
The new student center is named for the late James V. Carmichael, a native of Cobb County who served on the Board of Regents of the University System of Georgia.

The History of Kennesaw Junior 1966-1976

Kennesaw Junior College is a Unit of the University System of Georgia.

When the college opened in September, 1966, temporary offices and classrooms were located at outhern Technical Institute and Banberry Elementary School in Marietta, Georgia, until the col-

ege buildings were completed in January, 1967.

The campus, located on approximately 150 acres of land eight miles northeast of Marietta, consists of a library, gymnasium, three classroom buildings (Humanities, Natural Science and Mathematics, Social Science), administration building, student services building, maintenance building, and added during the 1974-75 academic year, a 10,000 square foot warehouse. The \$2 million James V. Carmichael Student Center was dedicated on October 2, 1975, by Governor George Bus-

A commuter college, KJC is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Approved by the Board of Regents of the University System of Georgia on October 9, 1963, KJC was officially named in August 1965. The college has three Divisions and one Department. The college opened its doors in the Fall of 1966 and the first academic year began with 1,014 students. KJC has more than doubled its original enrollment, with 2,241 students in the Fall of 1974 and 3,098 in September, 1975. The faculty has grown from 46 full-time teaching faculty in 1966-67 to 76 in 1975-76. KJC has had a total of 1,230 graduates through June, 1975. Some 14,520 different students have attended the college from September, 1966, to September 1975.

Dr. Horace W. Sturgis, Associate Registrar at Georgia Tech for 18 years, became the first President and continues houselve in that capacity. Dr. Derrell C. Roberts, now President of Dalton Junior College, was the first Academic Dean (1966-1970) of KJC. Since that time, Dr. Robert Akerman, presently an editorial associate with the Atlanta Journal, served (1970-73) as Academic Dean, and Dr. Eugene R. Huck now serves (1973-76) in that post. The first Chairman of the Division of Humanities was Dr. John C. Greider (1966-1976), and the Social Science Division Chairman was Dr. George Beggs (1966-1976); both men continue to serve in those capacities. Dr. Herbert Davis is Chairman of the Natural Science and Mathematics Division (1970-76); Dr. Wesley Walraven preceded him in that position (1966-1970). Dr. David Harris has served as Acting Chairman and Chairman of the Physical Education Department since 1966; he continues in that position. Dr. Harris is a past President (1973-74) of the Georgia Association for Health, Physical Education, and Recreation. Skill classes in Physical Education have grown from 8 in 1966 to 38 in 1976, plus 8

lecture courses.

While the main thrust of the academic program is the preparation of students for transfer to four-year colleges and universities, the college also offers career programs and developmental courses. Thirty transfer programs (in the Fall of 1975) are designed to meet the core curriculum requirements for colleges in the University System of Georgia. The first career program, nursing, began in the Fall of 1968. Some eight career programs were being offered in the 1975 Fall quarter.

Growth in library resources is a story of documented progress. In June, 1967, at the end of the first fiscal year of the college, the collection amounted to 1,479 books. By March, 1971, the number had grown to 43,922, or more than double the 20,000 valuence required by the Amorican Library

had grown to 43,923, or more than double the 20,000 volumes required by the American Library Association for junior colleges. The KJC library reached a new pinnacle when it required its 50,000th volume in the Spring of 1973. In addition to this year's 60,000 volume collection, the KJC library also houses the 20,000-volume microfiche series on American Civilization. The library serves as a Federal Despository for government documents.

When KJC opened, it began participating in the annual Cobb County Symposia, held on the campus each Spring. The 1975 Symposium explored "The Human Condition." The annual Symposia are co-sponsored by the Cobb County Medical Society, the Cobb County Ministerial As-

sociation, the Cobb Judicial Circuit Bar Association, and Kennesaw Junior College. KJC's first Student Government Association was organized in 1967. "The Sentinel," student newspaper, and "The Montage," student yearbook, both began publication during the first academic year of the college.


A program of community services was begun in the Fall of 1967 with 282 persons enrolled. By 1974-1975, enrollment had grown to 5,578 adults enrolled in non-credit courses and seminars both on the campus and in out-lying communities through the "College on Wheels" program.

The Kennesaw Junior College Foundation, Inc., a group of 29 business and professional leaders from Cobb and surrounding counties, was organized in the Summer of 1969. Funds raised by the Foundation are used for student scholarships, faculty development, and community services.

A Joint Enrollment for Twelfth Grade Students (JETS) program, offered in cooperation with Marietta, Cobb County, and other area school systems, enables superior high school seniors to earn high school and college credit concurrently. This program has been very successful at KJC. KJC offers Cooperative programs with the Cobb-Marietta Vocational Technical School, Southern Technical Institute, and Georgia State University.

Clubs and organizations on campus offer opportunities for students to participate in special interest groups. Students also participate in honor societies and service organizations.


