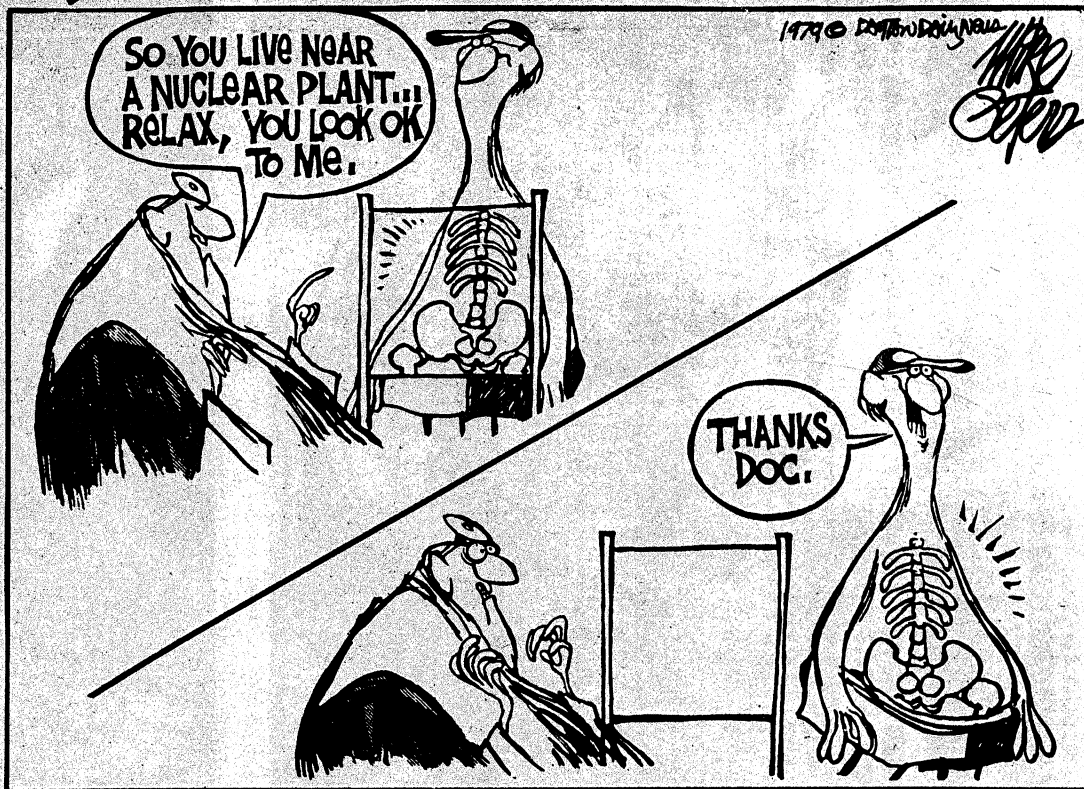
Board Formed

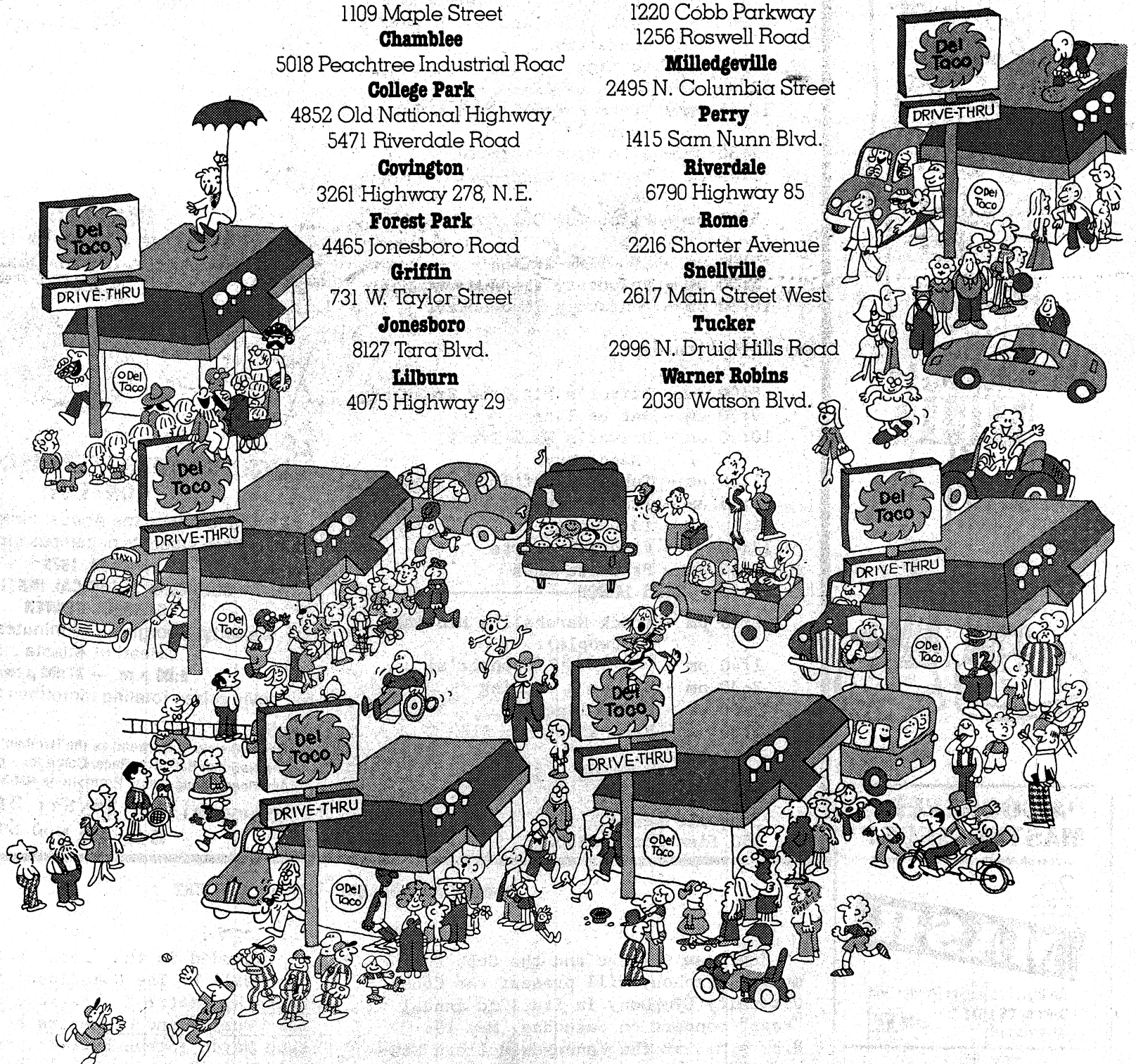

PARKING REGULATIONS FOR THE SPRING BATHTUB RACE

Parking will not be allowed on Campus Drive or on the road on the west side of the main parking lot from 10:00 pm on Friday, May 18, 1979 until after the race on Sunday, May 20.

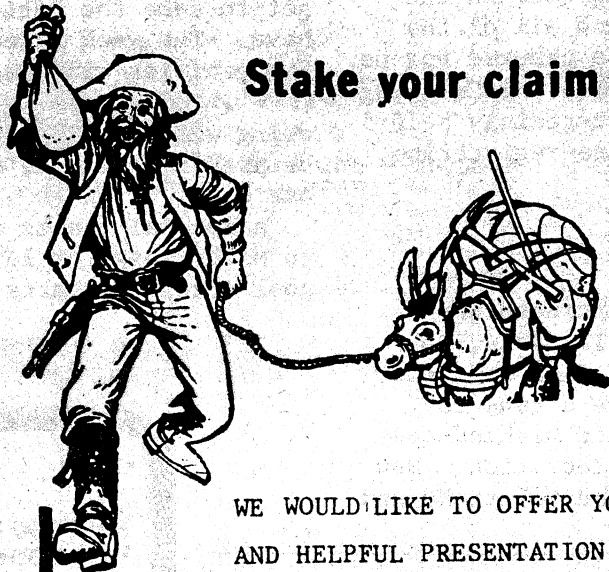
REGENTS AT STI

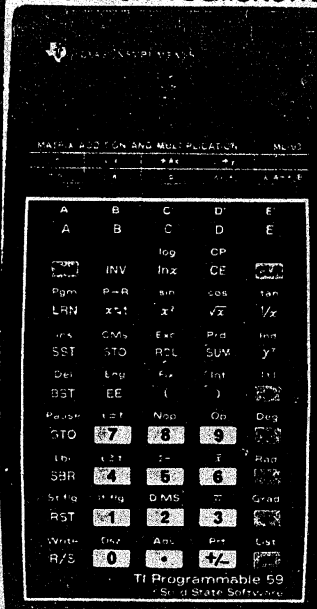

Recycle your way to Moscow

PITTSBURGH, Pa., April 30, 1979---- Aluminum Company of America and its recycling subsidiary, Alcoa Recycling Company, will help raise more than \$135,000 to train American athletes for the 1980 Olympic Games through a six-week, beverage can recycling sweepstakes campaign in 25 states.

George E. Herrman, president of Alcoa Recycling Company said: "Alcoa expects to collect more than 13 million pounds of cans between May 1 and June 15. For every pound of used aluminum containers brought to any of 500 participating recycling centers in 25 states, can collectors will receive as much as 20 cents a pound plus Alcoa will donate a penny to the U.S. Olympic Committee. The U.S. Olympic Committee should receive more than the \$135,000 can collectors helped Alcoa raise in a similar recycling campaign during 1978.

By visiting a participating center and filling out an entry blank, consumers

also will be eligible for a trip for two to the 1980 Moscow Olympic Games and 1,980 other prizes. "It's not necessary to collect cans for recycling to be eligible for the sweepstakes," Herrman said, "although Alcoa hopes the campaign will prompt more Americans to recycle aluminum cans."

Money raised through the can recycling sweepstakes will help support American athletes in Olympic training centers at Colorado Springs, Colorado and Squaw Valley, California.

"Since 1970, Alcoa has recycled over 10 billion cans," Herrman said. "That represents a tremendous savings in energy, the recovery of a valuable metal resource and a sizeable and positive contribution to the nation's balance of trade. In addition, this year recycling will help Alcoa turn more aluminum cans than ever before into Olympic gold," Herrman said.

Filmmaking Workshop

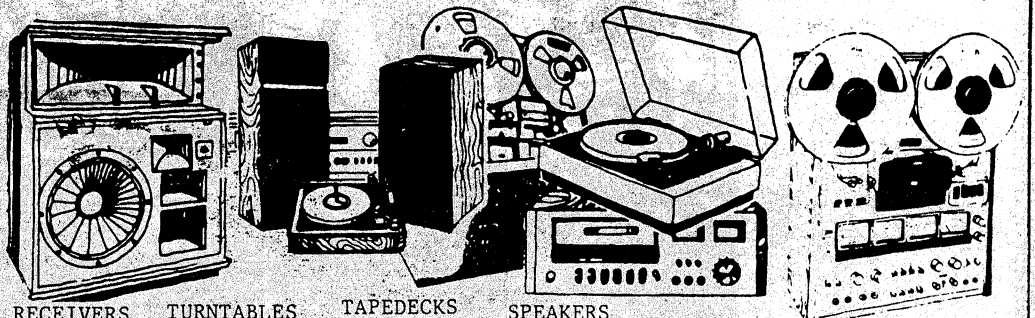
The Seventh Annual Intensive Workshop in 16 mm Professional Filmmaking is being offered this summer by the Berkely Film Institute in Berkeley, California. This full-time workshop will meet 8 hrs. each day, 6 days each week for 5 weeks, from June 25th to July 28th, 1979. Practical instruction will be given in all aspects of the filmmaker's craft, including production, cinematography, editing, sound, lighting, and phototechnology.
