Naples, March 3.

Ur Viceroy has given orders for the fitting out the Gallies of this Kingdom with all diligence. Here are likewife fitting three Spanifb Men of War, who fultained fome time fince much damage in bad weather.

Lieutenant Admiral de Ruyter continues at Melazzo.

Copenhagen, March 20. This morning the great Chancellor of this Kingdom, the Count Griffenfelt, as he was going to Court, was Arrefled, by the King's order, and carried Prisoner to the Castle, where he remains, his House being beset by a Guard, and all his Papers scaled up. We do not yet know the cause of this his sudden disgrace; a Placaet has been published here for the scizing and confiscating the Goods and Effects belonging to the Subjects of the Crown of Sueden, that are within the Territories of his Majelly. Our preparations both by Sea and Landadvance apace, and it's said our Troops have orders to be ready to march by the end of this month.

Vienna, March 15. Count Montecuculi continuing very much indifposed in his health, we are told that the Emperor has given the command of his Army to the Duke of Lorrain, yet fo, as that he shall take his refidence this Summer in fome place which may be nearest the Army, to affift the Duke with his counfel; and accordingly it's faid that he will part hence the beginning of the next month. Orders are given out to the Regi-ments of Foot of the Duke of Brunswicke Wolferbuttel, of the Count Massini, and of the Count Kaunits, the Regiment of Groats of Count Pals, and the Regiment of Drazoons of Colonel Wopping, making in all 9000 Men, to march for kwith towards the Rhine ; and at the same time the Regiment of Caraffa is commanded to march towards Pomerania, to reinforce the Body of Imperial Troops that acted in those parts the last Summer under General Cops, who is come hither very much indifpoled, and has refigned his command to General Keyferstein. Several Regiments are likewise ordered to march towards Hongry, to have an eye upon the Turks, who, it's feared, may attempt fomething upon the Fort of Schella, lately built by the Imperialists. From Poland we have advice, That the Dyet had refo!ved to make a ftrift Alliance with this Court, and in order thercunto, intended to fend hither a folemn Embaffy.

Eflingen, March 20. The 16 inflant, Prince Herman of Baden, General of the Imperial Artillery, after having taken feveral Pofts about Philipsburg on the other fide of the Rhine, caufed his Troops to do the like on this, they poffeffing themfelves of Graben, Roufheym, and other places in that Neighborhood, where they are raifing feveral Forts and Redoubts, in order to the blocking up of Philipsburgh, which is already fo far done, as to hinder their incursion, into the Dutchy of Wirtemberg, the Palatinate, and the Marquifate of Beden, which before lay open to them. It is faid that the French of Philipsburgh have had a defign upon Spire, but that they were prevented in it. The 18 inflant they came out

with 400 Foot, and 200 Dragoons, with intention to have furprized the Imperialifts that were in Rozsfheim, but being difcovered, they retired, without attempting any thing. The Magisfrates of Strasburgh have prayed the Prince of Baden to fend them 1000 Foot, for the fecurity of their City.

Strasburgh, March 20. We are told that Monfieur Verjus the French Envoy, has demanded of our Magt-ftrates, that they will caufe feveral Arches of their Bridge over the Rhine, to be forthwith broken down, or otherwise that they will give Hostages, that the imperia ists shall not have any liberty to pais it this whole Campagne; to which our Magistrates have not as yet given any answer, but in the mean time have reinforced their Garri-fon in the Fort that guards their Bridge. The Prince of Baden has begun to block up Philipsburgh as well on this as the other fide of the Rhine, and has turned the courfe of the River which makes the communication between that place and the Rhine. The last week the Mareschal de Roche fort arrived at Saverne with 180 Waggons, laden with Ammunition and Provisions. It is beieved he will endeavor to remove the Imperialists from the Posts they have taken to block up Philipsburgh, or at leaft to put a good Convoy into it; and yesterday and this day we have news, that he is marched with 6000 Men to-wares Lauterburgh. The Dyet at Katisbonne has writ-ten to the 13 Suiffe Cantons, to defire them not to give any affiltance to the French as being contrary to the Alliance they have with the Emperor and the Empire.

Colegne, March 24. The report here is, that the Duke of Newburgh will put the Forces he has lately raifed into the fervice of the Emperor, though with what certainty we know not. From Strasburgh they write, That the Imperial Troops are marching from their feveral quatters, and that before the middle of the next month they will be in a Body, commanded by the Duke of Lorrain; for according to the advices from Vienva, Count Montecuculi will not go into the Field, but if his health permit, will come to strasburgh, or fome other conveent place near the Army, to give the Duke his advice upon all occafions. The death of the Electrefs of Bavatia, is confirmed by Letters from Mienic, which left that Court in great grief; fle was Sifter to the late Duke of Savo, and Coufin-Germain by her mother to the Moft Chriftian King that now is. The Marquis de Grana is not yet returned from the Hague.

Liege, March 24. The French continue to work in order to the demolishing of our Cittadel, all the Ammunition and Arms they have already transported to Maesfiricht, and yesterday most of the Cannon was likewife shipped to be carried thither. According to the advices we have here, they intend to blow up the Castle of Huy to morrow.

Bruffels, March 27. On Wednefday laft, all our Spanish Cavalry that were quartered at Louvain, Dieft, Halem, and those quarters, had orders to marth with all speed to Hassell, the quarters of Count Nassellau, and to obey his orders, who joined to them a considerable Body of Datch Troops, and marched with them towards the Meuse, upon a design, of which we are as yet ignorant, though

though some think it may be to intercept the French Garilon, who was to have drawn out of Huy yelterday. We are cold that the Governor of Acth is going to build a Cittadel for the farther security of that important place. We have advice from Lijle, of the 24 inflant, that great flore of Provisions had been fent from thence to Charleroy, to be Convoyed to Maestricht, for the fubfittence of a flying Army the Marefehal d'Estrades is to have in those parts. The 29 instant, the Marcschal sent 500 Horte and Dragoons as far as Stracsen.in Gelderland: where paffing unexpectedly over the Roer, they furprized that place, and in it two Troops of Horfe. The Sicur de Quinones hath obtained leave to quit his command of Mailtre de Camp General of the Forces of these Countries, which will be folely exercised for the future by the Count de Rajch. The French begin again to exact Contributions from the Dutchy of Fuliers. We hear for certain that the Imperial Army will be 30 000 men effective, and that it will begin to march about the middle of the next month, under the command of the Duke of Lorra.n, till such time as General Montecuculi arrive. We have the confirmation of the death of the Electress of Bavaria. From Spire we have Letters which say that the Mareschal de Rochefort was march-ing with a Body of 6000 Men towards the Palatinate.

Oftend, March 29. On the 25 instant, about four in the afternoon, appeared off of this Harbor seven Capers of Duskirk, five of them Frigats mounted from 8 to 26 Guns, and two Snaws of four Guns each. The lame night they made themselves Masters of a spanish Merchant ship belonging to, and coming from S chastian, laden to the value of 40 000 Gilders, which Prize they fent with the two Snaws for Dunkirk ; and in the mean time' the other five continued Cruifing on these Cossts. On the 27, within three leagues of the fhore, they came up with eight Billanders of this place, and two small Vessels belonging to Ftulbing, all richly laden, under the Convoy of two Men of War of this Port, the one mounted with 24 Guns, and 90 Men, and the other with 40 Guns, an 1 70 Men, and another Man of War of Zealind of 18 Guns, and 105 Men, coming from London. After a short but sharp dispute, the Capers poss fied themfelves of the eight Billanders, and the Zealand Convoy, the two Oftend Men of War, and the two Vcffels of Flusbing made their escape, the former having fullained little damage, and loft only three or four Men.

Hague, March 27. Yesterday the States of Holland Separated, after that the Prince of Orange had taken his leave of them in their Affembly, and that they had been wi h his Highness to refurn the Complement, and to with him a happy fuccels in this Campagne. Last night his Highness issued out orders, commanding all Officers to repair within 24 hours to their respective commands; and we are told that his Highness intends to part hence the 10th of the next month towards Rosenduil, the place appointed for the Rendezvous of his Forces, whither they are in the mean time marching. It is faid that the States have refolved to fend a Man of War to Gottenburgh, to bring over the Suedifh Plenipotentiaries de-Gened for the Congress at Nimeguen. We have Letters from Mentz which advife, That the whole Imperial Army will begin to march soon after Easter, under the command of the Duke of Lorrain; and from Eslingen they write, That the Marquis of Balen, and General Schultz, had made themfelves Mafters of Graben, Roujheim, and other Polts near Philipsburg, by which means they held it blocked up on that fide the Rhine, and that they were endeavouring to turn the course of the River which makes the communication between PLilipsburgh and the Rhine. Besides the eight Men of War which we formerly told you were failed out of the rezel with a secret Commission, there are six more fail to be gone out from Zealand, mounted each with 20 Guns, upon the fame defign. There are Letters from Copenhagen of the 8th inflant, which inform us, That they had there already complete for this Campagne 42 Regiments of Hotie Foot and Dragoons, ready to march; and that a Squaron of 16 Men of War, well provided, would be ready to fail in 8 or 10 dayes. And from *stock bolme*, of the first instant, we have advice, That there lay 12 ships ready to fail with Provisions for Pomeren, fo fuon as the weather would permit. Vessel come in from Palermo of a great Conspiracy that had been discovered at Meffina, for the burning the French Fleet in Port there, an the defitoying the Duke de Vivonne, and all the French that are there, and that it was gone fo far, as that 500 Spanish Soldiers had by the Confpirators been privately brought into the Town, when the whole matter was discovered to the Duke de Vivonne, who caufed the Authors to be feized, and afterwards punished with death ; but we know not how fir we may give credit to all these particulars, seeing our advices from Naples of a very freih date, only fay, that the Duke of Vivenne undertianos: g that the Viceroy of Sicily was marching towards Meffina, had thought fit to change the Garisons that were in some of the Outpolts, for fear of some intelligence the Enemy might

have formed among them. Paris, March 28 The Marelchal de Grequi is parted for Flanders, and the Marelchal de Monsmonency for Oermany. On Monday next the whole Court will remove to Versailles, where Monday next the whole Court Will remove to Verlaides, where it will continue till the Kings departure. Here has been much difcourfe as if the Dake de Creque was to go in a folemn Em-baffy to the Elector of Baweria. It is faid that the Kings Afmy in Alfatia this Campagne, will be compoled of 22 Battalions of Foot, each Battalion confifting in 800 men, befides Ca-valry. From Marfeilles we hear, that the Men of War and Gallies defigned with a farther fupply for Miffina, lie ready there and at Thuelon to fail with the first orders.
