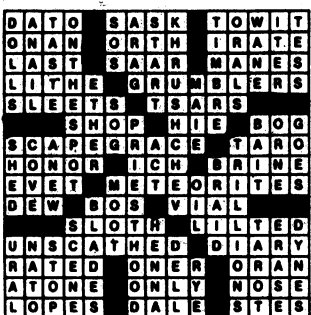
