Falmouth, Fan. 10. HE 8th inffant arrived here the St. Peter of London, John Keuel Master, bound for Helland from Malaga, and mounted with 10 Guns; coming out of the Streights, she was attacked by a Sally Man of War, likewife of 10 Guns, 2nd about 120 men, who immediately boarded her, pouring a great many men into her; but they were bearen off, with great loss to the Moors, who, after exchanging two or three Broadfides, were glad to quit the

Fight, and suffer the English to pursue their Voyage.

Danigick, Decemb. 28. We have of late had feveral accounts, that Dorofensko, General of the Rebel Coffacks, had made an agreement with Zierco, General of the Coffacks, which have all along remained faithful to the Crown of Poland: and the particulars are, That Doro-Jensko receiving advice of the dishonourable retreat of the Turks towards Caminiec, and that the King of Poland followed them with all his Forces, refolved to prowoke them to a Battel, and having already in his appre-hensions given the victory to the Poles, and to himselfa continual disquietness, to free himself from the confequences of fuch a victory, which he knew after having a-bused the Kings clemency must needs be faral to him, he fent to the Moscovites, to offer to them to deliver the City of Czerin into their hands, and himself under their protection; of which Zierco being informed, immediately marched with all the Troops be could draw together towards Czerin, with cesign to attack the place, and pre-vent its falling into the hands of the Moleovites. Dorefensko, who had not received any account of what had paffed between the Poles and the Turks, but being confirmed in his fear of the defeat of the latter, marched out of the City, accompanied with the Bishop thereof, all the Russian Priests that were there, and most of the principal of the Inhabitants, to meet Zierco, to whom he offered to refign his Staff of Command. But that Zierco, in confideration of the friendship that had been between them before his defertion from the Poles, contented himself to receive an Oath from Dorosenskost at he would for the future never ferve but against the Enemies of Poland, and that he would join his Forces with those of that Crown against the Turks and Tartars : this done, Zierco and Dorojensko entered into Czerin, where the faid Agreement was ftrengthned with farther Oaths and Solemn Promifes. But of all this we must expect a confirmation.

Naples, Decemb. 27. Since the Dutch Men of War parted hence on the 20th instant, under the command of the Vice-admiral de Haen, we have advice, that Lieutenant Admiral de Ruster is arrived at Palermo, and hath joined the Spanish Men of War there under the command of the Prince of Montefarchio. Yesterday we had news that the French Fleet going to Meffina, had been seen upon this Coast; and from Rome we have an account, that the Admiral thereof had orders to fight his way through the Dutch and Spanish Men of War, if

they went about to oppose its passage.

Venice, Jan. 3. The Procurator Nani, who is ap-pointed by this State to be its Ambassador at the Treaty at Nimeguen, is preparing for his journy thicher though it's faid that he will not begin it, till it may be concluded that the other Ambahadors are arrived upon the place. The last Advices we received from Constantinople, gave us an account that the Grand Signior was much concerned, that his Forces employed against the Poles this last Summer, had made so dishonourable retreat, the blame of which is faid to be attributed to the Cham of Tartary; but that in the mean time great preparations are making against next Summer, when, as the report goes at Constantinople, the Grand Visier will go in perfon into the Field.

Genoua, Fan. 8. The 5th instant arrived here the Thomas and Francis, John Halftoffe Master from Spain, and the England, Robert Baffe Master. This morning arrived the sman Frigat, Capt. Carter Commander, in 11 dayes from Cagliari, from whence he departed in company of the Saphire Frigat, commanded by Captain Herman, bound for Legern; the Streights Merchant, Robert Browning Master, and the European, Fames Patter Master. Potter Mafter : And this evening came in the Sca-horfe; Fohn Heuzey, from Lisbon and Spain. To morrow the Marquis d'Aftongas, late Viceroy of Naples, purposes to

embauk, in order to his passing to Spain.

Madrid, Jan. 2. The Marquis de los Pinares, who we formerly told you was parted privately from hence, as was then believed, on his Embaffy to Venice, is, as we underfland, at prefent at Malaga, where he is to take pofsession of the Command of Captain General of the Coast of Almeria, vacant by the removal of the Marquis de los Nanes, to the Vicero ship of Sardaignia; that done, it is faid he will pass to Granada, to prepare things there for the Queens reception, her Majesty having, it seems, chosen that place for her retirement : The 6th infant, Don Juan of Austria is expected at Court, upon which it's believed fome alterations will be made in feveral Offices.

Copenhagen, Jan. 7. The passage of Letters between this Kingdom and Sueden, having of late been wholly interrupted, we are somewhat ignorant of what passes there; yet by fome Paffengers who have had Passports to come from Stock bolm, we are rold, that that King is using all endeavors to put himfelf into fuch a condition against Spring, as to be able not only to oppose the farther progress of the Arms of the Confederates in his Territories of Germany, but even to recover what hath been loft this Summer; though we here feem to perfuade our felves, that the Allies will fo well purfue the advantage they have at present, as not to give the Suedes any opportunity to recover themselves; but this time must shew. In the mean time, an ill report has been spread about Town, as if the Sieur Guldenlieu, Viceroy of Norway, had fuffered a great defeat by the Suedes; which some are the more forward to believe, for that it was before faid, that we very much wanted good Officers in those parts.

Vienna, Jan. 8. The Count of Windisgrats is returned from the Affembly that was held at Mulhaufen, of the Deputies of the Princes of the Upper and Lower

Saxony, and hath reported to his Majesty the success of those Conserences. The Count of Monticuculi is expected here every day to affist at the great Council of War to be held here, after which, it's faid, he will forthwith return again to Ellingen. The Turks highly refent the action at Drebegen ; and we have advice, that the Baffa of Waradin upon notice thereof, forthwith drewtogether 800 Horse, and marched with them, with refolution to have intercepted the Imperialists in their return from thence, and to have cut them all in pieces; but it is hoped the excuses that the Imperial Resident at the Port has orders to make in this matter, will pacifie the Ministers there. The Count of Starenburg is fent by the Emperor to the Electors of Saxony, of Brandenburgh, the Dukes of Lunenburgh, &c. finally to adjust with them the matter of the Winter-quarters. The Empress begins to mend.

Strasburgh, Fan. 13. The difference continues between the Elector Palatine, and the Elector of Mayence, about the Baillage of Bocketheim, which belonged to the late Duke of Simeren, by whose death this question

rifes.

Ditto. As the time for Action draws nearer, fo our apprehensions encrease, that the French mean those great preparations they are now making against us, as well in revenge of our having no better observed the Neutrality we had concluded with them, as to deprive the Imperialifts of a place of fo much advantage to them; though at the same time the Imperial Generals bid us fear nothing, for that sufficient care is taken to scure us against all the insults of the Enemy. The Imperial Army, they say, will be very early in the Field, and stronger by some thousands of men, than it was the last Campagne; and befides we are told, that the Troops of the Circles, composing an Army of 16000 men, will act a part under the command of their General the Marquis of Baden Dourlach.

Estingen , Jan. 13. The French being about 600 ftrong, have two or three dayes fince made an attack upon the Fort guarded by the Imperialifts at Rhinfelden, not far from Lauterburgh, but have been repulsed with some lofs. Upon advice hereof, several Companies of the Regiment of Colonel Strein have been commanded to Rhinfelden, and others are ordered to march to Mayence to reinforce the Imperial Garison there. The report goes, that the French draw their Troops towards the Dutchy of Deux Ponts, with design to take possession of that Countrey in the name of the King of Sueden, who

Cologne, Fan. 17. We are told that a good Body of Imperial Troops are coming to quarter in this Diocess, to free it from the continual vexations it at prefent receives from the French Parties. The Dutch Troops that are marching to Tre ves, are come as far as Snitzig and

Hamburg, Jan. 14 Our Letters from Berlintell us, that the Saedes had again belieged Wolgaft, and that the Elector of Brandenburgh had given orders for the drawing some Troops together to relieve it, but that it was feared they would come too late. Hagne, Jan. 21. We are now told, that upon a Letter from the Duke de Villa Hermofa, Governor of the Spanish Nether-

lands, the States have resolved to fend some body on their patt to Marchienne au Pont, to treat with the French and Spanish to Machienne su Pont, to treat with the French and Spanling Ministers, about granting a Neutrality to the Country of Liege. The 16 instant, Sir Lealine Jenkins, Ambassador and Plenipoteniary of His Majesty of Great Britain, arrived at Nimeguen incognito, having refused those publick Civilities and Respects that were intended him by the Governor; and the Ambassadors of this State were likewise expected there the Monday followof this State were likewise expected there the Monday following. The 18 instant, Don Emanuel de Lyra arrived here from Bruffels, we are told that he has in his hands the Passports of Spain, for the Ambassadors of France and Suedin, though it's said they will not be given out, till the French Passes arrive in the form desired. Our Letters from Bruffels, of the 16 instant, tell us, that there was a report, that Monsieur de Lonvigny had defeated a Body of French that were marching with some design upon Treves, of which we must expect to hear sarther.

Bourdeaux, Fan. 6. The Soldiers that were quartered in our Suburbs, are marched away; but we have still soove lodged upon the Burghers in the City. To morrow four Soldiers, who by the affiliance of a servant

Paris, Jan. 18. We have Letters from Marfeilles, which tell us that there was arrived a finall Veffel from Mejina, which met the French Fleet, confifting in 26 Sail, not far from the Fare of Messina, so that we expect our next Advices will give us an account of its arrival there. It is said here, that 8000 Men have been within these two months raised in Snifferland, for the fervice of this Crown, and that they are already on their march towards Affatia, to join the Kings Forces there, which fome are difficult to give credit to, for that it hath been all along faid, that the Cantons had, during this War, declared, that they would not have their Troops employed against the Emperor or the Empire. The Kings journey is fixed towards the latter end of the next month, and we are told that the Officers of the Artillery have politive orders to be ready to march with it by the 30th inftant, and the Troops of the Kings Houlhold on the 8th of February.
