Cracow, Febr. 2.

T is impossible to give you at prefent a particular account of what hath passed here this week. On Thursday last the King and Queen made their publick Entry into this City, attended by all the Nobiliry, his Majessies Guards. Core. The next day

lity, his Majellies Guards, Gec. The next day were performed the Funerals of the late Kings Cafimire and Michael. Yefterday his Majefty, attended with all the Clergy, Senators, and Nobility, went on foot from the Caffle here, to the fmall Town called Cafimire, about a quarter of a mile diftant, to pay his devotions to St. Staniflaus, who is faid to have been Martyred there. This day their Majefties were Crowned with all the pomp and mignificence imaginable; and to morrow his Majefty will receive the Homage of all the Senators, Nobility, Ge. and on Tuefday will be begun the Affembly of the Dyet, where it's hoped fuch refolutions will be taken as are neceffary for the providing for the defence and fecurity of this Kingdom.

Naplos, Febr. 6. We now expect the Lieurenant Admiral de Ruyter very fuddenly back here with his Fleer, for we hear he hath received the orders of the States to that purpole. The four Spanift Men of War that arrived here three dayes fince, have fultained great damage in the late bad weather; here are likewife in Port four Gallies. The famous Banditi Felice hath been within these two dayes brought Pritoner hither, he was taken by a Party fent out by our Viceroy, after hawing bravely defended himself. Here are now three Troops of Horse ready to be t ansported to Reggie, which will be followed with other Troops, our Viceroy labouring by all the Application possible, eff chually to ashift the Viceroy of Sicily from hence.

Legorn, Febr. 10. In our last we told you of the arsival here of five Dutch Men of War of the Squadron of the Lieutenant Admiral de Ruyter, fince they are returned with the orders they found here from the States to their Admiral, commanding his flay for fix months longer in the Spanifb fervice. And this morning is arsived here a fmall Veffel, the Master whereof tells us, that about five day:s fince he met the Heer de Ruyter with 26 ships failing towards the Levant; and just now arrives a Felucea from Porto Lorgone. who confirms what it above faid of de Ruy: ers taking his courfe to the Eastward.

Vienna, Febr. 16. The Empress mends daily, and it's faidher Feaver has now wholly left her. General Monsecuculi prepares for his departure towards the Army, which it's faid will be within three weeks at fartheit. Several Regiments that have their quarters in the Emperors Hereditary Countries, are commanded to march forthwith towards the Rhine, to reinforce the Army there, which will be fironger this Campagne than it was the laft by 10000 Men. The Marquis de los Balbaces, Ambassador here from the Crown of Spain, having reteived his orders from Madrid to part hence for Nimeguen, prepares for his journey, which it's faid he will begin, so foon as there appears any likelihood of forming the Congress. The Baron Battoni, who was lately fent

by the Emperor to the great Duke of Moscowy, is returned, with a good account, as is faid, of his Negociation.

Irincfare, Febr. 21. The Imperialists having de-manded of our Magilirates not only to grant quarters to fome Troops, but likewise to furnish a Sum of Money for their subsit nce, they have sent a Deputy to the headquarter at Eslingen, to represent to the Duke of Lor-rain the grounds on which they pretend to be excused from conlenting to the faid demands, and we are at prefent in some imparience to know the success of his errand. The Magi trates of Stronburgh are, we hear, very zealous to hnilh their new Levies, and the Fortilications which they are adding for the better security of their Bridge. The Imperialists lay up great quanticies of Provisions at strasburgh, and at Lauterburgh, for the subsistence of their Army this next Campagne; they assure that their first work will be to attack P bilipsburgb, which becomes very grievous to the Neighbouring Countries, by reason of the heavy Contributions it exacts from them. Several Imperial Regiments are marching from divers parts this way; part of them, it's faid, are to be lodged at Mayence, to prevent the design it's believed the French have upon that City. The Elector of Bava-ia highly complains that feveral Imperial Troops have taken their quatters in his Countries, and it's faid threatens even to remove them by force, which may have ill confequences.

Strisburgh, Febr. 21. We do not yet hear that the French Troops begin to move, they have their quarters on the Rhine, in Alfatia, on the Saar, in Lorrain and in Burgundy; but they continue to work with all pcffible diligence on the Fortifications at Schleftalt, where they intend to raife 10 new Baltions; and to provide great Magazines in several places. It is faid here, that the Molt Christian King will come to Meiz, that fo he may be the nearer to give the necessary directions, as there shall be occasion to his Armies on the Rhine, on the Moselle, and in Flanders. From Spire, of the 21 instant, they write, that feveral Imperial Regiments were marching that way, that some Lad already passed the Neckar, and the rell the Knibis, in order to the putting in execution the defign, long fince refolved, upon Phi. lipsburgh. The differences between the Emperor, and the Elector of Bavaria, on account of several Imperial Troops being quartered in the Territories of his Electo-ral Highnels, increase, and it's apprehended may break out into Hossilities.

Cologne, Febr. 25. A Party of 300 French have for feveral dayes path held themfelves within four Leagues of this City, and a report is fpread abroad that they expect a reinforcement, and fome pieces of Cannon, in order to the attacking the Caftle of Kerpen. People here will needs have it, that the Troops which the Duke of Newburgh is raifing, are intended for the Emperors fervice, but of this time must inform us. The Imperialifts prepare to be very early and powerful in the Field this next Campagne, and they pro nife the Countries neighbouring to Philipsburgh, that they will begin it with the firge of that place which at prefent fo great ly incommodes them. We are told that the Frerch there have lately demanded Contributions of the City of Spire.

Hamburgh, Febr. 25. The Confiderates arc, it's faid, agreed about the manner of carrying on the War against Sucden this Summer, and that in the first place they have refolved with joint Forces to attack Staden, which being taken, is to be put into the hands of the Duke of Zell : In the mean time the Suedes have taken care to furnish that place with Provisions, and other Necesfaries, in good abundance. From Wismar they write, that se-veral Vestels were lately arrived there from Denmark, with Provisions for that Garilon, and with orders to bring back two Danish Regiments that are there, by which it feems the King of Denmark is refolved to be this next 'ummer with the main of his Forces near home, to obferve the Suedes on that fide. The Imperial En-voy, the Count of Sternberg, is fill at Berlin, and has frequent Conferences with his Electoral Highness, and his Ministers. Certain Brandenburgh Troops having taken their quarters in the Territories of the Elector of Saxony hath given his Electoral Highnels occasion to complain thereof to the Emperor, and to defire they may be forthwith removed, but hitherto the faid Troops remain in those quarters. We have Letters which speak as if the Moforites began to move towards the Frontiers of Livonia, though from Stockholme they tell us, that that Crown seems secure of the friendship of the Czar.

Bruffels, Febr. 28. His Excellency, we hear, has iffued orders for the reinforcing each of the old Regiments of Foot with 100 Men : and thefe are all the rectuits that are intended to be made here against the Campagne, when we are to be affisted by the Bishop of Ofna-brughs Troops, making a Body of 9 or 10000 Men, to be commanded by Monfieur de Louvigny, at present Governour of the Province of Luxemburgh The Calle of Arcy, which we told you in our last was at-tacked by the Mareschal d'Humieres, was, it seems, surrendred upon the first appearance of the Enemies Troops before is, which makes us suspect the Officer that commanded there, to have been corrupted by the Baron de Quincy, who fately in some dissati faction quitted this fervice, and put himself in o that of the French, where he has now the command of a Regiment of Dragoons. From Germany they write, that the Imperialifis make hafte to come into the Field.

Hague, Febr. 25. This State is much concerned at the late ill fuccels of matters in *Sicily*, and at the in-flance of the Crown of *Spain*, hath refolved to fend a confiderable reinforcement to the Heer de Ruyter, who, weunderstand, hath received the orders that were fent from hence, for his continuing fix months longer in the Spanish service. The Danish Ministers press this State tohasten the Equipage of the Men of War that are to join with the Fleet of the King their Master this Sumther; we are told that the Sieur Tromp is to command the faid Fleer, though under the Flag of Denmark, and that to that end he is to have a Commission as Admiral We are assured that orders have been of that Crown. issued to the several Officers in the service of this Stare, comman ling them absolutely to have their Troops com-plete at or before the first of April, on pain of forseiting their Commands, and b ing belides obliged to repay the monies they have received for the making their recruits.

Ditto, Febr. 28. We are told that the States have refolved to caufe fix Men of War, all capital fhips mounted with 60 Guns and upwards, to be forthwith fitted out, to be sent to the Mediserranean, to reinforce Lieutenant

Admiral de Ruyter, and some spea's of four more to be added to them; and with this new Force it is believed de Ruyter will be in a condition to engage the French in those Seas, even without the affilince of the Spanifb Armada. The States of Holland are separated again, and we do not hear of any matters of moment that hath been concluded by them this meeting. The Prince of Orange, we are told, purposes to part hence the latter end of the next month, and in the mean time his Troop. will have orders to repair to the places appointed for their Rendezvous; which for the Cavalry is to be at Langenstract, and the Infantry at Rosendaci, as it was the last Summer. We are affured that the Confederates will now very fuddenly begin the fiege of Stade, and that the Duke of Hanouer will lend his Troops in that occasion. From Suisserland they tell us, that the Cantons have written very carneftly to his Molt Chriftian Majesty, to desire that their Troops in his service may not be employed without the limits of France, according to their Alliance with his Majefty; and that they have in the mean time refolved that none of the Cantons shall feparately fuffer any Levies in their respective Territorics, without the approbation of the whole Body. The Treaty of Commerce between Sueden and this Stare, is not yes ratified by the States, who, it's faid, make a difficulty to agree to certain private Articles, which the Crown of Sueden desires should accompany the faid Treaty.

Sueden delires inculd accompany the laid 1 reaty. I aris, Febr. 29. The laft week the Deputies of the City of Mefina had Audience of his Majefly, to take their leaves in order to their return home, his Majefly received them very kindly, and promifed to affift them very effectually, and or-deted that each of them fhould be prefented with a gold Chain and Medal. At Marfeilles the Gallies of this Kingdom, in all 25, are fitting out with great diligence, and 6 or 7 Men of War at Thomlon, defigned with frefh Succors to Miffina We do not yet know with certainty how the Arinies will be commanded this Campagne, or where the King will be in perfon: form this Campagne, or where the King will be in perfon : fome are, after all, of opinion that the Prince of Conde will go into the field. A general Pardon hath been lately published at Rennes, with an exception of about 50 perfons who are field, and it's believed the Parliament will fuddenly return thither. The Marefchal de Schomberg arrived two dayes fince at Court from Roufillon, having put the command of his Majefties For-ces in those parts, inro the hands of the Marefchal de Navailles. It is generally faid, that the Marefchal de Schomberg is to command a feparate Army on the Jele, which on occasion [hall join with that on the Rhune.
