## Regents' exam got you down? Don't despair, help is here

Everyone at Southern Tech has heard horror stories about the Regents' Exam. And while it's true that STI's pass rate is a bit on the low side, the statistics don't reflect the potential that Southern Tech students have for doing much, much better. So if you're gnawing your nails and gnashing your teeth in anticipation of the Regents' Exam on February 12, take heart--there's help available on two fronts.

To begin with, for only \$3.95 at the Bookstore, you can purchase, Regents' Examination Preparation Guide, a handy and dandy guide to writing an acceptable Regents' essay. The author, Helen Naugle, is a professor of English at Georgia Tech who has specialized in helping Tech students prepare to conquer this academic dragon at the gate. She offers a no-nonsense, practical approach. While she is supportive of the basic aim of the test--to avoid graduating illiterates--she is also sympathetic to students who must eventually pass it to graduate. As background, the book includes

information about the history of the test, the way it's graded, the criteria used. More importantly, there's a step by step discussion of how to improve your chances of writing a good essay. Professor Naugle shows you how to choose a "good" topic and avoid a "bad" one, how to set up an organization suitable to the topic chosen, how to fill three middle paragraphs with five to seven sentences each. She anticipates your questions and answers them all, using Regents' topics to give you the "feel" of a good essay. Sample exam forms prepare you for the unknown, and a quick review of grammar may help you recall the highlights of English 101 and 102. Finally, as a programmed text, this book makes self-study easy.

Additional help is available for free. If you take topics, time yourself, and write practice essays, English teachers here will be happy to read them and offer constructive criticism. After all, they as well as you would love to see a high pass rate on the next exam.

RE: Radio Station Programming

At last week's SGA meeting the RCB constitution was unanimously approved by the SGA. Throughout the two weeks of discussion concerning this constitution I strongly supported an idea that I have concerning WGHR radio station AM-FM. I am very dissatisfied with the lack of attention paid to the area of programming. I feel that a sub-committee entitled "Programming Review Board" should have been set up in the constitution. It was not.

I feel that I have been compromised. I relinquished my stand concerning this issue when the SGA received a verbal offer from members of the radio station. The radio station felt that a Programming Review Board would be cumbersome and would interfere with the day to day

programming of the station. Though I made it quite clear that interference was not the purpose of the board, the radio station offered to include a section in the "Radio Station Constitution" covering guidelines and goals. This offer satisfied me for exactly eight days.

On Wednesday, January 23 at 4:15 PM I was part of about 30 to 40 people sitting in the cafeteria. There were another 10 to 20 people in the game room including at least four young children of ages eight to twelve. I would not write this verbatim except that otherwise the whole point of this letter would be lost so now I will tell you that the title of the song was "Why Don't We Get Drunk and Screw" by Jimmy Buffet.

Jimmy Buffet is an accomplished musician and lyricist. However, just because a song warrants space on his album does not necessarily sanction our radio station to play it. For a disc jockey to play that song as part of a Jimmy Buffet mini-concert is irresponsible and is an abuse of the right of freedom of

speech.

If I had an eight year old who came home signing "Why Don't We Get Drunk and Screw" I would want to know where he picked it up from. The suggestion was made when I objected to the playing of the song that a mail file be used to scratch the record so that it not be played again. I say to them that the song has been played, the damage done. The question of programming has not been responsibly handled as far as I can see.

Therefore, I am making a request on my own behalf and in what I feel is the best interest of Southern Tech that the disc jockey responsible for the Jimmy Buffet mini-concert, be banned from operating on the air during the hours of 12:00 noon to 6:00 PM when the Student Center is most likely to contain young children.

# LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

Dear Editor:

I was a bit 'stung' by the STIng's gratuitous observation in the Jan. 14 article on the Nuclear Safety Option that the IET Industrial Distribution Option is "Not accredited." To forestall understandable concern on the part of ID students and others who might be considering the program, I would like to set the record straight.

At the time of the ECPD team's visit last February 5-6, the ID program had not yet produced any graduates and, therefore, could not be a candidate for accreditation. Our situation exactly paralleled the Nuclear Safety Option's experience of six years ago.

Further, because of the nature of the career paths involved, primarily those of technical sales and distributorship management, ID may never attempt ECPD accreditation, because it is not as relevant to career advancement in the ID field as it

is to the other technology disciplines. ID's wishing to go to graduate school will most likely pursue MBA programs, for which the ID program is accredited--as are all STI four-year curricula--by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (SACS).

In no sense do I wish to demena ECPD accreditation. STI graduates wishing to pursue Master's Degrees in Engineering should value it for this purpose. Conversely, I hope the persons responsible for the inadvertent half-truth in the Jan. 14 article, will graciously accept this clarification.

### ATTENTION S.T.I. WOMEN

In 1976, the Loan Fund for women in engineering studies was established by the Business and Professional Women's Foundation with a grant from the Exxon Foundation. Objectives at the program are to assist business, government, and educational groups seeking to place more women in

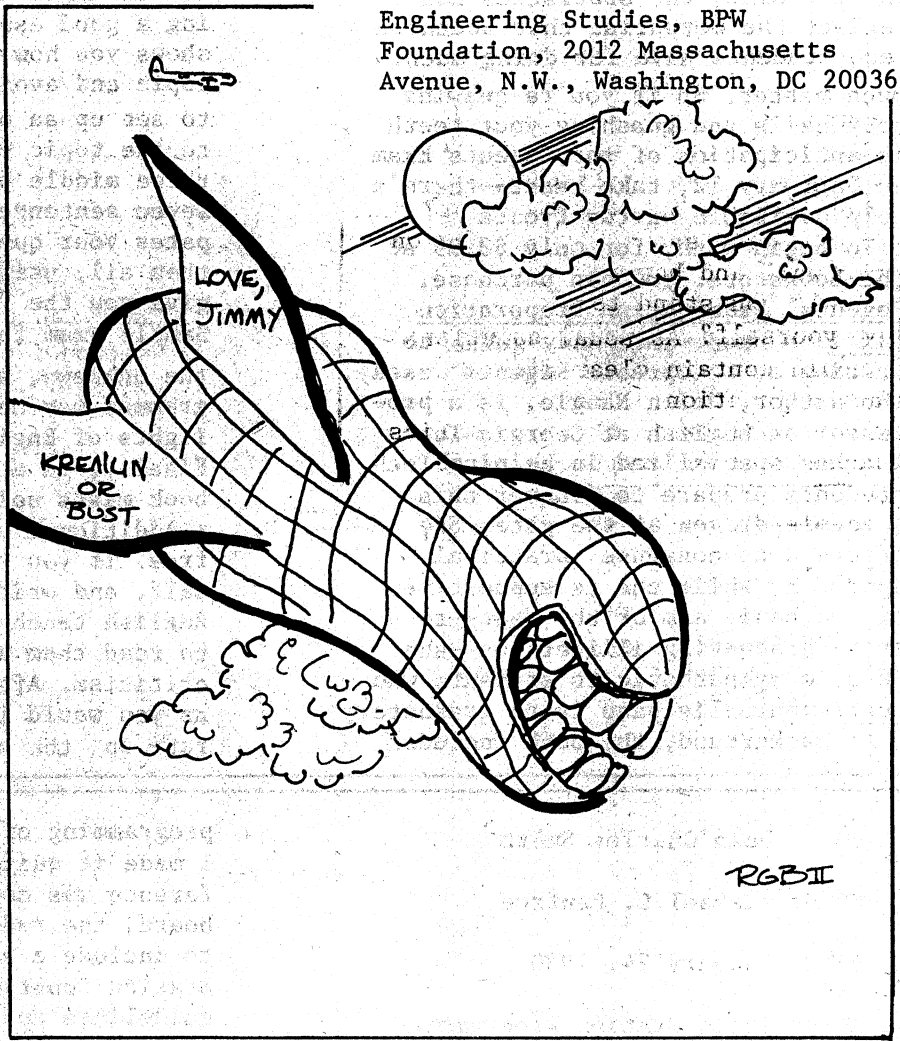
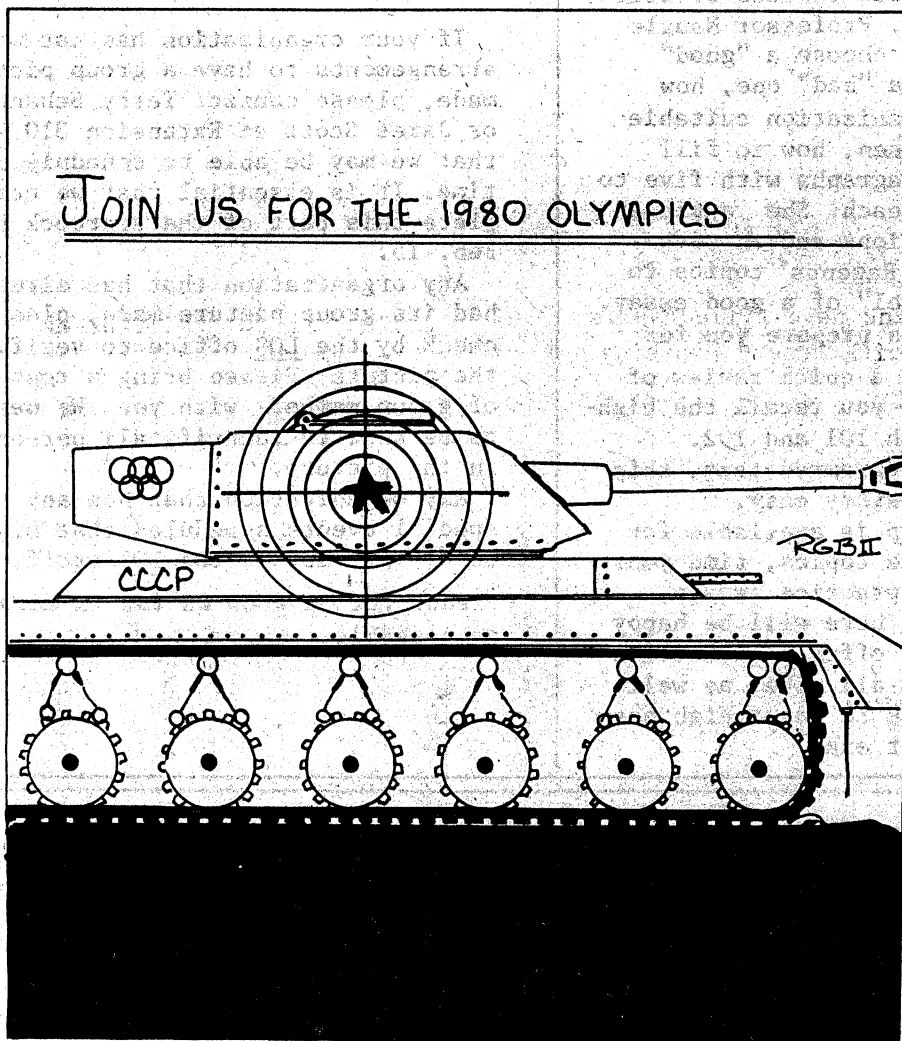
engineering positions and to assist women in preparing for or furthering their engineering careers.

The fund is designed to assist women in their final two years of any engineering program accredited by the Engineers' Council for Professional Development, which includes undergraduate, refresher and conversion programs, and graduate studies. Encouragement is offered to women with work experience in engineering or related technical fields and to those who are qualified through past study for training in engineering or engineering technology.

Study may be full or part-time, but the applicant must carry at least six semester hours or the equivalent during each semester for which a loan is requested. In addition, the loan may be applied to such related school expenses as housing, transportation, and child care. Loans are repayable over a five-year period, beginning one year after completion of the educational program.

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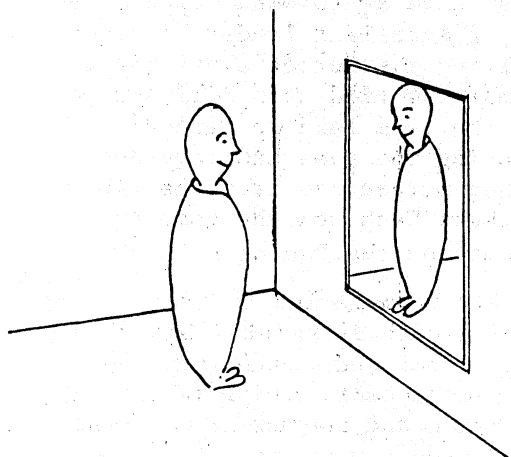

## HORNETS SHOOT DOWN HAWKS

## HORNETS AMBUSH PANTHERS

Southern Tech perfectly ran their stack offense and played hard-nose, man-to-man defense last Wednesday night to open up a 40-28 half-time lead against LaGrange College, and eventually won the game, 79-73. Both teams were coming off a loss to conference teams, and so a win was needed to boost their confidence.

Coach Perides employed a new line up against the Black Panthers with additions Mike Jones at point guard and Baxter Thomas starting for the first time at forward. Jones displayed excellent leadership in controlling the Hornet's offense while Thomas was tied with Billy Bromell for the team lead in rebounds.

During the game LaGrange shot a higher percentage from the floor, Southern Tech won the game by out rebounding the Panthers 53-40.

Billy Bromell led the Hornets in scoring with 24 points, but as soon as he committed his fourth foul in the second half, Ken Shaw came off the bench and poured in the rest of his season's high 13.

With a big lead, Southern Tech slacked, and LaGrange tried to stage a last minute come back. But the deficit was too great to overcome, and the Hornets prevailed raising their conference record to 4 and 3. In the locker room Coach Perides summarized the game saying, "We played 35 minutes and not the last 5 minutes, but overall the effort was great."

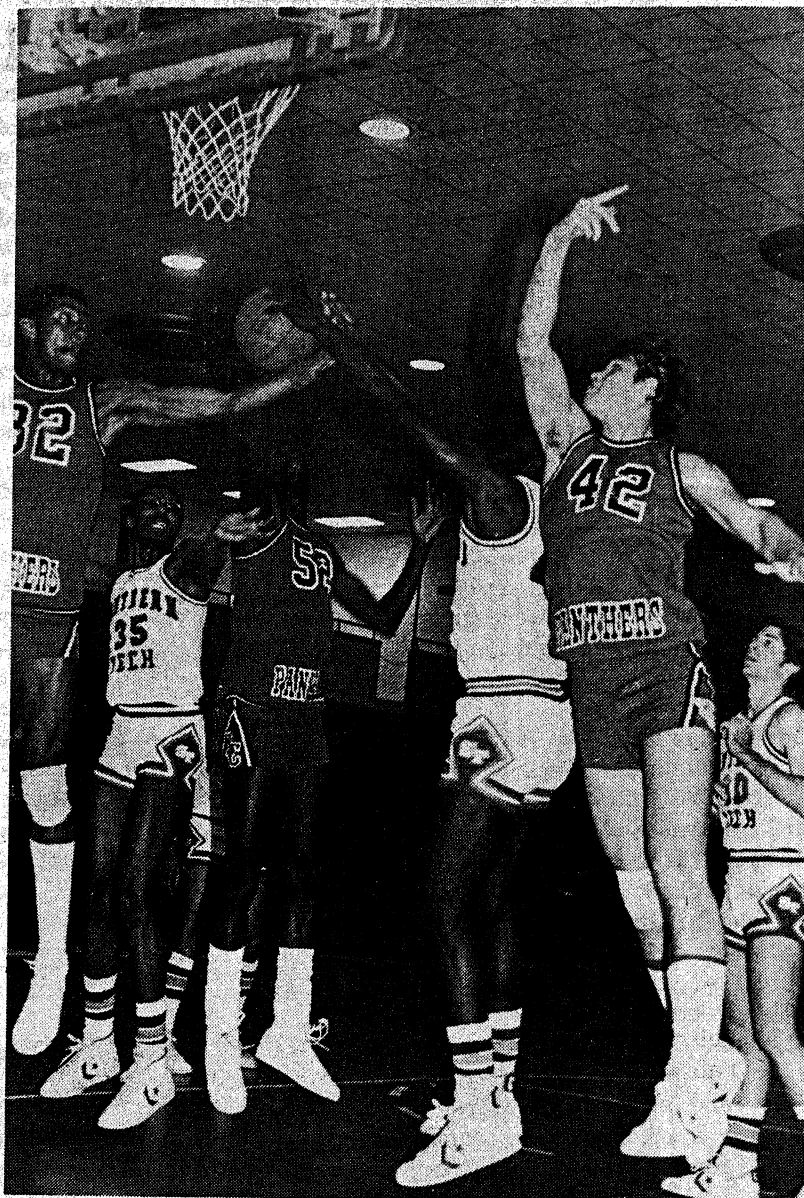

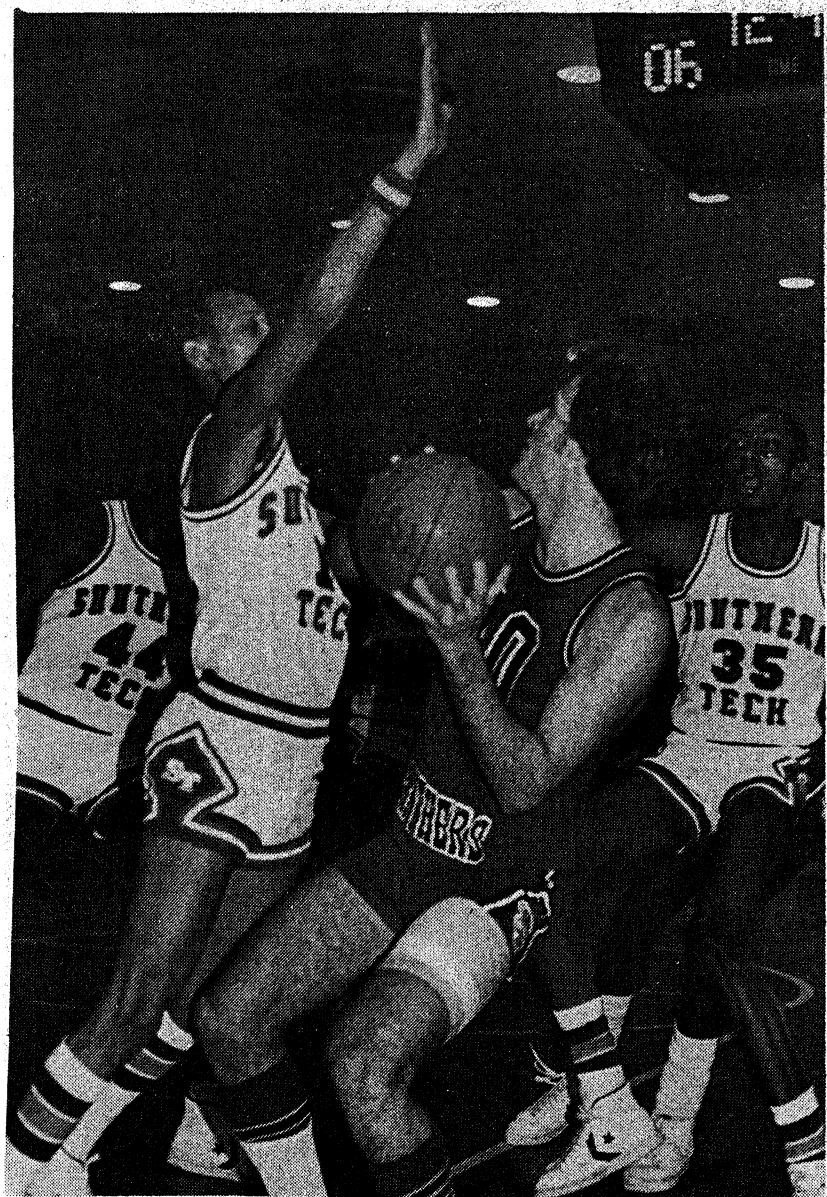

**PIEDMONT COLLEGE (3--26):** In 1977, Coach O'Neal Cave's Lions lost only one player to graduation off of last season's squad and have some outstanding recruits like Marietta's Daryl Ellis, the brother of highly sought after Dale Ellis. Leading the returnees is 6-5, 200 lb. junior center Jon Cantrell, 6-3 senior forward A.B. McMillian, 6-1 senior guard Wayne Harrison, 6-2 junior forward Jesse Bonner, and Jerry Roberts. The Lions have a young team that should play well together and be on the prowl to knock off some top team.

**NORHT GEORGIA COLLEGE (19-11):** Coach Bill Ensley's Saints have been an annual bridesmaid to the District 25 title, losing in the championship game three of the last four years. Last season with liette help from the bench the Saints posted a 11-5 GIAC record and tied LaGrange for second place. They came through to win the GIAC Tournament with a 61 to 52 win over Southern Tech, but six days later they lost to Tech by a 49 to 42 score in a defensive minded District Championship game. When you consider that North Georgia lost star center Randy Dunn to injuries in an off-season car accident and lost top play making senior guard Eddie Rushton (who played tough vs. Southern Tech) to a late season knee injury, and the fact that the Saints generally used only six men and two of these were freshmen--THEN the GIAC Tournament title and the 19-11 season reflect on some clutch playing and good coaching. This seaspn if the basketball experts pick North Georgia to go to Kansas City, they would be correct as the Saints have a Dec. 19 and 20th road trip to KC to play Avila College and a very tough Rockhurst College team coach by former West Georgia assistant and ace recruiter Jerry Reynolds. Their hopes of making it back to Kansas City on March 10 ride largely on three returning starters led by GIAC All-Freshman Ricky Glasper, a 6-3 forward who gunned Southern Tech down in a 67 to 61 win at Dahlonega and hit for 20, 22, and 8 points in the GIAC Tournament. Other lettermen back include 6-0 senior guard Alan Ross, 6-2 junior forward David Lavender, and 6-6 junior center Roger Wilmont who has more moves than Mayflower under the basket. The lofs of Rushton and top scores Willie Franklin and Jimmy Bromell will be felt and Coach Ensley stated, "We have more experience, but a definite lack of a proven All-Star caliber player." Ironically, Jimmy's brother Billy Bromell will be playing against the Saints for arch-rival Southern Tech this season (another Bromell brother Lacca also played for North Georgia two years ago) with the two teams splitting in four games last season and the three-year series between the two standing at 5 wins apiece. Coach Ensley's career record stands at 149-98 over the eight years he has been at North Georgia and he should add to the winning side this season!!

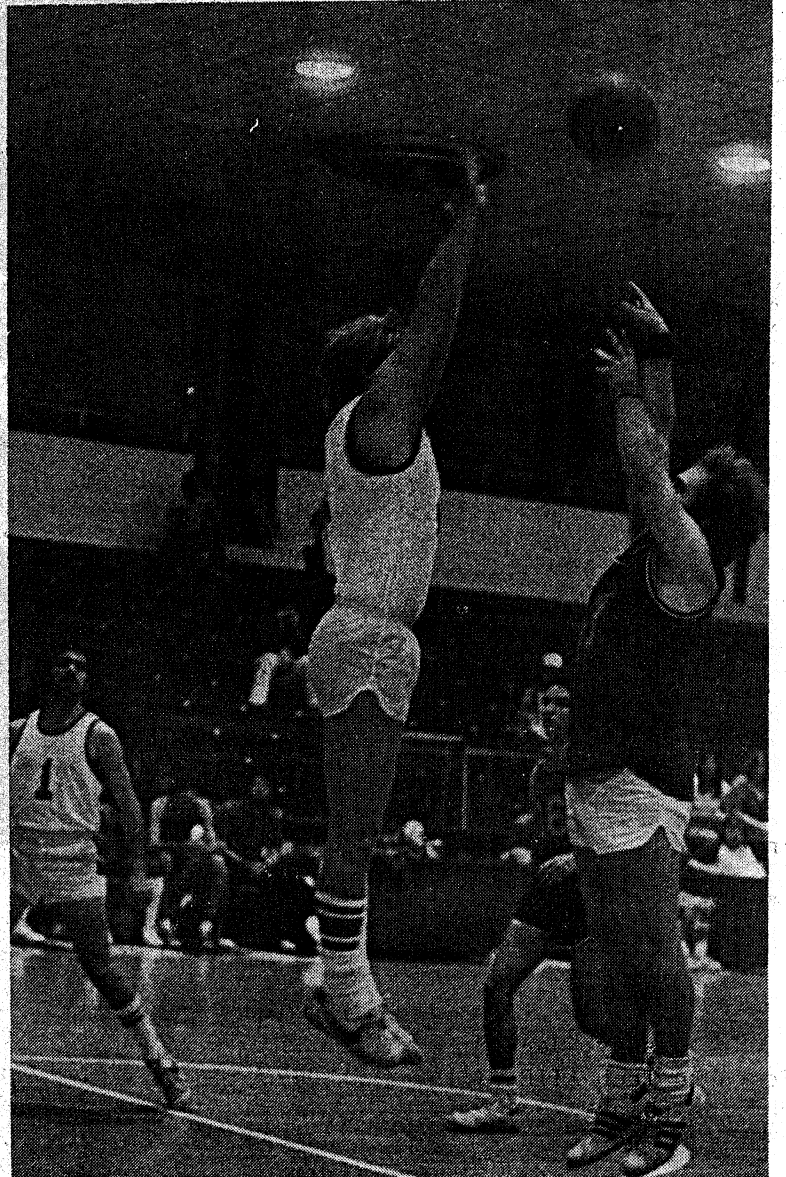

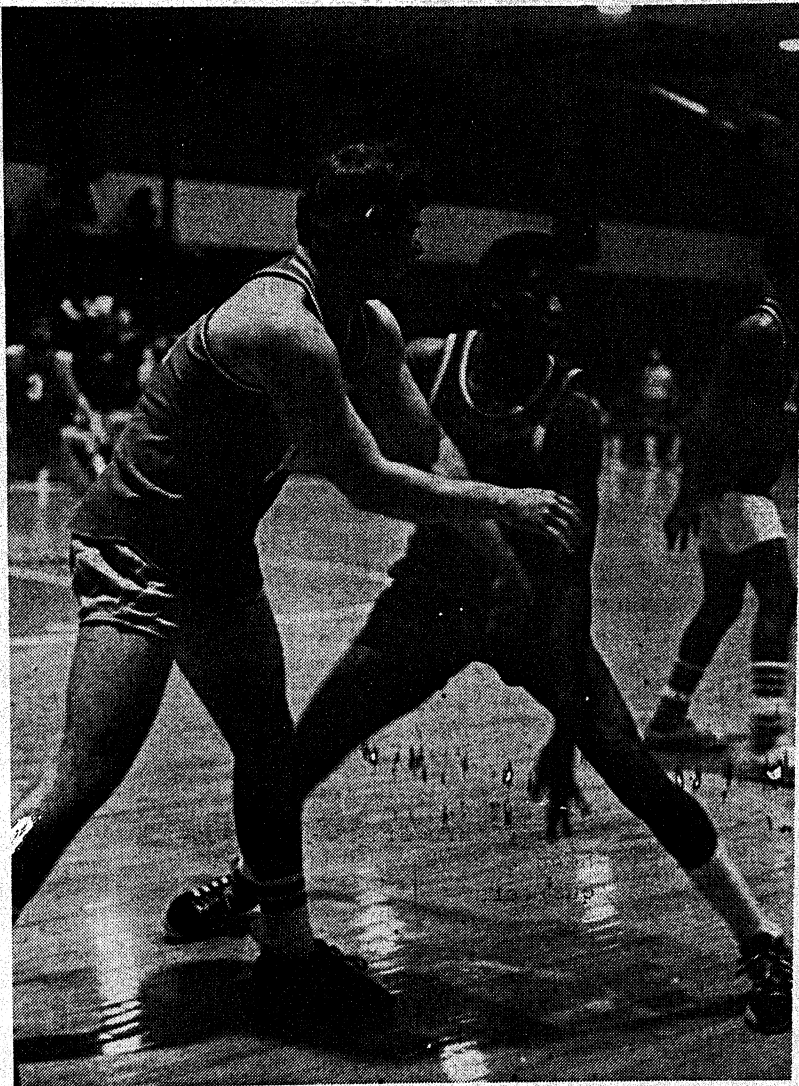

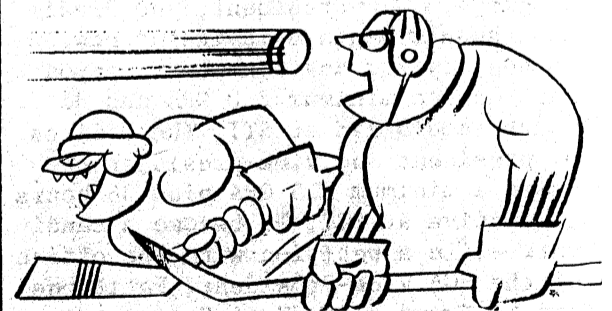
