Madrid, Octob. 13. N. S.

**W**E have Advice from Cadix, That the Galeons sailed from thence the 25th past for the West Indies, except 4 Merchant Ships, who not being ready, by reason they staid to take on Board the Goods of another Ship that proved Leaky, followed the 27th. On the 3d of this month Admiral Russell arrived in the Bay of Cadix with the Fleet under his Command. The Campaign is ended in Catalonia; The French have demolished Palamos, and the Spaniards reformed Ostalricks. The Moors continue before Ceuta.

*Venice, Oct. 14.* On Thursday last sailed hence a great Convoy for the Levant. And two new Gallies, and two Galeasses with several other Vessels, will be ready to depart by the end of this month, to joyn likewise the Venetian Fleet.

*Turin, Oct. 17.* The Forces of the Allies continue encamped near Rivolta; but 'tis believed they will separate in few days, and go to their Winter-quarters; The French lie still at Diban.

*Vienna, Oct. 19.* By Letters from Deua in Transilvania of the 8th instant, 'tis confirmed, That the Ottoman Army was marching back towards Orsova, where the Sultan intended to repass the Danube, and to Quarter his Troops in the Neighbouring Provinces. The Elector of Saxony was still encamped near Deua, and General Truchses near the Iron Gate, but would likewise put their Troops into Quarters, so soon as they heard the Enemies Troops were separated; Of the Imperial Forces, 7500 Horse, 5000 Dragoons, and 4500 Foot, are to Winter in Transilvania; and those Regiments that suffered the most in the late Action at Lugos, are to be removed to Upper Hungary; We have now received a certain account, That General Veterani was not carried by the Turks to Temiswarer, as was reported, but being ready to expire when he was taken, they cut off his Head, and carried it to the Grand Signior, who ordered it to be Buried with the Body. The Letters of the 12th instant from the Imperial Camp at Futacke near Peter Waradin, give an account, That the Detachment which General Staremberg had sent to the Save, where they plundered and burnt a Town called Cupina was come back; and that the General intended to send out another strong Party to annoy and alarm the Enemy.

*Cologne, Oct. 27.* The Letters from the Upper Rhine tell us, That the Forces on both sides are gone into their Winter-quarters; The Brandenburgers, who are to have theirs in this Dicecs, are on their march hither.

*Paris, Octob. 28.* The Mareschal de Boufflers is come hither from Melun, where he took a review of several Companies of the Guards, and will suddenly return to his Government of Flanders. The Mareschal de Villeroy, who is now visiting the Frontier places, is expected here the next week. The Duke de Vendome having put the Forces he Commands in Catalonia into their Winter-quarters will go to Provence, whereof he is Governor, and from thence return to Court. The Letters from Toulon continue to say, that all the Men of War in that Port are laid up, except such as are designed for Convoys. There are several new Edicts preparing to raise Money.

*Brussels, Oct. 30.* The French have begun to send away their Foot, which were Cantoned about Furnes, into their Winter-quarters; They are now working on their new Line between the Sambre and the Meuse; and are making an advanced Work at Charleroy. The Letters from Mons say, That the French Intendants have received Orders to Demand, besides all other Impositions, the 16th Penny of all the Revenues, belonging as well to the Nobility, as others, in the New Conquests.

*Hague, Nov. 1. N. S.* The States General have given new and very strict Orders to hinder the supplying the French with Horses; as has been already done by the Elector of Bavaria and the Elector of Cologne. The Letters from Flanders of the 30th past say, The Mareschal de Villeroy was still at Ipres, and that the French are working with great diligence on the new Outworks they are adding to the Fortifications of Mons and Charleroy.

*Kinsale, Oct. 13.* On Wednesday last arrived here His Majesty's Ships the *Lenox* Captain *Guy*; The *Rupert*, Captain *Dilkes*, the *Crown*, Captain *Wade*, and the *Owners-Love* Fireship; and on Thursday came in the *Norwich*, Captain *Crow*, with the *Katherine* Storeship, Captain *Atkins* from *Plimouth*; The *Owners Goodwill* of *London*, *Richard Aimes* Master, and the *Johanna* and *Anne* of *London*, both bound to *Limericke*; as also the *Betty* of this place from *Ostend*.

*Dublin, Oct. 17.* The two Houses of Parliament proceed in the dispatch of the Business before them. The Commons having resolved to continue the Additional Excise on Beer, Ale, and other Liquors, till the 25th of *December* 1698, they appointed a Committee to attend his Excellency the Lord Deputy with the said Vote, and humbly to desire that a Bill may be prepared in due Form, pursuant to the same, and transmitted into *England*. Heads of several other Bills have in like manner been laid before his Excellency to be transmitted into *England*. And this day the Commons were again in a Committee of the whole House, to consider of further Ways and Means to raise the Supply, and having agreed on an Estimate of what the Poll and continued Excise would amount to, they resolved to lay a Duty upon Tobacco to raise the rest of the Supply. Upon the News of His Majesty's safe arrival in *England*, here have been great Rejoycings, with Bonfires, Illuminations, and Ringing of Bells.

*Falmouth, Oct. 21.* Yesterday came into this Port the *Blackham* Frigate, *Thomas Newnham* Commander from *Scanderoon*, but last from *Malaga*; as also the *Mount Carmell* from *O-Porto*; and

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and a Dutch Privateer, Peter Bonne Commander, from Cruising.

Comes, Octob. 24. On Monday last came in here the *Thomas* of *Glasgow* from *Flushing*, who was taken by the French, and retaken by a Dutch Privateer, and is now proceeding on her Voyage to *St. Sebastian*.

Yarmouth, Oct. 25. Yesterday came into this Road His Majesty's Ships, the *Lincoln*, Captain *Chant*, and the *Mermaid*, Captain *Arby*, bound to the Northward; as also the *Samuel and Henry*, Captain *Saunders*, who, together with the *Penzance*, is to Convoy our laden Fleet to *Holland*.

Portsmouth, Oct. 25. The 23th in the evening came to *Spithead* the *Smirna Factor*, with several Vessels under her Convoy for the *Downes*.

Deale, Oct. 26. Last night came into the *Downes* from the Westward His Majesty's Ships the *Kings Fisher* and *Roebuck*, and under their Convoy, the *Friendship* and *Unity* from *New England*, and the *Eagle* from *Barbadoes*, with about 20 sail of Coasters, who are all failed for the River. Yesterday came in likewise a Ship from *Genova*, Captain *Giacomo Spatina* Commander.

Whitehall, October 25. The Commandore del Bene, Envoy Extraordinary from the Great Duke of *Tuscany*, had this day Audience of their Royal Highnesses, the Princess and Prince of *Denmark*, being Conducted by Sir *Charles Cotterel* Master of the Ceremonies.

Albrop, October 26. The King intends to stay here till Monday next; the Concourse is very great of the Nobility and Gentry that come to attend His Majesty. On Thursday last His Majesty Dined with the Earl of *Northampton* at *Castle Ashby*; and yesterday with the Earl of *Mountague* at *Boughton*. From hence His Majesty will go to *Stamford*, and so to *Lincoln*, and *Welbeck*.
