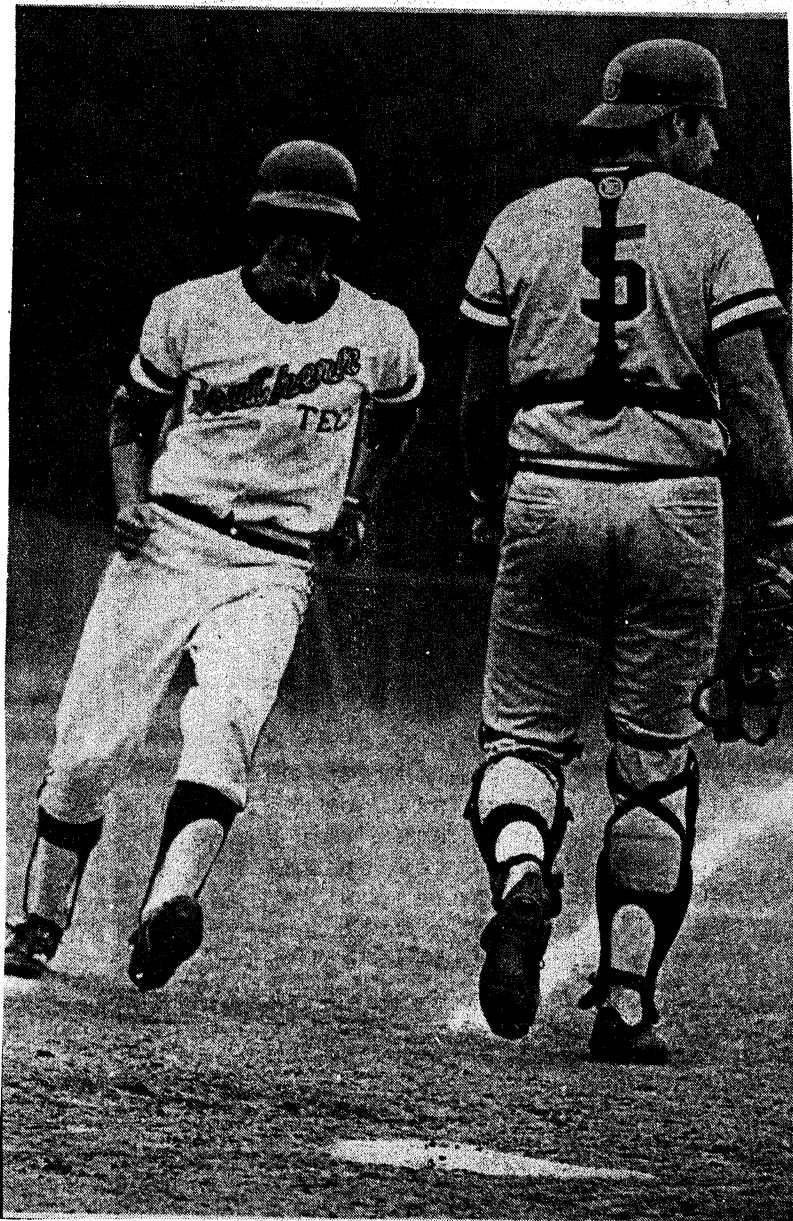

**OLD PRINCIPLES: NEW POTENTIAL**

The strongest case for a federal union of the Western democracies is found in a premier American document—*The Federalist Papers*. These articles by Madison, Hamilton and Jay (all called Publius), urging the adoption of the new Constitution, appeared in New York newspapers in 1787-1788.

Arguments Publius used to press the colonies on to Union then, also apply to the cause of federation among the democracies today. The obstacles to union are strikingly similar. "The plan offered," Hamilton wrote, "affects too many particular interests and innovates ... passions and prejudices little favorable to the discovery of truth."

But the common tradition of democracy can override such obstacles. As Publius says in Federalist #2, we are "a people descended from the same ancestors ... attached to the same principles of government, very similar in manners and customs ...". The people of the democracies share these characteristics on a scale that Publius could not have envisioned.

Then, as now, the safety of the people was paramount in forming a government. The simple belief that in unity there is strength is widely accepted; it was the foremost reason for the creation of NATO in 1949. But today's realities show, according to former Ambassador Robert Strausz-Hupé, that NATO can no longer remain in the middle ground between military alliance and a federation: "NATO cannot tarry in its present, nondescript state ... standing military alliances that have not evolved into political federations have always fallen apart."

Overt signs of the falling apart may already be occurring. The Cod War between Great Britain and Iceland proves the wisdom of Publius who stated in Federalist #7: "The competitions of commerce would be another fruitful source of contention."

These two founding members of NATO prove how quickly years of friendship can be put aside over economic and territorial disputes. The battle over Cyprus between two NATO allies also demonstrates a situation where a union by federal principles would recognize the diversity of individual parts while committing the whole to work together for the common good.

Federalist #10, a key chapter, gives a convincing argument for the U.S. to cast its lot with other democracies. "Extend the sphere and you take in a greater variety of parties and interests; you make it less probable that a majority of the whole will have a common motive to invade the rights of other citizens."

The need for a federated Western world becomes clearer when one looks back at the oil embargo of 1974, in which some Western nations were forced to change their policies so their people wouldn't freeze. Federalist #11 recognized the dangers of economic cartels and the temptation that disunity offered these groups: "In a state of disunion ... we should then be compelled to content ourselves with the first price of our commodities, and to see the profits of our trade snatched from us to enrich our enemies and persecutors." A united industrialized West would be so powerful that few organizations would be tempted to try economic blackmail again.

It is, in sum, the arguments of the Founding Fathers that carry the case for Federal Union. Nothing so truly captures the point than James Madison's words in Federalist #14: "Hearken not to the voice which petulantly tells you that the form of government recommended for your adoption is a novelty in the political world; that it has never yet had a place in the theories of the wildest projectors ... if novelties are to be shunned, believe me, the most alarming of all novelties, the most wild of all projects ... is that of rending us in pieces."

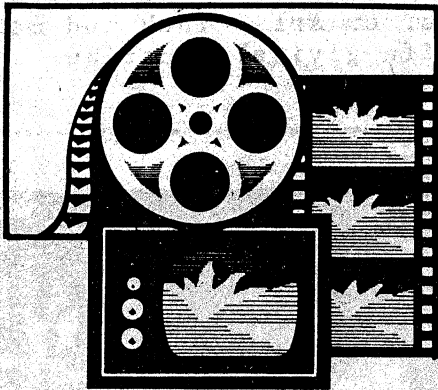

## LIBRARY ANNOUNCEMENT

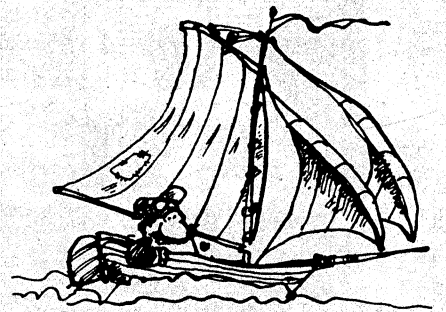
Effective with the beginning of Spring Quarter 1979, the Library overdue fine policy is changed as follows:

There will no longer be a maximum \$1.50 fine on reserve materials. Fines will be allowed to accrue until the price of the book has been reached.

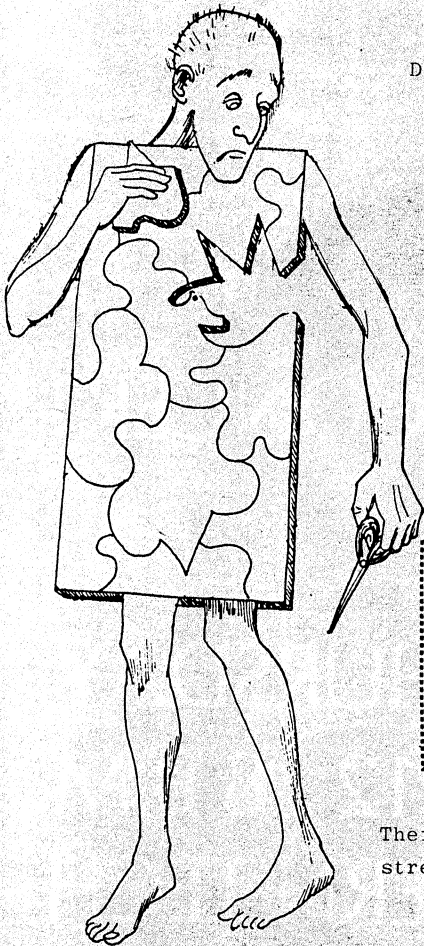

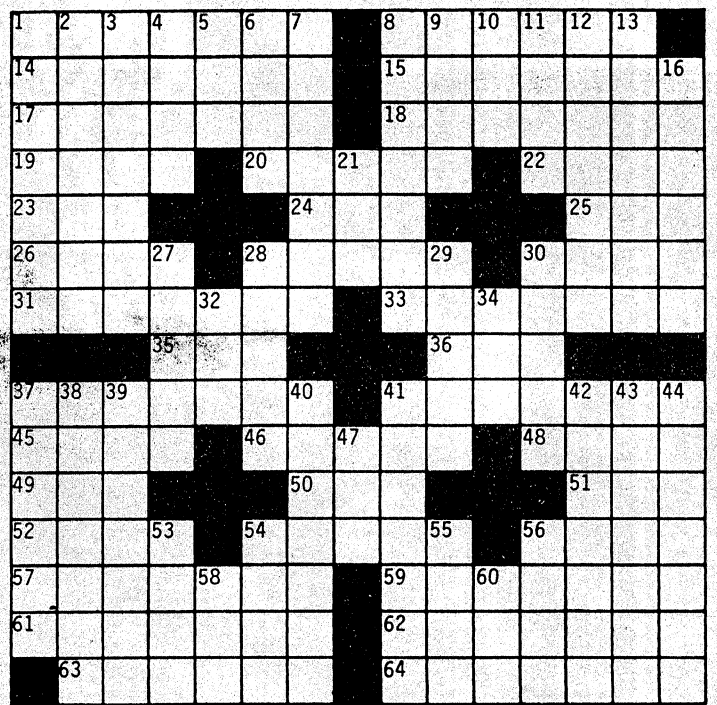
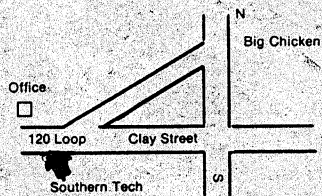

## Inman Park Spring Festival

Being "born again" has become quite popular and fashionable of late, but Atlanta's Inman Park was born again nine years ago when a small band of young hardy urban pioneers revived its decaying Victorian homes from the diseases of poverty and neglect. But urban renovation is becoming an old story as more and more people across the nation are rediscovering the joys of living in ties and living in big old comfortable homes. What, then, makes Inman Park special?

The spirit of Inman Park, embodied by the butterfly gardens dotting the neighborhood, is shared with all of Atlanta and beyond every year at the biggest open house around. Spring Festival 1979, April 28th and 29th from noon to six, features a house tour, flea market, arts and crafts, and continuous live entertainment. This year's theme, SmallTownDownTown, is indicative of Inman Park's dual nature: the warmth and closeness of small town living; the sophistication of urban proximity.

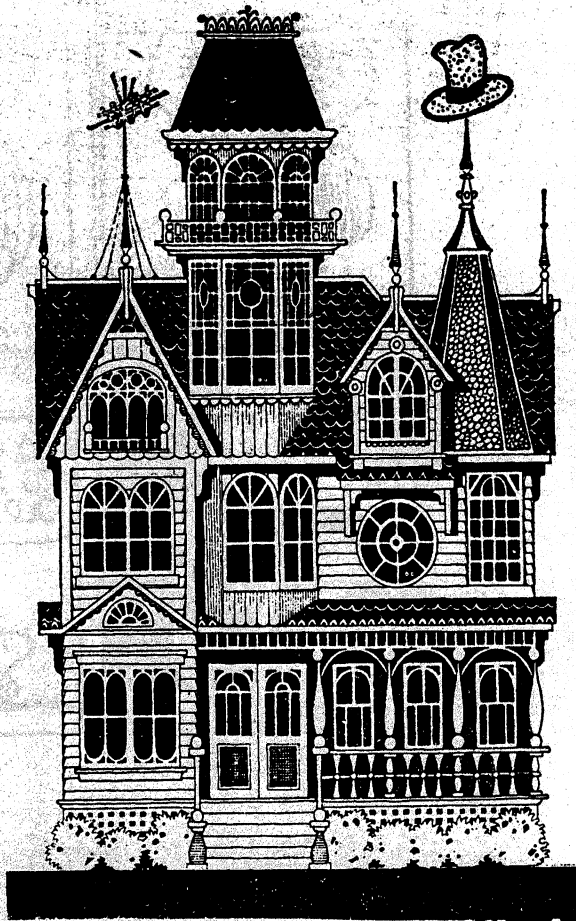
Those who are regular visitors to Festival will note the continuing facelift Inman Park has been getting ever since that first band of foolhardy dreamers saw more than

broken windows and chipped paint in those old homes. Walking the placid, tree-shaded avenues today, a newcomer would never think that this SmallTownDownTown was once one of Atlanta's worst crime districts, that gun fights in the street, a la O. K. Corral, were not unheard of, that the grassy meadows bisecting the neighborhood were once intended to be asphalt highways threatening to kill what poverty and neglect had already weakened.

And Spring Festival has done its part in the neighborhood rejuvenation. Besides the unity it provides to neighboring home owners working together, its monetary rewards have benefitted the community in a number of ways: contributions to the local day care program at Inman Park United Methodist Church; funding for special projects at Moreland Elementary School, such as reading kits, new stage curtains, etc.; beautification projects, such as landscaping of Delta Park (Edgewood at Delta); and many more. Really it is the SmallTown spirit of "let's work together and get things done," exemplified by Festival, that has made Inman Park what it is today.

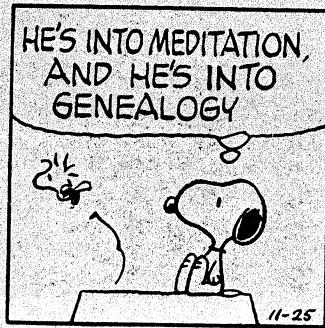
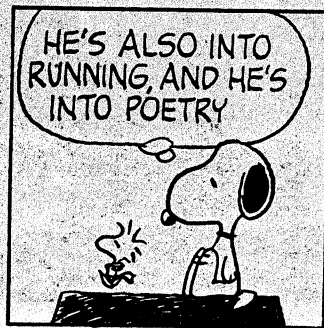
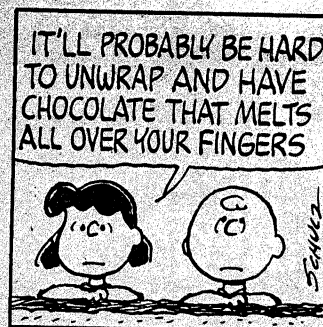
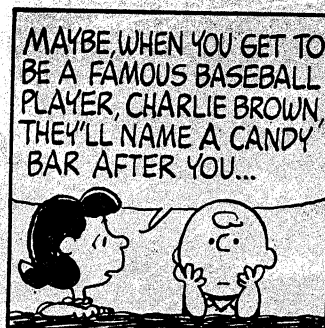
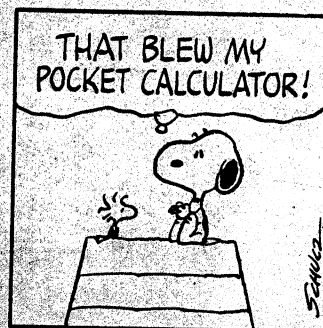
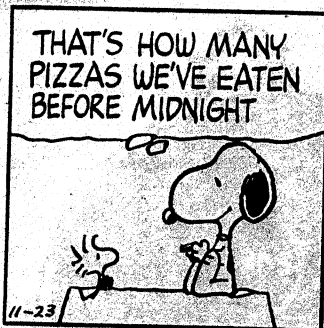
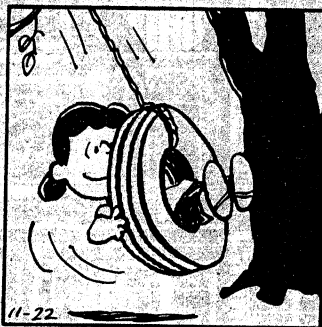
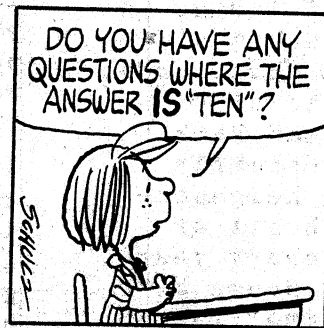
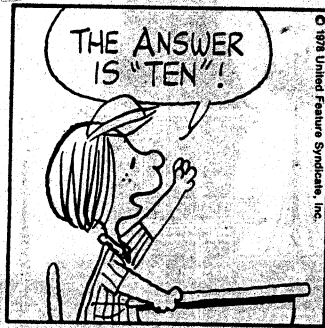
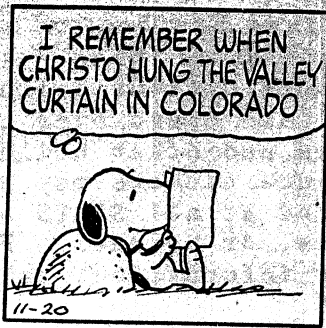
After eight years, Spring
